Community mourns loss of business owner to COVID-19

Michael LeCompte, beloved friend, husband, father, soon-to-be grandfather and owner of Michael's Hardware in Cassville, leaves an entire town to mourn his abrupt passing on November 4,

2020, after a short bout with COVID-19.

Cassville attorney and good friend of LeCompte's, David Cole, says LeCompte was a perfect fit for the retail business.

"He was always smiling and laughing and made everyone he met feel like his best friend," he said. "When a person was around Michael, they couldn't be in a bad mood. He's really going to be missed."

Jon Horner, President of Security National Bank in Cassville, bills himself as LeCompte's best friend, a fact commonly acknowledged by people in Cassville.

"We had lunch every Friday, except for the couple of times I begged off recently because I felt like I might be coming down with something," Horner said. "Michael and I joked that we didn't want to have lunch and leave with a bad case of the Covid."

Although the two men spoke lightly of it, they took COVID-19 and its inherent risks seriously, according to Horner.

Friday, October 30, it was LeCompte's turn to cancel their lunch date.

"He had a little headache and sinus pressure, he told

me," Horner said. "To be on the safe side, he thought he should stay away from me."

Horner never LeCompte again. On Monday, November 2, a CO-VID-19 test came back positive. On November 4, LeCompte died after being airlifted to a northwest Arkansas hospital. He had turned 56 the previous day.

"Michael and I had been best friends for as long as I can remember," Horner said. "We were babies together in the nursery at United Methodist Church in Cassville and grew up and got into trouble

Cassville veteran recounts experiences in the Pacific

"I bet you've never seen anything like this," said 96-year-old Robert Ryder, of Cassville.

As he unsheathed the Japanese Samurai sword he held in his hands, its burnished blade glinted in the sun cast by the overhead skylight. I agreed that I'd never seen one before.

Nor had I seen - not in person, at least - a Japanese flag, two of which were displayed in a cabinet in his home.

Ryder, one of perhaps only a handful of living WWII veterans remaining in Barry County, was happy to share a few stories with me.

"One of the Japanese flags," he said, as he pointed toward the cabinet, "I bought it for \$6 from a disgraced Japanese kamikaze pilot, who was unable to follow through with his mission."

Ryder opted not to tell me how he had procured the sword.

Born in Pioneer, Ryder was a 1942 graduate of Wheaton High School. After graduation, he accepted a job with Elkins Butane Gas Company, where he gained the experience to qualify as a combat engineer when he joined the military in 1944, after first

accepting a deferment for which he was eligible because his job was considered essential.

"I let the deferment expire," Ryder said. "Some of the guys were giving me a hard time, and I decided it was time for me to join the draft like others were doing.

"I was inducted into the service in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, in 1944," Ryder said.

After shipping out, his first stop was in New Guinea, where his troop spent a few months mostly just waiting to ship out again, according to Ryder.

"In 1945," he said, "I sailed into Lingayen Gulf in the Phillipines and became part of the 556th Heavy Poton

Four more residents die from COVID-19

On Tuesday, November 10, the Barry County Health Department and Office of Emergency Management announced the death of four more Barry County residents due to complications of CO-VID-19.

One of the deaths was that of a Cassville business owner who lived at home with his family and had no significant underlying health condi-

According to health department director, Roger Brock, the other three patients who died were residents of Roaring River Health & Rehab, a residential care facility in Cassville. The 68-year-old female, the 52-year-old male and the

80-year-old female all had known underlying health conditions.

The residential care facility has been struggling with an outbreak of COVID-19 among residents and staff for the past few weeks. A Cassville resident, 90-year-old Monna Kelner, is concerned.

"Right now, I live at home independently," Kelner said, "but I have health issues, and I know that at some point in time, I'll need to move to a nursing home. It's not right when people move to a facility, expecting to be taken care of, but face bigger problems when they get there."

Kelner said she is not just concerned for herself, but

there, too.

"Michael was the funniest guy I knew," Horner continued. "We liked to sneak snacks into church when we were kids, just to see what kind of reaction we'd get from the adults. One time, we took corn nuts in and opened them up and begin chomping on them during a solemn part of the service. Of course, it drew some attention, especially from our parents who were standing up front, in the choir.

"Another time it was green apple Jolly Ranchers we smuggled in. Their distinctive aroma turned heads all around us," Horner recalled.

