Wrestler Zach Coenen doubles Cassville's gold

What. A. Week.

On Tuesday, Cassville's Annie Moore became a state wrestling gold medalist.

Zach Coenen on Thursday? #metoo.

Cassville's Coenen, lone entry in the MSHSAA Class 2 wrestling championships at Independence, matched Moore's mojo to capture Cassville's first ever boys wrestling medal. Unlike Moore, who pinned every opponent in her state saga, Coenen had to battle through overtime in all three of his matches to earn the gold bling.

After an opening round bye in the Class 2, 220 pound weight class, Coenen survived in the quarterfinals against Josh Dunmire of Fulton, winning in OT, 2-1. The semifinals saw Coenen forced into OT again. This

time he dominated the extra period, defeating Peyton Hahn of Boonville, 4-1, to advance to the championship match.

Waiting for Coenen in the finals was Jared Kinder, Moberly's prolific senior with the 45-6 record. Only 26 wrestlers in the 14 weight divisions of the Class 2 tournament had reached the 40win plateau. Most school schedules lack the number of matches required for a wrestler to reach 40 wins. To hit that mark, you have to finish the season near perfect, or compete every weekday and twice on Sunday.

Harrisonville's Carson Miller came in with an impressive 39-9 record, but Kinder decisioned him in the semifinals.

In contrast, Coenen's sectional championship victory boosted his record to

just 28-3. But throw out the victory total. They were both sectional champions. Perhaps the most important stat was Kinder's six losses, double Coenen's number.

Technique, ferocity, and instinct

In the title match, Coenen battled Kinder toeto-toe, and hold for hold, then scored the winning point in the waning minute of overtime. Coenen matched Kinder in technique, and used his football power and instinct honed in years of practice and competition to turn the tide.

Monday's opening of Phase 1B - Tier 3 COV-ID-19 vaccine eligibility in Cassville was marked by a drive-through clinic near

Cassville's city ball fields, yet another one conducted with well-oiled efficiency.

In spite of a long line of traffic, wait times were minimal. Most drivers entering the line at the south end of City Park Road, were able to leave via Mineral Springs Road in less than 30 minutes: a time frame which included waiting for the proscribed 15 minutes after the vaccination

was administered.

Health department administrator Roger Brock credits the efficiency to the 30 or so people who pitch in to help with the clinics, including personnel from Roark Family Health and Access Family Care in Cassville, as well as Mercy EMS, City of Cassville and Office of Emergency

GoBEC, Barry Electric host broadband discussion

Commissioner, Bob Dixon a member of the National Association of Counties - met with business owners and interested citizens of Barry County Wednesday for a discussion about the challenges of providing broadband internet connectivity to all residents of the county.

The round-table meeting - held in one of Barry Electric's garages in Cassville - was the most productive meeting in the four counties where he's held them so far, Dixon said.

"I'm gathering information from residents of the ten-county region I'm responsible for," said Dixon, who was appointed to a 30-member national task force to study the broadband needs of U.S. residents in de-

"Primarily, we are looking Greene County Presiding for the answer to three questions," he continued. "What is the current footprint of broadband? What are the barriers to build-out (to increase that bandwidth)? And, how can we guarantee equal access to the internet?

> The goal, Dixon said, is to decrease the digital divide in rural areas across the nation.

> "Most of the comments we receive regarding the importance of internet connectivity come from four fundamental groups: law enforcement, agriculture leaders, educators, and business leaders," Dixon

Angela Seymour, who represented Crowder College at the meeting, said many of the school's students were left stranded last year when classes went virtual.



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10th County Joins Treasurer Fitzpatrick's Local Government Checkbook

To kick off Sunshine Week, Missouri State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick today announced that Cape Girardeau County is the 10th county to provide spending data for the local government checkbook. This is part of his ongoing commitment to ensuring a more efficient and transparent government at all levels.

Spending data from ten Cape local governments, Cass Girardeau County, County, Clay County, Cole County, Franklin County, Greene County, Jasper County, Newton County, St. Charles County, and the City of St. Louis, can be searched, with 16 additional counties in progress. The Office will continue adding county expenditure data as it becomes

Visitors to the Checkbook can examine expenditure data detailing funds, departments, vendors, payment descriptions, and totals for the available government entities.

