# Southwest leads county's schools in Annual Progress Report

The Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) released the Annual Progress Reports (APRs), evaluating schools on their progress. This year, Southwest R-V District came in as the highest rated school in the county, earning a 88.6 percent. Southwest Superintendent Tosha Tilford said, "I am so proud of the students, teachers and staff."

She continued, "Although we are proud that we are the top performing district in the area, we are not satisfied with our performance level. The Southwest R-V School District has the philosophy that all Southwest students can improve academically, and all staff, faculty, and administrators have room to grow professionally."

Area schools are evaluated in five different categories: Academic Achievement, Subgroup Achievement, College and Career Ready, Attendance and Graduation Rate. Each of the categories has specific goals schools need to achieve to keep up with state standards and ensure students have a solid education by graduation.

Academic achievement is based on Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) scores, using both initial scores and

students' growth over time to determine the school's overall score. Subgroup achievement relates to subgroup students, such as those on the free/reduced lunch program, different racial/ethnic backgrounds, English language learners and students with disabilities improving over time.

Other assessment tools, like college and career readiness, attendance and graduation rates are all self explanatory. This year, Southwest's scores were at 88.6 percent. Comparatively, Monett earned a 88.2 percent, Cassville a 84.6 percent, Wheaton 86.1 percent, Exeter 83.2 percent and Purdy 77.1 percent.

While Southwest's numbers topped the county's school for this year, they did dip slightly from last year. In 2015, Southwest scored 92.5 percent. Exeter and Monett's APR percentages also dipped slightly.

Cassville, Purdy and Wheaton all saw improvements over 2015's scores. All buildings are taken into account on the APR percentages.

According to a DESE press release, Missouri schools ranged from 28 percent to 100 percent, with the average score being 90 percent statewide.

# Portrait of a veteran: Maloney recounts extraordinary acts of service

Children in the Cassville area like to bump into Bill Maloney, a retired realtor from the area. When they do, Maloney pulls out a stack of one dollar bills from his shirt pocket and gives them a dollar. No rhyme or reason, just a random act of kindness. But for those kids, as well as the adults in the area who have crossed paths with Maloney, they don't realize his history nor do they know his stories of service in the United States

Air Force that seem larger than life.

Maloney is a pleasant, jovial man. At 85 years old, he's still sharp as a tack, retelling stories from years past like they just happened yesterday, and at first, his tales seem a bit too fantastical to be believed. But if doubt creeps in, making you wonder if he's pulling your leg, he can show you a photo of Air Force One signed for him by President Richard Nixon's pilot, and you believe again.

Inside this issue:

Maloney was raised on a farm on the White River just south of Barry County in Arkansas. After high school, he went to college in Springfield at the business college there. While in college, he joined the naval reserves, and then enlisted with the Air Force.

Maloney's beginnings in the Air Force were unusual, to say the least. He said, "Well, they gave me that first test, and I got 100 percent on it. Out of 144 who took the test, I was the only one

who scored 100. Then, they didn't believe me, so I took it again and got 100 again. Every test they gave me in the service, I never missed one. And they just couldn't believe that." Maloney's perfect test scores caught the eye of some of the more prominent officers, and he was assigned to be in intelligence.

During the Korean War, Maloney and his wife, Virginia, were stationed in Tokyo. From there, Maloney was able to travel into

A Ford Explorer and John Deere Gator utility vehicle collided on Monday morning on a farm road south of Cassville. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the driver of the Gator had minor injuries from the collision.

Joshua M. Crouch, 19, of Washburn, was driving a 2006 John Deere Gator across Farm Road 1110, about 1.5 miles south of Cassville. Crouch was crossing Farm Road 1110 from one private drive to another private drive when he failed to yield and struck an SUV in the side. The other vehicle, a 2012 Ford Explorer, driven by Debra L. Mitchell, 61, of Cassville, was moderately damaged.

Crouch had minor injuries from the crash but refused treatment, according to the crash report. The Gator had extensive damage and

was driven from the scene. Crouch was exempt from any type of safety device in the

utility vehicle. Mitchell had no reported injuries at the time of the report.







# Improve indoor air quality in advance of winter

Upon the arrival of winter, people in regions where winter is marked by cold weather tend to spend significantly more time indoors. Because windows tend to be closed during winter, indoor air quality can suffer, making conditions inside a home less than desirable.

According to the American Lung Association, poor air circulation in a home can promote the spread of bacteria and viruses. Once such bacteria or viruses are inhaled, coughs, colds and flu can spread. In addition, asthma and allergy sufferers may experience worsening symptoms thanks to the presence of endotoxins, which are substances that come from the broken-down cells of dead bacteria.

