Cassville's Annie Moore takes state gold, makes history



Annie Moore led the Lady Wildcats team to a fabled finish at the MSHSAA Girls State Wrestling Championships in Independence on Monday. Moore, a sophomore, won Cassville's first ever girls wrestling medal -

THE GOLD ONE - defeating Chloe Sheckells of Staley in the championship match of the 112 weight class.

Moore reached that bout via a first round bye - courtesy of her 33-1 record - and wins in both her quarterfinal and semifinal matches. In the quarters, Moore pinned Waynesville's Josie Moody in short order, then dumped Aiya Meyer of Carrollton in the semis.

There was a lot to celebrate besides Moore's medal. All four Lady Wildcats won at least one match at the state championships. The Lady-

In the 137 pound weight class, Faith James dispatched Benton's Tatum Levandahl to reach the quarterfinals. But Holt's Maria Slaughter downed James in that quarterfinal match. In the consolation bracket, James won a quarterfinal contest with Anmarie Dillon, of Eldon, before falling to Cassidy Head of St. Charles in the semis by decision.

In the 132 class, Hailey Roark dropped her opening round match to Madison Conrad of Seckman, Roark returned to defeat Madison Leverknight, of Winnetonka by decision in the consolation quarterfinals, before bowing out against Anna Stephens of Rock Bridge in the consolation semis.

Optimism prevailed Thursday, March 4, as area residents lined up on City Park Road in Cassville to receive their first dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine. The two-day, drive-through vaccination clinic was a cooperative community effort between the Barry County Health Department, Access Family Care, Roark Family Health, the Barry County Office of Emergency Management, Mercy EMS personnel and the City of Cassville.

Health department administrator Roger Brock said 1,170 doses of the Pfizer vaccine were scheduled to be administered during the

two-day event, which continued through Friday, March 5. Prior appointments were required in order to receive the vaccine. All time slots were soon filled.

According to Emergency Management director, David Compton, many recipients of the vaccine had previously made appointments for a March 9 vaccination event scheduled to take place in Monett, but when the Barry County Health Department organized the rather impromptu drive-through event in Cassville after receiving additional doses of vaccine from the state, those

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Cassville to welcome new superintendent

The Cassville R-IV School Board announced March 4 that Dr. Merlyn Johnson, of St. James, has been selected as the next superintendent for the Cassville district.

Dr. Johnson will officially begin in his new position on July 1, 2021, and will replace Dr. Richard Asbill, who accepted a position as superintendent of the Bolivar School District.

Dr. Johnson is currently serving as the superintendent for the St. James School District in St. James, Missouri. He has been in education 23 years.

As part of the selection

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Parents as Teachers program helps parents help children

Barry County school districts currently have openings for families interested in participating in the national Parents as Teachers program.

Parents as Teachers (PAT) began in Missouri in 1981 as a pilot program for the firsttime mothers of newborns.

It's since expanded into all 50 states and benefits families with children from birth through age five.

Because research shows that parental involvement is critical to the development of a child's learning skills - including reading and writing - the program is designed to enhance that link.

Available in most Barry County school districts, Parents as Teachers (PAT) provides parents with ageappropriate curricula, as well as information about the developmental milestones they can reasonably expect from their children at certain ages. Assessment screenings are offered, and parents are given suggestions for activities they can engage in with their child to help spark his or her critical thinking skills.

Weaver said the school receives regular inquiries from parents about their child's development.

"Those parents are who this program is for," she said. "We offer information, support and encouragement."

"The focus of the program is to help parents help their children," Eunice Thomas Elementary principal, Catherine Weaver, said. "Plus, it's a great networking opportunity for parents.

"We try to provide group

activities for families on a regular basis so that parents can connect with other parents with children of the same age," she added.

According to Weaver, PAT training can begin before birth, with prenatal suggestions for mothers - often first-time mothers - who are sometimes a little nervous.

"As an example, one thing PAT can offer new mothers is an idea for a daily routine for little ones, for whom consistency is so important," Weaver said.

While home visits can be arranged, alternatives are also available, Weaver says.

"In Cassville, we have a separate facility - a little brown house behind the Intermediate School - set aside for Cassville Parents as Teachers appointments," Weaver said.

While school districts receive some state funding for the PAT program, Weaver said it doesn't begin to cover the cost of the program, which is about half to threequarters locally funded.

The Cassville school district currently has two Parents as Teachers educators - Christel Roller and Angela Burns - who serve 55 fami-

Roller says guidelines for age-specific milestones are quite general. She cites walking as an example.


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
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Senators discuss barring discrimination against parents for medical marijuana use

A bill that would prohibit family courts from discriminating against a parent or custodian for using medical marijuana was discussed by the Committee for Seniors, Families, Veterans & Military Affairs Wednesday morning.