"Government transparency is essential to a functioning republic," Treasurer Fitzpatrick said. "As Treasurer, I will always strive to improve transparency because I want Missourians to trust that their government is working for them and their tax dollars are being spent wisely. Increased transparency helps facilitate that trust and I am hopeful that more county leaders will volunteer to participate in the local government checkbook."

In 2020, Treasurer Fitzpatrick announced the expansion of the Show-Me Checkbook to include local governments. He also facilitated aggregating state expenditures related to CARES Act funding in one portal on the Treasurer's Office website for Missourians to search.

The Show-Me Checkbook, launched by the Treasurer's Office in 2018, is one of the most comprehensive state financial data portals in the country. The Local Governments section of the Show-Me Checkbook can be found at https://treasurer. mo.gov/ShowMeCheckbook/localgovernment.

In 2020, the Treasurer's Office had a sunshine request response time of less than a day. Sunshine Week celebrates open government and access to public information. It runs from March 14-21.

Special Enrollment Period open for Medicare & Medicaid Services

The Missouri Department of Commerce and Insurance (DCI) wants to make Missourians aware of a Special Enrollment Period in response to the public health emergency which will allow consumers to purchase new individual health coverage or change their Marketplace plan for 2021.

This Special Enrollment Period, which runs from February 15 through May 15, 2021 allows consumers to enroll for the coverage they need for 2021. Consumers may enroll for these benefits on the HealthCare.gov website. Some health insurers are also offering the opportunity to enroll for coverage for 2021 outside the federal Marketplace as well.

If you purchase through the federal Marketplace, your cost may be reduced if you are eligible for an advanced premium tax credit (APTC). The credits are only available if you buy insurance on the Marketplace. They are not available for policies purchased off the Marketplace or for policies purchased through your employer.

Insurance companies offering individual plans in 2021 are Healthy Alliance Life Insurance Company (Anthem), Blue Cross Blue Shield of Kansas City, Ambetter from Home State (Celtic/Centene), Cigna, Cox, Oscar, Medica, and SSM (Well First Health). Consumers can access the department's coverage map for more information on companies in their county.

'When choosing a new health plan, it's important to consider more than just premium cost. Compare all costs, including networks, providers and drug formularies," warned Chlora Lindley-Myers, Director of the Department. Additionally, be wary of deceptive sales practices, online ads, and phone solicitations. We have received complaints from consumers who purchased plans they thought were comprehensive, but ended up providing very limited benefits."

Cassville clean-up event to be held April 12-16

The city of Cassville's annual spring clean-up will be held April 12 through April 16. Republic Services will accept additional household waste and large items on regular collection days.

The following items will be accepted at the curb: barbecue grills, patio furniture, sofas; dressers; love-seats; recliners; desks; televisions; bundled guttering; beds, including hide-a-beds, mattresses and box springs.

Wood pallets; materials must be cut into four-foot sections and stacked; sinks; toilets; cabinets; vanities; carpet that is cut into four-foot lengths and bundled; and bicycles.

Republic Services will not accept tires, yard waste, large quantities of ash, dead animals, raw sewage, waste oil, hazardous materials, wet paint containers, chemicals, flammable substances, lead or acid batteries or waste from large remodeling or construc-

One option will be to have Cassville residents set at their curb side large appliances for Republic Services to collect. There is a \$15 fee. Residents must pay the fee to Republic Services in order to schedule the pick-up of the appliance. the following large appliances will be accepted after the \$15 fee has been paid: dishwashers; washing machines; dryers; hot water heaters; and

Republic Services will also accept refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners that display a tag from a licensed technician proving that all freon has been removed from the item. To request and pay for pick- up of an appliance please contact Republic Services at 417-268-1261.

PACE, Cassville United Methodist Church, Haven of the Ozarks receive grants

Cassville United Methodist Church Food Pantry, Haven of the Ozarks and PACE - a Cassvillebased 501c3 umbrella for civic groups and projects have received grants totaling \$10,000.

