# "A Living Testament"

Bill Branham, of Aurora, will have a new story to share with his grandchildren after escaping virtually unharmed from an explosion which destroyed his camper and pickup Sunday morning.

Branham, 82, had spent the previous week at his deer-hunting campsite in the Piney Creek Wilderness in eastern Barry County, where he enjoyed time by himself filming deer and other wildlife.

"I'd been camping down there since Monday," Branham said. "Every night, I used the generator to fix my coffee before I went to bed. Then, every morning I got up and

heated the coffee in a metal pot on my propane stove. Sunday morning, though, when I ignited the lighter, the camper exploded."

Branham, who clearly remembers events as they unfolded, said he was thrown through the air, with the camper wall and the refrigerator going before him. When he was able to get his bearings, his first thought was to call for help.

"I sat up and looked for my telephone," Branham said, "and found it lying within arm's reach of me. In the camper, it had been lying on a little shelf beside where I'd been standing.

Bill Branham's camper (shown above) was destroyed in an explosion resulting from a propane leak Sunday morning. Branham had been camping in the Piney Creek Wilderness area in Barry County and was alone when the explosion occurred.

## Cassville Pantry offers food from a new location

In conjunction with the recognition of September as "Hunger Action Month," the Cassville Pantry has made a move to expand food distribution services in Cassville. They are now in their third week of operation at their new facility located at 800 W. 10th Street in Cassville.

According to Cassville Pantry director, Janet Mills, while the organization is still affiliated with the Cassville United Methodist Church, the new location offers much more space.

"The coronavirus revealed a greater need for food assistance services," Mills said, "and we are doing what we can to help.

"We had been providing food boxes entirely outside of the church building since March," she said, "but, now, with more space, we can accommodate visitors indoors. We have lots of room to operate efficiently, with the potential to grow in capacity to meet the growing needs of our community. It's especially important during the pandemic."

Mills, who has served as the Food Pantry director for the past 18 years at Cassville United Methodist, has moved, along with the pantry, to provide full-time leadership for programs offered at their new location.

The Cassville Pantry provides food assistance to Barry County families in need of groceries.

"Our agency is here to help put food on the table when times might be difficult," Mills said. "We come alongside people on fixed incomes and others who may be experiencing income-flow difficulties due to health or employment obstacles. We have the resources to help out if the food budget is not able to stretch far enough."

The Pantry offers three different food assistance programs.

Jasmine Luna, daughter of Suzanne Morin of Butterfield, knew something was wrong from the moment her body went numb at 18. For most twenty-two-year olds, life is about starting a career and starting a family. But for

agnosed with Multiple Sclerosis.

MS is a progressive disease that causes the immune system to eat away at the protective covering of nerves. It damages and disrupts the communication between the body and the brain.

Luna was diagnosed a week after her twenty second birthday with the lifechanging news. Luna worked at Walmart, a job she loved, when she first noticed her symptoms getting worse. It was hard for her to walk, climb a ladder, and lift boxes as heavy as twenty pounds.

"One night after work, my mom took me to the emergency room at Cassville Mercy where they told me that nothing was wrong and that it was just my low iron,"

that Multiple Sclerosis ran in my family because my father and his sister (my aunt) both have the disease."

After the ER visit, Luna's mom decided to take her to the primary doctor in Cassville where he referred Luna for an MRI in Bentonville.

After the MRI, the primary doctor called her a week later and confirmed that Jasmine did have Multiple Sclerosis.

"It was emotionally and physically draining," Luna said.

She has had trouble doing things she used to do in her everyday life. Drawing and cooking were two of Luna's favorite things to do, as well as favorite ways to unwind. Luna can't write her name





One food box is offered, per household address, once a month. The box will consist of dry goods as well as meat, bakery, and fresh produce. A selection of personal care items are included upon request.

We will ask for information about who lives in each household, including questions such as the name, address, and ages of all household members. We will try to fill the box with items that suit the dietary needs and cooking styles of each visitor so that we can give what aligns with their personal preferences.

• The USDA Distribution program occurs one afternoon each month, on the afternoon of the 4th Tuesday of every month. This is a government sponsored program. Upcoming dates for distribution include: Sept. 22, October 27 and November 24, from 3:30 - 5 p.m.

Recipients must meet a low-income criteria and be residents of Barry County. An assortment of dry goods, dairy, meat, and produce items are included in the box. They vary in type and quantity each month. Verification of household members, names, ages, and physical address will be requested. We give all these boxes away in one single 4th Tuesday afternoon, so be prepared to experience some wait time when receiving your box.

• The USDA Senior Box Commodity Supplemental Food Program occurs one day per month, on the Friday that follows the third Monday each month (\*date exceptions for holiday months).

