Record set, history made in Roaring River Cave

While some 50-plus-yearold men are starting to make plans for retirement, Mike Young, owner of KISS Rebreathers in Fort Smith, Ar-

kansas, is slipping into layers of warm clothing, a dry-suit, and closed-circuit underwater rebreathing equipment and diving into places where no man nor woman has gone

before.

He and his team of equally-intrepid, experienced divers did it again over the weekend. Reaching a depth of 239 feet below the surface

water, they dove deeper into Roaring River Cave than any person has been. Their purpose, however, was not solely

Three employers cited at **Bentonview Park Health & Rehab**



OSHA inspectors allege that three employers at Bentonview Park Health & Rehab in Monett exposed employees and residents to asbestos during a floor renovation project at the facility which began in December 2020.

Three employers at a Missouri residential nursing facility exposed workers and residents to asbestos hazards and failed to ensure safe removal of the known carcinogen during a flooring re-

placement project, a federal workplace safety inspection alleges.

In January 2021, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration initiated an inspection at the Bentonview Park Health & Rehabilitation in Monett based on a referral from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources.

Cassville Police Department reports arrests, structure fire

Cassville June 29, 2021:

Officers from the Cassville Police Department executed a pair of search warrants within the city limits of Cassville. The first was served at 1004 Harold Street, where officers located several stolen items inside of the residence as well as narcotics and paraphernalia. The stolen items were identified as being from a recent burglary at a business in Cassville. One female was taken into custody for the items as well as for an outstanding warrant. The stolen property, which included two laptop computers, was returned to the owners the following day. A male and female have been charged with felony stealing and burglary in connection with the incident.

Officers and deputies from the Barry County Sheriff's Office then executed a second search warrant at 205 W. 9th Street. Inside of the residence, officers located numerous drug paraphernalia items as well as illegal narcotics. One male and one female were taken into custody and placed on investigative hold. Another female who had left the residence as officers arrived was taken into custody on an outstanding warrant. Additional narcotics and paraphernalia were located in her belongings. Charges on all subjects are pending. Cassville, July 14, 2021:

On July 14, officers from the Cassville Police Department responded to a structure fire at 1008 Harold Street. Extensive damage

was suffered to the residence, both from fire and smoke. Officers quickly determined that the fire could have been intentionally set and identified their suspect. A short time later, officers made contact with and arrested Mitchell Davidson, 36, of Cassville. He was booked into the Barry County Jail on charges of harassment and ex parte violation. The following day, Davidson was interviewed at the Cassville Police Department and admitted to starting the fire. A charge of Arson 2nd degree was added, and he remains in custody with a \$75,000 bond. The incident was also investigated by the Missouri State Fire Marshal's Office.







Drury announces COVID-19 vaccination incentives

Drury University is incentivizing students attending its residential day school to get vaccinated to help fight the spread of COVID-19.

"Our students showed incredible leadership and community spirit last year in doing everything possible to keep one another safe as we held in-person classes," says Drury President Dr. Tim Cloyd. "We were encouraged to see nearly a third of students get vaccinated in just a few weeks' time once they became eligible this spring. Still, we want to do everything we can to encourage vaccination and that's why we've put together these incentives for students who take this important step to protect themselves and others."

Drury's incentives include:

- Three \$1,000 tuition discounts for either the fall or spring semester
- Two "park anywhere" parking permits
- One night in the president's suite at a home basketball game
- Laptop or iPad
- Apple pencil
- Three \$100 bookstore vouchers and three \$50 bookstore vouchers
- One \$200 Panther Bucks voucher (for campus food service); one \$100 Panther Bucks voucher; and two \$50 Panther Bucks vouchers
- Assorted restaurant gift cards

Drury is also offering two rewards for the entire student

body if certain vaccination goals are reached:

• When 55 percent of the student body is vaccinated, the university will hold a campus

If 70 percent of students are vaccinated, the university will add one extra day to fall break, currently scheduled as a four-day weekend on Thursday, Oct. 21-Sunday, Oct. 24. The additional day of break would be Wednesday, Oct. 20.

All students who submit proof of vaccination to the Dean of Students office will be entered into a drawing to win one of these prizes. To submit proof of vaccination, students can email an image of their vaccine card to DOS@drury.edu or stop by the Dean of Students office to show it in person.

To help make vaccination easy, Drury will host a vaccine clinic on campus the day before classes begin on Monday, Aug. 23. The university held a clinic in June during a summer orientation day for new students.

Drury is also incentivizing employee vaccinations through health care premium reimbursements and cash incentives for those who are not on the university health care plan.



ESSER III budget planning was discussed. ESSER III provides funding to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) through Section 2001 of the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER III) Fund, to address the impact of COVID-19 on elementary and secondary schools. The District will organize public input and consult with stakeholders during the ESSER III budget development process. The ESSER III budget application is due to DESE on August 23, 2021.

