Barry County life shifts as social distancing implemented for COVID-19

Barry County life shifted dramatically this week as schools, senior centers and some businesses closed to prevent the widespread of a new pandemic coronavirus, COVID-19. While Barry County does not have a confirmed case of COVID-19, schools and senior centers closed as a precautionary measure to attempt to squash the rapid transmission of the virus to more vulnerable populations, like the elderly.

Barry County specific guidelines

Barry County emergency management director David Compton released information Tuesday morning, March 17, about the status of COVID-19 in Barry County. As of time of press, Barry County does not have a single confirmed case of the virus.

Currently, Compton said there is no declaration of a state of emergency unless there becomes a case locally.

Barry County Emergency Management is suggesting the federal guidelines of limiting groups to less than ten people for the next 15 days.

Compton assured he is speaking with state, regional, and local organizations daily.

The release also states to practice social distancing, "It is important to limit personal contact to 6 feet or greater. Experience with the 1918 Spanish Flu Pandemic demonstrated the effectiveness of social distancing in stopping the spread of a pandemic flu. Limiting close personal contact and avoiding large groups is an effective way to

"flatten the curve" of new infections."

Campton also states to stop panic buying. The release states, "There is no indication that we will experience long-term shortages of food or other household items. Panic buying has caused immediate shortages, which may cause those with mobility and access issues difficulty in obtaining the regular supplies they need."

Roger Brock, Barry County Health Department administrator, suggested if a person suspects they are experiencing symptoms of CO-VID-19, to call the doctor's office, as opposed to showing up unannounced. If a person is experiencing severe respiratory issues, he suggests they go to an emergency room. He said the closing of Barry and Lawrence County schools was not mandated by the health department, although the department worked in an advisory capacity.

Students and Schools

The decision to close schools came Monday, March 16. All Barry County schools are closed until at least April 5. Whether or not schools will reopen on April 6 is to be determined as officials continue to work with local and state health departments to determine the best course of action to keep the public safe.

All local schools are implementing a free meal program for students regardless of free/reduced lunch eligibility. The schools are offering multiple pick up locations for the meals.

Cassville School:

Beginning Wednesday, March 18, the cafeteria will provide free lunch and the next day's breakfast. To order meals for your student, please call (417) -847-4042 between the hours of 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. Parents are able to pick up their Grab-n-Go meals at the following locations each day from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

The locations are: Primary/Middle School Cafeteria, Butterfield First Baptist Church, Eagle Rock Shore Line Campground (across from Eagle Rock Corps of Engineers) and Golden First Baptist Church.

Exeter School:

The school will offer student lunches from 11 a.m. to 12 p.m. at which time they will send breakfast with the student for the next day.

The school has a link to an online form to fill out on their Facebook page. Students age 18 and under are eligible and meals will be available on March 19 and 20 as well as March 24 through April 3.

Location: in front of the Exeter Elementary School doors.

Purdy School:

Starting today, Wednesday, March 18, Purdy Schools will offer free breakfast, lunch and dinner to all students ages 18 and under. It will be available Monday through Friday, including Friday, March 20, from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Each student will receive three bagged meals: one lunch,

New Cassville park restrooms planned

New restrooms in Cassville's city parks were a topic of discussion at Cassville's city council meeting on Monday, March 9. Public Works Director David Brock said plans are being implemented for the construction of a new restroom facility at the downtown park on City Park Road near the existing structure. The project is the result of a 2018 survey in which city residents were asked what improvement or development in parks would best benefit families.

"Of those who responded, 64 percent put more restrooms at the top of their lists" Brock said. "We're now working toward meeting that need. We've approved architectural plans and will have them drawn up over the summer. We hope to

open it up for construction bids in September. Our goal is to begin construction in the spring of 2021, and have the project completed by summer."

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"Until a site survey is conducted, we won't know whether the original restrooms will be kept for use, or removed. It will depend on the space available," Brock explained. "The new

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Former local deputy accused of assault

A Fairview man is accused of sexually assaulting a victim during his time as a law enforcement officer in Barry County. The incident allegedly happened on September 16, 2019.

