Cole, raised in Barry County and a graduate of Wheaton High School, will fill the vacancy created by the appointment of the Honorable Jack A. L. Goodman to the Southern District Court of Appeals.

Cole is currently a partner at Ellis, Cupps & Cole Law Firm in Cassville. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Missouri Southern

University and a Juris Doctor from the University of Missouri - Columbia School of

Kasper will fill the Associate Circuit Judge vacancy created by the retirement of the Honorable Robert George.

Kasper currently serves as the assistant prosecuting attorney for Lawrence County. He holds a bachelor's degree in history and political science from Arkansas Tech University and a master's degree in divinity from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Mr. Kasper earned his Juris Doctor from the University of Arkansas School of Law.

## Hospitals, state collaborate to administer vaccines





Mercy and CoxHealth hospitals have been selected by the state to receive and administer approximately 55 percent of the COVID-19 vaccines allotted to southwest Missouri residents.

Due to limited availability of the COVID-19 vaccine, CoxHealth President & CEO Steve Edwards is encouraging area residents to sign up everywhere to take it.

"Get your name on a list," he said, in a media briefing Monday, "and take the vaccine from whichever organization contacts you first to let you know it's available. It's just important to get people vaccinated to slow the course of this virus."

Missouri Governor Mike Parson and the Department of Health and Senior Services announced the implementation of a distribution plan for the vaccine Monday. That plan includes partnering with selected hospitals in the

state, which have the capability of administering 5,000 vaccines per week. The allocation of vaccines to those hospitals will be proportional to regional population, based on highway patrol territories.

Within Troop D, which includes Barry County, both CoxHealth and Mercy hospitals are scheduled to receive 5,700 vaccines every other


## **OATS Transit Celebrates** 50 Years

February 1 marked the 50th anniversary for OATS Transit, a nationwide leader in rural public transportation systems. The company is headquartered in Columbia MO and serves 87 counties in the state of Missouri.

## Roark Family Health to host free COVID-19 testing clinics

Beginning Friday, February 5, Roark Family Health will host free COVID-19 testing clinics every Friday, 9 a.m. - 2 p.m.

The free clinics are provided through a partnership with Roark Family Health and Nextgen Diagnostics, Dr. Lisa Roark said.

The tests will be completed in the south side parking lot (concrete parking lot) in the numbered parking spots.

People wanting to be test-

ed need to bring a driver's license and insurance card (if they have one). For those who are uninsured, or whose insurance will not cover the cost of the test, the test will still be performed at no cost to the recipient.

According to Roark, the test is a nasal PCR test, with results generally available in about 48 hours.

For questions, people are advised to call Nextgen at 417-362-NEXT.

Roark emphasizes that the

test is available to all interested patients, whether they are a member of her clinic or not.

"The tests can be used," she said, "for testing out of quarantine, testing before leaving the state, and for employers whose staff must be tested weekly regardless of symp-

## Health department taking names for vaccines

The Barry County Health Department received an allotment of 100 Pfizer vaccines last week which were all administered Friday in a hastily organized drive-through vaccination clinic, according to administrator Roger Brock.

"We're now taking the names of people interested in receiving our second allotment of vaccines," Brock said.

Eligible recipients are in the Phase 1A and Phase 1B, Tier 1 and Tier 2 categories, which include high-risk individuals, and those age 65 and older.

"During Friday's clinic, we first contacted first responders, but since we still had plenty of vaccines, we began calling other qualifying individuals who had expressed interest in receiving it," Brock

Interested parties may call the health department at 417-847-2114 for more information or to have their name added to the waiting list.

Edwards said the state's partnering healthcare facilities will receive 55 percent of the state's total allocation of 76,000 vaccine doses per week. The remaining 45 percent will go to other clinics, pharmacies, state-operated mass distribution points and public health departments.

Edward appreciates the agility of the governor's new vaccine distribution plan with its predictable cadence. There are still two unknowns, though, according to Edwards: one is the future vaccine supply, since it's dependent on both manufacturers and federal allotment.

"I do anticipate that sup-

ply will increase," he said, especially with the product of more manufacturers almost ready for approval."

The second variable which presents an unknown, Edwards said, is the number of people who will be interested in taking the vaccine.