Upcoming dates include: September 25 and October 23.

An application process and documentation are required. The food is distributed from 1 - 3 p.m. on the dates listed

This, too, is a governmentsponsored food assistance program for low income people age 60 and older. If there are two persons in the home over the age of 60 and the household qualifies by income, both persons can potentially receive a food box.

# Crane resident killed in crash

Jeffrey A. Holden, 42, of Crane, was killed in a crash that occurred at 2:15 a.m., September 20, on the westbound I-44 exit ramp 58, near Halltown.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol report, Holden's 2005 Ford Mustang was westbound on the exit ramp, when it left the roadway, hit an embankment and became airborne. After striking the ground and overturning, it hit a tree and came to rest on its top. Holden, who was not wearing a safety device, was ejected. He was pronounced deceased on the scene by Lawrence County deputy coroner Larry Eden at 3:35 a.m.

A passenger in Holden's vehicle, Kristen M. Hoss, 32, of Steelville, was taken to Mercy Hospital in Springfield by Mercy Lifeline, with serious injuries.

The body of the deceased was transported to Lakin Funeral Home in Pierce City. The vehicle was towed from



# Cassville School Board Met September 17

The major topics of discussion at the September 17th meeting of the Cassville Board of Education concerned updates to the Return to Learn plan, online learning, and health care in addition to regular business.

With over 200 people in quarantine through contact tracing and three active cases of COVID-19, the district has faced new challenges, triggering adjustments to the way the school year is progressing. Of the 200+ people in quarantine, 100 are sixth graders who are now in Engagement Level 3, working through online instruction from teachers via Google Classroom. At the time of the board meeting, an additional 46 students in 7th grade and 54 students in 8th grade were quarantined.

There are 100 students who have chosen to enroll in full time virtual learning through the Launch platform.

As part of their COVID-19 response, the Cassville District is now offering, at no cost, CoxHealth telemedicine services to all students (Pre-K through 12) and to all employees and their dependents. The estimated cost of this program to the district is approximately \$60,000. In addition to the telemed system at the elementary school, one will be installed at the high school, providing basic health care access.

The Board reviewed program evaluations of the assessment plan, enrollment statistics, media centers, school safety, wellness program, and fall sports. Copies of these can be found on the Board of Education meeting information tab on the district web page.

The Board approved the Consent Agenda, including the minutes of the August meeting, financial reports, bills, vendors, reports from

administrators, and the new substitute list. They also accepted the retirement resignation of Lisa Cooper from the Eunice Thomas Elementary office and congratulated Lisa on her retirement plans. Director of Learning Traci

Mitchell answered questions about the online learning platforms and the availability of Chromebooks to all K-12 students, thanks to assistance from the county CARES program. Technology Director Errick Fuchs has established five Wi-Fi "hotspots" for student access, programmed to accept only District Chromebooks.

Director of Learning Eric or draw anymore without it White updated the USDA program which provides free breakfast and lunch to all students, Pre-K through 12th grade, through December 31, 2020. School employees have also been offered a subsidy program for a main tray option for breakfast or lunch. Any "a la carte" items will cost extra for both students and employees.

In Action Items, the board reviewed the MSBA 2020A updates to board policy and Federal Title IX. They approved special education service contracts and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) Local Compliance Plan Certification.

Board members had an extended discussion on the current issues regarding COVID-19, contact tracing, quarantines, and masking requirements and would appreciate additional feedback from school staff.

Other topics considered included the annual refresher course for the Board of Education and updates on the Vision 150 projects.

After a closed executive session for legal and personnel matters, the Board adjourned.



Simpson, who immediately set out for the campsite. Wilma Branham followed in her own vehicle.

"I wanted Richard to get there first," she said, "because I wasn't sure what we'd come up on. When Bill called me, his voice didn't sound right. He told me his camper exploded, that he needed help, and that he was bleeding all over."

Richard Simpson didn't know what to expect when he arrived at the campsite either.

"I could see debris from the explosion before I ever got to the campsite," he said, "and I had a devastating feeling of bewilderment. Based on the amount of debris I was seeing, I was prepared for the worst.

"When I got to the site and found Dad up and walking, I couldn't believe it," he continued. "He was in a bit of shock: shaking uncontrollably, bleeding in several places and had debris all over his face and in his eyes. I sat him down and wrapped a blanket around him to try to stop his shaking, then cleaned up his face and eyes."

When Wilma Branham arrived at the scene, Simpson left her to watch over her husband while he called emergency dispatchers and directed them to the remote campsite, located south of Highway 76, between Highways 39 and EE.