Because many people spend significantly more time indoors during winter than other times of the year, it's essential that they take measures to improve indoor air quality in the months ahead.

· Cut back on chemicals. It's ideal to avoid heavy chemical usage inside a home throughout the year, but it's especially important to do so during winter. Solvent-based cleaners or cleaning products with strong fragrances can negatively affect indoor air quality and potentially trigger allergic reactions. In lieu of chemically-enhanced cleaning products, use natural products that get the job done without sacrificing indoor air quality.

· Stop smoking indoors. Tobacco smoke can affect smokers and nonsmokers alike. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention note that secondhand smoke causes numerous health problems in infants and children. Those include more frequent and severe asthma attacks and respiratory infections. In addition, reports from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services have linked secondhand smoke to an increased risk of sudden infant death syndrome. Adults exposed to secondhand smoke are at greater risk for coronary heart disease, stroke and lung cancer. Tobacco smoke contains thousands of pollutants that can greatly diminish indoor air quality, so make sure smokers limit their smoking to outside the home throughout the year, but especially



during winter.

· Take off your shoes when entering the home. Snowy conditions often require a home's inhabitants and guests to remove their footwear upon entering a home, but it helps to remove footwear in a mudroom or just inside the front door when entering a home even when it's not snowing. Shoes can pick up dirt, dust and a host of other particles during winter, and if tracked inside those unwanted guests can negatively affect indoor air quality.

· Routinely inspect bathrooms for mold. During winter, mold can grow in rooms that are exposed to moisture but not properly ventilated. In many homes, that's the bathroom. Even if a bathroom has a ventilation fan, routinely inspect the ceiling and shower for mold growth. Exposure to mold can cause a host of negative side effects, including nasal and sinus congestion and sore throat. Mold also can exacerbate asthma symptoms.

Improving and maintaining indoor air quality in winter can help a home's inhabitants stay healthy during the colder months.

Veterans Day, once known as Armistice Day, was first celebrated on November 11, 1919, the anniversary of the end of World War I. In 1928, the United States Congress passed a resolution for Armistice Day to be an annual observation, and by 1938, the day became a national

Differing from Memorial The family will receive Day in May, Armistice Day, which would be renamed Veterans Day in 1954 under President Dwight Eisenhower, pays tribute to veterans who survived various wars. Memorial Day commemorates those veterans who lost their lives.

Americans celebrate Veterans Day, while residents of Great Britain, Canada and Australia celebrate Remembrance Day. Those who want to learn more about Veterans Day can consider the following facts.

- · According to the American Community Survey, there were 19.3 million military veterans in the United States in 2014. Of those, 1.6 million were female.
- California, Texas and Florida comprise the states with the largest number of veterans, equalling one million or more.
- · Veterans consist of people who served in the military. This includes the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard. Veterans serve in times of war and peace.
  - word "veteran"

comes from the Old English language and means "old, experienced soldier." The first use of the word was documented in 1789.

· Although many veterans are working, and the average annual income of male veterans is \$37,000, some veterans continue to be unemployed. According to data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the overall unemployment rate for veterans rose to 7.6 percent in January 2013. The unemployment rate of post-9/11 veterans or those who participated in the Gulf War reached 6.2 percent.

· Upon retiring or being discharged, veterans may need help acclimating to life outside the military. The Department of Veterans Affairs says about 30 percent of Vietnam War veterans have been diagnosed with posttraumatic stress disorder, or PTSD.

· Between 1971 and 1977, Veterans Day was celebrated on the fourth Monday in October. It was changed back to its original date, November 11, in 1975 when President Gerald Ford signed bill S.331 into law. The change went into effect beginning in 1978.


· An American soldier


government places a wreath on the grave.

Maloney said he was sent in because of a specific skill he has, one that was very useful when gathering information and investigating. He said, "When they sent me over there, they said they knew I didn't have to write anything down. I could go in without a pencil or anything. I just remember it." His ability to recount details would prove vital many times in his military career, but his life as well.

During the investigation, Maloney asked the secretaries what they did with their typewriter ribbons at the end of the day. The ribbons were supposed to be cut and then burned by the sergeant, but Maloney discovered the ribbons were being taken home by the secretaries. Vital military secrets were intentionally being leaked and many men were dying because of it.