"When we administered our first allotment to employees in December, there was a certain amount of caution among them," he said, "but after those who were hesitant saw that their peers who had taken the vaccine were doing well, they stepped forward to take one, too. We anticipate it will be the same for members of the general public when they become eligible."

Because there is a limited

supply of vaccine, CoxHealth is offering it in tiers based on the following criteria: age 80 and over, with a BMI over 40; age 80 and over, with diabetes or lung disease; and age 85 or over with heart disease.

If there is not enough demand in those categories, they will begin offering it to those who are eligible under the state criteria, which recently opened to those age 65 and older, or who have known health conditions.

Edwards is pleased with the collaboration among state and local health entities to administer the vaccine.

"What has torn us apart as a nation, also has the ability to bring us together," he said.

# Resident reminds of property tax credit for eligible seniors

Yet one more effect of CO-VID-19 on the elderly and disabled can be seen as tax time draws nearer. With area senior citizen centers closed, many residents don't have the tax help that was once offered through the centers.

Cassville resident and senior citizen Donna Creel reports that she did not receive her Missouri Property Tax Credit Form in the mail, as she has done for the past 10 or 15 years. The form, when filed, allows eligible senior citizens and disabled residents to receive a credit on their property taxes, Creel said. Because she lives on a limited income, it's a credit Creel appreciates.

"As soon as I pay my property taxes, I typically turn right around and file the Property Tax Credit Form," she said. "This year, I didn't receive one, so I called the Missouri Department of Revenue. They told me that, as the result of a budget-cutting decision, they would not be mailing the forms out this year, but that they're available online."

Creel was a little taken aback, because she knows many senior citizens are not familiar with computers, although she is herself. Because her home computer had a glitch, she visited the library, where she discovered there were several steps involved to properly print the form. With the help of a librarian, she had the necessary form in hand 20 minutes later, an excessive amount of time for a form that had once been mailed, she thought.

"Before COVID," Creel said, "the senior center held sessions every year to help people prepare their taxes.



This year, with senior centers closed, that option isn't available, so I just want to remind other seniors that they may be eligible for a property tax credit. However, in order to claim it, they'll either need to access the form online or call the Missouri Department of Revenue and request that a form be mailed."

Creel said, this year, she will get back \$330 of the \$380 she paid in for 2020 property taxes. For her, that number represents a considerable savings.

Melissa Burchfield, of Burchfield Tax Service in Cassville, says the property tax credit for senior citizens and disabled people is income-based and depends on how much real estate property taxes were paid.

"Generally, a person must make less than \$30,000 for the year in order to qualify," she said.

According to Burchfield, Missouri has stopped mailing out all of its forms this year, but her office is more than happy to print the property tax credit form for people if they ask.

The 20-page forms are also available at The Barry County Advertiser office at 904 West Street in Cassville for a \$5 fee.

The accident occurred at 7 a.m., Wednesday, January 27, just west of Butterfield.

Holenda suffered minor injuries. The driver was transported by ambulance to Cox Hospital in Monett.

Holenda was wearing a seat belt.

The vehicle was towed by Brice's Towing of Cassville. The car was insured.

According to the report filed by K.L. Knight with the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Miles S. Keifer, of Wheaton, driver of a 1998 Mercury Mountaineer, ran off the roadway on Highway 76 and struck a fence and several trees.

The accident happened at 6:30 p.m., Friday, January 29, just east of Anderson.

Keifer suffered moderate injuries. The driver was transported to Mercy Hospital in Cassville.

Keifer was not wearing a seatbelt. The vehicle was

towed by Metro Towing of Neosho. It is unknown if the car was insured.

In addition to using the data collected in the classroom and by district administration, the district will partner with the National Weather Service to provide weather updates and infor-"Weather station mation. data, such as the one in the

Cassville School District, allows the National Weather Service to see near real time weather conditions for the immediate Cassville area," said Mark Burchfield, Meteorologist with the National Weather Service. "This data is an input into the forecast process, which helps make more accurate forecasts. The data is also used as ground truth for measuring high winds and/or high precipitation that could lead to hazardous weather. This could prompt us to issue warnings, which ultimately save lives and property. We are thankful for the Cassville School District for providing this weather data to the National Weather Service."