The Cassville Community Foundation applied for the grant through the Coover Regional Recovery Grant Program. The Community Foundation of the Ozarks manages the Coover grantmaking program and opened this year's grant round to its 52 affiliate foundations for proposals to support community recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

PACE received a grant of \$5,000 to offset cancelled fundraisers due to COV-ID-19. The agency also will use the funds to support improvement and development projects.

Cassville United Methodist received \$2,500 for the Cassville Food Pantry, which provides food to Cassville residents in need.

"We greatly appreciate the grant to help those struggling," said Janet Mills, Cassville Food Pantry Director. "With the pandemic, resources are appreciated. We're going to use the grant money to distribute groceries for those having a hard time, be it from unemployment or health related issues."

Haven of the Ozarks will use its \$2,500 grant to fund programming support and for pandemic relief for the Cassville community.

"We're really grateful for the grant," said Sherah Farris, the director at the Haven of the Ozarks. "We're currently working on reaching out to the community.

'We plan to use the money to neuter animals, since the typical cost can be \$160, which can be a lot for some families," Farris explained.

A total of \$300,000 w awarded to 30 CFO affiliate foundations for a combination of specific requests for nonprofit projects and plans to accept future applications and re-grant the funding in their communities.

The grants are made possible by the CFO's partnership with the Coover Charitable Foundation, managed by Commerce Trust Company. The Foundation was created by Julia Dorothy Coover, a longtime Commerce Bank employee, in honor of her late husband. Since its partnership with the CFO began in 2002, the Coover grantmaking program has awarded more than \$7.1 million across the Ozarks.

"One of the primary goals of the Louis L. and Julia Dorothy Coover Charitable Grantmaking program is to be flexible to respond to highpriority needs in our region," said Jill Reynolds, senior vice president at Commerce Trust Company. "The nonprofit community has worked tirelessly over the past year to help residents cope with the wide range of issues created by the pandemic. We are pleased to work with CFO Affiliate leaders who are well positioned to identify local needs and the organizations responding to them."

The Community Foundation of the Ozarks is a regional public charitable foundation established in 1973 that provides asset and resource development, grantmaking and public leadership through a network of donors, 52 affiliate foundations, including the Cassville Community Foundation, and more than 600 nonprofit partners across central and southern Missouri.

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

A Title to Take to Your Grave

Annie Moore and Zach Coenen's state championship performances brought back a lot of memories of my own high school athletic career. Some bittersweet, memories of a tumultuous few weeks that challenged me to the core and helped define who and what I am. Telling this story is difficult, but it is a story that needs to be told.

Running on the Fayetteville High School cross country team was a stressful experience. As the consecutive state championship streak grew and the "dynasty" label stuck, no one wanted to be a part of the team that broke the streak.

When I entered my senior year at Fayetteville, we were in pursuit of a fifth straight

state title. In two previous seasons, I had finished 8th at the state meet twice as the purple Bulldogs won easily.

But there was a lot more than running on my mind.

My father, W.R. Stubblefield, was not well. Dad was 65, having retired the previous May. I was the youngest of his four sons, the second from his second marriage. Dad was 47 when I was born, my mother was 40.

As the season progressed, Dad's health deteriorated. Two weeks before the state cross country meet, he was admitted into the old Fayetteville City Hospital. Can-

He slipped into a coma within a week. I was devastated and unsure of what to do. My mother, who was never a big sports person, sat me down and told me how it was going to be.

"You are going to run Saturday because your father would want you to," she said. "If he dies while you are gone, it's ok. He would understand."

Privately, she and Dad's sister Dorothy feared for my emotional state. They had already concluded that I was in no state to run, much less win. A nagging knee injury had kept me out of the final

regular season meet, and the added emotional burden seemed to them to be more than I could bear. But they didn't want me haunted by regrets if I didn't at least go and try.

It was cold on the golf course that morning in Searcy. There were only four boys races to be run. Girls cross country was still years away in the state of Arkansas. A hilly and challenging course awaited, as did a talented Conway team that was primed for the upset in Class

By design, I sprinted off the line into the lead, forcing the pace up the first big hill. Then after a half mile, I throttled down and let the pack catch up. I ran easily in third place for the next mile, and then moved back in front for the

I struggled near the crest, and teammate Clark Lewis crept past at the summit. We turned right onto the last straightaway with a quarter mile to go.

