Morning flash floods impact Roaring River State Park

According to a later post on the park's Facebook page, the campgrounds had been evacuated, water was over the Highway 112 bridge, and more rain was expected.

It shouldn't hurt to be a child

The idea that children are physically and sexually abused is so uncomfortable and upsetting that we (myself included) try not to think about it. By pretending it doesn't happen - at least not here in the area where we live - we hope that in reality it doesn't happen. Until, that is, we're confronted with the latest allegation in a news headline. *Then*, we have to face the glaring possibility that people do abuse children.

Unfortunately, the numbers don't lie. Child abuse occurs,

and it occurs in Barry County.

According to 2020 statistics received from Jeannie Stuart, program manager for Children's Center of Southwest Missouri, 1,000 children were served by the organization during that year.

The Children's Center, a not-for-profit child advocacy center, provides victim assistance services to physically and/or sexually abused children from birth through age 17 at no charge to the victims or their families. Professional medical, legal and law enforcement personnel are

available through the center to serve children in crisis on a 24-hour, on-call basis.

The Children's Center first opened its doors with a Joplin facility in 1997. With community support from both Barry and Lawrence Counties, a Monett facility was added in 2001, followed by two more satellite locations in Nevada and Butler in 2004 and 2009.

Jennifer Humphrey, an officer with the Probation and Parole Office in Cassville, becomes passionate when speaking about The Chil-

dren's Center. As a previous employee of the Children's Division of Family Services, she served as an advocate for children who were served at the center. There, intervening in the course of abuse - and advocating for the children involved - was part of her job description: not a task for the faint of heart.

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"When my job became difficult emotionally," Humphrey said, "I asked myself, 'If I don't do this, who else

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Area schools announce summer school dates

Summer school is receiving a green light again in Barry County school districts.

• The Cassville R-IV School **District** has announced plans for its W.I.L.D. About Learning summer school session. Pre-kindergarten through Eighth Grade students will attend seated classes June 1 - June 30, which will include field trips, swim days at the Cassville Aquatic Center, a science fair and more. Free breakfast and lunch will be provided. Transportation will also be available. Parents can enroll students online; a link to a registration form can be found at https://cassville. k12.mo.us/vnews/display.v/ ART/6058a4ad280c3. per forms are also available, or can be picked up in your child's building-level office. Students currently in the Eighth Grade (incoming freshman) may enroll in oncampus MS Summer School for fun or remediation using

the PreK-8th Grade Form, or can begin earning high school credits by enrolling in high school courses using the high school form. Most of the CHS summer course offerings are online. However, if students choose to complete a seated class, classes will be held on the elementary campus from June 1 - June 30, 7:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m.

- The Wheaton R-III School
 District will offer summer school classes May 24 June
 18. The theme for this year's summer school will be "Habitats," and will include information on topics such rainforests and deserts.
- The Exeter R-VI School District summer school classes will be held May 24 -June 25, from 8 a.m. - 3 p.m., Monday through Friday.
- The Southwest R-V School District plans summer school June 2 June 29. Free breakfast and lunch will be available to students. Bus routes will be modified.

Enrollment will be open for both remediation and acceleration classes if a minimum of 15 students enroll for a particular class.

- The Purdy R-II School District will hold summer school from May 27 - June 24, from 8 a.m. - 3 p.m., for students going into Kindergarten through Sixth Grades. This year's theme will be "Olympics." Free breakfast and lunch will be provided. Modified bus routes will run and will depend on the number of students enrolled. Church's name change garners attention

A new sign beside the road in front of the large church on the west side of Highway 37, just south of Monett, has raised questions for passersby

The church, formerly designated "First Baptist Church of Monett, now bears the name "Waymark," according to the sign.

Did they withdraw from a Baptist affiliation in favor of a more generic name, people wondered?

Tiffany Tallent, Promotions Representative for Waymark, explains.

"Way back when," she said, "when we were raising funds to build the building we are currently in, we called it 'Windows at Waymark,' based on (text found in) Jer-

emiah chapters 30 - 31."

When their fundraising goal was accomplished and the building was completed, Tallent said the church hosted a celebration festival called "Worship at Waymark."

"Waymark played a huge part in our growth," she said. "We want our focus, now, to not only be a family church, but a church for the community to *feel* like a family.

"The book of Jeremiah talks about "Setting up signposts or 'Waymarkers' to mark the trip home," she added. "Waymarkers communicate or direct people to a place: a place pointing to Jesus. As a congregation, our job is to help point people to Jesus, which is how Waymark Church was born."


Tallent says the church is still technically called First Baptist Church of Monett, but the congregation is now doing business as Waymark Church.