The weather stations will also be used by both the high school and middle school science departments. Science teachers plan to use the information collected when teaching students about electromagnetic frequencies and meteorology. "We are grateful to Freedom Bank for providing an additional tool for our district to use for not only our students, but the safety of our wildcats and our community," surrounding stated Asbill.

State law requires financial institutions, insurance companies, public agencies and other business entities to turn over assets, including cash and the contents of safe deposit boxes, to the Treasurer's Office. Most Unclaimed Property consists of cash from bank accounts, stocks, bonds, and contents of safe deposit boxes that have been abandoned. It can also include uncollected insurance policy proceeds, government refunds, utility deposits, and wages from past jobs.

Treasurer Fitzpatrick currently manages over \$1 billion in unclaimed assets in more than five million owner accounts. One in ten Missourians have Unclaimed Property, and the average return is nearly \$300. Unclaimed Property can be searched for and claimed on Show-MeMoney.com.

The Treasurer's Office also

holds more than 100 military medals and insignia. To search these, visit https:// treasurer.mo.gov/Military/ AllMedals.aspx.

Since taking office in 2019, Treasurer Fitzpatrick has broken three unclaimed property records, returning the first \$1 million of his administration in less than 10 days, returning over \$45 million in one fiscal year, and returning unclaimed property to more Missourians in one year than any prior treasurer.

Launched by the National Association of Unclaimed Property Administrators (NAUPA), today marks the first National Unclaimed Property Day.





## **Extension Approved for Funds to Reimburse** Substitute Teachers

The Governor's Office recently approved an extension of the allocation of funds from the state's Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) to support Missourians wishing to serve or currently serving as substitute teachers during the staffing challenges Missouri schools are facing because of the COVID-19 pandemic. This opportunity for reimbursement, as well as the newly-approved alternative route to obtain a substitute teaching certificate, was first announced in October as a way to address the substitute teaching shortage exacerbated by the COVID-19 pan-

This alternative certification route allows individuals who possess a high school diploma (or its equivalent) to complete a 20-hour online training to be eligible for a substitute certificate. There is a \$50 application fee for the certificate as well as a \$175 online training fee. The Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) will use the identified CRF funding to reimburse any individual who has paid the application fee between November 5, 2020, and March 31, 2021. Reimbursement will begin after March 31, 2021. DESE will also use CRF funds to reimburse any individual who has paid the online training fee from November 5, 2020, through February 28, 2021. The online training program, Frontline, will begin processing those reimbursements after February 28, 2021. There is no action required

by the substitute teachers to be reimbursed; the payment method used to pay these fees will be automatically credited. To qualify for the alternative route to substitute teacher certification, individuals must complete the online training by February 28, 2021; the emergency rule that allows this alternative route, approved by the Missouri State Board of Education to pandemic-related address staffing shortages, expires after that date.

Substitute teacher candidates must also pay \$41.75 for a fingerprint background check for each local education agency (LEA) in which the substitute teacher intends to work. Substitute teachers may sometimes pay this fee multiple times, if they work in multiple LEAs. CRF funding is also available for LEAs that choose to reimburse substitute teachers working in their schools for the required background check fee. The individual must have completed their fingerprint background check between November 5, 2020, and March 31, 2021. To access these CRF funds, the LEA must submit to DESE an application and a list of those individuals to be reimbursed. The application is due by March 31, 2021.

## Missouri DHSS looking for organizations to help feed children

The Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) is looking for non-profit organizations throughout the state to help feed thousands of children who would otherwise go without meals during the summer months and during times of public emergencies, when children do not have access to free or reduced-price meals at school.

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) reimburses organizations for meals they serve to children under the age of 18 who are at risk of not having enough to eat during the summer months. The program is one of the ways Missouri is working to fight childhood hunger. Organizations that choose to sponsor the SFSP will help ensure that children in underserved areas of the

state continue to receive nutritious meals when school is not in session.

"Preventing food insecurity in children is an important step in improving the health of Missourians," said Dr. Randall Williams, DHSS Director. "Without the assistance of organizations across the state, many of Missouri's children would have gone without meals during this past year. We greatly appreciate the organizations who have stepped up to provide the critical nutrition our children need."