The Cassville Board of Ed-

ucation plans to implement a new Performing Arts Center in the coming years. Draft contracts with Paragon and RE Smith are presently being reviewed. All preliminary plans are focused on ensuring that decisions that could impact cost or schedule are proactively addressed during the design phase rather than reactively during construction. 

With the new technology offered by Young's compact Sidewinder Rebreather with sidemounted air tanks which fit snugly below his arms, he was able to slip through the fissure which before had been considered impenetra-

"There's a navigable tunnel on the other side that runs laterally," Young reported, after he resurfaced. "Due to time and air limitations, I couldn't explore any further on this dive, but I hope to later."

Young said he had been closely monitoring the water flow at Roaring River prior to the team makings its third scheduled trip to the park on

"The first part of the week, cubic-feet-per-second (CFS) water flow was in the mid-30s, about the lowest it's been all summer," he said. "After rainfall Thursday night, it was up to the 50 CFS mark before our first dive Friday.

(The water flow can be easily determined by checking the United States Geological Survey (USGS) site at https://waterdata.usgs.gov/ nwis/uv?07050152.)

The KISS team made an initial dive into the spring Friday afternoon to check out subsurface water conditions and put safety lines and air tanks in place. Tim Bass, a videographer with NWA Adventure Dive, was also on hand to begin filming the KISS team's explorations.

"The water was the clearest we've ever seen it Friday," Mike Young said, as he geared up for what he hoped would be his record-breaking dive Saturday morning.

With the water-flow down and the visibility good, Young's confidence that he could make it through the stricture was well-founded.

Some two hours later, Young, along with teammate, Joe Heinrichs, returned to the surface of the spring and reported "mission accomplished."

Satisfied with the day's 239-foot dive and the breaching of a stricture once thought to be impenetrable, the KISS team was content to wait until the following day to begin mapping efforts of the newfound underwater

According to diver Greg Ables, the mapping dive planned for Sunday would be a bit riskier since it would call for time-consuming underwater technical work by cartographer Jon Lillestolen.

As it turned out, Sunday's mapping plans were put on hiatus after heavy rains Saturday night took the water flow up to over 120 on Sunday morning.

"The water flow was just too high to get any more work done this trip," Young said, "so we brought all of our air tanks and safety lines back up, and we'll try again in August."

In a light moment for on-

lookers, a two-year-old child was startled to the point of screams when the first of five divers resurfaced beside her feet as she stood with her parents at the guard rail of the spring.

Before doffing their diving gear, Jon Lillestolen and Mike Young surprised hatchery visitors by slipping into the spring-fed pond for a leisurely swim in search of the remains of the old undershot mill wheel reputed to lie below the surface.

Last weekend's dive was participated in by Mike Young, Joe Heinrichs, Jon Lillestolen, Greg Ables, Neal Brownlow, Charles Walker and the sole female diver, Gayle Orner.

Orner was pleased that the record-setting dive was accomplished on July 17, a date recognized as "Women's Dive Day" by the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI).

Mike Young, however, was a little disappointed that mapping efforts had to be postponed.

"In the caving world," he said, "broken records and new discoveries aren't real until divers can bring back survey data.

"We'll get it next time,

though," he added.

The KISS divers have a fourth trip to Roaring River State Park planned August 27


In the meantime, Young has three other diving expeditions planned: one to an area 40 miles off the coast of North Carolina, another to a cave system in the Bahamas, and a third to explore shipwrecks in the Great Lakes, where, he said, the cold water has reputedly preserved the lumber on a ship that sank in




Above, Jon Lillestolen prepares to explore the mill pond after his Saturday morning dive into Roaring River Spring.

Balance needed for student COVID-19 precautions

As Barry County schools wade cautiously to normalcy, a great amount of additional strain continues to be placed on their faculties to balance what implemented protocol earns their vital state funding, and what follows the true return to normalcy that many parents, students, and staff crave. Although guidelines are relaxing, school staff are now required to maintain a heightened vigilance in regards to safety and health. Masks and vaccines are strongly recommended by the CDC, though not a required condition for school attendance, due to the CDC considering it a decision properly made by individual states, counties, and schools.

Currently, no direction is given by the CDC on how to differentiate vaccinated and unvaccinated students and staff. So, in Cassville, for instance, the Board of Education has elected to invite students to undergo the separate guidelines for unvaccinated and vaccinated individuals based on an honor system of alerting staff to the status of their vaccination.

March saw the reduction of CDC-recommended deskdistancing in schools; from 6 feet apart to 3, as well as dismissing a recommendation for the use of plastic shields between desks. The CDC maintained, however, that distancing of this kind among vaccinated students or staff is not required. The CDC states that ventilation and handsanitization remain crucial to minimizing exposure, and to always stay home when feeling symptomatic or unwell. Frequent COVID-19 tests for unvaccinated individuals are recommended as well.