After graduating from Cassville High School two years apart, the two friends went their separate ways for

a time to pursue college degrees, careers and families of their own, but were reunited in 1988, when LeCompte and his wife, Jill, moved back to Cassville, where he worked in his father's hardware business, LeCompte Ace Hard-

Horner had returned to Cassville a year earlier, in 1987, when he accepted a position with Commerce Bank.

The two friends immediately took up where they left off, this time for the betterment of the community.

"We served together on the Cassville Chamber Board and took turns being president a time or two," Horner

"In 1993, the same year I married my wife, Darla, Michael said, 'we need to spruce up the Christmas spirit in Cassville,' and he spearheaded a drive to hang the snowflake Christmas lights around town," Horner continued. "For his efforts, he was awarded the Chamber's Community Service Award. This year, when you see the snowflake lights, you can think of Michael."

According to Horner, cooking was another accomplishment of LeCompte's.

"One year he said to me, 'we're going to start tailgating at Razorback games this year," Horner said. "Now, when I thought of tail-gating, I thought of burgers and hotdogs, but Michael apparently had gourmet meals in mind. We went to those Razorback games and he'd get out his grill and fix gourmet

meals: ribs, baked beans, even shrimp and flaming bananas foster. It always drew a big crowd. People would ask him to come cook at their tailgate, and ladies would tell their men that that's how they should be cooking."

"One time," David Cole recalled, "we were having so much fun at the tailgate party, we just forgot about watching the game altogeth-

Dr. Richard Asbill, Superintendent of Cassville R-IV School District, was also a friend of Michael LeCompte's.

"Michael LeCompte was an extraordinary friend to me and many others," Asbill said. "When I first came to Cassville and made my first trip to the local hardware, Michael greeted me with, 'How can I help you?'

"Michael was always there to help, I learned," he continued. "It's funny how God puts people into the right places (at the right times) in our lives. People needed Michael when they had trouble, and Michael was there to help. He was easy to talk to and always listened."

"I talked to Michael every day," Jon Horner said. "He was the smartest guy I ever knew, and the one I bounced things off of. COVID-19 is real and it took my best friend. I didn't see this com-

Round Three CARES Act application window open

Barry County is making an application available to request CARES Act funds for a third round of funding. For the third round of funding, non-profit corporations negatively impacted by COVID may seek economic support for the time period of March 1, 2020, through October 31, 2020. Requests must satisfy the requirements of the CARES Act and Treasury guidance. Applicants will be required to submit sufficient supporting documentation in support of the request.

For instance, a non-profit corporation that was unable to hold previously scheduled fundraisers due to COVID may submit documentation consisting of the past three (3) years of: informational tax returns, statement of financial position (balance sheet), statement of financial activities (income statement), and records evidencing past fundraising activity from the identified fundraising events, bank statements in support

of those efforts, and other financial records in support of the request.

Applications for the third round of funding are due on November 30, 2020. The County will then review and evaluate the applications for completeness (including supporting documentation), compliance with the CARES Act requirements and Treasury guidance. Award recipients will be required to enter into a written agreement with the County prior to disbursement of awarded funds.





A plague of flies hit us after Filipinos began dumping the bodies of dead Japanese soldiers into the river where we were working. The flies got so bad it was hard to even eat our food. Then the Air

Force began spraying DDT and that put a stop to the fly problem.

"I got malaria three times while I was there, in spite of the fact that we took an atabrine tablet every day," he continued. "The atabrine was supposed to prevent it, but it didn't always work.

"Once when I was in the hospital with a fever, they brought in two guys who had bought poison liquor from

some Chinese vendors in Manila. The doctors pumped their stomachs and they stayed the night in my room, one on each side of me. They were in lots of pain, so they made a lot of racket. When daylight came, one of them was dead and the other one was blind," Ryder said. "We'd been warned not to buy whiskey from the Chinese. I guess there was a good reason for

According to Ryder, his closest brush with death was probably the time he was airing up the floats on a bridge in Manila, and a sniper fired toward him.

"I didn't hear the shot, until after I'd felt the bullet whiz past my right ear," he said. "I immediately dove into the water."

Ryder said one of his bouts of malaria kept him from

shipping out to come back home with his unit in 1946.

"I had to wait until I was well," he said, "which was about three weeks later."

After landing in Seattle, the troops were welcomed, in part, by an Olympic Dairy truck, Ryder remembers.