Sponsored by Sen. Barbara Anne Washington, D-Kansas City, Senate Bill 357 "is asking that we not punish or prejudice those persons who actually have a medical marijuana card, got it and are using only medical marijuana..." to help alleviate problems "like a chronic disease, chronic illnesses (or) chronic pain," Washington said.

Washington continued, "(parents) are not punished for (taking) other meds. We don't punish them for smoking cigarettes. We don't punish them if they drink, unless it's excessive of course. So if they are legally doing medical marijuana, then we want to make sure that those parents are not prejudiced and prevented from reunifying

with their child." The committee's chair, Sen. Bill White, R-Joplin, pointed out that family court can deal with issues of addic-

"If you do have an alcohol issue, the court can say 'don't drink it," White said. "Now I know that's a little different than a medical marijuana card, but a medical marijuana card is not the same as a (prescription) written under our federal system of how we write for narcotics and other such things."

Washington clarified that "our family court system identifies when those people

do have a problem, and they are placed in treatment programs. Whether they are alcohol related, addicted to drugs, whether they're legal or prescribed drugs."

"We're just asking that the medical marijuana card be given some consideration as well and that not be the total bar (for custody and visitation removal)," Washington emphasized.

Five witnesses rushed through their testimony by the committee due to a scheduling issue, all of whom were in favor of the bill.

interventional cardiologist from Joplin and a medical marijuana patient.

Paul Callicoat is a retired

"I find it unbelievable that in court, someone could hold that against me. It's a constitutional right to use medical marijuana," Callicoat said.

He added, "Marijuana is not the boogeyman."

Cynthia Northcutt, a family law attorney and registered nurse, agreed.

"Cannabis is medicine. It was not always the devil's lettuce, until 1937 cannabis was listed in the U.S. pharmacopoeia and was routinely used as over the counter and prescription medication both in the United States and worldwide," she said. "There is significant, high quality, peer reviewed evidence that cannabis is effective in treating and/or managing many health conditions ... Missouri voters approved a process for people who wish to become a qualifying patient and use medical cannabis is not easy to be a patient, you must

meet the criteria set forth in Article 14 (of the constitution.)"

The executive director of NORML Kansas City, Jamie Kacz, spoke about her experience as a parent and medical marijuana patient.

"I have been in family court, and I've had my status of just being a cannabis activist used against me by an abusive ex-spouse," Kacz said. "I had to carry the stigma with me through court proceedings, and I had to participate in drug testing, just for exercising my First Amendment rights to reform cannabis laws in Missouri, to help other Missourians gain access to medicine that they needed. I have never had legal issues or committed any

same residents opted to take the earlier vaccine in Cassville instead of waiting for

Monett's clinic. "It left us short on people registered for the March 9 Monett event," Compton said. "We had 1,000 Pfizer vaccines available, with only about 100 registrants by Saturday, March 6. We sent out an immediate press release to let people know we had plenty of vaccine available, and the numbers came up." as well.

Compton stated Wednesday morning that 256 people were vaccinated at the drivethrough clinic in Monett on Tuesday.

"People came from as far as Branson, Springfield and even St. Louis to receive a vaccination," Compton said.

According to Compton, another clinic is planned at the Monett City Park Casino today (Wednesday), where they plan to administer an additional 900 vaccinations.

On March 15, a third tier of the population will be eligible to take the vaccination, a tier which will include various sectors of the work force, including educators and food production personnel, among many others. Compton said plans are in the works for another mass vaccination clinic for that group

On the sunny, mild Thursday at Cassville's drivethrough clinic last week, Dr. Lisa Roark, of Roark Family Health, deftly inoculated the drivers in a steady stream of vehicles working their way through her line.

"With spring in the air and COVID vaccines more readily available, I suddenly feel like there's hope for tomorrow," she said.

It was a sentiment common among everyone who participated in the clinic, prevalent most of all in those who bared their shoulders for the needle.

While Dr. Roark provided hope to the drivers in one lane, RN Carol Landstad, of the Barry County Health Department, vaccinated passengers on the opposite side of vehicles.

In a second drive-through lane, Access Family Care employees, Marsha Davidson and medical assistant Terry Purdom vaccinated another set of drivers and passengers.

The carefully-orchestrated event included traffic directors, registrars, vaccinedrawers, providers, and emergency personnel who kept their eye on vaccine recipients for proscribed amounts of time in case there

were adverse reactions.

There were not any, David Compton said.

Per a March 3 situational update for Barry County, 9.5 percent of the population had been vaccinated.