Central Crossings Fire Department in Shell Knob was the first to arrive on the scene. According to fire chief, Rusty Rickard, the explosion occurred as the result of an undetected propane leak.

Branham was airlifted to

the Springfield hospital by Mercy Lifeline where he was given a thorough examination, including a "head-totoe scan," according to Wilma Branham.

"They found no broken bones, and his burns turned out to be only 1st degree," she said. "They kept him all day, but since his vital signs were good, they told us he could go home that same night."

"I walked out of the hospital on my own," Branham said, Monday. "I'm feeling good today. I just finished a big breakfast and am sitting here drinking coffee now."

Branham credits God for his amazing escape from serious injury. Richard Simpson calls him a living testament to God's protection.

Branham's thankful, too, that he didn't have company at the camp with him.

"My great-grandson had planned to drive down the night before, then changed his mind at the last minute," he said.

According to Richard Simpson, the blast had thrown Branham a distance of 30 feet from where the explosion had occurred. Debris from the explosion could be found in a 100-foot radius, with parts of it dangling from nearby trees.

According to Branham, the explosion destroyed both the camper and the pickup, but left two four-wheelers tied behind the camper in drivable condition.

Branham's granddaughter, Tia Burcham, calls her grandfather's story miraculous.

# Spire Missouri customers to see gas rates change

Spire Missouri, Inc. (Spire Missouri) natural gas customers will see rates change under a company filing that will take effect on October 1, 2020. The change reflects a change in the Weather Normalization Adjustment Rider (WNAR) which authorizes rate adjustments based on weather variations. The WNAR projects anticipated gas usage changes due to weather that is either warmer or colder than normal. The rate change in this filing generally reflects warmer than normal weather in the Spire East and Spire West districts.


The establishment of a WNAR was part of a March 2018 Public Service Commission decision in a general natural gas rate case filed by Spire Missouri. Under the WNAR, Spire Missouri will make adjustments based on

the weather twice a year. Under tariffs filed by the natural gas company, a Spire Missouri residential customer using 100 Ccf of natural gas in a given billing month will see a line item increase of \$1.22 in their bill.

Spire Missouri East provides natural gas service to approximately 654,600 customers in the City of St. Louis as well as the Missouri counties of St. Louis, St. Charles, Butler, Iron, Franklin, Jefferson, Madison, Crawford, St. Francois and Ste. Genevieve.

Spire Missouri West provides natural gas service to approximately 522,000 customers in Andrew, Barry, Barton, Bates, Buchanan, Carroll, Cass, Cedar, Christian, Clay, Clinton, Dade, DeKalb, Greene, Henry, Howard, Jackson, Jasper, Johnson, Lafayette, Law-

rence, McDonald, Moniteau, Pettis, Platte, Ray, Saline, Stone and Vernon counties.

# **Cassville mauls Rogersville in catfight**

When two state champion pedigreed programs from the Big 8 met on Friday night, both with 2-1 records, expectations for a nail-biting thriller were high. Instead, the Cassville Wildcats utterly dominated the Logan-Rogersville Wildcats. With the best ground game since Sherman razed Atlanta, Cassville rolled to a 30-0 halftime advantage and then coasted home with a 43-6 victory.

The first half saw Cassville amass 250 yards rushing. This game was over when the black-and-gold Wildcats executed a 10-play, 99-yard drive midway through the second quarter to take a 20-0 lead. There is nothing more demoralizing to a defense than surrendering the entire field on a single drive.

Cassville was energized by the return of Zack Coenen and Hayden Sink to the lineup. Coenen had not played a single snap since being injured in jamboree action, and Sink went down in the season opening loss to Mt. Vernon. The already potent Cassville running game reached an impressive level of dominance at Rogersville.

The stalwart Cassville defense was just as impressive. Brett Cooper intercepted a JJ O'Neal pass on the fourth snap of the game to set up the first scoring drive. Sink bulled into the endzone for the final 2 yards to finish an 11-play, 78-yard drive as the Wildcats took a 7-0 lead with 5:20 on the clock.

Rogersville managed one first down on the following possession, but then Cooper returned a Peyton Prenger punt down to set up a short field drive. Cassville covered the 31 yards in 3 plays, with Jericho Farris breaking tackles and turning a loss into a 15-yard touchdown run. Drake Reese added another PAT to push the lead to 14-0 with 1:28 left in the first quarter.

Rogersville again moved the chains before Prenger boomed a pretty punt that the coverage downed at the Cassville 1-yard line. That led to the Drive of Domination, and the recognition that Lance Parnell's team was playing at a different level on this night of football.

A Hernan Hernandez interception gave Sink and Company the ball back near midfield. Only a Drake Reese fumble on a jet sweep kept this from being a perfect half for Cassville.

