Pleasant weather draws enthusiastic anglers

While total tag sales were down a bit from last year, Roaring River State Park proved its popularity by once again being the top seller of trout tags in Missouri's state parks.

"Mondays' turnouts are usually smaller than other days, since most people are beginning their work week," said Corporal Steve Jabben, of the Park Rangers.

Even so, a total of 1,956 tags that were sold, according

to park store data. Of those tags, 1,571 were for adults, and 385 were for children.

Montauk State Park was second based on number of tags sold, with 1,793; and Bennett Spring was third, with 1,709.

Roaring River Park Superintendent, Joel Topham, believes that COVID-19 has been driving residents to Missouri's state parks, not only for the opening day of catch-and-keep trout season, but throughout the past year.

"We're lucky to have state parks where admission is free," he said.

"Last year, we saw an increase in attendance on every level. We had a lot of people who were new to Roaring River, but also brand new to camping," he continued. "Since I believe COVID is here to stay, I think the uptick in outdoor activities will continue to grow. People are going to seek that mental health break that comes with being outdoors."

Topham said that by Friday, all 186 camp sites in the park had been reserved.

Roaring River Hatchery Manager, Paul Spurgeon, said hatchery employees stocked the river with 6,000 fish, a week prior to opening day. Of those, 100 were lunkers.

"We stock at 32 points along the river (above and below each dam)," Spurgeon said, "using a ratio of 2.25 times the anticipated number of tags we'll sell, to determine

the number of fish we'll put in the river for opening day," he added. "The anticipated tag sales are based on historical data, plus the weather forecast and current trends."

This year's opening shot was fired by Jewel Farwell,

the wife of Marvin Farwell, a retired Missouri Department of Conservation employee.

"Marvin Farwell was chosen to fire the opening shot,

Tier 3 Vaccination Plan Announced, J & J single-dose vaccine approved

Governor Mike Parson announced Thursday, February 25, that the activation of Phase 1B-Tier 3 of the state's COVID-19 vaccine plan will go into effect on Monday, March 15.

This announcement was followed by news from the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services on February 28 that a standing order was signed for the Janssen Biotech, Inc. CO-VID-19 vaccine, approved by the FDA on February 27. Janssen is a subsidiary of Johnson & Johnson.

"With vaccine supply steadily increasing, we believe we are in a good position to activate Phase 1B - Tier 3 of the COVID-19 Vaccine Plan," Governor Parson said. "This will make approximately 550,000 more Missourians eligible to receive a vaccine."

The Phase 1B-Tier 3 category includes infrastructure employees in the following categories:

- Education: Teachers, faculty, and staff in public, private, and nonprofit pre K 12.
- **Childcare**: Faculty and staff in a DHSS or DSS -licensed facility providing basic care to children
- Communications Sector: Employees at public, private, or nonprofit organizations that provide communications services
- **Dams Sector**: Employees at public, private, or nonprofit organizations that provide

services in the dams sector related to critical water retention and control services.

- Energy Sector: Employees at public, private, or nonprofit organizations that provide energy services, regardless of the energy source.
- Food/Agriculture Sector initial: Employees of certain food production and processing facilities, and related operations, prioritizing mass food production, distribution, transportation, wholesale and retail sales, including grocery and convenience stores where groceries are sold; includes veterinary services.
- Government: Elected of-

In municipal races in Barry County, the following names will appear on the ballot for the upcoming April 6 election.

Washburn:

alderman-at-large Two positions are open, with incumbent Jeremy Johnston refiling for one of them. Greg Varner will be vacating his seat after moving outside of the city; Thomas Galloway has filed to fill the vacancy.

Mayor John Tiedman refiled for his position, which is uncontested.

Wheaton:

Incumbents, East Ward alderman, Casey Prewitt; West Ward alderman, Jon Brattin; and Mayor David Shockley all refiled for their positions.

They will face no opposition. Exeter:

The Barry County Health Department will have three open positions on its Board of Trustees, with four candidates running for those posi-



The emergency room at Mercy Hospital Cassville has reopened Thursday to patients after a fire Monday temporarily closed the facil-

to treat patients having emergencies who came in by private car. Now, the facility can once again accept ambulance traffic as the ER is fully functional.

'We know how critical quick care is in an emergency," said Valerie Davis, administrator of Mercy Hospital Cassville. "We have been laser focused on reopening the ER since the fire on Monday. But we had to ensure the building would be safe for patients and co-workers."

Positive final inspections today of the medical gas system (for things like oxygen) and an air quality survey cleared the facility to reopen the ER. Other areas of the hospital, like the medical/ surgical unit where the fire happened, will likely remain closed for several months while repairs are made.

Hospital-based outpatient services, like cardiac rehab, therapy, radiology and lab, will resume tomorrow. Staff has alerted patients.

Mercy Clinic Family Medicine - Cassville is connected to the main hospital and has also been closed since Monday, February 22, but reopened to patients March 1.

The providers relocated temporarily last week to Mercy clinics in Shell Knob and Monett and saw their patients there.

The fire began about 6:30 a.m. on Feb. 22 in a rooftop HVAC unit. When smoke detectors sounded, Mercy co-workers immediately evacuated all six patients to waiting ambulances. Mercy

co-workers contacted patients' families, and all were taken to Mercy Hospital Aurora. No one was hurt.