Roy Blunt will not seek another term


U.S. Missouri Senator, Roy Blunt, announced March 8 that he will not seek reelection to his senate seat in

Phase 1B-Tier 3 opens March 15, Cassville vaccination clinic planned

The Barry County Health Department is happy to announce that there will be a drive-through vaccination clinic in Cassville on March 15, for those in Phase 1B-Tier

As of March 15, Missouri Residents who are included in Phase 1B - Tier 3 are eligible for vaccination.

Tier 3 includes K-12 edu-

cators, childcare staff, food production and processing employees, as well as persons included in the certain critical infrastructure sectors. Persons over 65 years of age, first responders, and those with certain health conditions remain eligible for vaccination.

Vaccinations are scheduled by appointment only.

Interested persons should call the Barry County Health Department at 417-847-2114 to register for vaccination.

The drive-through clinic will again be held on City Park Road next to the ball fields in Cassville.

The Pfizer vaccine will be administered.

"Our PAT guidelines say that a child should be comfortably walking on their own anywhere from 14 to 24 months. So, if you're child isn't walking without assistance by 15 months, there's no cause for alarm. They may be completely mobile by 16 months. However, if they're not walking on their own by age 24 months, then a parent might want to consider consulting with a doctor to see if there are physical reasons why a child is not walking."

Questions like these are fielded by Roller and Burns on a regular basis.

"Screenings can be conducted at different ages, too," Roller said, "to determine how children are developing both mentally and physically. Based on the results, we offer teaching suggestion so parents can focus on areas of weakness."

Cassville Parents as Teachers currently has openings

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for more families who are interested in becoming a part of the program. In the PAT program, visits are scheduled as infrequently as once a month, or as often as twice a week, depending upon the needs or desires of the children and parents.

PSC Empire hearing scheduled

The Missouri Public Service Commission has established the hearing schedule in a case filed by The Empire District Electric Company (Empire). Formal evidentiary hearings are scheduled for June 22-23, 2021.

Empire seeks Commission approval of a portfolio of transportation electrification pilot programs. Empire states the proposed portfolio of pilot programs is designed to accelerate electric technology adoption and provide utility customer, grid and societal benefits. Empire proposes an initial pilot term of five years.

Formal evidentiary hearings will be held by video and teleconference via WebEx. Participants are to appear at the hearing telephonically via WebEx video and telephone conference. The hearing will also be live-streamed via the Commission's website at www. psc.mo.gov . Legal medical marijuana patients should not live in fear of losing their children. No patient deserves to have their family torn apart, due to their status as a legal marijuana patient," she said.

According to NHTSA, 10,142 people were killed in drunk-driving crashes in 2019. On average, more than 10,000 people were killed each year from 2015 to 2019 one person was killed in a drunk-driving crash every

52 minutes in 2019. This is why the Cassville Police Department is working with NHTSA to remind drivers that drunk driving is not only illegal, it is a matter of life and death. As you head out to the festivities, help us spread the word: Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving.

During the 2019 St. Patrick's Day weekend alone (6 p.m. March 16 to 5:59 a.m. March 18), more than three out of five (63%) crash fatalities involved a drunk driver. In fact, from 2015 14937-011521-v5 to 2019, a total of 280 lives were lost in drunkdriving crashes during the St. Patrick's Day period. Drivers should also keep an eye out for pedestrians who have had too much to drink. Walking while intoxicated can also be deadly, as lack of attention to their surroundings could put pedestrians at risk of getting hit by a vehicle.

"Drunk drivers are a continuing problem on our nation's roads, especially around days like St. Patrick's Day," said Chief Kammerlohr. "People need to know that they can go out for a night of fun and return home safely by ensuring they have a sober driver take them home. Don't be the reason someone —including yourself doesn't get home. Don't let St. Patrick's Day become an anniversary of a tragic night."

If you're the designated driver, make sure you keep that promise of safety to yourself and your passengers. It can be a long night, but people are counting on you, not to mention the other drivers, passengers, and pedestrians on the streets. Take the role of designated driver seriously - people are relying on you.

Party with a Plan

Before ever heading out, it's vital to plan ahead. Be honest with yourself: You know whether you'll be drinking or not. Follow these ideas to ensure you and your fellow partygoers stay safe.

- Remember that it is never okay to drink and drive. Even if you've had only one alcoholic beverage, designate a sober driver or plan to use public transportation or a ride service to get home
- If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact Barry County Emergency Services (911) or 417-847-3121.
- Do you have a friend who has been drinking and is about to drive? Take the keys away and make arrangements to get your friend home safely.

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



Since taking office in 2019, the Treasurer has prioritized enrolling more individuals in the program. He has travelled to all corners

of the state visiting agencies, sheltered workshops, and groups who work in the disability community to host informative presentations for their membership. Through these efforts to spread the word, MO ABLE has more than doubled in size.

not completely. Starting out I wanted to be a veterinarian but as I learned more about it and realized some of my other options, my decision has switched to staying closer to home and being a vet tech or maybe even an ag teacher.

