Dolly Parton's Imagination Library comes to Cassville, Exeter

Thanks to the efforts of Teresa Phillips, of Exeter, and Community Faith Chapel in Cassville, there's soon to be a new library in town for children ages birth through age five.

"I read about Dolly Parton's Imagination Library on Facebook," Phillips said, "but when I went online to see if my granddaughters were eligible for the free, monthly book program, I discovered that nobody in Barry County was eligible."

In fact, according to Phillips, very few children in southwest Missouri *are* eligible, except for some in Greene, Stone and Taney Counties, where the Imagination Library is champi-

oned by public libraries, schools, and United Way.

"A 501c3 umbrella is necessary for the library to operate," said Phillips, "because donor support is required in order to provide the books to children at no cost to their families."

The Imagination Library is designed to inspire a love for reading in kids, and was created 20 years ago by Dolly Parton in honor of her father, who, in spite of being intelligent and a hard worker, had never learned to read nor write.

Parton first initiated the program in her home county of Sevier in Tennessee, but it has since expanded around the world and serves over one million children.

Dolly Parton believes that

if you can read, you can do anything, dream anything and be anything. Through the Imagintion Library, her hope is to ensure that all children have books in their homes, regardless of the environment in which they live.

The Imagination Library partners with local communities to provide a free, high-quality book each month to registered children from birth to age five. The books are hand-selected by a committee of early childhood experts to be age-appropriate and align with the child's developmental needs.

Phillips likes the fact that books are addressed and mailed to each child.

"It gives them something

Many residents unaware of earned income tax credit

"Few people who are eligible for it know about it," said Karla Deaver, in reference to the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC).

Deaver is the County Engagement Specialist for Extension: a community focused program designed to equip Barry County citizens with research-based information affiliated with the University of Missouri.

Currently, Extension is unfolding a statewide project to assist low-income families by offering insight into the system of how one's taxes are processed, specifically pertaining to one key point: the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). According to Deaver, only 20 percent of all eligible applicants, nationwide, actu-

ally apply for the tax credit, even though these are funds that American taxpayers are entitled to, and eligible for.

This shortage of applicants has led to a total of \$300 million "just sitting there - unused," said Deaver.

However, she says, this is far from the average tax-payer's fault.

"If they're doing their own taxes, they might not know," she said.

"There are few tax credits here that one doesn't have to pay in, in order to get money back," continued Deaver. "This is based on income."

Deaver gave an example of how the tax credit works for an average family: a married couple with three children and a household income of \$37,500, she says, could be eligible for a refundable tax credit of approximately \$3,000. The family's owed taxes would be \$1,238, and their tax refund would be \$1,762.

"Not only would [the tax credit] help those individual families, but it can help local communities. That money's then going to be turned over to the community for groceries, and everything a family has to do to live day to day. That money is spent in the local economy."

Another contributing element to the tax credit not being applied for is the existence of a language barrier, according to Deaver. "Also," she said, "there are a large number of families with foster children. It can be difficult to claim some of these

tax credits, since the child must have lived with that parent for more than half of the year."

The tax credit is not just for families. According to Deaver, the tax credit can apply to any tax-paying citizen of Missouri.

"Even a single, retired person can apply for this earned income tax credit; it is not necessarily just for people with children still in the home," she continued. "It's all based on the number of people in the household, and their taxable income."

The Extension office is endeavoring to reach senior centers with this information, as well as Barry County schools.

"We'll be getting this in-

Phillips said, due to the efforts required to solicit local funding and due to the limited amount of time she has, she initially thought to institute the program only for children within the zip code of her hometown of Exeter. However, because the program requires a 501c3 umbrella, which was kindly provided by Pastor Rick Cooper and her home congregation of Faith Community Chapel in Cassville, she and fellow organizers are opting to also offer the program to children

within Cassville's zip code. The program is scheduled to launch in Cassville and Exeter on January 4, with online registration available at that time at imaginationlibrary.com.

An in-person registration event organized by CS Designs, Decor & More is scheduled for January 8, 10 a.m. - 12 p.m., at Diva Bling & The Tiny Highlander Boutique at 201 E. Fifth Street in Cassville.

"We'll have 20 sample books available at the event for parents to view," Phil-

lips said. "They'll represent books that children will receive across the birth to age five spectrum."

Phillips says a monthly book will be received by a child about six to eight weeks after registration.

Phillips will be looking for sponsors for The Imagination Library in the Cassville and Exeter areas and beyond.