Organizations eligible to participate in the program as sponsors include non-profit organizations such as schools, faith-based organizations, camps, private nonprofit agencies, and local government entities. The sites qualify if they are locat-

ed in areas where at least half of the children are eligible to receive free or reduced-price

The federally funded program is administered by DHSS. The department is now accepting applications from new non-profit organizations to participate in the program. Organizations interested in serving nutritious meals to children through the summer are requested to apply. Training in the requirements for the program will be provided.

## Cats may help increase empathy, decrease anxiety for kids with autism


As a former school nurse in the Columbia Public Schools, Gretchen Carlisle would often interact with students with disabilities who took various medications or had seizures throughout the day. At some schools, the special education teacher would bring in dogs, guinea pigs and fish as a reward for good behavior, and Carlisle noticed what a calming presence the pets seemed to be for the students with disabilities.

Now a research scientist at the MU Research Center for Human-Animal Interaction (ReCHAI) in the MU College of Veterinary Medicine, Carlisle studies the benefits that companion animals can have for families. Although there is plenty of existing research emphasizing the benefits of dogs for children with autism, Carlisle's newest study has found cats may help increase empathy while decreasing separation anxiety for children with autism. The findings can have beneficial implications for families considering adopting a companion animal for their child.

"Previous research has shown parents of kids with autism are more stressed than parents of kids with any other disability," Carlisle said. "If a family is considering adopting a companion animal, we want to provide the best evidence-based information possible so they can make an informed decision, and cats might be more beneficial than dogs to some families."

In the study, families that had children with autism aged 6-14 were recruited through the MU Thompson Center for Autism and Neurodevelopmental Disorders and monitored after adopting a cat into their home. The cats were screened for temperament to ensure they were calm and a good match for the family. Not only did the families report an instant bond between their child with autism and their new cat, but the





bond remained strong over the course of time, and the child's anxiety decreased over time.

"We found the main benefit of these companion animals is their unconditional acceptance," Carlisle said. "Some children with autism may have sensory issues or be sensitive to loud noises, so a cat may be an appropriate, comforting pet for some families due to their calming presence."

Helping families make the best choice for their kids has motivated Carlisle's research with companion animals, and the study's findings highlight the benefits of human-animal interaction.

"As a former pediatric nurse, I have always strived to help children, and one thing I learned is that you need to involve the parents so they can make informed choices for their children," Carlisle said. "I see pets as a way to enhance wellness, and it feels gratifying to provide assistance to families that have a lot on their plate."

"Exploratory study of cat adoption in families of children with autism: Impact on children's social skills and anxiety" was recently published in the Journal of Pediatric Nursing. Funding for the study was provided by the Human Animal Bond Research Institute and the Winn Feline Foundation.

market must meet the United States Department of Agriculture definition, be located in Missouri and register as a member of the Missouri Grown program. Projects must be matched on at least a dollar-for-dollar basis to meet eligibility. Priority will be given to farmers' markets using funds to expand their marketing budget and those

not awarded funds in 2020.

Examples of qualifying expenses may include permanent signage, billboards, radio spots or print advertisement. Awardees must include the Missouri Grown logo on all reimbursement project pieces and submit receipts for dispersed funds, scripts of radio advertisements and copies of any artwork created.

Ineligible expenses include food, employee payroll, infrastructure, donations, equipment, clothing and reprinting of existing promotional material.

The maximum award amount for each farmers' market is \$1,000. Applications are due Feb. 16, 2021. To apply, visit the Farmers' Market Promotion Matching Grant Program webpage for a full list of program requirements, a grant timeline and printable application.

## USDA to invest millions to help control feral swine

Agriculture (USDA) is investing \$11.65 million in 14 projects to help agricultural producers and private landowners trap and control feral swine as part of the Feral Swine Eradication and Control Pilot Program. This investment expands the pilot program to 3 new projects in Missouri. Projects have also been funded in Alabama, Hawaii, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Texas.

This pilot program is a joint effort between USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). This second round of funding is for partners to carry out activities as part of the identified pilot projects in select states.

