Monett man charged with holding victim at gunpoint for pain medications

A Monett man is jailed on a \$200,000 bond after allegedly holding a cancer patient at gunpoint and stealing his pain medications. Shawn Scott Ice, 30, of Monett, was allegedly with another suspect when he entered the home and demanded the medications.

According to affidavits of probable cause by Monett Police Department detective Scott Landreth, officers were dispatched to an armed robbery at a location on East Broadway in Monett around 11:17 p.m. on November 4. The occupants of the residence told officers two masked men had forced their way into the home and into the bedroom of one of the occupants. Once inside, they forced the victim onto the floor at gunpoint before demanding narcotics, according to victims' statements.

One of the victims of the crime reported he has stage four cancer and was prescribed Fentanyl patches as well as Diluadid. The victim told the intruders he would get the medication and one of the masked intruders struck him in the head and demanded he tell them where the medications were. The other person held two other people at gunpoint in the home with a military-style rifle.

In all, the men allegedly took the medications, one of the victim's wallets which

Cassville airport fueling system back in business

After a lot of waiting and much anticipation, the Cassville Municipal Airport is back in the gas business. For nearly three years, the local airport was unable to provide aviators with aviation fuel due to a failing tank. Now, construction is complete and pilots can once again fuel up at the local airport.

David Brock, Cassville public works director, said the fuel system went live as operational on Friday, November 15, with a local pilot taking honors as the first to fuel up after the three year hiatus. Brock said the completion of the project is a welcomed after so long without the ability to provide fuel. He said, "It's similar to an electric vehicle instead of someone's personal vehicle. You really have to plan where you'll fill up if you fly an aircraft. If you're going to land, you want to fill up before you take off, and we really appreciate the patience of the local aircraft owners."

When the city was first notified of the issue, it had to shut down fuel operations until a new system could be installed. Brock initially said the project would be complete in spring 2019, but some delays outside of the city's control delayed it until fall.

Overall, the system boasts a 10,000 gallon capacity, which is 4,000 gallons more than the previous tank, as well as a total overhaul of the delivery system.

Aviators are also able to pay at the pump when fueling up.

In total, the project cost \$434,490, which was just under \$20,000 less than the city initially planned. Brock said it is possible the final total will be even lower once the final engineering bill is received. Of that cost, 90 percent was paid for with Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) nonentitlement funds from 2017, 2018 and 2019. Each year, the airport receives \$150,000 annually if at least 12 aircraft are based there. Those funds are designated for certain airport improvement projects and have to be approved.

The remaining 10 percent comes form the city's capital improvement fund. Otherwise, the airport is funded through fuel sales and rental agreements with the city for hangars.

Lochner Engineering Group oversaw the engineering side of the project, and the construction bid was awarded to Illinois Oil Marketing Group.

Up until November 15, the closest place pilots could fuel up was Monett.

Brock added that the city also fields questions from pilots coming to the area for a visit about fuel availability. He said, "It's a common question from folks flying into the area, as well. They need to make their plans to fuel up if they are going fly in the area."

As far as the delay in getting the system operational,

Brock says most of that had to do with the way the city's contract was worded. Basically, the construction company had 180 days to complete the project, but that was after the manufacturer finalized plans and built the tank for the airport. Brock said, "Our engineers kind of admitted that the contract format wasn't suitable for this type of project. The bulk of the delay was to get the tank manufacturer to submit the drawings and then build it. That's what took all of the time."

Moving forward, Brock

Purdy moves forward on new city hall remodel

At a city council meeting on Monday, November 18, Purdy's board of alderman unanimously approved a bid for a full remodel on the building that once served as the Purdy Library and Community Center. This approval cements the long-expected move of Purdy's City Hall from its current location to the remodelled building.

The accepted bid came from JDS Construction, of Exeter, in the amount of \$52,610.42. According to Purdy mayor Bo Prock, the company will be doing a variety of improvements to the former library.

"We're going to change the library portion of it just a little bit," explained Prock. "There's going to be a wall added on to it, and we're going to put a conference room in the back of that."

Prock explained that the division of the structure will remain the same, with the two sides of the building serving a variety of purposes.

"The front side will be normal city hall operations, where they'll take bills and things like that," said Prock. "In what used to be the community center, we're going to renovate it to become the new council cham-

ber, and then behind that, we're going to build a wall to make a seperate police office."

According to Prock, the new police office will feature separate offices for both currently serving Purdy officers. There will also be an additional third room, for the purpose of speaking with witnesses and suspects.

Purdy city clerk Debbie Redshaw confirmed that the council chamber portion of the building will be used for Purdy's municipal court sessions.

The interior of the building will receive some cosmetic upgrades in the remodel.

With a little over a month left until Christmas, the spirit of giving already fell fast over Barry County. In this spirit, a bar in Springfield, Archie's Lounge, once again chose local animal sanctuary Haven of the Ozarks as one of beneficiaries for their annual charity auction.

"There's a bar in Springfield that has a really dedicated group of regulars," explained Jennifer Silverberg, Haven treasurer. "For the last 20 years, every year, they pick charities to raise money for. They do a rummage sale, a chili cook-off, and in the final event, every December, they do a charity auction."