According to her research, there are currently 714 children age five and under within the Cassville zip code and 119 within the Exeter mailing area. The Dollywood Foundation estimates that about 60 percent of the children in areas where the library is available will become registered, and the es-

timated cost of the program is \$25 per year, per child who is registered. Individuals or businesses may donate through the Imagination Library's website at imaginationlibrary.com and selecting the affiliate's code:



Fitzpatrick instrumental in housing tax credit reforms

Missouri State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick today announced that because of reforms he championed with other members of the Missouri Housing Development Commission, the efficiency of the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit program (LIHTC) improved significantly when compared to last year. Because of these reforms, the value of the credits continues to increase which is resulting in more low-income housing being built with no increase in state spending.

The average price per tax credit with standard pricing improved to \$0.634 this year versus \$0.58 last year, an increase of more than \$0.05. For the first time in the history of the LIHTC program all projects which received an award included pricing of state tax credits of at least \$0.60. Additionally, under the accelerated redemption program some credits were priced over \$0.70 for the first time ever.

"Over the past three years I have worked alongside the other members of the commission to improve the efficiency and transparency of the LIHTC program and it is great to see the impact of this work," Treasurer Fitzpatrick said. "Increasing competition for credits, like any marketplace, drives the efficiency of the program up. The accelerated redemption model I championed has no doubt led to increased competition for these tax credits and I am gratified to see the first significant price increase in years. I remain committed to protecting Missouri tax dollars and maximizing their impact." At yesterday's MHDC meeting, the Commission voted to approve the Rental Production Recommendations for Funding.

In September, the Commission unanimously expanded the availability of accelerated redemption for LIHTC to up to 50 percent of state LIHTC, an increase from 20 percent of total projects in the 2020 pilot program. This expansion followed the recommendation of a study committee, chaired by Treasurer Fitzpatrick, which evaluated the impact of accelerated redemption on pricing for LIHTC. The committee found accelerated redemption increased the value of state LIHTC over \$0.10 per tax credit dollar from the 2017 standard pricing, representing an increase of 18 percent.

MHDC was created by the General Assembly in 1969 and administers and provides financing for the construction of affordable housing in the



Medical marijuana sales reach \$200 million in Missouri

Fourteen months after the first sale to a qualified patient occurred in a Missouri medical marijuana dispensary, the total sales as part of the stateregulated medical marijuana program reached the \$200 million mark.

Facilities began receiving licensing and certification from the Section for Medical Marijuana Regulation within the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) two years ago this week, and they began receiving their approval to operate following the commencement inspection process in June 2020.

to clear so many hurdles that COVID-19 presented during a critical time."

DHSS is charged with providing safe and secure access to medical marijuana for qualifying Missouri patients. 158,169 qualified patients and 3,283 caregivers are currently active in Missouri's program.

Including Missouri, 21 states have implemented medical marijuana laws since 2005. The national average for implementation is 29 months, and Missouri was able to implement its medical program in just over 23 months. Only five states implemented medical programs faster than Missouri (Pennsylvania, New York, Utah, Minnesota and Oklahoma).

MSHP Reports Eight Traffic Fatalities Over Christmas Holiday Weekend

Colonel Eric T. Olson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, provides the following preliminary statistics related to the Christmas holiday weekend:

Eight people died in traffic crashes during the 78-hour counting period, which began at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 23, 2021, and ended at 11:59 p.m. Sunday, December 26, 2021.

Troopers investigated the following:

- Traffic Crashes: 310
- Traffic Crash Injuries: 92
- Traffic Crash Fatalities: 4
- DWI: 67

[Note: Last year during the 78-hour Christmas counting period, there were 746 traffic crashes statewide. In those crashes, 10 people were killed and another 10 were injured. During the 2020 Christmas holiday, troopers investigated 307 traffic crashes which included all 10 fatalities and 86 injuries. Troopers arrested 62 people for driving while impaired in 2020.]

There were no boating crashes or drownings over the 2021 Christmas holiday counting period.

Of the four fatality traffic crashes investigated by troopers, two occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring area, and two occurred in the Troop F, Jefferson City area. The remaining four fatalities were investigated by Kansas City Police Department, St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department, Overland Police Department and Wentzville Police Department.

There were no traffic fatalities on Thursday, December 23, during the holiday counting period.

- · Zachary M. Sutton, 32, of De Soto, died when the vehicle he was operating crossed the center line and struck a pickup truck head-on. Sutton was wearing his seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred on Missouri Highway 28, one mile west of Missouri Route A in Osage County. Osage County Coroner A.J. Probst pronounced Sutton deceased at the scene. The driver of the pickup truck sustained moderate injuries in the crash. He was wearing a seat belt.
- Kenneth H. Mustain, 57, of Camdenton, died when the ATV he was operating traveled off the right side of the roadway and overturned. Mustain was ejected from the ATV. The crash occurred on


Greenview Drive near Hermit Holler in Camden County. Dr. Barnes pronounced Mustain deceased at University of Missouri Hospital. Camden County Sheriff's Department assisted at the scene.