"Feral swine pose a threat to Missouri agriculture and natural resources leading to major habitat and financial loss," Scott Edwards, NRCS State Conservationist in Missouri. "The Missouri Department of Conservation will lead the projects, expanding on their existing efforts working with private landowners to eradicate feral swine."

Similar to the first round, NRCS will provide funding to partners who will provide financial assistance, education, outreach and trapping assistance to participating

The U.S. Department of landowners in pilot project areas. All partner work will be closely coordinated with the APHIS operations in the pilot project areas. Between the first and second round of funding, there will be a total of 34 active projects across 12 states for the life of the 2018 Farm Bill. Each project is unique, and additional information about the expectations for individual projects can be found at www.nrcs. usda.gov/FSCP.

> These new pilot projects and areas were selected in coordination with NRCS state conservationists, APHIS state directors and state technical committees to address feral swine issues and damage in areas with high densities. Pilot projects consist broadly of three coordinated components: 1) feral swine removal by APHIS; 2) restoration efforts supported by NRCS; and 3) assistance to producers for feral swine control provided through partnership agreements with non-federal partners. Projects are planned to conclude at the end of September 2023.


All USDA Service Centers



## STOPPING GOVERNMENT CORRUPTION IS A TEAM EFFORT

Two years ago, I launched a renewed effort to fight fraud and abuse in government by creating the Public Corruption and Fraud Division in my office. In every corner of the state, we've shown that exposing wrongdoing by public officials not only helps recover tax dollars for citizens, it puts others on notice that corruption will not be tolerated. As a CPA and certified fraud examiner, I remain committed to being your independent watchdog as we work to root out fraud and abuse.

Since 2015, audits by my office have led to 77 criminal charges against public officials. That work has been amplified by the Public Corruption and Fraud Division, which includes a team of dedicated attorneys, auditors and investigators. They have a demonstrated history of working with local, state and federal law enforcement to pursue justice for taxpayers.

The results are significant. An audit of the city of Center in northeast Missouri found the city clerk misappropriated more than \$300,000 in public funds and used them to pay credit card bills and other personal expenses. That's a lot of taxpayer dollars in a town of only 500 people. She now faces federal criminal charges of wire fraud and theft, and my office is working with prosecutors on the case.

In the Bootheel town of Parma, an audit found a pattern of blatant corruption and cover-ups that resulted in more than \$115,000 fraudulently taken from the city. Three former city officials now face criminal charges that include stealing and forgery.

And after our audit of Putnam County Memorial Hospital found \$90 million in illegal billings, the Public Corruption and Fraud Division worked with federal law enforcement agencies in Missouri, Florida and Washington, D.C. to share information and support a national investigation involving rural hospitals throughout the country.

The former CEO of the hospital has pleaded guilty to federal health care fraud charges, and others have been charged in a federal indictment to operate a multi-state \$1.4 billion billing scheme that used rural hospitals to submit fraudulent claims. The work by my office played a key role in bringing down this scheme.

From charter schools in Kansas City and St. Louis to fire districts in small Missouri towns, I'm proud of all this anti-corruption team has accomplished to expose wrongdoing. Our forensic auditing expertise has resulted in dozens of criminal charges being filed in the past two years. Government officials have been kicked out of office, received felony convictions, and made to repay the money stolen from taxpayers.

I never lose sight of the fact that our success in exposing public corruption depends to a large degree on the information we receive from citizens. Whistleblowers see wrongdoing and take action to do what is right.

As we mark the successes of the Public Corruption and Fraud Division, I'm asking for your help. The Whistleblower Hotline in the State Auditor's Office allows individuals to report suspected fraud and abuse, and you can reach us through phone calls, emails or our website.

In some cases, the information from whistleblowers results in audits that uncover wrongdoing and lead to filing of criminal charges and the convictions of public officials. In other situations, we work with public officials to make them aware of problems that can be resolved quickly or go directly to the proper authorities with allegations.

The bottom line is that I want to hear from you. If you have concerns about abuse and mismanagement in government, you can call 800-377-8597 or visit auditor. mo.gov/hotline. Under the law, whistleblowers have the option to remain anonymous.

I remain dedicated to our mission to expose fraud and protect taxpayer dollars. Involved citizens are important allies in this fight. Together, we can spotlight public corruption and help put a stop to it.
