Fitzpatrick announces bid for state auditor

Missouri State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick announced July 29 that he is throwing his hat in the ring as a candidate for Missouri Štate Auditor.


Fitzpatrick and his wife Mallory are the parents of three young sons: Luke, Carson, and Noah. Becoming a father, Fitzpatrick said, has deepened his passion for the rights of the unborn and children with disabilities.

Fitzpatrick will highlight his campaign, he says, with his track record as a job creator, conservative watchdog, and a next-generation leader.

"Missouri needs an auditor who will be a conservative watchdog for taxpayers," Scott Fitzpatrick said. "The auditor's office should be a tool for change, not a weapon to be used against your oppo-

"I believe how you handle yourself in office is important," Fitzpatrick said, "and there's a place for bipartisanship at times. When I chaired the House Budget Committee, I tried to make sure everyone was treated equally, to hear everybody's side and to ask Democratic legislators what was important to them."

Fitzpatrick, a Shell Knob native and graduate of Cassville High School and the University of Missouri, understands the impact our growing government has on working families and businesses. As a teenager, he started his own company, MariCorp U.S., a Shell Knobbased marine manufacturing company that he grew from his dorm room at Mizzou. With lots of hard work and the help of great team


members, it's now an industry leader that does business coast-to-coast, he says.

"I learned from growing my own business how frustrating it is to deal with much of the unnecessary red tape

and burdensome regulations involved with bureaucracy," he said. "It's what prompted me to get involved in politics

Since October 2020, Chass "Coach" Williams has operated Field of Faith, a 12-month residential program to provide testimony-based help with gaining sobriety for adult men. The men share a house just north of George's, which formerly operated under other names and other people.

Williams helps residents find professional help if they need it, and endeavors to surround them with the love and support they need to heal. Williams has contacts at the Clark Center and other mental health establishments, which places him in a posi-

Fitzpatrick was first elected State Representative in 2012, at the age of 25, to represent Barry and portions of Stone and Lawrence Counties. Serving as Chairman of the House Budget Committee in 2017 and 2018, he was responsible for the drafting and passage of Missouri's \$28 billion annual operating budget. Scott Fitzpatrick was appointed by Governor Mike Parson and sworn in as Missouri's 47th Treasurer on January 14, 2019. He was elected to a full term on November 3, 2020.

As State Auditor, Fitzpatrick pledges to continue the conservative fiscal measures he began in the Treasurer's office.

"Liberals have been in charge of the Auditor's office for basically two decades. It's time for a conservative watchdog with a proven record of protecting Missouri taxpayers," Fitzpatrick said. "Missouri families need leaders who have a record of delivering results for taxpayers, and who will hold bureaucrats accountable for how

they spend your hard-earned tax dollars."

"This is especially important," he said, "when local governments receive billions

in federal stimulus money from the Biden administration, yet continue advocating extreme liberal policies, like defunding the police.

"As a business owner, I learned that watching how every dollar is spent is critically important to long term success," Fitzpatrick said. "As Auditor, I will watch over your money as if it were my own. In an era of unprecedented stimulus spending at all levels of government, this job has never been more important to the public. Liberal politicians have used the pandemic as cover to justify spending trillions of dollars of borrowed money to fund their socialist agenda - and we must fight back to stop it. I've had the opportunity to live the American dream. I feel a duty to do all I can to

help preserve that same opportunity for our kids and grandkids."

Fitzpatrick does believe there is a place for social programs, but also believes they should be used only as temporary stair-steps to a better economic position, not as long-term safety nets to disincentivize gainful employment.

"There are plenty of jobs available for people who want to work," he said. "As a business owner, I know that firsthand."

He then spoke of what truly sparked his decision to change his life. While in a bar, Williams heard Misery and Gin by Merle Haggard

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In a nearly cinematic moment, Haggard sang, "Looking at the world through the bottom of a glass, all I see is a man who's fading fast."

That lyric struck him, and Williams was ready to change. He's now been sober for eight years.

Williams is a singer/songwriter himself. He first began to play guitar and write in college as a hobby. Soon, however, it became a way to help himself and others.

"I thought music was a good way to share my testimony," Williams said. "I'm always looking to share about what God has done in my life."