It was then that I heard my father's voice as clearly as ever say, "Turn it loose."

I shot into the lead and pulled away for the win. I sprinted through the finish chute and looked back to see a parade of Fayetteville runners trailing me. Lewis, second. Keith Striegler, fourth. Charlie Ferguson, fifth, Chuck Smith, seventh. Barry Bramlett, tenth. Our last runner, my good friend Les Ledbetter, placed 11th. He would have been no worse than second for any of the other schools. We scored 19 points in a dominating team perfor-

It was late afternoon when we returned to Fayetteville. Les drove me to the hospital where I took a deep breath before heading down the corridor to Dad's room. There were no cell phones, and I had no idea what awaited me.

Aunt Dorothy came out of Dad's room just as i reached it. She looked at the trophy I held and exclaimed, "You did

She ushered me into the room where Dad was awake for the first time in days after suffering a stroke. He held my trophy with his good hand and whispered, "It's not much for all the work you put into it."

He slipped back into a coma that evening and was never really awake after that. He passed away in the early hours of Wednesday, November 14. We buried him in the old cemetery east of the Methodist church in Elm

Boating & Thunderstorms Don't Mix

Springtime in Missouri means ever-changing weather. In the last month, Missourians have seen thunderstorms as well as clear days in the 70s. When it's warm out, spring is a great time to enjoy Missouri's many lakes and rivers. But, remember that thunderstorms develop quickly this time of year.

When a thunderstorm looms on the horizon, it's time to get ashore. Lightning, torrential rain, and rough waters can turn a pleasurable outing into a life-threatening situation in moments. An unaware boater or fisherman can be taken by surprise, and not realize the danger a thunderstorm brings. Severe conditions can quickly overwhelm smaller craft, resulting in swamping, capsizing, collisions, falls overboard, and other dangerous occurrences. Some thunderstorms can create microbursts-intense downdrafts over an area a half-mile to 2.5 miles wide capable of producing wind gusts from 60 mph to more than 100 mph. Microbursts can capsize a small boat or blow a passenger overboard.

Before leaving the marina or launch ramp, boaters should check their local weather stations for storm warnings and other weathknowing there's a "chance of The Bulldogs would win a thunderstorm" won't necessarily tell a boater when one is headed his or her way.

> Weather fronts typically move in from the west/ southwest, so scan the horizon in that direction periodically for lightning flashes and other signs. Recognizing that a "lowering ceiling"

- flat clouds getting lower and thicker - indicates an approaching storm front. To determine the distance of an approaching storm, count the number of seconds between the flash of lighting and the sound of thunder then divide the number of seconds by five. This will give you a rough idea of the distance in miles. If you notice signs of an approaching storm, immediately head for the nearest boat ramp or dock. These fast-developing thunderstorms are usually short in duration. Never try to outrun the storm in open water.

If you do get caught on the water during a thunderstorm, make sure everyone in the boat is wearing a properly secured life jacket. Have your passengers sit low and in the center of the boat. Then, head for bank of the river or shore of the lake. Make sure all doors, windows, and hatches are closed to reduce the risk of swamping and to keep the bilge free of water. If there is lightning, disconnect all electrical equipment. If you are in a small boat, which could easily capsize or swamp, or if the conditions get too bad, head to shore immediately, beach your boat, and seek shelter.

Weather can be both friend and foe to fishermen and recreational boaters. Staying alert to weather changes and taking appropriate action when necessary goes a long way toward safeguarding both lives and prop-

Remember: Make sure everyone on board is wearing a U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jacket every time you are on the water.

If you experience an emergency or see another boater in danger, dial *55 on your cell phone to reach the nearest troop headquarters. The Missouri State Highway Patrol will respond. We're here to help.

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Life's A Gamble: Thoughts from The Editor

A favorite Dr. Seuss book of mine - undiscovered (by me) until some 15 years ago when my grandson was a tot - is titled "What Was I Scared Of?" I'm not here to discuss discontinued Seuss publications (a decision made volitionally by the publisher), but I would like to spotlight this little jewel of an obscure tale.

Not only did the title resonate with me, but the story did, too. It's the first-person narrative of a little guy who meets up with a pair of empty pale green pants walking down the path towards him at night. Almost needless to say, the young man was frightened.