- Cesar Estrada-Lopez, 18, of Bridgeton, died when the motorcycle he was operating struck the rear of a vehicle and he was ejected onto the highway. A third vehicle swerved to avoid striking the motorcycle and struck Estrada-Lopez. Estrada-Lopez was not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. The crash occurred on Interstate 70 west of North Lindbergh Boulevard in St. Louis County. Dr. Schwartz pronounced Estrada-Lopez deceased at SSM Health DePaul Hospital. Neither of the other two drivers involved in the crash were injured. They were both wearing a seat belt.
- · Zachary M. Ward, 28, of Kansas City, died when he lost control of the vehicle he was driving while taking an exit. The vehicle struck a guardrail, went off the roadway, traveled down an embankment, and overturned multiple times. Ward was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected. The crash occurred at the exit for Shoal Creek Parkway on U.S. Highway 169 in Clay County. Officers with the Kansas City Police Department handled the investigation.
- A pedestrian was struck and killed in the vicinity of West Florissant and Thrush Avenue in St. Louis. Officers with the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department are investigating. No further details are available.



- · A fatal crash involving a motorcycle occurred on David Hoekel Parkway over Interstate 70 in St. Charles County. Officers from the Wentzville Police Department are investigating. No further details are available.

There was one traffic fatality on Sunday, December 26. • Amy L. Veit, 37, of Lonedell, died when her vehicle traveled partially off the right side of the roadway and she over-corrected. Her vehicle began skidding, traveled across the center of the roadway and rotated counterclockwise, striking the front of another vehicle. Veit was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred on Missouri Route H east of Dry Creek Road in Jefferson County. Valle Ambulance District personnel pronounced Veit deceased at the scene. The driver and a passenger in the other vehicle sustained minor injuries. They were wearing their seat belts.







Omicron variant rising quickly throughout Missouri

According to a press realease from the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, more than half of community sewershed samples tested from the week of Dec. 20 showed presence of the Omicron variant. The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) continues to partner with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, the University of Missouri -Columbia, wastewater operators, and others to monitor COVID-19 trends by testing wastewater in communities throughout the state. For nearly a year, this team has been testing wastewater samples to look for the presence of variants of the virus that causes COVID-19.

Sequencing tests identified the first presence of the Omicron variant (B.1.1.529) from two sets of sewershed samples collected on Dec. 7-8 in Jackson County and Buchanan County. In both wastewater systems, CO-VID-19 viral strands were identified as having mutations associated with Omicron which indicated that the Omicron variant virus is likely present among the population in these sewershed areas.

As a result of expanded testing the week of Dec. 20, 32 of 57 samples had mutations associated with Omicron variant. Those locations included: three Kansas City facilities (Blue River, Westside, and Birmingham), seven St. Louis facilities (Lemay, Grand Glaize, Coldwater Creek, Bissell Point, Fenton, Lower Meramec, and Missouri River), five St. Charles County facilities (St. Peters Spencer Creek, **Duckett Creek Sewer District** WWTF #1, Duckett Creek Sewer District WWTF #2, O'Fallon, and Wentzville), Branson (Cooper Creek and Compton Drive), Springfield Northwest, Interim Saline Creek Regional, Troy Southeast, Farmington East, Perryville Southeast, Columbia. St. Joseph, Atherton, Cape Girardeau, Nixa, West Plains, Washington, Oak Grove, Festus - Crystal City and Joplin Turkey Creek.

"Our robust program for monitoring COVID-19 through sewershed sampling provides us with reliable information regarding the presence of the virus and its variants," said Donald Kauerauf, DHSS Director. "The existence of the Omicron variant is becoming much more prevalent each week, making the actions of COVID-19 individual testing, vaccination and other mitigation measures more important as we already face the threat of the Delta variant and an increase in flu cases."

DHSS continues to recommend that residents follow prevention strategies such as wearing a mask in public indoor settings, frequent handwashing and maintaining physical distance from others.

"Gatherings are continuing during this holiday season, and I highly encourage testing before and after these events and any travels to help limit any unintended spread of the virus," said Kauerauf. "If you're not feeling well, stay home and don't risk getting your loved ones sick. It is important for individuals to plan ahead when identifying a location and advance timing needed to get tested, as there is a growing demand for these services."