According to Silverberg, past auctions have raised as much as \$10,000. This year's auction will also benefit a

"The volunteers at the bar do most of the work for this," Silverberg continued. "They get everything done. They sometimes even make smaller donations into gift baskets."

The auction will be live with a professional auctioneer who has donated his services officiating an event. Items featured in the auction are donations, collected from a variety of places that include hard goods, such as electronics or furniture, and soft goods, such as gift certificates and

"It's a live auction," explained Silverberg. "They auction all kinds of items, from gift cards, to electronics, to a used car that someone once donated. Anything that anyone can think

Silverberg went on to explain that the fundraiser is crucial to maintaining funding for the Haven.

"By the end of the year, we find ourselves spending more money than we bring in, and we always count on things like this in December to catch us back up," Silverberg explained.

Haven of the Ozarks is currently accepting donations for the charity auction until December 13. The auction will take place at Archie's Lounge, located at 1817 Grand Street in Springfield, at 2 p.m. on Saturday, December 14.

"There will be new floor in the city hall side," explained Prock. "We're going to try and save a little money by keeping the current flooring in what will be the council and police office

At that same meeting, the council received a separate set of bids for the new heating and air system planned in the new city hall. However, final decisions on these bids were tabled by the council until a later date, so as to empower the council to seek further information.

"We felt that we needed to get some more quotes to entertain on that," Prock explained. "Basically, I think that we're making sure that we're comparing apples to apples on that. Heating and air is something that nobody on the council has much experience in. There's a wide gap of cost between the bids that we do have, and we want to make sure that the people that are bidding are getting everything in there that we



contained \$1,200 in cash and a pair of jeans.

The next day, one of the victims reported to the officers that he believed Ice was involved in the crime because he'd been at the residence about 45 minutes before, seeking pain pills and was ordered to leave.

On November 13, officers interviewed an inmate in the jail for information regarding he robbery. The inmate told officers Ice told him he'd committed the robbery.

When officers interviewed Ice, he told them he was there, but that he did not commit the crimes.


Ice is currently charged with three felonies related to the crime: robbery in the first degree, stealing - physically take, and stealing a controlled substance. The second suspect does not have charges as of time of press.

said no major construction at the airport is in the books, however, they do have some paperwork that needs to be updated with the FAA and MoDOT. He said, "The only other project we have on the books for 2020 is we have to update some documents we have on file with Mo-DOT and FAA. It's a property exhibit which shows what we own and what we have control over easementwise. That's expected to cost around \$20,000. But, it's a land survey and title work."

As of November 15, the Cassville Municipal Airport's fuel system is up and running. Brock confirmed a few small details, such as some lighting, are almost finished, but those do not affect the ability of pilots fueling up at the airport.

Herrin Animal Hospital hosts annual toy drive Vinnie Roberts

Wildcats run past Falcons in state quarterfinals

The Cassville Wildcats saw a big lead cut to six points late but held on for a 35-28 win over Blair Oaks in a MSHSAA state quarterfinal game at Wardsville on Saturday. Senior running back Bowen Preddy keyed the Cassville victory, rushing for 215 yards and two touchdowns and also scoring with the second half kickoff.

Playing at Blair Oaks is a daunting assignment. The Falcons have not lost a regular season game since a 9-3 campaign in 2014. Going into Saturday's contest against Cassville, these Blair Oaks seniors had posted a 51-2 career record. Ranked #1 in Class 3 at season's end, this is a quality program, a very Lamar-like program.

Blair Oaks has a high octane offense, an explosive spread passing attack led by freshman quarterback Dylan Hair and buoyed by a complementary rushing game. But, while the high scoring offense gets most of the press, the Gang Green defense has been even more impressive. After allow-

ing 14, 21, and 21 points in their first three games, the Falcons held the rest of their opponents to 8 points or less leading up to Saturday's playoff game.

But the Wildcats, with their own storied history and legacy, were ready.

At the game's opening, Blair Oaks did what Blair Oaks does. The Falcons scored in just two plays following a Drake Reese touchback. Jacobi Marble motored 43 yards with a jet sweep to the Cassville 37-yard line. Then, Hair delivered a bomb to Jake Closser as Blair Oaks claimed a 7-0 lead just 28 seconds into the game.

There was no panic on the visitors sideline. Led by their powerful offensive line, the Wildcats drove 61 yards in 9 plays to tie the score at the 7:08 mark of the first quarter. Zach Coenen plowed into the end zone on 1st-and-goal for Cassville's first score.

The Falcons drove into Cassville territory on their next possession but punted the length of the field in 12 plays, with Preddy scoring from 12 yards out. A bad snap ruined the PAT attempt though, and the score remained at 13-7 with 9:34 left in the second quarter. There was a little second guessing after the play, as the Wildcats declined an offsides penalty and yardage that could have made a 2-point try an easier option for the bulldozing Cassville

But Blair Oaks ended up punting again after a long pass attempt sailed out of bounds after the Cassville defender fell down. Forcing Blair Oaks to punt on consecutive possessions was a noteworthy accomplishment by the Cassville defense.