I can relate. In my lifetime, I've lived with many fears, many of which (I've discovered only fairly recently) were unfounded.

Yes, people die in plane crashes and drown in swimming pools, but to allow a fear of flying and a fear of the water to prevent me from enjoying many activities that I otherwise might have over the years, was unrealistic, I now see.

Some fears were imputed to me by those who were

fearful themselves, sometimes even with the name of God added for emphasis.

It's only recently, I've come to understand that not everything in life can be made a moral imperative to be taken up under a banner of right or wrong. With some things when the health and welfare of others is not at stake - we have liberty to make our own choices. Those choices, ideally, should be based on our individual past, present and anticipated future life and the lives of our loved ones.

Yes, if I take a COVID-19 vaccine, I might croak in four months - as some seem certain could happen - but who's to say the vaccine caused it? I could as easily die from CO-VID-19, just as more than 500,000 people in the nation have done, so far.

Or I could die in a car wreck or a plane crash.

The thing is, life's a gamble and death is certain, from whatever quarter it might come from.

For me to attempt to take away your liberty to take a COVID-19 vaccine would be just as unreasonable as would be my attempt to insist that you take it (unless you work in healthcare, that is).

I have no desire to attempt to make anyone do as I do, although there may have been times it has seemed so.

In the Dr. Seuss book I first referenced, the narrator and the empty pale green pants became friends, an apt resolution for the fear they had both experienced of each

For better or worse - although for better, I suspect - I have taken the first dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine. My only reaction has been a sore left arm - much like the one I remember after having been on the receiving end of a brotherly punch when I was child.

Yes, I was nervous about taking it, but that's just my nature. After coming to terms to a degree with the sky and the water, I realized a vaccination-fear could be just another red herring in my path to prevent me from fully enjoying what remaining life I have left.

This is not my attempt to persuade you to take the vaccination. That's for you to decide. Just don't let other people's prejudices influence you unduly.

City of Cassville Public Works employee, Kenny Schieler, is scheduled to retire at the end of March after 30 years of service to the city.

Public Works director, David Brock, said Schieler began his employment with the Parks Department during a crucial time.

"He was there for the building of the aquatic center, followed by the installation of the greenway trails, one expansion after the other," Brock said.

Schieler, who has worked for the Wastewater Department for the past ten years, liked it so well that he told Brock he wished he'd worked

in that department for his entire 30 years.

On behalf of the city council, city personnel and residents of Cassville, Mayor Bill Shiveley presented Schieler with a proclamation honoring his service at the March 8 city council meeting.

"We administered 650 first doses of Pfizer vaccine during Monday's clinic," Brock said. "The second dose is scheduled for April 5, at another drive-through clinic in the same location."

In the meantime, Brock says, a second-dose clinic for Moderna recipients is scheduled at the health department March 24, followed by two second-dose Pfizer drive-through clinics at City Park Road in Cassville on March 25 and 26. Walk-in, second-dose Pfizer clinics are scheduled to be held at the Monett City Park Casino on March 30 and 31.

"We're not sure when we'll receive more vaccine for first doses yet," Brock said. "We have to finish up all the second-dose vaccinations first before we take another look."

According to Brock, approximately 15 percent of Barry County residents have been vaccinated at this point.

"We accepted an extra allotment of vaccine," he said, "because we believed we'd be able to administer it all, and, so far, we've been successful."

With the opening of Phase 1B - Tier 3, personnel from various infrastructure employment sectors are now eligible for the vaccine.

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Officer involved shooting in **Stone County**

At approximately 10:00 a.m. on March 12, 2021, the Missouri State Highway Patrol, the Stone County Sheriff's Office and the Kimberling City Police Department, responded to an address on Port Holiday Lane 2, in Kimberling City, after a call regarding a possible hostage situation.

After several hours of unsuccessful negotiations, the Missouri State Highway Patrol Troop D SWAT team was requested by the Stone County Sheriff's Office. Upon arrival, members of the SWAT team made verbal and visual contact with a male subject who had a hostage in the apartment with him. While

negotiating with the male suspect, he fired random shots inside the apartment. One trooper discharged his Patrol issued firearm and the suspect sustained a single gunshot wound. The Stone County Coroner responded to the scene and pronounced the suspect deceased.