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Cassville School Board holds special meeting

Tuesday, Cassville Community Teachers Association (CCTA) representatives met with Dr. Richard Asbill regarding the current fiscal status and plans for the Cassville R-IV District, with a specific look at salary and welfare options for district personnel.

A review of the health insurance benefit cost was evaluated and reviewed. Current expenditure and revenue trends within the district budget were discussed and reviewed, as well as options for salary and hourly wage rates for certified and classified employees. The committee will meet again May 12 to review those options.

After the CCTA meeting,

the Board of Education met to review current employment recommendations.

The Board approved the employment recommendations for:

- Emily Pry, Middle School (Science)
- Angela Burns, Eunice Thomas Elementary - Kindergarten
- Lindsay Halterman, Middle School - PE/Health
- Tyler Wills, High School Principal

The district currently still has position vacancies for MS PE/Health (Boys), MS Social Studies, Elementary Special Education, Middle School Counselor, and building three (3) level aide positions.

\$2.5 million grant to benefit algebra teachers'

In her 16 years teaching algebra, Amy Dwiggins has seen countless students struggle with the seemingly abstract subject.

But the creation of new, online professional development materials at the University of Missouri could help teachers like Dwiggins, who teaches Algebra 2 and Geometry at Macon High School in Macon, Missouri, teach their students more effectively.

"Algebra can be a tough subject to learn if the students don't find it applicable to their daily lives," Dwiggins said. "But we use critical thinking and problemsolving skills all the time, and math is a big part of that. So we, as teachers, need to find creative ways to spark students' interests in a way that makes them more motivated to learn."

With the help of a \$2.5 million grant from the National Science Foundation, Zandra de Araujo, associate professor in the MU College of Education, is creating the online materials with the ultimate goal of improved learning outcomes.

"If we can help students succeed in algebra, which is a major prerequisite to many of the higher math courses, they might have access to a greater variety of careers in science, technology, engineering and math fields later on," de Araujo said. "I often think back to what would have been helpful to me as a former math teacher, so I am passionate about helping teachers build on their strengths and find new strategies for approaching algebra instruction."

The four-year grant will

start with teacher observations in Missouri classrooms where de Araujo can meet with algebra teachers, discuss their strengths and needs, and evaluate the effectiveness of the professional development materials before expanding her outreach to schools nationwide.

"Math is actually a very creative field, but algebra has traditionally been taught in a very dry and procedural way," de Araujo said. "More active and engaging instruction is key. This research will help us not only see the impact different instruction strategies can have on teachers' approach to teaching the subject, but also the effect that can have on student learning outcomes."

Areas of focus to assist algebra teachers include strategies for reviewing homework problems, assigning group work to increase collaboration and embedding interactive questions or other features into online videos to support students learning asynchronously during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"This project is hitting right at the heart of where research and math education needs to be," said Dwiggins, who also serves on the grant's advisory board. "We can't ask our students to be learners, if we as teachers are not striving to learn and improve our practice as well."

Funding for the grant was provided by the National Science Foundation. Coauthors on the grant include Samuel Otten at MU and Amber Candela at the University of Missouri-St. Louis.

Who indeed?

It takes a special group of volunteers to get down in the trenches with the littlest among us: those who cannot (or dare not) speak for themselves

Special or not, those volunteers often face emotional difficulties themselves in their line of work, says Lori Jones, Development Coordinator for The Children's Center.

"While the nature of their work is highly confidential," Jones said, "after a difficult interview or a tough case, the team often turns to each other for support."

Forensic investigations, medical exams, advocacy and trauma therapy are services available through the center for both child victims and their non-offending family members. All services are provided by trained professionals in a child-friendly setting.

Physical exams can be performed on site, precluding the need for a hospital visit. An aspect of the center that Jennifer Humphrey appreciates is its ability to videotape the testimony of victims on site as well.

"This way, kids don't have to repeat their traumatic testimony multiple times to multiple people," she said. "They give it *once*, and it can be used in future court cases, if necessary."

Of the 1,000 children served by The Children's Center (in all four of their facilities) in 2020, 865 victims were interviewed. Of the children served, 622 were female and 657 were the victims of sexual abuse; the ages of the victims were spread evenly across the birth to 18+ age range.

The majority of the alleged abusers was a parent of the victim, followed by another person or relative known to the child.

After a decade of service provision, therapists began to see cases where the abused became the abuser, so, in an effort to stop the generational cycle of abuse, they implemented a trauma-focused therapy program in 2016.

Humphrey said she knows the center is serving its purpose when she sees and hears stories of former victims who later create purposeful lives for themselves. She cited one young lady who is now a school teacher as an example.

Because she's aware of the needs of The Children's Center, Jennifer Humphrey said in the past she organized a drive to provide the items on the wish lists of children served by the center. She felt like it wasn't enough, though.