According to a February 5 affidavit of probable cause statement issued by Sergeant Jason B. Trammell, of the Missouri Highway Patrol, Barry County Deputy Meng Yang, 21, of Fairview, is accused of inappropriate sexual contact with a victim after he and a fellow deputy responded to an emergency call in the Washburn area on September 16, 2019.

According to the Highway Patrol statement, the female victim accused Yang of touching her in a sexual manner while attempting to revive her from the effects of a drug overdose.

It goes on to state Yang's body camera was secured and reviewed, and there was a 17-second darkened portion of the footage that was a source of concern. The victim alleged that, during that time, Yang had touched her inappropriately.

The body cam revealed the victim was initially unresponsive and lying facedown on the threshold of the bathroom door when Yang and the other deputy arrived on the scene. Yang attempted to revive her by kneeling near her head and rubbing between the victim's shoulder blades with

rubber-gloved hands. After several attempts at resuscitation, the victim responded by moving and nodding her head yes when asked if she could hear, according to the report.

When interviewed by investigators with the highway patrol, Deputy Yang was given the opportunity to explain the darkened portion of the body cam footage but gave conflicting stories to investigators. The probable cause statement says he first indicated that he had inadvertently covered the body camera attached to the right side of his shirt - with his left wrist while attempting to apply

Senior Citizens

Senior centers also announced they would be closing, however, many are offering take out meal options. The Cassville Senior Center posted on their Facebook that they will be closed to the public until further notice. However, staff will be passing out individual frozen meals during the center's regular lunch time, from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., to those 60 and over who need a meal. Those in need are asked to knock on the front door or call at (417) 847-4510.

Central Crossing Senior Center in Shell Knob is offering the same service as Cassville during their normal lunch times, from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.To receive a meal, you must be 60 or older and pull up under the awning and honk once. If you have questions, call (417) 858-6952.

Monett's Senior Center's information is the same, and they can be reached at (417) 235-3285.

One nation-wide chain announced the first hour of business will be dedicated to senior citizen shopping only to ensure they have what they need. Dollar General stores across the country will be open to senior citizens for the first hour of business for that day. All stores will also close an hour earlier.

Hospital changes

CoxHealth announced system-wide changes, including screenings for visitors. At Cox Monett, visi-

tors may only enter through the north entrance Monday through Friday from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and the ER entrance which is open 24 hours a day and seven days a week. Visitors must have a fever check when they come in. All Emergency Departments and Urgent Cares will remain open at CoxHealth.

Visitor restrictions include: only one visitor per patient per day, no visitors for patients suspected to have COVID-19 and no one under the age of 18 may access the CoxHealth facilities, including hospitals and clinics, unless they are seeking

Mercy Cassville is adopting policies laid out by the Mercy network. In a statement, Mercy announced they would also be screening all visitors for a fever and limiting visitors. According to Mercy, visitors will be required to go through screening every time they come into the hospital and patients can have one visitor per day. Exceptions may be made for those who are near end-oflife. Unless they are seeking treatment, no one under age 18 will be permitted in Mercy hospitals or clinics.

Emergency Management Director Compton's release states COVID-19 symptoms are fever, cough and shortness of breath.

If you are symptomatic, Comtpom says to:

- Stay home.
- Call your primary care provider and inform them of your symptoms.
- If you have serious breathing problems dial 911 and tell them about your symptoms.
- Follow your PCP direc-

• Do not have close personal contact or share spaces with others.

For non-symptomatic people, Compton said, "Practice good prevention. Remember COVID-19 is spreading person to person and all people may contract the disease and pass it to others, even if they do not have symptoms. Avoid close personal contact with others and especially those at greatest risk."

