Two arrested after alleged baseball bat assault, breaking and entering

Two were taken into custody by the Barry County Sheriff's Department after allegedly breaking and entering into an apartment, waiting for the resident and then beating him with a baseball bat. Laura R. Talbert, 37, of Cassville, and Richard R. Randolph, 24, of Cassville, were arrested and charged with the

According to the affidavit of probable cause by Officer Taylor Lombard, Talbert and Randolph broke into an apartment on State Highway 112 outside of Cassville around 11 p.m. on November 16. The duo broke a three foot by five foot window by breaking the glass and causing about \$40 worth of damage.

Once inside, Talbert and Randolph waited and then allegedly beat the resident with baseball bats when he came home. The

victim returned home to find the two there, armed with the bats, according to his statement. Both Talbert and Randolph struck him multiple times with the bats, according to the victim.

When officers arrived, Talbert and Randolph were taken into custody. However, officers reported Talbert had to be sprayed with a chemical agent (OC spray) to get her into

Talbert was charged with burglary in the first degree, assault in the second degree, property damage in the second degree and resisting arrest for a felony. Randolph is charged with property damage in the second degree, assault in the second degree and burglary in the first degree. They are each being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of \$30,000 bonds.

City of Cassville, YMCA re-negotiate pool contract

ENTRY RATE TO GO UP \$1 IN 2017

The City of Cassville and the Cassville YMCA renegotiated the contract which involves the YMCA managing the Aquatic Center each year.

Every year since 2005, the City of Cassville has been in contract with the Cassville YMCA for the YMCA to manage operations at the pool and the city sports. Initially, the YMCA charged \$16,200 to manage and operate the pool and \$25,000 to manage the sports activities. Now, the

to operate the pool and the sports programs will continue at \$25,000.

Dove Haney, with the Cassville YMCA, approached the City at their regular council meeting on Monday, November 14. Dove said, "There's some new federal regulations that has caused the need to change the pay to operate the pool." She added that the YMCA operated the pool for a \$10,835 loss last year.

Haney said, "We aren't YMCA will charge \$24,600 wanting to make a profit by

raising the rate. We just need to cover those expenses." That need was also the reason for the YMCA to suggest a \$1 gate entry fee increase. The gate fee had been \$4 since the pool opened in 2002.

With the initial contract with the YMCA, the price increased each year with cost of living. Eventually, the cost to operate both programs was up to around \$58,000, according to Haney. It was at that point that they rolled the price back; however, now the change in federal regulations is increasing the costs to pay employees and operate the facility.

With the operation contract increase, as well as the gate fee change, the YMCA should be able to operate the Aquatic Center without any major losses, according to Haney.

As part of the contract, the YMCA will continue with the same hours of operation, free swim days and all notifications of pool operation to the public.

The YMCA also offered the City's employees a 10 percent discount on YMCA memberships, five pool passes per family and employees and council members will be invited to the YMCA's annual BBQ and pool party in August.

Exeter boy injured in ATV-truck collision

A 12-year-old boy from Exeter was injured over the weekend when he struck an SUV head on near Exeter. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the boy crossed the center line and hit the truck headed in the opposite direction.

The boy was driving a 1994 Honda FourTrax ATV northbound on Farm Road 1045 when the crash occurred around 2:45 p.m. on Sunday, November 20. The boy hit a 1996 Toyota Tacoma driven by Cheng F. Khang, 29, of Cassville that was driving southbound



on the road. The crash occurred about four miles northwest of Exeter.

The Exeter boy was transported by a private vehicle to Mercy Hospital in Cassville for moderate injuries. He was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. Khang had no reported injuries at the time of the report.

The ATVsuffered extensive damage while the Tacoma had moderate damage.

Monett man arrested for alleged meth distribution

A Monett man was arrested and charged with methamphetamine distribution after an informant purchased the drug from him twice, according to officers. Bobby J. Smith, 34, of Monett, was charged with three counts of distribution of a controlled substance.