This year, she organized a fundraiser in conjunction with the Probation and Parole Office, and the BBQ Station and Emmy's Lemonade Stand, in Cassville.

On Wednesday, April 28, from 5 p.m. - 8 p.m., a portion of the proceeds from meals purchased at the BBQ Station will be donated to The Children's Center.

The BBQ Station is located at 900 Main Street, Cassville. They can be reached by telephone at (417) 847-0470.

Emmy's Lemonade Stand will also set up nearby at the same time. Proceeds from their lemonade sales will be donated to the center.

Although The Children's Center receives grant funding for many of their services, they count on donations to fill other needs, such as administrative costs and the price of the toys, snacks, drinks and blankets they donate to every child who enters their doors.





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MDC program to focus on native plants for landscaping

Many people are discovering that when it comes to flowers and shrubs around their homes, plants that are native to this region have a number of advantages over exotic species from other parts of the world.

If you're interested in adding some native beauty to the flowerbeds and gardens around your house, be sure to sign up for the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) virtual program "Top 10 Series: Natives for Landscaping." This free program, which will be May 5 from 2:30-3:30 p.m. is part of a year-long "Top 10" series of programs being put on by the staff of MDC's Shoal Creek Conservation in Joplin. At this program, MDC Administrative Assistant Tim Smith will discuss some of the native plants that are popular choices for flower beds and landscaping strategies. He will explain how, in addition

to providing habitat needs for insects and other animals, native plants are helpful for homeowners because they require less work to main-

HB 429 and HB 430 signed to support Missouri adoptive families and children in foster care

During a ceremony April 22 at the State Capitol, Governor Mike Parson signed HB 429 and HB 430 into law, which both support Missouri adoptive families and children in foster care.

"Every child deserves a family to provide love, support, and a strong foundation," Governor Parson said. "Missourians who take on this role as foster and adoptive parents are invaluable to the children of our state, and I am extremely pleased to sign these bills today."

"I want to thank Representative Kelly, Speaker Vescovo, Senator Koenig, and Senator Rehder for their work to support Missouri's adoptive and foster families, improve the adoption process, and most importantly help foster children reach the permanency they deserve," Governor Parson continued.

HB 429 establishes a clearer path to permanency for foster children by clarifying what constitutes an abandoned child, creating a definite timeline for courts in certain circumstances, and removing barriers for adoptive families in consent adoption cases. Specifically, the legislation allows the Children's Division or juvenile officer to seek termination of parental rights when a child less than two years old has been abandoned for 60 days or a child over two years old has been abandoned for six

The Children's Division or Juvenile Officer may also seek termination of parental rights when a child has been in foster care for 15 of 22 months, which will allow courts to move cases along more quickly and prevent children from getting stuck in foster care. Additionally, HB 429 removes the requirement for prospective adoptive parents to pay the legal fees of a birth parent in consent adoption proceedings while maintaining the court's ability to appoint an attorney to the birth parent as neces-

HB 429 and HB 430 both make several statutory changes to make the adoption process more accessible, including the expansion of an existing adoption tax credit to include the adoption of any child. HB 430 also extends tax credits for maternity homes and adds rape crisis centers to the shelters to which individuals may donate in order to receive a tax

Two free soil tests available for soybean growers

Missouri farmers can submit two free tests to beat the soybean cyst nematode (SCN) by contacting their county University of Missouri Extension center or the SCN Diagnostics laboratory.

Testing soil before planting soybean is vital, says MU

Extension plant pathologist Kaitlyn Bissonnette. SCN is the No. 1 soybean disease in the U.S. and Canada, with yield losses up to 30% per infected acre. Symptoms include stunted growth and yellowing, but yield loss can happen even when there are

no visible symptoms, Bissonnette says.

Sample every three to five years, she says. Bissonnette gives instructions on how to sample at ipm.missouri.edu/IPCM/2021/4/ scnSampling-KB.

SCN quickly began spreading through Missouri in the 1970s and gained a foothold in most of the state's soybean-growing counties by the 1990s. SCN is easily transported in soil; cysts and eggs spread via equipment, water or wind.

United Soybean Board

checkoff dollars fund up to two free tests for Missouri farmers as part of SCN Coalition efforts to raise awareness of SCN. The SCN Coalition is a public-private partnership of university researchers, extension specialists and industry representatives.

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

If you checked your mailbox last week, you may have noticed a large postcard with the headline, "Thank your lawmaker for standing up for Missouri taxpayers and saving our state budget".