CoxHealth announced virtual visits will be open to anyone needing to be evaluated for suspected COVID-19. They released the following statement last week: "To be evaluated, individuals should simply use code COVID when beginning a Virtual Visit. This service is available to anyone experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, which include a fever, cough and respiratory distress. Patients at risk may also have traveled to areas with widespread disease. If a provider feels a patient should be tested, he or she will make a referral so that may be conducted.

"The availability of Virtual Visits by anyone, regardless of insurance or ability to pay, aligns with public health goals of keeping the disease from spreading throughout the community. This approach also prevents the spread of illness in medical facilities, and protects the local health care workforce so they can be ready to help those who need assistance."

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



extra pressure between the victim's shoulder blades with his right hand.

When confronted with the screenshot, Yang allegedly changed his story multiple times, finally stating that he had covered the camera so that anyone seeing the camera footage would not think he was sexually molesting her.

Yang is no longer employed with the Barry County Sheriff's Department. When asked about the incident, Barry County Sheriff Gary Davis had no comment.

Yang is charged with sodomy in the first degree and sexual abuse in the first degree.

Yang is represented by attorney Dee Wampler, III, of Springfield. The case is being prosecuted by Barry County Prosecuting Attorney Amy Boxx. A bond



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
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JIMMY DALE COX

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

The dangers of mowing too low

Spring marks the return of many things. Trees and flowers begin to bloom again in spring, while warmer temperatures are welcomed back with open arms. Grass also begins to grow again in the spring. That means it's not too long before homeowners have to dust off their lawn mowers and get to work. Those who don't necessarily enjoy mowing the lawn may be tempted to cut their grass very low, as doing so can mean longer intervals between mowing sessions. However, mowing grass too low can have a very adverse effect on a lawn.

• Cutting too low can injure the grass. Cutting grass too low can injure the grass, creating what's essentially a domino effect of problems to come. Injured grass will focus on its recovery efforts, thereby making it vulnerable to other issues.

• Cutting too low promotes weed

growth. Injured grass is vulnerable to invaders, including insects can attack grass as it recovers from injury, and before homeowners know it, their lawns are overcome with a host of problems.

· Cutting too low allows crabgrass to thrive. Crabgrass needs ample sunlight to grow. By cutting grass too low, homeowners may unknowingly be promoting crabgrass growth. So lawns cut too low may not only lose their lush appeal thanks to the unattractive appearance of crabgrass, but also because areas surrounding the crabgrass patches might turn brown due to lack of water.

• Cutting too low can stress the grass. Cutting too low also makes lawns vulnerable to summer heat. Without blades tall enough to block some of the summer sun, grass can quickly succumb to summer heat, leading to dried out, discolored lawns.

City of Cassville well underway with plans to beautify Greenway Trail

For several months, a sign has been up at the end of the Greenway trail in Cassville. The sign explains that, with little fanfare, the city has embarked on an endeavor to beautify one of their most densely travelled natural ar-

At the end of the Greenway, behind the Cassville Aquatic Center, the trail loops around several acres of flat land, currently home to a disc golf course. According to David Brock, Cassville's director of public works, this space has already begun a series of changes in an effort to bring more natural beauty to

"We're going to convert about 80 percent of that into native grasses," said Brock. "We'll leave the fairways for the frisbee golf course as fescue and keep them mowed to their regular height, but the prairie grass, we'll just let

to plant a series of pollinator gardens along the trail

with the Barry County Master Gardeners, the group suggested to Brock that the planting of native prairie grasses in certain areas could achieve a similar goal.

"Someone from there had suggested that we plan some native grass out there," continued Brock. "We researched it and the frisbee golf course seemed like a good candidate as it's mostly just fescue grass out there."

According to Brock, the planting of these grasses will have several positive effects on the area, both aesthetically and ecologically.

"This is a good location, because it is bordered by the trail," explained Brock. "Those fescue grasses will want to creep into our native planting area. We also think that it will be a little bit more challenging for our frisbee golfers. Now, it won't be just one big, open area. It's going to take a little more skill to keep you out of the tall grass and in the play area.