According to the affidavits of probable cause by the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Smith was taken into custody on November 17 after multiple methamphetamine purchases were made using a confidential source.

Smith allegedly sold to

the confidential buyer on October 26 and November 16. Then, the Highway Patrol executed a search warrant on Smith's residence, vehicle and cell phone. Officers found a black digital scale with crystal substance, spoons with crystal substance, baggies, a drug ledger, unused Fentanyl patch, marijuana, drug paraphernalia, money and a cell phone.

According to the report, Smith was on supervised probation for two counts of possession of a controlled substance and had a history of drug offenses.





Low in fat, high in proand an inexpensive source of iron, zinc, potassium and B vitamins, turkey makes a healthy addition to a person's diet. Turkey also tends to be the star of the show on Thanksgiving and other holidays. Even though turkey can be a delicious addition to any holiday table, some people prefer to buck Thanksgiving tradition from time to time and divert focus from the golden gobbler.

Even though turkey may be synonymous with Thanksgiving, hosts and hostesses should not shy away from serving something different. In fact, turkey may not even have been on the menu for the first Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving dates back to New England in November 1621, when newly ar-

rived Pilgrims and the Wampanoag Indians gathered for an autumn harvest celebration. It's reported that pilgrims went on a "fowling" mission in preparation for the three-day feast. Although wild turkey was plentiful in the region, ducks, geese, passenger pigeons, and swans were commonly consumed. Historians at Smithsonian say documents refer to wildfowl and venison as foods appearing at the first Thanksgiving, but turkey was not mentioned.

Home chefs can take a cue from those first pilgrims and choose less traditional offerings this Thanksgiving. The following are some ideas that are reminiscent of the first Thanksgiving.

- · If the flavor is more palatable, don't hesitate to select another bird to grace the Thanksgiving table, such as a goose or even a chicken. Some people find turkey meat to be too dry, despite all of the different preparation methods. Chicken or goose may be more well-received and just as versatile.
 - Don't overlook the pos-



sibility of serving fish and other seafood. Colonists and the Wampanoag probably ate eel, lobster, clams, and mussels. Fish can be dried, smoked and preserved.

- · Replace wheat-based recipes with those made from cornmeal, as maize was more likely available during colonial time than wheat.
- · Forests provided chestnuts, beechnuts and walnuts, so a platter of nuts paired with cheese or fruit also can make a welcome addition to the table. Nuts also can be ground and used in baked goods or flavoring for Thanksgiving desserts.
- Pumpkin and squash were plentiful in colonial times, and this is why these gourds are often included in Thanksgiving meals and decor. The flesh of a pumpkin or squash can be turned into casseroles or used to make quiche.
 - A traditional Thanksgiv-

ing meal for the early settlers would not have included potatoes. White potatoes originated in South America and sweet potatoes in the Caribbean. At the time of the first Thanksgiving, these would not yet have been introduced, as white potato patches in North America were not established in the region until 1719, according to the potato resource Potato Goodness.

· Because colonists did not have wheat flour and butter to make flaky tart crusts, pumpkin pie was not on the first Thanksgiving menu. In lieu of pumpkin pie, hosts can experiment with moist loaf breads or muffins made with pumpkin.

The average Thanksgiving dinner table today looks quite different from the one the Wampanoag Indians and Pilgrims gathered around centuries ago. Families can stick closer to history and tailor their meals for a touch of

SOUTHWEST SCHOOL BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The Southwest R-V Board of Education held their regular meeting on November 17.

The Board approved the MSBA proposed policies and procedures JFCF, JFCG, and JG-R1.

Billie Sapp had included the Library Media Center Program Evaluation Report.

Dan Shelton had included the Technology Program Evaluation Report.

Jeff Payne's monthly Elementary School Principal's Report included updates such as the October 14 Fire Safety Day held by the Washburn Fire Department and Red Ribbon Week activities. He also included information about the professional development provided by MoreNet where teachers learned to create their own web pages. The elementary school has developed their building mission statement which is "Learning to Achieve; Achieving to Succeed."