As his investigation progressed, the sergeant in charge of the office began following Maloney closely. He said, "He was stuck to me, followed me everywhere. Then, one day, I was walking away from him, and he drew his gun. He didn't want me alive. He was going to shoot me in the back." At that moment, another sergeant drew his weapon and shot the treasonous sergeant dead.

Following that, Maloney said the five secretaries and six more people were arrested and then executed for treason.

Maloney traveled all over the east while stationed in Toyko. As a Personnel Sergeant Major in 6002nd Air Intelligence, he investigated and protected military personnel. He also served as Chief Officer of Retirements.

As Chief Officer of Retirements, Maloney said he received a phone call from a pilot who had been served his mandatory retirement from the Air Force. Maloney said, "He called me and said, 'I've just been assigned to be President Nixon's pilot, what do I do? You just retired me."

So Maloney retracted his retirement and got him back in the cockpit to fly for President Nixon. He said, "He promised me the first time he flew, he'd send me a picture, and he did." Maloney still has the picture sent to him.

For 28 years, Maloney served in the United States Air Force. His stories are plentiful, seemingly too incredible for the friendly man who hands out dollars to kids at local restaurants and the grocery store.

Maloney retired from the Air Force and moved to Cassville, opening a real estate office. While he retired, Maloney never stops paying attention and taking mental notes around him. He seems to always find himself in the midst of things where he can help. After his retirement, his incredible attention to detail helped with a huge FBI investigation.

Maloney said, "You know the Oklahoma City bombing? I helped catch them."

Maloney's story was of his encounter with bomber Timothy McVeigh and two other men in none other than his real estate office in Cassville.

Maloney said, "I had a man come in wanting to look at some secluded property around here." One of the men who came into his office was McVeigh himself. While they didn't end up buying the property, Maloney took note of them, surveyed their appearances, just as he always did, and when he saw the sketch following the bombing, he immediately called in saying he could describe the other two men.

Maloney's attention to detail, even down to the degree of angle in one of the men's noses and the tread of his shoes, helped the FBI and profiler Jeanne Boylan identify accomplices.

Boylan wrote about

Maloney in her book, "Portraits of Guilt: The Woman Who Profiles the Faces of America's Deadliest Criminals."

Maloney will always be on alert. He's always watching, and it's saved many people during his service and after. Some of those stories, he still doesn't share due to the sensitive nature of the secrets he's kept.

Beyond the uniform, Maloney lives life to the fullest. He was married to his wife, Virginia, until she passed away in 2007 after over 50 years of marriage. He said, "She was quite a woman," with a twinkle in his eye. The woman he loved, he met when he was five years old near his family's farm on the White River. Virginia threw an apple

at him from an apple tree, and eventually, they would wed and spend their lives together.

He and Virginia had Teresa, children,

Nancy, Rebecca and Tim, and adopted Sara while he was in the service in Texas. Rebecca passed away. He also has seven granddaugh-

### Sales tax still up for year despite dip in October

Both Cassville and Barry County's annual sales tax figures are up over last year's totals, despite a decent dip in sales for the month of October. Barry County's general revenue sales tax is currently up 1.93 percent over 2015 in the same time frame, and Cassville is up 0.5 percent over last year.

Sales tax collected in October for Barry County was down 15.22 percent when compared to October 2015. Revenue collected for October 2016 was \$133,321.99 for the general 1/2 cent tax, which was a \$25,141.68 loss from last

Cassville was down, but not as significantly as Barry County, with a 5.6 percent drop in October. Cassville's general one-cent tax generated \$57,035.58, a bit of a discrepancy when compared to 2015's \$60,422.98.


Currently, Barry County's general 1/2 cent tax has generated \$1,867,527.66, a 1.93 percent increase over last year's revenue at this time. The county's 1/8 cent general revenue is up 3.01 percent over last year, with \$468,392.28 in revenue thus far for 2016.

With all of Cassville's taxes taken into account, the city has generated \$2,004,706.45 in sales tax revenue thus far in 2016. That total is \$149,640.78 over the budget. This year, Cassville's 3/8-cent transportation sales tax has generated \$315,976.80, nearing 2015's total of \$332,460.99.

If next month proves to be a positive figure for the city and county in sales tax revenue, both will finish the year ahead of totals from 2015. Cassville had four months of sales tax revenue that were less than 2015. Barry County had five months that were less than last year.

Several high school students joined him on the floor to kick off the challenge. The audience awarded McMillin and his troops with a standing ovation upon completion of their 22nd push up.

# Tips for cooking the perfect Thanksgiving turkey

Cooking a large Thanksgiving turkey can seem daunting, especially to a novice cook, but it's not that difficult, says a University of Missouri Extension nutrition specialist.

