

Homicide investigation underway in Barry County

According to Barry County Sheriff Danny Boyd, a call to Barry County 911 was received Friday, May 28, at 6:02 p.m. about a person lying in a field near the road at the

intersection of Farm Roads 1078 and 2140, southwest of George's Feed Mill.

Responders arrived at the scene to find 25 year-old Daylon Michael Anderson, of Monett, deceased from an apparent gunshot wound. It was determined that a possible homicide had occurred.

According to a probable cause statement filed by Detective Doug Henry of the Barry County Sheriff's Office, a description of suspects was obtained and leads revealed that 21-year-old Dylan Rixon Williams, of Pierce City, allegedly shot Anderson, and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

Not long after the call about the deceased body of

Anderson, a call was received at the Monett City Fire Department to report a vehicle fire - which turned out to be Anderson's - on Farm Road 1090, near Angus Branch.

"Whoever attempted to burn his car wasn't very successful," Fire Chief Tom Jones said.

According to Detective Henry's probable cause statement, Williams was arrested in connection with the incident at a residence in Monett. The firearm used to allegedly shoot Anderson was also found at the residence. Shell casings matched those found at the crime scene, Henry's statement said.

A Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce ribbon-cutting ceremony and open house were held at the new W.I.L.D. Academy on the Cassville R-IV campus Friday, May 28. The ceremony marked the


long-awaited formal completion of the academy, which was the result of the passage of a bond issue in the spring of 2019.

With funds from "Vision 150" (as the bond was called), \$4.5 million was al-

located toward the project, as well as toward the construction of an Early Childhood Development Center, which was completed last year.

W.I.L.D. Academy, which will provide space for a college-level biology class, Fifth Grade science classes, and K - 12 gifted programs, is the result of the repurposing of former middle school space which had been unused for years, other than for storage.

Crowder welcomes new English teacher

Crowder Quill-published-writer, Kayla Branstetter, has accepted a position at Crowder College as their promising new English teacher. With a decade of teaching English at Purdy

High School behind her, as well as a number of published personal works, she expressed excitement for the position

"This is a dream job for me," Branstetter said. "My mom was a teen mom and a high school drop-out. She graduated from Crowder with her Associate's and moved on to get her Bachelor's, so I know the potential this school has."

Aware that a few of her students will also be parents working full-time jobs, she said that regardless of how old we are, we still need that one person in our corner who's going to support us.

"It's my responsibility to offer that support," she said.

Raised in both Barry County and Denver, Colorado, where she earned a Masters of Arts in Liberal Studies, she understands both the importance of Barry County, the culture outside of it, and how they flow as one.

As an adviser to the National English Society at Purdy, she chaperoned two trips to New York City, where she took her students to Broadway shows. With the support of the Purdy community, she derived great pleasure in being able to expose students to culture outside of Barry County. Teaching students the cultural context in which literature was written, she says, is a vital part of her teaching style and enables students to have a comprehensive look at the piece.

Visitor policy change for Mother and Baby units

As COVID-19 levels continue to remain low locally, CoxHealth is making a change to its visitor policy for patients on Mother and Baby units.

Effective immediately, patients on Labor and Delivery and Postpartum units may have two visitors per day. One support person may remain with the patient 24/7 while they are in the hospital. The second visitor may also be present during the baby's birth, but will fall under the health system's current visiting hours between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m. after the mother transitions to postpartum status. These visitors must be the same two people for the duration of the hospitalization.

This change is a shift from the former policy of one visitor for the duration of a patient's stay, which has been in place since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020.

"This is an exciting moment, and one we celebrate alongside our patients," says Karen Kramer, Chief Hospital Officer and Incident Commander for COVID-19 response at CoxHealth. "We have not enjoyed the restrictions over the past months,

but believe they were necessary to help limit the potential spread of COVID-19. Having a baby is a significant milestone, and it makes us very glad to be at this moment where it is safe to have more visitors with these patients at this pivotal time."

The change affects Cox-Health's maternity hospitals in Springfield, Branson and Monett. Visitors must be at least 18 years old, remain masked at all times while on campus, pass a temperature and symptom screening when entering the facility, and limit their movement to the patient's room and the public restrooms.

"We will continue to monitor the COVID-19 pandemic, and make further changes to our visitor policy depending on how the disease prevalence evolves in our communities," says Kramer.

Please note that this change does not apply to the hospital's Perinatal Care Unit, which follows the health system's guidelines of one visitor per day.

Pool Opening Postponed Due to Rain

Originally set to open May 29, the YMCA pool opening has been postponed to Saturday, June 5. Due to weather circumstances, production on the pool's resurfacing project has been delayed. According to the Cassville YMCA's Facebook page, nearing the Cassville Aquatic Center's twentieth construction anniversary, the pool is "getting a major face lift."

The basin is being cov-

ered in a new protective epoxy surface designed to have extended durability, and will be "easy on bare feet." New waterline tile and skimmer boxes are also being implemented, and the play features are being renovated. The remaining work in the deep end of the pool requires several hours of dry weather, yet Public Works Director David Brock remains hopeful for the June 5 opening date.