Williams plays at Celebrate Recovery at the First Baptist Church in Cassville on Tues-

MoDOT plans road work in seven counties

State routes in seven southwest Missouri counties are scheduled to be sealed with a mixture of rock and oil beginning the week of August 9, the Missouri Department of Transportation said. Here's a look at the locations:

- Newton/Barry County Route A from Newton County Route D near Stella east to Missouri Route 86 in Wheaton (8.7 miles)
- Newton County Route HH between U.S. Route 60/ Missouri Route 59 near Neosho and Missouri Route 86 in Fairview (15.4 miles)
- Newton County Route U from Missouri Route 43 in Seneca west to Missouri/ Oklahoma state line (1.1 miles)
- Christian/Greene County Route ZZ between Missouri Route 14 near Clever and

Greene Country Route M in Republic (8.5 miles)

- Dade County Route Y between Missouri Route 39 in Arcola and Missouri Route 215 194 (9.4 miles)
- Lawrence/Christian County - Missouri Route 14 between U.S. Route 60 in Marionville and U.S. Route 60/ Missouri Route 413 in Billings (8 miles)
- Taney County Missouri Route 265 between U.S. Route 65 and Iowa Colony Road near Hollister (3.1 miles)

Drivers also can expect flaggers and pilot cars directing them through the work zone. Drivers should wait for the pilot vehicle before proceeding through the work zone or before entering the work zone from a side road. Lane closings can be expected between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Crews could work Sundays to make up work missed due to weather delays.

Signs and message boards will alert drivers to the work

Weather and/or scheduling delays will alter the work schedule.

A seal coat is not an alternative to an asphalt overlay, but is planned for these roads as an economical way to maintain and preserve the roadway. The treatments keep a road from deteriorating and will extend its life.

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"Let's all go down to the river . . ."

Thoughts from The Editor

Something I really like about living in Cassville is its proximity to Roaring River State Park.

While the Greenway trails in Cassville are beautiful and work well for outdoor exercise when I'm short on time, even better are the roads along the water at the river. Plus, they're less than a tenminute drive from home.

Walking along the river in the morning is therapeutic in more ways than one. The temperature in the valley is, on average, five degrees cooler than it is at the top of the hill, and the sound of the rippling water soothes my oftcluttered mind.

My mind's certainly been in a whirl after last week's editorial. Although I wasn't

shocked by some of the negative reactions I received, I was surprised, on the other hand, by the messages of confirmation. Although I appreciate the encouragement, my intention was not to ingratiate it. I just wanted to share my perspective and, in so doing, maybe provoke some thought. I'll admit, too, that my column was written under duress. It's hard not to become emotionally affected by some of the news that comes across my desk.

One of the most rewarding conversations I had was with a mother, some 20 years or so younger than me, who disagreed with what she understood that I was saying in my editorial.

Instead of taking a potshot on social media, or even rebuking me from behind the anonymity of email, she came into the office and asked to speak to me in person.

Her words melted my heart, as did her presentation. It was obvious when I greeted her that it had taken every bit of courage she had to walk through that front door. Her voice and her hands shook as she handed me a sheet of paper on which she'd written her opposing viewpoint, one to which she added a disclaimer.

"When you read this," she said, "I just want you to know the message is not directed toward you personally. I wanted to meet you in person to tell you that."

Then we sat down and talked. She told me that she is terrified of taking the vaccine and even more terrified at the idea of her teenage daughter possibly being required to take it, for fear of the longterm consequences.

Her fear was real. I had no heart for trying to talk her out of it.

The truth is, we are indeed living in a science experiment, as many people are prone to saying in a derogatory manor. We're trying to beat a tiny virus with the best means currently at our disposal. Those means are subject to change as new information reveals itself.

We are also living in a social experiment, and lots of us are failing the test we've been handed.

As I listened to this young mother's story, I was reminded of my own daughter's adverse reaction to the Pertussis vaccine when she was an infant. I was terrified and requested that she receive no more of that variety.

That's the thing about this COVID vaccination program. We all live in different circumstances. Pros and cons must be considered by each of us individually, with an

eye for the good of the com-

Advocating against vaccination becomes something less than a personal choice when it's taken up as a sign of solidarity with a religious or political group, every bit as much as a vaccination mandate would be.