The first question: to stuff or not to stuff.

"We don't recommend stuffing the turkey," said Tammy Roberts. It's safer to cook the stuffing outside the turkey in a casserole dish. That's because it takes stuffing a long time to reach a safe internal temperature when cooked inside the cavity of the bird. Roberts says more people get sick whenever the turkey is stuffed with stuffing.

If your heart is set on a stuffed turkey, there are ways to do it safely.

Prepare the stuffing right as you're getting ready to put the turkey in the oven, and stuff it loosely," Roberts says. Packing the stuffing loosely will make it reach a safe temperature much

Once it's ready for the oven, put the turkey, breastside up, on a rack in a shallow pan. Using a rack lets the drippings fall below the turkey and will help to evenly distribute the heat around the bird, Roberts

Then grab a meat thermometer. "Place the meat thermometer in the thickest part of the breast or the thickest part of the thigh, and roast the turkey until the thermometer reaches a minimum of 165 degrees," she says.

Make sure the thermometer is not touching bone. The temperature of the bone will go up faster than the meat.

Set the oven for 325 degrees. An 8- to 12-pound unstuffed turkey will take about 2 3/4 to three hours to cook. A stuffed turkey of the same size will take three to 3 1/2 hours, Roberts says.

Some turkeys you buy are labeled "basted" or "selfbasting." That means the


meat has been injected with something to make it flavorful and moist, Roberts says, adding that instead you might want to do that yourself with butter, oil, broth or spices.


But there's no need to baste while the turkey is cooking. The image of mom lovingly spooning the juices over the roasting turkey is a perfect Norman Rockwell picture, but it doesn't really add to the flavor.

"The liquid only penetrates about an eighth to a quarter of an inch, so it only makes a difference in the very top layer of the turkey," Roberts says.

There is one trick for a moister turkey.

"Once you take the turkey out of the oven, allow it to sit for 20 minutes," she says. "That allows for the even redistribution of the juices so they spread back through the turkey, and the whole turkey will be moist."

# Exeter man jailed after allegedly assaulting his wife at Jersey's

Exeter man Ernest John Jones, 38, was taken into custody and charged after allegedly assaulting his wife at Jersey's Bar in Cassville. According to the affidavit of probable cause by the Cassville Police Department, officers arrived to find Jones' wife unconscious on the floor

on Saturday, November 5.

According to the report, the bartender at Jersey's reported that Jones grabbed his wife by the hair and then punched her in the face until she lost consciousness. Jones allegedly refused to leave the bar and continued to fight with wife despite being asked to leave.

Jones' wife was reported to have lost consciousness for seven minutes.

Jones is in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$50,000 cash-only bond. Jones is charged with domestic assault in the second degree.

# Plan thaw time for this year's turkey

Don't get stuck with a turkey that's too small for the feast or one that's still frozen solid on Thanksgiving morning.

Buying the right size turkey and planning for defrost time can prevent Thanksgiving Day disasters.

"If you want to have leftovers after Thanksgiving, make sure you buy 1 pound of whole turkey per person," said Tammy Roberts, nutrition specialist for University of Missouri Extension.

A rule of thumb is 3/4 pound of turkey per person if you don't want leftovers or if you're cooking a turkey breast, Roberts said. For a boneless turkey breast, you'll need a half pound per per-

In the grocery store, turkeys might be labeled "hens" or "toms." Many believe hens are tenderer, but Roberts said that's not true. Hen and tom just refer to the size of the bird, and hens are smaller than toms.

Once you've picked an appropriately proportioned bird, make sure you give yourself enough time to defrost it.

"The safest way to defrost a turkey is in the refrigerator," Roberts said. "You need to allow one day of thawing for every 5 pounds of turkey."

That means you need to start defrosting the average bird four to five days before Thanksgiving. If time is short, a quicker but still safe way to defrost a turkey is with a cold-water bath, she said. Completely submerge the wrapped turkey in cold water, and change the water every half hour. This method requires about 30 minutes of thawing for every pound of turkey.

Most importantly, never defrost a turkey on the countertop at room temperature. "Just get the thought out of your mind, because it's not safe," Roberts said.

When you leave a whole frozen turkey out at room temperature, the outside will reach 40 degrees Fahrenheit while the inside is still frozen. At that temperature, harmful bacteria can grow.

You can defrost a turkey in a microwave, but parts of the turkey will get warmer than others. "Once it's finished in the microwave, you need to put it in the oven immediately," Roberts said.