Public health experts worldwide

quickly to learn more about the Omicron variant and how it may impact the health and safety of citizens. The disease severity caused by Omicron is still unknown. Scientists are also studying the degree to which existing vaccines and therapies protect against Omicron.

The sequencing testing results are updated weekly and displayed in the COVID-19 sewershed surveillance StoryMap. The online storymap will be updated on Dec. 28 with the most recent variant



MDC changes some fishing regulations

The Missouri Conservation Commission gave final approval during its Dec. 10 open meeting in Jefferson City to several proposed regulation changes to the Wildlife Code of Missouri by the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) for paddlefish, related fishing methods, and commercial fishing. The regulation changes will become effective Feb. 28, 2022.

MDC asked for initial public comments on the proposed regulation changes this past spring. The Commission gave initial approval to the proposed regulation changes at its Aug. 27 open meeting in Jefferson City. MDC then had a public comment period during October.

One regulation change establishes a formal definition of "snagging," which was undefined in the Wildlife Code of Missouri. Snagging is a popular method for taking fish, such as paddlefish, that do not go after baited hooks because they "filter feed".

The MDC definition of snagging is: Hooking or attempting to hook a fish in a part of the body other than the mouth or jaw by means of a pole, line, and hook. Snagging is characterized by a repeated drawing or jerking motion of the pole, line, and hook or by trolling with an unbaited hook rather than enticement by bait or lure.

A regulation change establishes a statewide minimum length limit of 32 inches -- measured from eye to fork of tail -- for sport/recreational taking of paddlefish, up from the current minimum length of 24 inches for most areas of the state. The existing minimum length limit of 34 inches -- measured from eye to fork of tail -- will remain in effect for Lake of the Ozarks, Table Rock Lake, Truman Lake, and their tributaries. All paddlefish under the legal minimum length must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after being caught.

Another regulation amendment adds 15 days to the fall/winter snagging, snaring, or grabbing season for taking fish -- except paddlefish -- by extending the season end from Jan. 31 to Feb. 15. It also prohibits snagging for all species of fish on Table Rock Lake after

taking the daily limit of two paddlefish.

The paddlefish snagging season for the state's major paddlefish snagging waters --Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, and Table Rock Lake -- and most other waters in the state remains March 15 through April 30. The paddlefish season for the Mississippi River remains March 15 through May 15 with a fall season of Sept. 15 through





Survey finds Missouri 2021 land values increased

Landowners who purchased Missouri property in 2021 paid more for land than buyers who purchased land in 2020, according to the latest Missouri Farmland Values Opinion Survey report from University of Missouri Extension.

Agricultural economist Ray Massey, who led the survey, projects the upswing in

land values will continue. He says higher land values will result in higher cash rental rates. Higher land values may also lead to an increase in the tax base, allowing communities to collect more revenue.

Conducted in September 2021, the land values survey collected responses from 88 Missouri lenders, farmers, rural appraisers and others familiar with Missouri land values. Values for cropland, pasture, timberland and hunting/recreational land all increased from 2020 to 2021. Cropland and pasture val-

The value of good nonirrigated Missouri cropland averaged \$6,326 per acre in 2021 - an increase of 14 percent relative to 2020. Between 2017 and 2020, values for this cropland category annually increased 4.3 percent on average. Values per acre averaged \$4,877 in 2017, and good non-irrigated cropland values increased by \$1,449 per acre since then.

The state's irrigated cropland averaged \$7,132 per acre in 2021, an 11 percent increase from 2020. The survev first included irrigated cropland in 2018. At the time, values per acre averaged \$5,514. Since then, irrigated cropland values have increased by \$1,618 per acre.

Pastureland values were reported as a state average of \$3,781 per acre. Compared with 2020, values grew by 12 percent in 2021. Between 2017 and 2021, the average value for pastureland increased by \$865 per acre.

Massey says several factors have driven cropland and pasture value changes, including high commodity prices, low interest rates and proximity to urban areas. In recent years, strong farm revenue contributed to increasing cropland values.

"If people have money in their pocket, they are willing

to buy land, and they will pay more for it," Massey says. Timberland and hunting/ recreational land values

Land used for timber or hunting and recreation also increased in value in 2021. Missouri tracts used for hunting or recreation averaged \$3,162 per acre in 2021 — an 18 percent year-overyear change. Values per acre averaged \$2,048 in 2017, and they increased by \$1,114 per acre in the past five years.

In 2021, Missouri timberland values averaged \$3,070 per acre, which was 17 percent higher than 2020 values. Values per acre in 2017 averaged \$2,012. Since then, timberland values have grown by \$1,058 per acre.