An energy independent America is vital for national security and strengthens our economy which impacts all Americans—especially our poorest citizens who feel rising prices at the gas pump and the checkout line most. Attempts to pressure financial institutions to cut off the fossil fuel industry amounts to nothing less than an abuse of power by the federal government and should not be tolerated by states. These backroom deals do not live up to the ideals of the American experiment and we should expect and demand more from those in Washington."

The Treasurers, led by West Virginia State Treasurer Riley Moore, are speaking out following media reports that Special Presidential Envoy for Climate John Kerry has privately pressured banks to cut off lending for fossil fuel industries.

The coalition sent a letter to Kerry outlining their opposition to these efforts and suggesting steps they might take to discourage financial institutions from participating in the Kerry-backed scheme.

"As a collective, we strongly oppose commandand-control economic policies that attempt to bend the free market to the political will of government officials," the Treasurers wrote. "It is simply antithetical to our nation's position as a democracy and a capitalist economy for the Executive Branch to bully corporations into curtailing legal activities."

The Treasurers observed that cutting off lending to these industries, which are engaged in perfectly legal activities, would do substantial harm to states' economies, resulting in significant job losses.

"The coal, oil, and natural gas industries in our states are vital to our nation's economy," they wrote. "These industries provide jobs, health insurance, critical tax revenue, and quality of life to families across our country. As the Obama Administration's War on Coal demonstrated, reckless attacks on the fossil fuel industry ultimately cut off paychecks for workers and take food off the table for hard-working middle-class families."

The Treasurers said they will closely monitor which financial institutions bow to Administration pressure. Moreover, the Treasurers further pledged to respond in the best interests of their constituents.

"As the chief financial officers of our respective states, we entrust banks and financial institutions with billions of our taxpayers' dollars," they wrote. "It is only logical that we will give significant weight to the fact that an institution engaged in tactics that will harm the people whose money they are handling before entering into or extending any contract."

In addition to West Virginia Treasurer Moore, Treasurer Fitzpatrick was joined on the letter by Alabama Treasurer John McMillan, Arizona Treasurer Kimberly Yee, Arkansas Treasurer Dennis Milligan, Idaho Treasurer Julie A. Well, the water is up again folks. As I was writing this report, we were at 233 CFS (cubic feet per second). The water rate is falling and should be very good for next weekend.

As of now power bait products are really working well. Yellow, pink, fluorescent orange and white eggs have all been great. We are fishing these with at least a ¼ ounce slip-sinker. Fourlb. line is still working fine. In a few weeks, as the water clears, 2-lb. line will become much more important.

Power bait worms are also working well. The pink, cheese-yellow and the orange worked best in the high water. As long as the water stays murky, I expect these colors to work well.

Spinners work well in the murky water; fish them with extra weight, and fish them very slowly across the bottom of the river. Black, brown, olive, fluorescent orange, and pink spinners did very well this past week.

When the water is up and murky, gold spoons, crankbait crawfish, and crank-bait minnows can be very effective.

A few people were fishing heavy jigs and were catching a few, but this next week should be even better for jigfishing. The water rate is falling and this will help a lot. We are fishing 1/8 and 1/16 marabou jigs, at the moment; we will start fishing lighter jigs once the river gets down to about 100 CFS.

Good jig colors this week were black/yellow, sculpin olive, RR specials, white, and tan. A few were caught on the tuti-fruiti jigs.

Fly fishing was a bit tough after the river came up, but a few people managed to catch a few. I talked to a young man Saturday, who said he caught 30+ on a pink San Juan worm. Pink usually is a good color.

There were a few fish caught in the C&R area of Zone 2 on streamers. Sculpins seemed to be the best, but a few were caught on a

brown razor-craw, also.

In certain areas, you can still find a few trout rising to tricos, blue wing olives, and caddis, but you have to be in the right place when the hatch is taking place.

As the water rate falls this week, the dry fly-fishing should get a lot better. Just before this last increase in water rate, we were just starting to catch a bunch of fish on ants and beetles.

This should happen again as the water rate falls

When the water hits 150 CFS, the dry fly-fishing starts getting good; anything under 100 CFS is usually very good.

Pheasant-tails have been good, as have sow bugs and burlaps. Black wooly-buggers caught some nice trout the past few days; olive buggers were pretty good also.

When the water is murky, small jigs, glo-balls and Y2K-bugs work very well, fished two to three feet under an indicator.

Crackle-backs will be good this week also if the water continues to clear.

With the bigger flies, I'm using 5X or 4X leaders; when fishing the smaller flies, I'm using 6X leaders, and when fishing small dries, I'm using 16's and smaller. I'm usually using a 9' 7X leader.

Good luck on the river this week!

Missouri Industrial Hemp Amendments Approved

The Missouri Department of Agriculture announced federal approval of the state's amendment to the Industrial Hemp Plan. With the approval, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Marketing Service affirmed that Missouri's amended plan complies with federal law and regulations. The entire amended Missouri State Plan can be reviewed here.