Members of the Missouri State Highway Patrol's Division of Drug and Crime Control are investigating the incident and the officer involved shooting. Further details cannot be released at this time.

"We provided access to wi-fi in the parking lot of the Cassville campus," she said, "but when students went home, many of them didn't have internet access. A lot of them had to drop classes for that reason."

Bob Dixon said he's heard many favorable comments about GoBEC's provision of fiber optic internet technology in Cassville and other areas in southern Barry Coun-

"GoBEC internet is the crown jewel of Cassville, from what I hear," he said.

Many satisfied customers of GoBEC, present at the meeting, agreed with him.

Dixon was able to take away feedback from Go-BEC board members, most of which related to the prohibitive cost of providing the infrastructure for the fiber network - a gamble Barry Electric was willing to take on, beginning in 2001, when they began their initial investment in a fiber optic network in the Cassville area.

Local veterinarian Dr. David Cupps, a board member of Barry Technologies (doing business as GoBEC), ex-

plained that part of the problem with GoBEC serving a broader area is the unavailability of more federal grant funds to help the defray the

"The FCC holds auctions which give competitors the opportunity to place bids for federal grants to be awarded to service providers," he said. "We had fiber optic infrastructure in place which ran north from Wheaton on Highway 86 and north from LeAnn along Highway 39. Our thought, which made perfect sense, was to run the network across northern Barry County from Highway 86 to Highway 39. However, we didn't receive the FCC grant we bid on, so we had to table the idea."

According to Cupps, a company out of Illinois called Whisper received the funding, but, based on the amount of their bid, he doesn't believe they will be able to provide the service that GoBEC could.

Bob Dixon says it's not always a fair playing field when it comes to FCC grants.

"It's usually the incumbent provider who wins the grants," he said, referencing Windstream, a national company which serves parts of northern Barry County. "Sometimes companies don't follow through with the promises they make in order to receive those grants, so internet accessibility for customers does not improve."

Cupps believes the best way to decrease the digital divide across the nation is for rural electric co-ops to make the jump into fiber optic provision, as Barry Electric did. He realizes it's an expensive proposition, though.

There's only so much we can do without more funding, since Barry Technologies operates as a for-profit business. If we can't make money

by expanding our network, then we can't do it," he said.

He makes clear that Go-BEC's business has not affected rates for members of the Barry Electric Co-op, which uses a separate business model.

"Someday," he said, "I hope to see the internet considered a necessary utility, and its infrastructure subsidized by the government, just as electricity was in the 1930s and 40s, under FDR."

With information collected by Bob Dixon and other members of the national task force, that day may be on the horizon. Just how far away it may be, though, is anyone's

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



MU Extension guide lists first, last frost dates

Spring and fall can be anxious times for gardeners. At the beginning of the growing season, you want to start the garden as early as possible, and at the end you hope for a few extra harvest

An online resource from University of Missouri Extension makes it easier to predict first and last frost dates for your specific region. The Missouri Frost/Freeze Probabilities Guide is available at ipm.missouri.edu/ frostfreezeguide.

"These data can be used for making an informed decision when it comes to planting and assessing climatological risk associated with light, moderate and hard freezes in your region during the spring and fall," said Pat Guinan, climatologist for MU Extension.

The website provides

frost/freeze probabilities, tables, maps and dates using data from the National Center for Environmental Information, based on information collected from 1981 through 2010.

Features of the site include median date point maps, which provide the last spring and first fall median frost/freeze dates for various temperature thresholds, Guinan said. There are median date contour maps and extreme date point maps. These maps are also available as printable high-resolution PDFs. The site also has county-level frost/freeze probability tables based on weather station data.

The guide provides a general representation of frost/freeze probabilities in your region, Guinan says, but users also need to consider local factors that may affect

temperature, such as terrain, elevation and urbanization. "Local anomalies due to microclimates are definitely something to consider when using the guide."

There's about 300 miles between the northern and southern boundaries of Missouri, and the state's growing season can typically run from April to October. Having a guide that separates data by county and regions can help you make informed decisions about when to plant and harvest plants that are sensitive to the cold, Guinan said.