"Once again, we'd like to thank our co-workers for their quick action, the firefighters who responded so quickly and everyone from law enforcement to our board members and off-duty coworkers who showed up immediately," Davis said. "This is truly a community hospital, and the care this community has given us inspired our efforts to quickly resume the care they deserve in return."

allow vaccinators across the state to continue vaccinating Missourians without delays due to those who are eligible but not seeking a vaccine. "While supply is still limited, we are expecting slow

and steady increases, and activating Tier 3 on March 15 will allow us to continue making progress as supply expands," Governor Parson said. "If vaccine supply continues to increase, and if we continue to make the progress we've been seeing, we believe that we will be ready to activate Phase 2 within 45 days of March 15."

"For now, we ask that vaccinators work in their communities to plan for March 15. We want this to be a smooth process, and it will be up to vaccinators to start planning now so that Tier 3 populations are ready," Gov-

ernor Parson continued. Governor Parson said, as of February 24, approximately 12 percent of Missouri's population has received at least one dose of the vaccine. Over 350,000 Missourians have been fully vaccinated with both doses.

Barry County Health Department administrator Roger Brock says the new Johnson & Johnson vaccine will be available in Barry County as soon as the initial order of 200 is received.

According to information released by the DHSS, the Johnson & Johnson (Janssen) vaccine is different from Pfizer and Moderna's mRNA vaccines, in that it is manufactured using a specific type of virus called adenovirus type 26 (Ad26). The vaccine uses Ad26 to deliver a piece of the DNA, or genetic material, that is used to make the distinctive "spike" protein of the SARS-CoV-2 virus. While adenoviruses are

a group of viruses that are relatively common, Ad26, which can cause cold symptoms and pink eye, has been modified for the vaccine so that it cannot replicate in the human body to cause illness. After a person receives this vaccine, the body can temporarily make the spike protein, which does not cause disease, but triggers the immune system to learn to react defensively, producing an immune response against SARS-CoV-2.

Asbill says legislation threatens rural schools,

A piece of legislation touted as part of an "education reform package" was passed by the Missouri House of Representatives last week. As far as Cassville R-IV Superintendent Richard Asbill is concerned, the description is a misnomer.

The legislation, known as HB 349 - or "Missouri Empowerment Scholarship Accounts Program" - is promoted by sponsors as a program that would allow Missouri students to attend a school of their choice with tuition paid

That's misleading, Asbill

The legislation, which might sound good at face value, in practice, would funnel federal education funds toward the payment of tuition for students in urban areas whose parents would like them to attend a private or parochial school.

Even if passed, according to talking points against the legislation written by Missouri school board association, MSBA and MASA, the funds may not cover the cost of a private school's tuition. Due to eligibility requirements of the bill, the maxium amount of voucher credits provided would be \$6,375 per student. The average private school tuition in Missouri is \$10,132 per student. That difference of \$3,757 would be difficult for many families to come up with, Asbill believes.

"The bill is intended to

help children in urban areas receive what they call a 'better education," Asbill said, "but it's more of a social experiment with federal funds.

"The people who would benefit from it would be those who least need it: families who are already sending their children to private schools," he said.

Because the bill is limited to use by children in cities with a population of 30,000 or greater, Asbill believes it will detract from the funding of rural schools - which includes all schools in Barry County - by funneling funds toward urban areas.

Asbill also says the bill, which is currently being discussed in the Missouri Senate, will allow private schools to accept federal taxpayer funds, without the accountability public schools are subject to.

Private schools can use whatever curriculum they choose and discriminate if they choose to, the MSBA

Asbill urges residents to educate themselves about this legislation, then contact Missouri District 29 Senator Mike Moon and urge him to vote "no" on it.

PSC opens investigation of cold weather event

The Missouri Public Service Commission has opened a case to investigate the February 2021 cold weather event and its impact on Missouri investor-owned utili-

"Much of the Midwest, including Missouri, experienced unseasonably cold temperatures in February 2021. Such temperatures resulted in rolling electrical blackouts and extreme natural gas price spikes in Missouri," said the Commission. "The Commission will order its Regulatory Analysis and Customer Experience Departments, with assistance as needed from other departments within its Industry Analysis and Financial and Business Analysis Divisions, to investigate Missouri's electrical and natural gas utilities' preparation for and response to Missouri's February 2021 extreme cold, and to report its findings to the Commission."

The report is to summarize analysis performed by the Regional Transmission Organizations (RTOs), market monitors, the Federal En-

ergy Regulatory Commission (FERC), the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), or any other relevant body.

"The report should also include information from the utilities as to their response measures, impacts on customers, and lessons learned going forward," said the Commission.

A report with initial findings is to be filed with the Commission no later than April 22, 2021.





Warmer temperatures mean spring is on the way and with it comes more opportunities to enjoy Missouri's lakes and rivers. To ensure everyone's safety, the Missouri State Highway Patrol stresses the importance of being aware and courteous while boating.

This includes both the dock and the power supply to the dock being inspected regularly by a qualified electrician.

Any boats operating in areas where dock damage has occurred are encouraged to operate at no wake idle speed. This prevents further damage and increases safety for those working on the

MSHP cautions dock owners, boaters After a long winter, it is important to make sure your boat is ready to launch! Check to see that you have all the necessary equipment, and thoroughly inspect your vessel for fuel and water leaks before you head out on the water. Going through your equipment checklist is a must, and life jackets should be at the top of the list! Life jackets must be worn or readily accessible to be compliant with state law. Wearing your life jacket is always the safer bet.

or near the water and an emergency occurs, call *55 on your cellular phone to reach the nearest troop headquarters. Marine enforcement troopers and emergency response services will respond. Be smart. Be safe. Stay healthy.