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

Sickles and Long lead Tulsa Bedlam Run

After the pandemic forced a near-total moratorium on road races last year, many classic events returned to the calendar this summer. On Saturday, Josie and I embarked to Tulsa to see Travis Sickles and Christian Long compete in the Bedlam Run 8K event

The Bedlam Run - a good excuse for OU and OK State alumni and fans to butt heads before the college football season - pits runners against each other on a challenging course in the brutal late-July heat of downtown Tulsa. For many high school and college runners, it represents a final test of their summer training before they dive into their respective team workout schedules.

This year, the Bedlam Run dropped the traditional 10K race, offering the 8K as its longer distance. All runners started and ran a 5K loop together, with the 8K runners bypassing the chute to finish with a 3K loop. A total of 232 runners competed in the 8K race.

Sickles and Long, both Southwest Trojans for life, had slightly different goals.

Sickles was running his final road race before heading off to Kirksville to compete for the Truman State Bulldogs. Undefeated in his short road racing career, Sickles had a gold medal in mind.

Long, entering his senior cross country season at Southwest with an All State goal, had never raced at any distance longer than 5K. The Bedlam Run was a litmus test for the effectiveness of his summer training schedule.

The hills and the heat took their toll on the runners on the longer first loop. Sickles held a slight lead as he veered past the finish line, with Long toiling in sixth place.

Jazz Carreon, 36 years old and a former Oklahoma Sooner, stalked Sickles as they tackled the final two miles. With a mile to go, Carreon cruised into the lead

to take the win in 28:07. An exhausted Sickles had no answer and had to settle for second place, finishing in 28:31. Long maintained his sixth-place position, finding the finish in 32:40.

Ashley Carreon - Jazz's wife and a proud young mother at age 31 - was the women's champion, finishing fifth overall in 31:07. At these highly competitive races, "you run like a girl" is a major compliment.

Sickles and Long were the top two finishers in the men's 16-19 division, joining other Southwest runners from the past who earned Bedlam Run medals. Brylee Wilson remains the bell cow of that group, claiming the women's overall championship in the 2016 5K race.

Search underway for new MU athletics director

University of Missouri officials announced that they have started the search for a new athletics director. A search advisory committee consisting of university leaders and other stakeholders has been formed to hire a new leader for Mizzou Athletics with proven experience and deep knowledge of the evolving college athletic landscape.

"We're excited to launch this national search," said Mun Choi, president of the University of Missouri. "We're seeking to hire a proven AD with a track record of visionary leadership, business acumen, fundraising successes, high integrity, effective management skills and a focus on the well-being of our student-athletes. Mizzou is a proud member of the SEC, and our new AD must radiate a winning and innovative approach."

The individual chosen as Mizzou's 21st athletics director will join a program that saw a school record 18 teams represented in the 2020-21 postseason — despite the challenges of the pandemic — and continues to add state-of-the-art facilities. The new home of Mizzou Football operations, the \$98M South End Zone Facility, opened in the summer of 2019, and ground is scheduled to be broken in the fall of 2021 on a new \$34 million indoor football practice facility located southwest of Memorial Stadium.

In FY21, Mizzou broke the Tiger Scholarship Fund's productivity record, raising \$55.5 million, surpassing the previous record by more than \$5 million. For the last nine semesters, Mizzou studentathletes have posted a 3.00 GPA or better, including a school record 3.44 GPA mark during the spring 2020 term.

The search advisory committee will be chaired by Curator Jeff Layman.

"Our goal is to hire a dynamic athletics director who will build upon our success in the SEC and instill a championship culture at Mizzou," he said.

In addition to Layman, the committee includes:

The search advisory committee will be assisted by Parker Executive Search firm, which carried out searches for previous Mizzou head coaches, including basketball and football.



the track has often seen more than 200 drivers.

"Tony has always been interested in dirt-track racing," said his wife Diana Cope. "In 2006, we were approached by a gentleman who told us our land in Butterfield would be the perfect place for a go-kart

track, so we built one, kind of on the premise that 'if we build it, they will come."

The Copes's faith was not misplaced.

In a motor-sport more affordable than stock car racing, child and adult drivers from hours away journey to Butterfield with their karts and get serious about racing.

Drivers pay an entry fee and receive the opportunity to win monetary prices.

Track promoter Chip Abramovitz, who came onboard with the Copes in 2013, has been part of the reason for the huge driver participation, says former racer Sam Mattingly, of Ex-

"As a former stock car racer, Chip has the connections that bring drivers to the track," Mattingly said.