The Middle School Principal's Report was presented by Beverly Bonner. Some of the items included in her report were setting Priority Standards for MAP testing and identifying areas of improvement. The Middle School Professional Learning Community team leaders are continuing their training and continuing collaboration with the specific teams when they return from the training. The Middle School Academic Team won the Sarcoxie Scholars Bowl and swept all the matches at the Exeter Meet.

Eric Roller, the high school principal, discussed his report. Increasing attendance rates continues to be a focus for Southwest High School. Two athletes competed at the state cross country meet. They were Maggie Robbins and Jarrett Pike. The Veterans Day Lunch and Assembly was held on November 11. There were 41 veterans in attendance.

Kara Hendrix, the Curriculum Director/Title I Director, provided information about the curriculum website that can be found at www.swr5.net under District Resources then Curriculum and the Title I website which can be found under Elementary and Title I. Parent survey information was included. The survey showed that the students enjoy coming to school and feel that the classroom lessons are motivating learning. Instructional Practice Inventory data was discussed. This data shows the level of student engagement in each classroom across the district.

The Southwest R-V School District Annual Performance Report (APR) for 2016 was presented. This is the district's report card. Strengths found include Southwest Elementary School Communication Arts and Mathematics and High School graduation rate. Focus areas of improvement include district wide mathematics and student attendance.



Purdy's Kaden Propps takes All-Nationals stage



Kaden Propps sang with the 2016 National Association for Music Education All-National Honor Choir, becoming only the second Purdy High School vocalist to achieve this high honor.

Purdy High School Senior Kaden Propps describes his recent experience as a tenor in the prestigious National

Association for Music Education All-National Honor Choir concert in Dallas, Texas as, "an absolute honor. It was a once in a lifetime experience, and I wouldn't trade it for anything."

Propps and Purdy High School Vocal Music Instructor Lauren Lee traveled to Texas on Wednesday, November 9, stopping in Durant, Okla., for a college audition. Upon arriving at the Gaylord Texan, Propps met his roomates and attended his first session. "The presenter said something that will stick with me forever. 'Music makes the mundane memorable.' I was so moved by his words and even more deeply touched by his obvious passion for sharing music."

Propps found himself caught in a whirlwind of fourhour choir rehearsals, sessions and special events over the course of the next two days, and he loved every minute of it. "In addition to lifting my voice with over 300 of the nation's most gifted vocalists, I also got to experience a concert by the Lone Star Orchestra. It was absolutely brilliant. Afterward, my group competed in a scavenger hunt at the Gavlord Hotel. We found ourselves in second place and dashing toward the ballroom to submit our sheets, when we saw Eugene Migliaro Corporon, the conductor of the Lone Star Orchestra. We instantly forgot about the scavenger hunt and instead pursued and captured a selfie with this amazing man."

Propps also attended a gala performance featuring the Male Directors Choir, the Main Street Barbershop Ouartet and the Texan Choir Vocal Majority, which Propps describes as, "a group of men who love to sing. They range in age from 13 to 78." The evening had a powerful effect on Propps and his fellow choir members. "It was the best concert I will likely attend in my lifetime. They all sang with such precision and passion. I could feel the song through them. They didn't need fancy movements to elicit a passionate response. This was especially true during the Texan Choir Vocal Majority's rendition of Danny Boy, which moved me deeply. At the song's conclusion, I glanced down the row and saw that all of us were wiping tears."

Following the concert, Propps found himself inspired by a Christmas light display in the Gaylord's atrium. "When we saw the rest of the choir walking through, I stopped them and suggested we sing a Christmas carol. We spontaneously fell into the most beautiful four-part harmony as we performed Silent Night for passersby. When we started to leave, the crowd that had gathered to listen begged us to sing more, so we gave a 30 minute impromptu Christmas concert, right there in the atrium!'