But Cooper came up with another pick to give the offense one more shot as the clock wound down. Reese boomed a 25-yard field goal through the sticks on the final play of the half to give Cassville a 30-0 lead.

Coach Parnell has stressed many times over the years how important it is to score the last points of the first half and the first points of the second half. The Wildcats did just that at Rogersville, marching 65 yards with the third stanza kickoff. Coenen swept off left tackle for a 14yard score to boost the lead to 36-0.

Even though Reese banged the PAT attempt off the left upright, the running clock came into play as the lead grew.

With the game well in hand, substitutions were in order. Still, Cassville would score one more time. Trey Wilson exploded into the secondary off left tackle for a 36-yard touchdown run early in the final quarter.

Then Rogersville averted the shutout with a 10-yard scamper from Zack Bergmann on the game's last play. That final drive for Rogersville had coaches, fans, and announcers scrambling for their rulebooks. Reese's kickoff was accepted in the end zone, an automatic touchback. But the officials allowed the runback out to the 24-yard line. Then after Bergmann's score, teams were dismissed from the field without an extra point attempt. It was an odd ending to the game.

The teams lined up on their respective hash lines and offered the Covid salute to end the night with a gesture of respect.

On a night that began with seven Big 8 teams sporting 2-1 records, this was an opportunity to step up and separate from the pack. Cassville certainly did that with this 43-6 victory. The return of Sink and Coenen to the field added strength and versatility to an already potent offensive team.

The Cassville defense was just as impressive, showing noticeable improvement in the secondary. The Wildcats intercepted O'Neal, the gifted lefthander, three times and held the opposing running game in check while flirting with a shutout.



ries for 181 yards. Zack Coenen had 81 yards on 10 carries, Hayden Sink had 70 yards on 9 carries. Trey Wilson had 52 yards on just 5 carries.

In contrast, no Rogersville runner reached the 50-yard plateau, as the Cassville defense limited the home team to just 153 yards of total offense. Half of those yards came on the final scoring drive against the Cassville reserves.

The Wildcats return home on Friday night to host the 3-1 Lamar Tigers in a Big 8 West clash. Kickoff is set for 7 PM.

## New rates affect Empire customers

Tariffs reflecting a decision made by the Missouri Public Service Commission in an electric rate case filed by The Empire District Electric Company, a Liberty Utilities Company (Empire), will take effect on September 16, 2020.

The tariffs reflect an electric rate increase of approximately \$992,400. For a residential using approximately 1,000 kWh (1,000 kilowatthours) a month, electric rates will increase by approximately \$0.48 a month (0.37%). When Empire filed its rate case on August 14, 2019, it sought to increase annual electric revenues by approximately \$26.5 million. For a residential customer using 1,000 kWh a month, the rate request would have increased electric rates by approximately \$7.85 a month.

Empire will continue various energy efficiency and low-income programs as well as the Fuel Adjustment

BIG or small --

Charge (FAC) under the rate case decision. The FAC adjusts customer bills twice a year (June and December) to reflect increases or decreases in fuel and purchased power costs.

The Commission also addressed Empire customer service issues. At local public hearings held in Bolivar, Joplin and Branson in February, the most frequent complaint regarding Empire's service involved the number of estimated bills and the difficulty in addressing estimated bills with Empire.

"While the Commission finds that Empire is taking steps to improve its customer service, the Commission believes it is important to monitor Empire's progress related to meter reading and billing," said the Commission.

The Commission has directed Empire to initiate quarterly reports to the PSC Staff and the Office of the



## MDC wants your turkey feathers

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is asking Missouri turkey hunters to save and share feathers from birds they harvest this fall for part of a new research project to help improve wild turkey management in Missouri.

MDC will send participating hunters materials needed to submit feathers, including a postage-paid envelope for feather submissions. The materials will contain instructions about which feathers to submit. MDC asks hunters to return the requested feathers in the postage-paid envelope provided. Participating hunters will also need to include the Telecheck identification number for the harvested bird to help MDC determine from which Missouri county it was taken.

MDC asks participating hunters to retain their turkey carcasses until MDC materials arrive, or to remove a wing from the turkey and several feathers from the lower portion of the breast.

Turkey hunters who want to participate in the MDC research project can get more information and provide their mailing addresses at mdc.mo.gov/turkeyfeathers. They can also call MDC at 573-815-7901 ext. 2940, or email MDC's Wild Turkey Management Program at wildturkeymgmt@ mdc.mo.gov.

## Sept. 21-27 is Rail Safety Week

JEFFERSON CITY - Each year, on average, there are 35 highway rail crossing collisions and five fatalities in Missouri, in addition to injuries and fatalities suffered by people trespassing on train tracks.