Barry County's numbers came in with 775 antlered bucks, 100 button bucks, 445 does and a county total of 1,320.

Last year, hunters checked 93,896 deer during the opening weekend of the 2015 November portion of firearms deer season.

# Bringing bulbs inside means spring in winter

Fall is here, and already we are looking forward to spring. But why not bring a bit of spring indoors during the winter? An excellent way to do this is by forcing spring-blooming bulbs into bloom in midwinter, according to Patrick Byers, horticulture specialist with University of Missouri Ex-

Common bulbs used for forcing are tulip (require 15-18 weeks of chilling before planting), daffodil (chill 8-12 weeks), crocus (chill 6-8 weeks), grape hyacinth (chill 10-12 weeks). You can also use snowdrops and hyacinths.

"To help mimic winter, keep bulbs chilled in a refrigerator. Pot them up (in shallow pots) before the end of October and then keep them in a cool area until they sprout. Good areas include a barely heated garage, a barn, a cool basement, or an enclosed porch," said Patrick Byers, horticulture specialist with University of Missouri Extension.

Bring the container out of cool storage when growth pops up an inch or so above the soil and put it in a well-lit location. A full sun, southern exposure may get too warm and reduce blooming. Water the container lightly if the soil dries out. Plants will bloom in three to four weeks.

"Bulbs must develop a root system after planting but before bloom. Cool temperatures are needed for this to happen, and 40 degrees is ideal," said Byers.

After blooming is done and the weather outside warms, gradually get the plants outdoors a few hours each day and then transplant them into the ground.

"Forcing bulbs is stressful to them and more tender types, like hyacinths and tulips, may not survive into next year," said Byers.

# MDC analyzing new samples for Chronic Wasting Disease

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reports that it collected approximately 19,200 tissue samples for chronic-wasting-disease (CWD) testing from this past weekend's mandatory sampling efforts at 75 stations in 29 counties in and around where the fatal deer disease has been found in northeast, central,

and east-central Missouri. The Department's goal was 18,000 - 20,000 tissue samples collected.

Department staff will send the collected tissue samples to an outside laboratory that specializes in wildlife disease testing. MDC expects test results to begin being available in 4-6 weeks. Hunters can get free

test results for their harvested deer online at mdc. mo.gov/CWDtestresults.

"Thank you to the thousands of hunters who made this effort successful by bringing their deer in for CWD testing -- and for the golden opportunity to listen to their stories and share in their excitement about their harvests," said MDC Director Sara Parker Pauley. "And thank you to the dozens of local businesses and organizations who provided facilities and services for this monumental effort. I also want to express my appreciation to Department staff and volunteers for their incredible work this past weekend."

Pauley added, "As we get the final test results back in the coming weeks, we will be evaluating our next steps in our CWD management efforts, including future testing efforts in the CWD management zone and around the state."

Hunters who harvest deer throughout the rest of

the hunting season in the 29 counties of the CWD management zone can still have their deer tested for the disease. Contact the MDC Central Regional Office in Columbia at 573-815-7900, the MDC Northeast Regional Office in Kirksville at 660-785-2420, or the MDC St. Louis Regional Office in St. Charles at 636-441-4554. Hunters can also find voluntary CWD sampling stations at mdc. mo.gov/CWD.

Chronic wasting disease is a deadly deer disease that has been found in 33 free-ranging deer in northeast, central, and eastcentral Missouri. According to MDC wildlife-disease experts, chronic wasting disease has the potential to greatly reduce deer numbers, deer health, and deer hunting in Missouri. CWD could also hurt the many Missouri families and businesses that rely on deer CWD.





# Be careful on roads over Thanksgiving holiday

Colonel J. Bret Johnson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, encourages motorists to include safety in their plans for the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

"The long Thanksgiving weekend is an opportunity for people to visit family and friends, which oftentimes means more drivers on the road," said Colonel Johnson. "It's important that everyone pay attention while they're driving. Turn off your cell phones. That text or phone call can wait until you're off the road. If alcohol is part of your Thanksgiving plans, choose a designated driver. On behalf of the employees of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, I wish you a safe and happy Thanksgiving."

The counting period for the 2016 Thanksgiving holiday weekend is from 6 p.m. Wednesday, November 23, until 11:59 p.m. Sunday, November 27, 2016. During the 2015 Thanksgiving holiday weekend, 13 people were killed and another 627 were injured in 1,817 traffic crashes. That means one person was killed or injured in a traffic crash every 9.6 minutes in Missouri over last year's Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

If you will be traveling this holiday, please make sure your car is in good condition before beginning your trip. It is also important that you are well rested before you start driving. Remember to buckle up -- seat belts save lives! Obey all of the traffic laws—all of the time. There is never a reason to speed, drive aggressively, or drive impaired.