"It's also going to provide a little bit of scenery for our

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walkers," Brock Continued. "It will also hopefully draw in more native insect and bird life, which will be more attractive for our people out there on the trail. Native grasses are deep-rooted and will absorb a lot more rain and flood water than a fescue grass. They're also better at filtering out pollution in the

Brock explained that the project began last year and will continue on into the future for some time. The project has a budget of \$2,000, all to come from the park's department budget.

"We actually began last year," said Brock. "You have to go through a whole year of killing off the fescue grass. We did the first application of the herbicide and we didn't want anyone to think that it was unusual, so we put up a sign to explain what we were doing."

City workers will apply two other applications of the herbicide to the targeted area, one in the spring and the other in the fall of 2020. Afterwards, planting is set to begin in 2021.

Additional planting will be done throughout the year, as well as in the future, to add to the plant life diversity on that section of the trail. In addition to an extra seeding to ensure the density of the prairie grass. Brock explained that additional trees and other native flowers will be planted in the area.

"It's a long way to go about it just to see some green, but it's the proper way, as told to us by experts," concluded

The initial project is set to wrap after the seeding and planting phase in 2021, but its effects and continuation are expected to extend far beyond.

MDC reminds snaggers that paddlefish season begins March 15

Imagine catching a giant, prehistoric fish whose ancestors swam during the time of dinosaurs. That is a reality for thousands of paddlefish snaggers during Missouri's annual spring paddlefish snagging season. Paddlefish -- named for their large, paddle-shaped snouts -- are an ancient species that can grow to seven feet and weight more than 100 pounds.

According to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), the state's major paddlefish snagging waters include Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, and Table Rock Lake. The paddlefish snagging season for these and most other waters in the state runs March 15 through April 30.

The season for the Mississippi River is March 15 through May 15 with a fall season of Sept. 15 through Dec. 15.

Unless exempt, anglers must have a current fishing permit to snag or to operate a boat for snaggers. The daily limit is two paddlefish and snaggers must stop snagging for any species after obtaining the daily limit on Lake of the Ozarks and Truman Lake and their tributaries, and the Osage River below the U.S. Highway 54 bridge. Once a legal-sized paddlefish is caught, it must be kept by the snagger and included in their daily limit.

The minimum legal length for paddlefish at Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, Table Rock Lake, and their tributaries is 34 inches, measured from the eye to the fork of the tail. The minimum legal length is 24 inches on the Osage River below Bagnell Dam and in other Missouri waters. All paddlefish under the legal minimum length must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after being caught.

The Wildlife Code of Missouri requires the head, tail, and skin to remain attached to all paddlefish while on the water, so paddlefish should not be cleaned until off the water. Also, extracted paddlefish eggs may not be possessed while on waters of the state or adjacent banks and may not be transported. Paddlefish eggs may not be bought, sold or offered for sale.

Additionally, paddlefish or their parts, including eggs, may not be used for bait.

Snagging Tips

MDC reminds snaggers that it is very important to immediately release sublegal fish for future harvests and offers these tips:

Use landing nets, not gaffs, which can kill young fish.

Wet hands before handling fish and avoid excessive handling.

Never put fingers in the gills or eyes.

Remove hooks carefully and get undersized fish back into the water as quickly as possible.

Season Outlook

According to MDC Fisheries Management Biologist Trish Yasger, the 2020 snagging season should be good.

"The extremely large 2008year class of fish is now 12 years old and will continue to provide good numbers of fish for snaggers to harvest," Yasger explained. "Snaggers should expect to see a lot of sublegal fish from the extremely large stocking in 2016. These fish are now four years old and won't begin reaching the 34inch minimum legal length limit until 2023. Please release sublegal fish unharmed immediately and gently as these are the fish you will be harvesting over the next several years."

Report Tagged Paddlefish

MDC has completed a fiveyear paddlefish tagging project to help monitor paddlefish numbers and improve species management. For the project, MDC staff placed metal jaw tags on thousands of paddlefish in Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, Table Rock Lake, and the Mississippi River. Staff also implanted transmitters in 100 paddlefish at each of these locations to track their movements and gain other important research information.