The Wildcats started the next drive at their own 19-yard line. Thirteen plays later, Deven Bates ducked his head and scored on a quarterback keeper as Cassville extended the lead to 20-7. That drive was saved

when DJ White hauled in a back shoulder throw from Bates for 35 yards on a 3rdand-8 play to give the 'Cats a first down in the red zone.

Cassville's ball control offense had left just 22 seconds on the clock for the host team, and the teams adjourned at halftime with Cassville leading, 20-7.

The Blair Oaks defense stubbornly stuck to a threeman line throughout the first half, awaiting Cassville's signature trick play or passing barrage. Instead, the Wildcats committed to the run, chewing up the Falcons with bread and butter dive and option plays.

Preddy accepted the second half kickoff on the left hash at his own 17-yard line. He cut across the field, picking up blockers, and then jetted down the Blair Oaks sideline for an 83-yard scoring return. Reese's third PAT gave Cassville a commanding 27-7 lead.

> Momentum change Scoring the last points

of the first half and the first points of the second half is usually a recipe for success in high school football. But no lead is safe when the Blair Oaks offense is clicking.

The Falcons adjusted their strategy at halftime, and took advantage of what Cassville was willing to concede. With the Wildcats playing a three man line and an umbrella secondary, Blair Oaks unleashed the running attack. An 80-yard scoring drive ensued, with Hair racing to the left pylon from 10 yards out. The successful PAT cut Cassville's lead to 27-14 with 8:56 left in the quarter.

The Wildcats stumbled on offense and were held to a three-and-out. Blair Oaks drove the field for another score. Hair, playing more like a senior than a freshman, found the end zone again. Suddenly, the Cassville lead was cut to 27-21 with 5:02 left in the third.


The Wildcats held the ball for just 4 plays on their next possession. Bates threw deep into double coverage for Preddy, and Closser intercepted and crashed down at the Blair Oaks 33-yard line.

With momentum squarely on their side, the Falcons drove to the Cassville 25-yard line. A touchdown and extra point would give them their first lead since early in the first quarter. But, a holding call a bad snap, and a long incompletion forced a punt on 4thand-forever at the Cassville 44-yard line as the final quarter began. The Wild-

Jericho Ferris barged into the endzone for two points as Cassville grabbed a 35-21 lead with just 6:01 left to play. Those 35 points represented the most points Blair

Oaks had allowed in any game this season.

But Blair Oaks wasn't done.

Last gasp

Sam Luebbering settled under Reese's kickoff at the 9-yard line, and burst down the Cassville sideline. White finally shoved him out of bounds at the Cassville 19-yard line. The one thing Cassville could not allow in that situation at that point in the game was a long return. But then it happened.

The Falcons scored five plays later with Hair bouncing off right tackle from the 3-yard line. But that drive trimmed almost two minutes off the clock. Only 4:04 remained after Blair Oaks pulled within 35-28.

The Falcons kicked off out of bounds on what looked like an errant onside attempt. The Wildcats took over at their own 44-yard line. Preddy and Coenen alternated carries as Cassville's line reclaimed control. Seven plays later, Coenen gashed the Falcons' defense for 11 yards to give the Wildcats a goal-to-go opportunity at the 3-yard line.

With the game clock under a minute, Blair Oaks coaches pocketed their final time outs with a show of good sportsmanship, and Bates knelt twice to end the game. There would be no dirty bird celebration for the Falcons as their season ended at 12-1.

Rushing dominance

The Wildcats entered the contest knowing that the best defense against the explosive Blair Oaks defense was a good game of keepaway. Clay Weldy's offense shelved the deep passing attack for the most part, relying on the run to control the clock and the game.

Preddy's monster game received rave reviews, but it was the o-line that set the tone for the victory. Coenen also put up big number behind that big line, running for 120 yards and a touchdown on his 19 carries. Bates was a wizard on the option, pitching at the last second time and time again after waiting for the defense to commit to his running threat.

Trinity

The Wildcats improved to 11-2 with the win and will make their first Class 3 semifinal appearance since a 2010 trip to Richmond, where they lost to the eventual state champions, 23-21. Cassville will host Trinity Catholic, a St. Louis private school, on Saturday at Wildcat Stadium.

Empire Electric customers to see small decrease

The Missouri Public Service Commission has approved a request filed by The Empire District Electric Company (Empire) to change the fuel adjustment charge (FAC) on the monthly bills of its electric customers.

As a result of this filing, the FAC for a residential customer using 1,000 kWh (kilowatthours) of electricity a month will decrease by approximately \$5.01 a month. The change is expected to take effect on December 1, 2019.

The FAC change reflects Empire's fuel and

purchased power costs for the six month period of March 2019 through August 2019 (Case No. ER-2020-0093). It also reflects Empire's FAC trueup filing (Case No. EO-2020-0094).

The Empire District Electric Company serves approximately 155,165 electric customers in the Missouri counties of Barry, Barton, Cedar, Christian, Dade, Dallas, Greene, Hickory, Jasper, Lawrence, McDonald, Newton, Polk, St. Clair, Stone and Taney.