The Patrol will participate in Operation C.A.R.E (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) during this Thanksgiving holiday weekend. As part of this operation, all available troopers will be assigned to Missouri's roadways to enforce traffic laws, especially those related to impaired driving, driving over the speed limit, and seat belt/child restraint use. Troopers will be available to assist motorists as needed.

Over the past several years, the Patrol has used special traffic enforcement projects to further their efforts to decrease traffic crashes and fatalities. This Thanksgiving weekend will include enforcement projects on November 23 and November 27, 2016. Troopers will be assigned at 20-mile intervals along Interstates 29, 35, 44, 55, and 70, as well as U.S. Highways 60 and 63.

The Highway Patrol's Emergency Assistance number is 1-800-525-5555 (or \*55 on a cellular phone). Motorists should use this emergency assistance number to report traffic crashes, crimes being committed, or other emergencies on Missouri's highways. When you dial this number anywhere in the state, it rings directly into the closest Patrol headquarters.

The only 100 percent survivable traffic crash is the one that never happens. Make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained in a seat belt or child restraint. Every day as we travel on Missouri's roadways, we trust that every driver on the road is going to obey the speed limit, pay attention, and drive sober. "Don't Violate The Trust."

# Slow cooker great for tasty meals

As the weather gets colder, there's nothing like coming home to a hot meal. A slow cooker, also known as a crockpot, can be an economical, timesaving way to feed your family, says Susan Mills-Gray, University of Missouri Extension nutrition and health education specialist.

"Most households have a slow cooker, but most rarely use it for more than the Super Bowl nacho dip or a big pot of chili," she says. If you find crockpot cooking daunting, Mills-Gray offers some tips to make your slow cooker easier to use and

- Have an older slow cooker with a nonremovable crock? To make cleaning easier, use a removable cooking bag to line pot.
- For easier cleanup, use a nonstick cooking spray before adding food and liquid.
- Crockpots work the best when they are ½ to ¾ full. If you fill the pot to the brim, the slow cooker can't correctly regulate the heating of the food. If it is less than half full, foods will overcook.
- One hour on the high setting equals two hours on the low setting. The high setting is approximately 300 degrees Fahrenheit, while the low setting is 200 degrees.
- Resist the temptation to peek. You add 20 minutes to the cooking time every time you lift the lid. Instead, spin the lid around until the condensation falls off so you can see the food better.
- Use the high setting the first hour that your food is cooking. This reduces the risk of bacterial contamination.
- Start with thawed food. Frozen foods take too long to get to 140 degrees. (The bacterial danger zone is 40 to 140 degrees.) The extreme temperature difference between frozen food and the slow cooker can cause breakage. If you choose to use frozen food, pour a cup of warm water into the pot before adding your food.
- Root vegetables such as potatoes and carrots take longer to cook. Place them on

the bottom or side of the cooker so they are closest to the heat source. Cut in pieces smaller than 1 inch. Tender vegetables such as tomatoes, mushrooms, zucchini and squash overcook easily. Add them during the last two hours of cooking. High-fat foods cook quickly, so place meats on top of vegetables when loading the cooker.

- Brown meat before placing in the slow cooker. This adds color and flavor and reduces fat.
- Fish and seafood cook quickly. Add them late in the process.
- Soak dried beans overnight before cooking in a slow cooker.
- Milk curdles during long cooking periods. Add sour cream or cream late in the cooking process. Condensed cream soups are a good substitute.
- Ground herbs and spices tend to lose their flavor during long cooking times, while cayenne pepper and hot sauce tend to get bitter; add these late in the cooking process.
- · Don't leave cooked food to cool in the slow cooker. The insulated liner won't let the food cool down quickly enough to prevent bacterial growth. Move to another container to refrigerate. Do not use your slow cooker to reheat leftovers.
- Need to convert a conventional oven recipe for the slow cooker? Use this chart:

### Cooking/baking times

conventional recipe, slow cooker - low setting, slow cooker - high setting

- 15 to 30 minutes, 4 to 6 hours, 1½ to 2 hours
- 30 to 45 minutes, 6 to 10 hours, 3 to 4 hours
- 45 minutes to 3 hours, 8 to 18 hours, 4 to 6 hours