MDC asks snaggers to NOT remove tags or transmitters from sublegal paddlefish.

Yasger added a "thank you" to all the snaggers who returned tags during the paddle-fish tagging project.

"Please continue to help us monitor and better manage paddlefish by reporting all tagged paddlefish that you catch," She said. "Together we can keep snagging great for many years to come.

Report fish with jaw tags or transmitters by calling 573-579-6825 or by calling or e-mailing Trish Yasger at 660-530-5500 or Trish.Yasger@mdc.mo.gov. Snaggers can keep the silver jaw tags. MDC just needs a picture to verify the tag number. Report sublegal fish, but please do not remove tags. While supplies last, MDC will send an "I Caught a Missouri Paddlefish" t-shirt or hat to those submitting a tag.

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

Be on guard for new forage insect pests in Missouri

Insect invasions advanced more slowly when ships and wagons moved crops. Today, pests can hop aboard an airplane and infest a new area in short order. That makes it more important than ever to watch for agricultural insect pests, says Tim Schnakenberg of University of Missouri Extension.

Schnakenberg is a field specialist in agronomy in the heart of hay country. In 2016, he and other agronomists noticed significant populations of sugarcane aphids in late-season Sudan grass and other forage sorghum stands, specifically around Stone and Christian counties in southwestern Missouri.

"Aphid populations would be so intense that late-season harvests of forage sorghum fields-and in some cases, Johnson grass—would be severely reduced or destroyed," Schnakenberg says.

Infestation can be spotty and happen quickly, so scout all fields. "Agricultural insect pests seem to develop when we least expect them," he

New pests with the potential to damage pastures and reduce hay yield include sugarcane aphids, which moved in from southern states. Masses of the yellow aphids gather on the stems and leaves of individual plants to feed. This leads to yellowing or reddening of the leaves and reduced yield, Schnakenberg says.

Traditional insecticides do not offer effective control, he says. "So far, Transform WG and Sivanto 200SL are the only products that seem to work, though others may soon follow. Generally, these are legal for grain sorghum. However, always consult the label for special labeling in your state and if it can be used in a forage situation."

The most practical way to deal with sugarcane aphids is to convert acreage to one of the millets that aphids do not affect, he says.

Another new insect in southwestern Missouri affects Bermuda grass. Schnakenberg and field specialist in agronomy Jill Scheidt found the bermudagrass stem mag-

got in Barry County in 2019, but they suspect it may have been present in southwestern Missouri before then. Bermuda grass growers in Gulf states have seen it for several

Like sugarcane aphid, the stem maggot affects midto-late season growth. It can cause yields to taper off quickly. The first sign of infestation is when the upper terminal leaves look frostdamaged and die. Looking inside the stem reveals a small white maggot. Infestations vary with different varieties of Bermuda grass.

The standard recommendation for control used in the southern states is to spray with an insecticide seven to 10 days after the previous hay harvest or grazing. "Fortunately, inexpensive pyrethroid insecticides can be effective on this insect if applied timely," Schnakenberg says. "Unfortunately, most producers do not like to use routine insecticide in Bermuda grass stands."


Kevin Rice, MU Extension entomologist, recommends monitoring for two other emerging pests that can damage alfalfa.

The brown marmorated stink bug feeds on alfalfa and many other plants. It has been found in seven Missouri counties so far, including Greene County. Schnakenberg says he has not seen it in southwestern Missouri crops or forages. Unlike the green stink bug, it moves quickly when established.

Another emerging pest, the spotted lanternfly, could affect vineyards and walnut trees. Found in northeastern states, it lays eggs on metal surfaces, including trains and trucks, giving it a way to spread to Missouri. The spotted lanternfly is a potential pest for alfalfa, corn and soybeans. It contains cantharidin, a toxin found in blister beetles. It can kill horses when they eat large amounts of infested alfalfa.