"They gave each of us a quart of milk," he said. "That was the best milk I'd ever had. We hadn't had milk for a couple of years, and we all just stood there and drank it."

Ryder eventually made it back to his family's home in Pioneer and went back to work for Elkin's Butane in Wheaton.

"By that time, I was thinking I might want to start a family of my own," he said, "but it seemed like all the girls I used to know were gone. Then, a buddy of mine in Purdy introduced me to

his wife's sister, and I knew she was the one. We really hit it off"

Robert Ryder and Marjory Young were married and bought a farm south of Purdy, where they raised two children.

Ryder said, at 96, he's forgotten a lot of details about his time in the military; some of it, he suspects, might be for the best.

"They wanted me to join the reserves after I got back home from Japan," he said, "but I'm glad I told them no. Those who *did* join ended up fighting in the Korean conflict and I always felt sorry for them. They had to turn right around and leave the homes and families they'd just started."

Ryder, whose wife passed almost two years ago, credits part of his longevity to never having smoked.

"They gave us free cigarettes in the military," he said, "but I never smoked them. I sold them to other guys who *did* smoke, though."

MDC hopes to see hunters at CWD sample collection sites

COVID-19 has changed the Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) chronic wasting disease (CWD) sample collection procedure during the opening weekend of the November firearms season to a voluntary process this year. However, MDC wants to remind hunters that there are still ways to cooperate in the state's search for this devastating deer disease.

On Nov. 14-15, the opening weekend of this year's November firearms deer season, the sample collection in the 30 counties that comprise Missouri's CWD Management Zone (MZ) will be voluntary. Since 2016, sample collection in CWD MZ counties had been mandatory during the opening weekend of the November firearms season. This year's change to voluntary was prompted by ongoing COVID-19 cases and public health concerns surrounding the pandemic throughout the state.

Although this year's sample collection is voluntary, MDC staff will still be working at sample collection sites in CWD MZ counties on opening weekend to get samples from hunters who want to have their harvest sampled. Counties are in the CWD MZ either because the disease has been found in those counties or they are within 10 miles of a site where a positive find has occurred. The CWD MZ counties in MDC's 17-county Southwest Region are Barry, Cedar, Christian, Hickory, Polk, Stone, and Taney. A complete list of counties that comprise the state's CWD MZ this year – and the locations of the sample collection sites in those counties – can be found in MDC's "2020 Fall Deer & Turkey" regulations book, a free publication available at all places that sell hunting permits and at most MDC offices, and online at: https://huntfish.mdc. mo.gov/sites/default/files/ downloads/2020FDT.pdf

CWD is a disease of the central nervous system that is fatal to deer and other members of the deer family. The disease was first confirmed in Missouri's freeranging deer 2012 but CWD has been maintained at a low prevalence due to intensive surveillance and management of the disease - more than 137,000 deer have been tested since the disease was discovered and only 163 of those tests have been positive. Hunter participation plays a key role in Missouri's ongoing fight against CWD.

"CWD represents a great threat to the health of Missouri's deer and elk herds and to our hunting culture," said MDC's CWD Sampling Coordinator Kevyn Wiskerchen. "Sampling deer for CWD allows early detection of the disease and allows for rapid management intervention to slow its spread. Hunters play a key role in helping MDC your Telecheck ID numbers. find and manage CWD by having their deer sampled."

Before arriving at a voluntary sample collection sites, hunters are asked to:

• Field dress and Telecheck their deer.

Position the deer in vehicles with head and necks easily accessible if they're bringing in the carcass. (Heads with six inches of neck attached can be brought to collection sites, too).

Capes may be removed in preparation for taxidermy before going to a sample collection station.

The person who harvested the deer must be present. Hunters and other members of their party will be asked to remain in their vehicles throughout the sample collection process as a precautionary health measure.

• Be prepared to provide

If using a paper permit, have it detached from the deer for easy access.

If using the MO Hunting app, have permit and Telecheck information available.

In addition to the voluntary sample collection being conducted on Nov. 14-15, MDC is also providing drop-off sites through Jan. 15 for hunters wishing to have

their deer tested for CWD. At these voluntary drop-off sites, hunters should leave the head with six inches of neck attached and the antlers removed. The drop boxes have instructions and materials hunters will need to provide information. Hunters will be able to check test results online using their Telecheck ID at https://short. mdc.mo.gov/ZuE.