Each school in Barry County has different, and evolving, pandemic responses. School staff are working tirelessly to provide up-todate mitigation strategies to maximize health, comfort, and safety. To stay aware of your district's specific protocol, your district's school's official website will list their mandates, options for safety, and specified conditions to your district and area.

In newspapers published one hundred years ago, or maybe even as recently as 50 years ago, families listed the cause of death of their loved ones in obituaries. Some of them were a bit graphic, mind you, with perhaps more details included than were absolutely necessary. However, in some cases, perhaps the details served as a warning to others: to be careful when felling trees and crossing flooded rivers, for example.

Nowadays, causes of death are, for the most part, left unmentioned. Unless one knew the person and his or her family personally, it's unlikely we'll ever know how they died. Most of the time, just to know that a person has passed from this life is enough information.

But these times are exceptional. And with the exception, comes the need for more information. It's important for the local community to know when a loved one dies from the complications of COVID-19. Not to arouse undue fear, but to serve as an alert that our community has a real problem with the virus, and that, as a community, we need to be taking simple measures to prevent other families from experiencing the losses that have taken our

loved ones. There's nothing shameful about the virus, other than the political maneuvering that has made its prevention tactics anathema. Our martyrdom is often misplaced, I've found.

COVID-19 has taken many of the best of us, even right here in Barry County. According to health officials in southwest Missouri, those numbers are likely to keep

Yes, death is inevitable, but it doesn't necessarily have to come via a preventable virus. Our silence in the face of its spread doesn't make it go away. In fact, the opposite is highly likely.

BENTONVIEW from FRONT

On Jan. 22, the state agency evacuated the facility's residents - 31 days after flooring work began on Dec. 21, 2020.

OSHA alleges Eastern Coast Management Inc., SRZ Mgmt Holdings LLC and SRZ OP Bentonview LLC failed to test for the presence of asbestos, did not erect protective barriers to contain residue and failed to use respiratory and personal protective equipment to prevent exposure. Bulk samples of tile backing and mastic collected at three locations in the facility indicated that between 45 percent and 51 percent of the samples contained chrysotile asbestos.

OSHA inspectors allege that workers for the three employers removed about 10,000 square feet of floor tiles containing asbestos, and that none of the employers completed an asbestos assessment to determine its presence.

"Asbestos is a known hucarcinogen released into the air when asbestoscontaining materials are removed. Exposure to its fibers can cause irreversible lung damage, which is often undetected for years," said OSHA Area Director Karena Lorek in Kansas City, Missouri. "Employers must test building materials before removal and ensure all measures are taken to prevent exposure."

"On multi-employer projects such as this, each employer must ensure workers are safe from potential hazards. When they fail to do so, the U.S. Department of Labor will hold them accountable under the law," Lorek cited the three companies for not implementing a respiratory protection program, exposing workers to asbestos hazards and failing to inform employees of the potential presence of asbestos. Additional violations and penalties proposed against each company include:

Eastern Coast Management Inc., the project's lead contractor, faces proposed penalties of \$105,127 for 11 Holdings LLC, the facility's owner, hired the Woodmere, New York, company to re-

After its inspection, OSHA

serious violations. SRZ Op move and replace the floor-

SRZ Mgmt Holdings LLC of Jefferson City faces pro-

posed penalties of \$95,570 for 10 serious violations. Investigators determined the company's regional director of operations removed flooring and used removal equipment and scrapers to keep the project moving in the lead contractor's absence. The company assigns managers to the Bentonville facility.

SRZ OP Bentonview LLC, which operates as Bentonview Park Health and Rehabilitation, faces \$38,228 in proposed penalties for four serious violations. As the facility's manager, the company had responsibility for protecting its employees and other workers in the rehabilitation facility from potential respiratory hazards.



All three companies have 15 business days from receipt of its citations and penalties to comply, request an informal conference with OSHA's area director, or contest the findings before the independent Occupational Safety and Health Review Commis-



ROY B. SHAVER

Roy Baker Shaver, former school administrator in Barry County, passed away July 14, 2021.

Shaver enjoyed a fortyyear career in education, retiring as superintendent of schools in Neosho in 1996. In 1956, he began his career in Washburn with the Southwest School District, serving one year as a social studies teacher and four years as high school principal. While there he also served as a scoutmaster.





day. During the fiscal year that ended June 30, the Treasurer's Office received 123 Sunshine requests. The average initial response time was 0.76 business days, a decrease from the previous year.

During FY2020, the Treasurer's Office received 119 Sunshine Requests. The average initial response time was 0.94 business days, a rate of less than one day. During FY19, the Office received 99 Sunshine Requests and had an initial response time of 1.6 business days.

"Despite remote working and the ongoing challenges presented by the pandemic, my Office reduced our already low response time. We are now responding to Sunshine Requests, on average, within hours of receiving them," Treasurer Fitzpatrick said. "This timely response should let Missourians know how much my staff and I understand and value the Sunshine laws in our state and that we take our responsibility under those laws very seriously. This is what I want from government-transparency and quick response and I am proud to meet these expectations."