MDC encourages public to Be Bear Aware this spring

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) estimates that Missouri is home to about 540 - 840 black bears with most being in the southern part of the state. As spring gets underway, these magnificent mammals leave their winter dens in search of food. MDC reminds Missourians to "Be Bear Aware."

MDC Resource Scientist and Furbearer Biologist Laura Conlee said it is imperative that residents remove bear attractants from their property, such as bird feeders, trash, barbeque grills, pet food, and food waste.

"As black bears become active in the spring, they are on a mission to find food," said Conlee. "Keeping areas free of attractants and letting bears find natural foods is in everyone's best interest. If you see a bear, let the animal be and enjoy the sighting, but be sure to not offer it any food."

Conlee noted that intentionally feeding bears can

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be dangerous as it makes the bears comfortable around people. It can also lead bears to cause significant damage to property while searching for a meal.

"When bears lose their fear of humans, they could approach people in search of food or may defend the food sources or territory they associate with people, which can make them dangerous," Conlee said. "When this happens, the bear cannot be relocated and has to be destroyed. A fed bear is a dead bear."

Food is usually a bear's main motivator, but that also means it can be a main source of conflict. MDC offers the following tips to avoid attracting black bears to possible food sources:

Store garbage, recyclables, and compost inside a secure building or in a bearproof container until trash pick-up day.

Keep grills and smokers clean and store them inside.

Don't leave pet food outside. Feed pets a portion at each meal and remove the empty containers.

Refrain from using birdfeeders in bear country from April through November. If in use, hang them at least 10 feet high and 4 feet away from any structure. Keep in mind that even if a bear cannot get to the birdseed, the scent could still attract it to the area.

Use electric fencing to keep bears away from beehives, chicken coops, vegetable gardens, orchards, and other potential food sources.

Keep campsites clean and

store all food, toiletries and trash in a secure vehicle or strung high between two trees. Do not keep food or toiletries in a tent, and do not burn or bury garbage or

food waste. While black bears are generally a shy, non-aggressive species and bear attacks are rare, MDC offers these tips when outdoors in bear

Make noise, such as clapping, singing or talking loudly, while hiking to prevent surprising a bear.

Travel in a group if pos-

Keep dogs leashed.

Be aware of the surroundings. If there is evidence of a bear, such as tracks or scat,

Barry County courts sentence five to incarceration during month of February

• Loryn Marie Barclay, of Monett, pled guilty to harassment by a person over 21 years old of a person under the age of 17. Barclay received a suspended execution of a three year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On April 27, 2017, the Monett Police Department received information from an anonymous source that Barclay, who was a substitute teacher at Monett School, was having a sexual relationship with a Monett High School student.

When officers interviewed the student on May 3, he confirmed he had a sexual relationship with Barclay and they had intercourse on several occasions between November 2016 and January 2017 at locations in both Barry and Lawrence Counties. In an interview with officers, Barclay confirmed the sexual relationship.

Barclay is to serve probation until February 21, 2025.

• Brian L. Easley, of Eagle Rock, made an Alford plea to receiving stolen property. Easley received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

Between December 5, 2015, and April 16, 2016, Easley claimed unemployment insurance benefits he knew to be stolen. Easley was under reporting his wages in order to earn more unemployment benefits.

Easley is to serve probation until February 18, 2025.

• Butch Nicholas Hall, of Eagle Rock, pled guilty to assault in the third degree on a special victim. Hall received a suspended execution of a six year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

As of November 28, 2011, Howell was in arrears on child support by \$6,478.54 for one minor child.

On December 7, 2018, Irving called a family member to say he had been in a car accident. When officers arrived, they found him locked in a vehicle with no damage. He told officers he ingested something earlier in the day and was not making sense. Officers located

On February 23, 2019, Irving was stopped by a Barry County Sheriff's deputy. Irving was anxious and could not stop moving. Officers found him to be in possession of methamphetamine and to be under the influence.

Irving is to serve probation until February 18, 2025.