The frost/freeze guide is also available as a printable PDF at extension.missouri. edu/ipm1033.

Save water, save money

Water leaks in your home cost you money. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), small household leaks can add up to gallons of water lost every day. The EPA reminds everyone to check their plumbing fixtures and irrigation systems each year in March during Fix-a-Leak

According to the EPA, household leaks can waste more than 1 trillion gallons of water a year nationwide. For example, a leaky faucet dripping at the rate of one drip per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons per year. That's the amount of water needed to take more than 180 showers. A showerhead leaking at 10 drips per minute wastes more than 500 gallons a year; that's the amount of water it takes to wash 60 loads of dishes in your dishwasher.

The EPA states the average household's leaks can account for nearly 11,000 gallons of water wasted every

year and 10 percent of the homes have leaks that waste 90 gallons or more of water a day. Common types of leaks found in the home include: worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets and other leaking valves. According to the EPA, fixing easily corrected household water leaks can save homeowners about 10 percent on their water bill.

To help consumers find and repair easy-to-fix leaks and to promote conservation, the Missouri Public Service Commission is supporting the EPA's Fix-a-Leak Week, March 15-21, 2021.

"Water is a valuable resource that we need to use wisely," said Public Service Commission Chairman Ryan Silvey. "There are several things that you can do to conserve water which not only helps you save money on your water bill but also helps protect the value of your biggest investment, your home."

Here are some tips to save water:

- Check for leaks. Silent toilet leaks can be found by putting a few drops of food coloring into the tank and seeing if color appears in the bowl before you flush. Don't forget to check irrigation systems and spigots, too.
- Twist and tighten pipe connections.
- Replace the fixture if neces-
- Plug up the sink or use a wash basin if washing dishes by hand.
- Install a water saving showerhead; they use one-third the amount of water that a regular showerhead uses.
- Turn off the tap while shaving or brushing teeth.
- Store drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool.

All of this has a negative impact on the lives of the residents who care about their property not to mention the depreciating value of homes in the affected areas.

Per the Conserve Energy Future articles, here are some serious problems with littering and dumping:

- 1. Litter can contain objects that can harm or cause physical injury to people or ani-
- 2. Littering can encourage the spread of pest species and diseases. The trash can provide the breeding ground for diseases and pass it through animals that eat them. If the trash collects water, it may also harbor mosquitoes that are known to spread dangerous diseases such as West Nile Virus and Zika.
- 3. Litter adversely affects the environment. Be it littering along the road, on the streets or by the litter bins, toxic materials or chemicals in the litter can be blown or washed into rivers, forest lands, oceans, lakes and creeks and eventually pollutes the waterway, forest areas, soils, or aquatic environments.
- 4. Litter can also block drain-

age systems and cause flooding, which requires money for intervention and restora-

5. Plastic litter has often been mistaken for food by both land and marine animals. When consumed by the animals, they reduce stomach capacity since they can't be digested. In the long-term, it affects the animals' eating habits, eventually killing the animal.

6. Littered places just look gross and depreciate the aesthetic value of the surrounding environments. Similarly, it affects local tourism as it makes areas and roadsides look disgusting. The public and tourists also tend to avoid areas that are littered because of health issues and unattractiveness. It also causes visual pollution and affects people's quality of life.

I suggest, as one resolution, for individuals or organizations to "Adopt a Highway" or "Adopt a Neighborhood" to help with litter control. That's been very effective in my previous home.





Rural hospitals eligible for CARES funds

Rural hospitals that suffered from business interruption due to COVID-19 are now eligible to receive reimbursement funds through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, Economic Security (CARES) Act. \$10 million has been allocated for this assistance.

The 62 rural hospitals that provide services to rural and underserved populations are eligible to receive these funds if they can attest that business interruptions resulted in lost revenue between March 1, 2020 and February 28, 2021. Funds reimbursed under this agreement are capped at \$161,290 per hospital.

Rural hospitals impacted by COVID-19 will submit requests for reimbursement which must be approved by the Office of Rural Health and Primary Care within the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS). Hospitals will receive instructions from DHSS on how to apply for these funds. Applications must be submitted for reimbursement by May 31, 2021.