Purdy High School Vocal Music Instructor Lauren Lee also found the event highly inspirational. "Listening to 346 of the finest high school voices in the USA is a reviving experience. Watching one of the finest directors in America is truly humbling. When I thought the choir sounded like a piece of heaven, the director was able to pull out an even more gorgeous sound. It was also uplifting to watch these high school students singing and working together in harmony and unity. They did this not only as musicians, but as citizens of our great nation. Watching all of the honor ensembles reminded me that beautiful moments in this life can be achieved when we set aside our differences and work together as one."

Propps describes the final day of his All-Nation-

als experience as, "the best and worst day of my life. We performed our gala concert, and it was breathtaking. The nation's best vocalists filled the Gaylord with pure, passionate sound." The 346voice choir performed seven pieces, including one written especially for the choir's director, Dr. Anton Armstrong, in honor of his birthday - Flight Song. The first refrain declares, "All we are, we have found in song: you have drawn this song from us." Propps echoes its sentiment. "Dr. Armstrong shared so much passion and love for music with me. Performing under his direction was a true

Why does Propps consider his final day in Texas also to be his worst? "Because I had to say goodbye to the best of friends. I instantly formed a bond with my fellow singers. We share a passion for music that will forever connect us." Propps explained this connection to his mom, Mica, in a phone call. "Mom! I found my people! They just get me."

Kaden Propps will graduate from Purdy High School in the spring, after which he plans to attend college, where he will continue to perform and pursue a double major in music education and vocal performance. Propps is the eldest son of Kevin and Mica Propps of Purdy.

first licensed nursing home in Barry County, The Sunset Valley Nursing Home. Her dedication to the area continued as she preserved antiques and other things in the Allen house after she purchased it. The Allen house was constructed by attorney and banker Thomas M. Allen in 1895. Allen was the son-in-law of John M. Bayless, the man who constructed the Bayless-Salyer home on Townsend Street in Cassville.


The Victorian-style home has changed hands a few times over the years, going to a doctor, Dr. Samuel Wilson Chandler, and his wife, Rebecca McClure Chandler, and eventually his second wife, Eva Webb Chandler. Writer was the most recent owner, and she kept the house true to the original structure, except for an addition put on in the mid-1990's.

Writer's additions to the house included her antique furniture collection, but also included glassware. Her collection is one of the largest of antiques and collectibles in the area.

Mitchell said, "There is a lot of history here. There's even rumor of the underground railroad running in a cavern below the house." Rumors of the underground railroad running through a cave on the north-facing hill by County Farm Road have been circulated for years, but not corroborated. Stories say the cave connects to a cavern running under the Bayless-Salyer home, Allen house and another old home that burned near the current ballfields in Cassville by Flat Creek.



52 points? That was a month's worth just a few seasons back. This team is Chris Shore Basketball 2.0, a offensive-minded team with skilled guards and superior post play. Pierce City had some success with a full court press, but could not contain Cassville in the paint.

"Pierce City has a good team," said Shore. "I was proud of how hard our kids played. We have some things to work on but it was a good way to open up the season."



With so much negativity in the world, Cassville R-IV students take time to say 'thanks.'

Many of the teachers at Cassville R-IV have had enough. Had enough of constantly being bogged down with the negativity that surrounds us in our day-to-day life. Had enough of our students growing up in a world that often focuses on the negative events rather than all we have to be thankful for.

After becoming inspired by a teacher in the Springfield

teacher Mandy Boone decided to implement a new initiative that asks students to shift their thought process and focus on what they are thankful for.

Teaching our students to find the positive is hopefully a life skill that will follow them beyond the halls of Cassville R-IV."

> "I was very nervous to start Thankful Thursdays," stated Boone. "I thought the students may think it is silly, but to my surprise, they have embraced it. It has been a great project to work on with our students and co-workers throughout the district."

> Students have said they are thankful for everything from as serious as life saving medications, to their family, friends and teachers to insignificant things such as their gaming systems.

> Teachers have also incorporated their "Thankful Thursday" lessons into class work requirements such as letter and email etiquette and journal writing practice.

> "It just takes about five minutes of class time, but if it can make somebody's day a little brighter, we think it is worth it," stated Boone.






Barry Electric to receive USDA loan to improve infrastructure
