# Purdy Schools nears completion of new performing arts, early childhood center

### **BUILDING TO BE OPEN FOR PERFORMANCES IN DECEMBER**

Purdy R-II School District is getting closer to finishing the new building on campus that will serve as a

performing arts and early childhood center. According to Purdy superintendent Dr. Steven Chancellor, the exterior should be completed in the next week and the remaining work will be on finishing touches inside. Dr. Chancellor said, "At this point, we're probably

# Purdy Police searching for suspects in vandalism streak

The Purdy Police Department is asking for help in identifying two suspects accused of vandalizing multiple properties in the city on Sunday night. According to the department, five different properties were vandalized with spray paint between Sunday late night, September 23, and Monday early morning, September 24.

The Purdy Police initially reached out to the public to identify the vandals on Monday through a Facebook post. After more information was gathered, they posted pictures on the

police department's Facebook.\*

In all, five organizations or businesses were vandalized. They were the Purdy School, Purdy Fire Department, a trailer owned by the Purdy Farm Center, the First Baptist Church of Purdy and the Purdy City Park. Spray paint was used in each of the cases, and investigators found a can of spray paint and two gloves by a dumpster following the crimes.

The vandalism was specific in some cases, but primarily centered around generic phrasing and shock and awe comments. The fire depart-

The Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce announced their selection for the new chamber director beginning in October. Rachael Freeman starts in her new position in October.

Freeman replaces former director Brittany Crawford who announced she was leaving to pursue a career with Barry Electric Cooperative after serving as director for just over three years.

under budget, Dr. Chancellor happily announced.

Voters approved a \$2.3 million bond initiative on the August 2016 ballot. The bond was dedicated to constructing the new building with the aid of FEMA funding. Of the entire \$4.165 million price tag, \$2.3 million is a bond, FEMA contributed \$1.579 million and the remaining approximate \$286,000 is the responsibility of the district.

Dr. Chancellor said, "We are on budget. So far, there has only been \$17,000 in change orders, and we had set back \$125,000 set aside for contingencies. R.E. Smith has been fantastic and really looked out for the district."

He added, "We had some delays due to wind with putting up the outside panels. It was an exceptionally windy winter and spring. However, there haven't been any significant delays, just common building delays."

At approximately 8,000 square feet, the performing arts and early childhood center will house a new preschool, new parking and a new band/choir room. The performing arts center will seat approximately 700 people. As a FEMA-approved storm shelter, the building will hold 1,200 in the event of severe weather.

The shelter will automatically open in the event of severe weather. Letters will be mailed to residents within the boundaries of safe evacuation to know the building will serve as their shelter. FEMA regulations also ensure anyone can use the shelter in the event of a tornadic event. With all of the pieces fitting together, Dr. Chancellor said the final steps to the physical completion should be done in mid-October. At that point, they will have technology installed, such as the audio/visual components. He said, "Outside, all we have left is to pour the parking lot and install the light poles. On the inside, we need finishing details like the cabinets and the counter tops. We'll also be finishing the tile grout and painting."





Dr. Chancellor said the last physical aspects are the sound treatments. Since FEMA buildings are essentially a concrete box, sound treatments are essential to ensure the buildings are able to be used for performances and other activities. Without those treatments, the echo off of the walls makes it impossible for the school to use the facilities for various purposes.

Dr. Chancellor said students and staff alike are excited about the opportunities that will open with the new performing arts and early childhood center.

He said, "We didn't have a place of quality to complement what the kids in our district are doing.

"The kids always do great, but what we had before was something serviceable, not great like the performances they give."


Margaret Amanda Peak, age 90, of Cassville, passed away Thursday, September 20, 2018, at her home.



# Whistlin' along: The man behind melodies heard around Cassville

### the shade of an old maple tree, he whistles his worries away, waving to passersby and sharing his talent with anyone willing to take the time to listen.

For over fifty years, Ed Sanders and his late wife, Lenora, have made their home in southwest Missouri. Moving to Cassville in 1966 to teach high school math and science and coach junior high basketball, Sanders and his wife set roots down in our community, bringing his lifelong whistling talent with him.

Sanders began whistling around the age of four, starting at home. Every evening after supper, the family gathered in their living room around the glow of their aladdin lamp and played dominoes or relaxed and visited. His sister, who was five years older than him, had learned to play piano and sometimes played songs for the family.

Sanders whistled along.

"I could pick out the notes of the melody and I'd whistle those notes," Sanders said. Over time, his talent developed, and he began whistling at events his family attended. "I'd whistle some songs at the dances and people would come by and comment."

Life wasn't always as carefree as his tunes, though. As a young man in Silver City, Iowa, Sanders was a promising basketball player, but in 1948 at the age of 12, tragedy struck. On the way back from a family trip to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation and the Black Hills of South Dakota, they stopped at their cousin's farm in central Nebraska. After an evening of riding calves in the barnyard, Sanders developed a severe headache, one that lasted the night. When his parents took him to the local doctor the next morn-

ing, he instructed them to drive back home immediately and have Sanders visit the hospital nearest their hometown.

At the time, Council Bluffs, Iowa, had the closest hospital to their home in Silver City, and they checked him in to be tested. The doctors tapped his spinal cord, and three hours later the diagnosis was confirmed. It was polio. Sanders remained in the hospital for six months to receive treatment, battling a high fever for the first six weeks as he slipped in and out of consciousness.