According to Chip Abramovitz, many go-kart drivers are either on their way up to stock car racing, or are deciding to give up stock cars for the more affordable go-karts.

"We have 12 classes of races based on motor-types," he said. "We have two quarter-midget races for kids through age 14, and several categories for adults."

Abramovitz, who has a voice made for emceeing, invites drivers in full racing gear with meticulously presented go-karts to prepare for their individual races in performances which are, as Sam Mattingly says, "fun."

"Kart racing is the 'funnest' sport I've ever partici-

pated in," said Mattingly, who gave it up several years ago in favor of spending more time with his own kids.

Mattingly says Abramovitz is a strong supporter of the children who race.

"He comes up with some good sponsors and makes sure all the kids take home some money," Mattingly said.

Because there is no charge for spectators to view the gokart races at Twister Alley, it's a great opportunity for parents to expose their children to the sport and get them involved, if they're interested, Chip Abramovitz says.

"A person can spend as much or as little as they'd like on a competitive go-kart," he said, "but we can give them information on how to get started."


"They're like my grandchildren," she said, "because I don't have any."



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

The water is in great shape, low and clear, running about 30 CFS right now. The little bit of rain we received did not affect the water at all. It was just enough to get the ground

It's August now, so hot, hot, hot, but the terrestrial fishing is just getting better.

Big beetles, ants, hoppers, stimulators, crackle backs, caterpillars and lots of other bugs are falling out of the trees this time of year.

I'm using smaller dries right now. I'll use a 9' 7X leader. When using buggers, bigger dries, soft hackles, or most nymphs, I'll use a 9' 6X leader.



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It's good nymphing. If you want to just catch a bunch, use a black zebra midge or a pheasant tail, and you'll probably have a good day, but the dry fly-fishing is pretty good. There are still good Caddis hatches every day and BWO's nearly everyday. There are still good trico hatches in the morning, and you'll still see a few sulphurs in the evening.

I'm really enjoying ant and crackle-back fishing; you can really do well on both right

Mop flies and mega worms did very well this week. The orange, cream, and the light green did well all week.

Glo-balls in orange, white, and orange/red dot did well all week.



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San Juan worms in red, orange, cream, and hot pink did well last week.

Marabou jigs are very effective right now, 1/100 -1/32 in black/yellow, white, olive, and olive/tan have been great all week.

With the clear water, you'll two-pound line.

The camo lines, and the blue, white, red, or yellow lines should be avoided. You'll do better with fluorocarbon, or maxima or gamma fishing lines.

Power baits are still very effective in Zones 1 & 3, plastic only in Zone 1. Only in Zone 3 are the dough-bait and real eggs legal.

Orange plastic worms were good all week, and white eggs and orange eggs were working all week.

Spinners in black, brown, and green were all good last week. I liked black or skunk first thing in the morning.

We're not expecting a lot of rain this week, so it should be good fishing all week.

Fees changed for this enrollment period, says Graham. There is a \$25 per farm membership fee, \$2 per head enrollment fee and \$20 per head tagging fee. Sale expenses are not included in these fees and are different for each sale.

Show-Me-Select heifers gained fame for calving ease, which cuts death losses and labor at calving, says Graham. Spring and fall SMS auctions across the state bring higher bids for calvingease genetics.





Purdy resident deals with unwelcome guests

Dave Redshaw, of Purdy, is faced with a challenge. An ever-growing colony of bees has established a huge hive inside of a tree in front of his house, and he is at a loss about what his next step should be.

"This has been really interesting," he said, "but the problem is way out of my league."

Redshaw first noticed the bees on the large white oak tree in front of his house last year, but didn't think too much about it, until the colony grew to over one and a half times its original size this year. Now, he's concerned.

"They haven't really been a problem as far as trying to sting us," he said, referring to himself and his wife Debbie. "When I go out to pick cucumbers in my garden, they'll be all over the vines, but I've never been stung."

However, because the tree is located alongside a public street in Purdy, he's concerned that if the bee population continues to grow, it could become a nuisance, if not a hazard.

Redshaw says his son, Bryan Redshaw, inserted a camera into the hole in the tree where the bees were swarming and discovered that the tree is hollow inside and it appears that the bees plan to take up permanent residence.

"I've talked to several beepeople who came by," Redshaw said, "and they're telling me I'll need to cut the tree down to get rid of them."