The following items will be accepted at the curb: barbecue grills; patio furniture; outdoor furniture; sofas; dressers; loveseats; recliners; desks; televisions; bundled guttering; beds, including hide-a-beds, mattresses and box springs.

Wood pallets; materials must be cut into four-foot sections and stacked; sinks; toilets; cabinets; vanities; carpet that is cut into four-foot lengths and bundled; and bicycles.

Republic Services will not accept tires, yard waste, large quantities of ash, dead animals, raw sewage, waste oil, hazardous materials, wet paint containers, chemicals, flammable substances, lead or acid batteries or waste from large remodeling or construction projects.

One option will be to have Cassville residents set at their curb side large appliances for Republic Services to collect. There is a \$15 fee. Residents must pay the fee to Republic Services in order to schedule the pick-up of the appliance. The following large appliances will be accepted after the \$15 fee has been paid: dishwashers; washing machines; dryers; hot water heaters; and stoves.

Republic Services will also accept refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners that display a tag from a licensed technician proving that all freon has been removed from the item. To request and pay for pick-up of an appliance please contact Republic Services at 417-268-1261

Yard waste will be accepted as normal at the Yard Waste facility behind the Cassville Aquatic Park.

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Construction, detours begin at Pea Ridge Park

Pea Ridge National Military Park Superintendent, Kevin Eads, announced today that Highway 62 Mitigation construction has begun at the park. The first phase of this project consists of prepping areas for, then constructing, parking lots and

re-routing portions of the tour road near the Elkhorn Tavern and work on the park's entrance road.

Because of the on-going work near the Elkhorn Tavern, and for your safety, the North Loop of the horse trail will be closed until further notice. However, the short loop of the horse trail will remain open during this time frame. The area around the Elkhorn Tavern and monuments as well as the area north of the tavern remain off limits to horses.

Soon work will begin on

the park's entrance road causing the entrance to the park to be re-routed for a time. The detour, which will be marked with signs, will route visitors to Old Liberty Road, which is located approximately 1 mile northeast of the current park entrance. Visitors will turn left, southeast, off Old Liberty Road onto the old highway 62 roadbed. The park entrance

will be approximately ¾ of a mile from the intersection of Old Liberty Road and the old highway 62 roadbed.

Paddlefish season begins March 15 Imagine catching a giant, prehistoric fish whose ancestors swam during the time of

dinosaurs. That is a reality for thousands of paddlefish snaggers during Missouri's annual spring paddlefish snagging season. Paddlefish -- named for their large, paddle-shaped snouts -- are an ancient species that can

grow to seven feet and weight

more than 100 pounds.

According to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), the state's major paddlefish snagging waters include Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, and Table Rock Lake. The paddlefish snagging season for these

and most other waters in the state runs March 15 through April 30. The season for the Mississippi River is March 15 through May 15 with a fall season of Sept. 15 through Dec. 15.

Unless exempt, anglers must have a current fishing permit to snag or to operate a boat for snaggers. Buy Missouri fishing permits from one of many vendors around the state, online at mdc.mo.gov/buypermits, or through MDC's free MO Fishing app, available for download through Google Play for Android devices or the App Store for Apple devices. Save time by buying

fishing permits for multiple people in a single transaction. Select the "Additional Customer" option during the permit purchase.

The daily limit is two paddlefish and snaggers must stop snagging for any species after obtaining the daily limit on Lake of the Ozarks and Truman Lake and their tributaries, and the Osage River below the U.S. Highway 54 bridge. Once a legal-sized paddlefish is caught, it must be kept by the snagger and included in their daily limit.

The minimum legal length for paddlefish at Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, Table Rock Lake, and their tributaries is 34 inches, measured from the eye to the fork of the tail. The minimum legal length is 24 inches on the Osage River below Bagnell Dam and in other Missouri waters. All paddlefish under the legal minimum length must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after being caught.

MDC reminds snaggers that it is very important to immediately release sublegal fish for future harvests and offers these tips:

- Use landing nets, not gaffs, which can kill young fish.
- Wet hands before handling fish and avoid excessive han-
- Never put fingers in the gills
- · Remove hooks carefully and get undersized fish back into the water as quickly as

The Wildlife Code of Missouri requires the head, tail, and skin to remain attached to all paddlefish while on the water, so paddlefish should not be cleaned until off the water. Also, extracted paddlefish eggs may not be possessed while on waters of the state or adjacent banks and may not be transported. Paddlefish eggs may not be bought, sold or offered for sale. Additionally, paddlefish or their parts, including eggs, may not be used for bait.



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