According to Massey, the value of timberland or hunt-

ing land rose as commodity prices and investment earnings increased in 2020. For example, out-of-town investors who earn positive returns on their investments are able to purchase land for recreational purposes.

"One of them is the satisfaction of sharing your plant knowledge with others. The Master Gardener program was initiated to do just that," Trinklein said. Its motto. "helping others learn to grow," emphasizes service to others as the program's main objective, he said.

A new session of online Missouri Master Gardener core training begins Jan. 19, 2022.

Trinklein and MU Extension horticulture specialist Sarah Denkler teach the 14 online sessions. "These classes represent a viable option for people who can't take the weekly classes in person," Trinklein said.

Classes are delivered through the Canvas learning management system as a series of scripted and narrated presentations. Students work at their own pace. A composite score of 70% on chapter quizzes is needed to pass the

Topics include basic botany, soils and plant nutrition, vegetable gardening, fruit production, landscape design, woody ornamental plants, herbaceous orname tal plants, turf management, insect and disease management, and pesticide safety.

Core training is the first step toward certification as an MU Extension Master Gardener. Trainees must also complete at least 30 hours of volunteer service, Trinklein said. Local Master Gardener coordinators can help online trainees find volunteer opportunities to meet the service hour requirements.

MDC proposes expansion of furbearer hunting, trapping seasons

The Missouri Conservation Commission gave initial approval to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) at its Dec. 10 open meeting on proposed regulation changes that would extend current furbearer hunting and trapping seasons for abundant furbearer species.

Furbearers are mammal species that have traditionally been trapped or hunted for their fur, such as coyotes, raccoons, and skunks. Many furbearers are also considered small game species, for which there are small game hunting seasons.

According to MDC, many furbearer populations have experienced long-term population increases, allowing for additional harvest opportunity. The Department has received input from a variety of stakeholders to provide additional opportunity through extension and adjustments of season dates for multiple furbearer species.

Furbearers play important ecological roles and trapping and hunting are critical wildlife management tools.

MDC strives to provide the opportunity to harvest these species, while considering pelt-primeness during the fur-harvest season, desire for opportunity outside of the traditional fur-harvest season, the potential for conflict with other hunting seasons for other species, and landowner opportunity.

MDC's Furbearer Program staff reviewed furbearer harvest seasons and worked to develop a regulatory framework that provides additional opportunity for harvest in response to stakeholder requests. Based on this review and stakeholder input, the following recommendations were developed for consider-

Extending the hunting season and trapping season for bobcat, coyote, raccoon, opossum, striped skunk Nov. 15 to the last day of February.

Extending the trapping season for mink, muskrat, and river otter to Nov. 15 to the last day of February.

Establishing an early hunting and trapping season for raccoon and opossum to run Aug. 1 - Oct. 15.



Sleep plays key role in health

We may not think about sleeping as a healthy behavior like we would exercising or eating a healthy diet, but we probably should.

Sleep can play a key role in health and wellness, and studies show that many of us just aren't getting enough of it.

"Short sleep and poor-quality sleep are linked to increased risk of depression, obesity, diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and some cancers," said Yikyung Park, associate professor in the Division of Public Health Sciences at Washington Uniin St. Louis. "A lack of sleep also weakens immune functo common infections such as the common cold."

How can sleep problems have such a wide-ranging effect on health?

For one, they can disrupt the circadian rhythm, our non-Hispanics, natural "body clock" that con-

Less directly, sleep problems can also simply make it harder for us to make choices that are good for our health. Lack of sleep can impact decision-making, energy levels and a number of other factors that can make us more likely to stay on the couch rather than get outside for a walk, or choose a fast food meal over making something healthier at home.

It's recommended that most adults get about seven to eight hours of sleep each day. But what counts as healthy amounts of sleep can vary.

"For some people, six hours of sleep a day is enough, but others may need nine hours. And although it's important to get enough sleep, sleep quality is also crucial," Park

While some of the factors that impact the quality and length of sleep are out of our direct control, there are simple approaches we can take to improve the chances of getting good sleep regularly. As a first step, Park recommends

Put away electronic devices such as smartphones, tablets and TVs at least 30 minutes before bed

Have a routine sleep schedule - that is, go to bed and wake up at the same time every day

Avoid large meals within a couple hours of bedtime

> Get regular physical activity, though not close to bed time

In our busy, round-theclock world, these changes can be an adjustment. But you don't need to tackle them all at once. Pick just one to start, and then go from there. Small changes build on each other. And like other healthy behaviors, improving the quality of sleep is something well worth the effort and can provide a real boost to health and well-being.

And that may just help you rest a bit easier.