Key changes include:

- Increasing the pre-harvest window for compliance sampling from 15 to 30 days
- Allowing remediation options for eligible crops that initially test above 0.3% total THC
- Updating requirements for testing laboratories to be ISO 17025 accredited and after 12/31/2022, also regis-



tered with the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA)

As one of the first plans approved under the new federal final rule, Missouri's producers will help launch a new era of domestic industrial hemp production.

Remaining states, tribes and territories must have plans approved by the end of the year, or defer regulatory authority to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.







Missouri Department of Agriculture announces new Nutrition Program

Missouri Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) is up and running for the summer. Funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Services, the SFMNP assists low-income seniors in obtaining fresh, Missouri Grown produce and generates more than \$200,000 for the farmers' market community. Through the program, more than 4,100 households may benefit.

"We have focused on addressing food insecurity in creative ways and this is just one example of that work," said Director of Agriculture Chris Chinn. "By partnering with the state's Area Agencies on Aging, we will unlock potential for Missouri agriculture. Our farmers' markets

offer a unique opportunity to not only benefit farmers, but also to support the local economy."

Low-income seniors in the Kansas City, St. Louis, Springfield and Mid-Missouri regions can apply to receive vouchers that will allow them to purchase eligible foods from an authorized farmer at a Missouri farmers' market. A total of up to 10 vouchers worth \$5 each may be issued to each qualifying Missouri household. To identify the regions that contained the highest number of eligible citizens, the Department of Agriculture worked with the Missouri Department of Social Services.

Seniors are encouraged to consider using a proxy to both apply for vouchers and

purchase eligible foods at a farmers' market. Each senior may designate one proxy on their behalf. The senior and the proxy must both sign the program application in order to receive the vouchers.

The Department's Missouri Grown team has trained and authorized nearly 200 farmer to participate in the program. Authorized

farmers will be identified by a sign that states the booth is proudly participating in the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program. Benefit vouchers may be used to purchase fresh, raw, unprepared foods grown in Missouri and sold at a farmers' market. Eligible foods include fruits, vegetables, fresh cut cooking herbs and honey.

Vouchers will be available through Sept. 30 and must be redeemed by Oct. 31. Farmers interested in learning more about eligibility and participation should email the Department of Agriculture at FarmersMarket@mda.mo.gov.

Competitive Bidding Pushes Land Prices Higher

Interest in purchasing agricultural land has grown since a coronavirus pandemic-induced slowdown blanketed the land market last spring. Farmers are feeling more financially secure as very strong commodity prices arrived on top of large government payments in 2020. This is propelling farmers to bid more aggressively for additional land than has been the case during the past six

"Farmland sales prices are up 5 to 15 percent in the past six months with most of the increase coming since the first of the year," said Randy Dickhut, senior vice president of real estate operations at Farmers National Company. "Competitive bidding among interested buyers is really pushing land prices right now."

Individual investors, both first-time, and experienced buyers, are stepping into the land market as they search for a safe, long-term real estate investment in a low interest rate environment. Investor buyers seldom outbid farmer-buyers for a good farm unless they have 1031 tax-deferred exchange funds to spend in a short time period.

The increase in ag land prices is happening in most areas of the Grain Belt and with most types of land.

"At Farmers National Company auctions, we are seeing competitive bidding push prices for good cropland to levels approaching 2014 values," Dickhut said. "Average to lower quality farms are experiencing stronger sales prices, too, while pastureland increases are more modest."

Currently, the demand for good farmland is outstripping the supply of farms for sale. During the previous few years, the number of farms for sale has been lower but there remained enough demand in the farmland market to balance the lower supply resulting in steady land prices. At this time, the strong demand to own farmland is one of the main factors pushing prices higher.

"In order for the seller to get top dollar in the current land market, they have to ensure there is true competitive bidding," said Dickhut. "Farmers National Company and its agents employ the most comprehensive platform of competitive bidding systems available in order to get the best price for sellers including public outcry auctions, a full array of online and simultaneous live auctions, various written bidding mechanisms, and other bidding or listing platforms."

Higher land values will bring more sellers into the market as estates, trusts, recent inheritors and family groups will decide to sell the farm or ranch and capture the higher prices. Also, uncertainty surrounding future tax policies will trigger a sale sooner than later for some.

Landowners who are thinking of selling their farm are now factoring in both the higher proceeds they would get from the sale and what potential tax obligations might be due.

The land market will be balancing increased demand for good cropland against what might be an increasing supply of farms for sale.

"Our agents are fielding an increased number of calls from landowners who want to sell because of the aforementioned reasons. Our pipeline of sales activity for summer and fall is filling up." Dickhut said.

Farmers National Company's land sales activity has already been very brisk and above the market the past seven months with dollar volume of land sold up 60 percent over last year and up 67 percent over the average of the past three years. The number of acres sold in this time period is up 64 percent from last year.

In a rising land market, it becomes more difficult to predict what a farm will actually sell for on any given day especially when there is demand from both farmers and investors, Dickhut said.

"The best way to sell cropland in the current market is to take it to auction or some form of competitive bidding that brings together the potential buyers and lets them push the price," he said.





Flyin Buzzards perform live at the Roaring River Shelter