Despite the pain and fever, he whistled a tune once in a while to keep his spirits up. After multiple treatments, he was cleared to return home. But his life was forever changed. He was forced to learn to walk again using a combination of leg straps, crutches and eventually a brace once

his sense of balance had returned.

Sanders' own father played a pivotal role in helping him cope with the effects of polio, having suffered a severe a buzz saw injury of his own that debilitated his right arm. "He was encouraging," Sanders said. Though he learned to handle his new circumstances, Sanders' basketball dreams were over. It was then that whistling became central to his life.

After high school, Sanders attended business school and eventually took a job in an accounting office. During this time he would attend three different Catholic churches in Council Bluffs just to hear the steam organs play "Danny Boy." Sanders whistled the melody and on one occasion was called up front by the priest to whistle along with the organ on a microphone. "Danny Boy" became one of



his favorite songs.

A friend eventually talked him into getting his teaching degree, and he started to follow a new path in life. At a time when the Soviet Union was leading the space race with the launch of Soviet satellite, Sputnik, America encouraged students to pursue careers in math and science. As a result, Sanders received a grant from the National Science Foundation to further his education, receiving Master's degrees in both math and physics.

He took teaching positions in both Iowa and Missouri, and through it all, he whistled to his heart's con-

tent, even while he worked. "It stops me from thinking negative thoughts," Sanders said. "When I'm whistling, I'm not thinking, not of anything negative."

Sanders' life was peppered with a few tragedies that would challenge his cheerful attitude. Undoubtedly the worst tragedy was when his oldest son passed away unexpectedly. Once a little time had passed, pastors from various churches in Barry County and neighboring counties began to contact Sanders and his wife, asking them to reach out to their church members who had also suffered the loss of a child. They

traveled to those churches to help the families in need, sometimes meeting with the family privately and other times addressing the entire congregation.

"I was raised to think about what we should do, not what not to do," Sanders said, adding that he feels we are supposed to help those we see in need. While guiding families through their loss, Sanders would sometimes be asked to perform at these churches, whistling the tunes of favorites such as "Mansion over the Hilltop" and "Red River Valley." Over the course of a decade, Sanders and his wife helped members of various communities in southwest Missouri learn to cope with their grief.

Sanders continues to inspire members of the community today. He speaks to young people about their lives and encourages parents to help their children find their talent and build pride in themselves, perhaps sharing that talent with others. "Every kid needs something. Something to lift his spirit-singing, playing an instrument, whistling—something to keep depression from setting in." And that talent can carry over into adulthood.

"We need to work at healing a bad disease that's

taking over the situation in our country, and that disease is me-ism." He stresses that we should find something we're good at and use it to help other people as well as ourselves. "Their talent might have some effect on them to bring them out of a negative attitude or thoughts."

For this former accountant and teacher, it is clear that whistling has become much more than a pastime. It is the first thing he does in the morning and the last thing he does before bed. Whistling has kept him on a good path through life despite the challenges that have been thrown his way.

Though Sanders has performed in front of church congregations and has recorded his whistled songs as gifts to give to friends, he confesses he'd like to record his talent one more time. "One of my goals left in life is to make another recording right here in the courthouse," he said, noting the quality of the acoustics in the building.

Until then, you'll find Ed Sanders out and about town, encouraging others, giving a friendly wave and whistling a happy tune.

# Wildcats dominate Patriots in 47-0 road win

How dominant were the Wildcats in Cassville's 47-0 shutout victory at East Newton on Friday night? One play pretty much summed up the game.

Early in the second quarter, the Cats were flagged for running into the kicker on a punt that Blake Gordon returned all the way down to the East Newton 30-yard line. Instead of taking the 5-yards and kicking again, the Pats declined the penalty, fearing an even more damaging return.

East Newton declined the penalty and let Cassville keep the ball at East Newton's own 30-yard line. Let that soak in for a minute.

It was just one of a number of wild plays at Granby on a wet field. Cassville improved to 5-0 with the 47-0 victory, while East Newton rode the graveyard spiral to 0-5. The Wildcats have already won as many games this season as the Patriots have won in the last five years.

Cassville didn't fool around any in this projected mismatch. A stifling defense, big plays on offense, big plays on special teams and turnovers led to a cringeworthy 47-0 score with 8:50 remaining in the second quarter.

The punt return unit and defense set up the Cassville offense with ridiculously short field position on several drives. Those seven touchdowns came on just 15 offensive snaps.

Shannon Haney threw deep to Bowen Preddy for a 50-yard touchdown strike to open the scoring. (A twoplay drive)

Tolbert scored after Hoppes returned a punt down to the East Newton 6-yard line. (A one-play drive)

Preddy scored on a 14-yard run after the defense recovered a fumble at the East Newton 26-yard line. (A two-play drive)

Haney scored on a 4-yard keeper on third down after DJ White returned a punt to the East Newton 20-yard line. (A five-play drive)

Haney rolled right and threw a 27-yard scoring strike to White after East Newton shanked a punt out of bounds. (A one-play drive) All that in the first quarter gave Cassville a 34-0 lead.