Such a piece of extraneous mail would normally be dropped directly in the round file, but this one caught my interest for a number of reasons, and I did call my Representative of the 158th district in the hopes of getting his perspective. But first, I was curious to find out more about the organization that sent this message to my mailbox - Americans For Prosperity Missouri - and why they want me to thank my lawmaker for denying funding for the Medicaid expansion Missourians voted for in August.

Americans for Prosperity is a social welfare charity founded by Charles Koch and his late brother, David. These are the famously wealthy Koch brothers of Koch Industries based in Wichita, Kansas. Their personal income interests include petroleum, chemical technology, paper, ranching, finance commodities, trading and investing. It seems the financial interests of the Kochs are broad and lucrative, but healthcare is not among their monetary interests. So, why is the charity - Americans for Prosperity - spending money to campaign against using tax dollars to provide health insurance for low-income Missourians?

The values expressed on the Americans for Prosperity

website indicate this social welfare charity is - somewhat ironically - a promoter of the 'pull yourself up by your bootstraps' philosophy. "What unites us is a steadfast belief in the power of the individual. We join together to tackle our country's biggest challenges, and we're committed to working with anyone to get good things done."

I cannot help but be perplexed by the obvious internal contradiction, and vagueness of this statement. It's somewhat laughable that the promotion of the power of the individual requires a group collaboration, a charity no less. They are 'united' by their belief in the power of the 'individual'. They 'join together' and they commit to 'working with' anyone to get 'good things' done.

What are these vague 'good things'? I think it's safe to infer from clues in both the name of the charity and the message of the mission statement. The 'good' is prosperity for the powerful individual.

This is one of the strangest charities I have ever heard of. It's not a charity for the down-trodden, the less fortunate, those lacking quality education or life's essentials, the victims of disaster, the disabled, the sick, the hungry. It is a charity formed for the purpose of promoting laws and public policies that make it easier for the powerful individual to prosper. It is a conservative think tank that works with other conservative think tanks with similar motivation - smaller government, less government oversight, a free market economy.

The arguments Americans for Prosperity make against Medicaid expansion in their literature, Facebook page and website, are mostly supported by references to reports compiled by other conservative think tanks such as The Foundation for Government Accountability, based in Naples, Florida, and the Kansas Policy Institute, a splinter group of the Charles Koch Foundation. This obvious bias lends little legitimacy to their criticism of Medicaid.

Americans for Prosperity is currently the Koch brothers' primary political advocacy group. The current mission statement is: "To mobilize citizens to advocate for policies that cut red tape and increase opportunity, put the brakes on government overspending, and get the economy working for hard workers - not special interests." It is clever for the Koch's to use their taxexempt charity to educate and enlist the aid of regular citizens to support policies for the Koch's own special interests, making money and keeping more of the money they make through low to no taxes for corporations.

The blocking of Medicaid expansion is not the ultimate goal for Americans for Prosperity and other free market organizations. It is just one step to reach the ultimate goal - an entirely free market economy with no government oversight. Which would also mean free market healthcare with no government oversight. What would healthcare look like in a purely capitalist free market economy? A patient would be free to shop for the best prices in medical care and medicine, and research the safety and efficacy of medi-

cine and medical treatments. Shopping around for the best price on a colonoscopy, and researching the quality of various medicines sounds more like a burden to me than a freedom. I truly do not have time for that. I need someone to do that for me someone who is not trying to sell me something.

Worse than all that - unlimited profits from medicine and medical care is an inherent conflict of interest.

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than keeping people healthy. If someone has a patent on a life saving remedy, they can charge huge amounts to the people who need it to live - a form of extortion. Unregulated capitalism is wrong for

health care. Those who know me, know that I've been speaking on the ethical conflict of healthcare and capitalism from the soap box for decades. Capitalism is well suited for some things such as transportation. Those without a lot of resources may walk or ride the bus or buy a used Chevette. Those with a lot of resources can hire a driver for their SUV limo, or cruise on their yacht, or fly on their jet plane. Healthcare is a different matter. In a purely capitalist free market economy, those with a lot of resources can afford the best of care, and those without a lot of resources will struggle for good health, go bankrupt in an emergency medical situation, or simply die a premature death from a treatable condition.

The burdens of poor health limit us from our potential as individuals and as a population. Our charity should not be for the strong individual, our charity should be for a strong and healthy society. Good health and healthcare for everyone is good for everyone.

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



The water is up just a bit; the level is 89 CFS(cubic feet per second). This is not high; actually, this is a normal level for this time of the year.

The dry fly fishing has been getting better. With the warmer days coming, we are going to see a lot more ants around, and trout love ants. And, soon, we will be fishing beetles every day.

The best hatches at the moment are Caddis and Blue Wing Olives. There are midges that hatch off each day. On the cloudy days, it is usually the Blue Wing Olives that hatch the heaviest; on the sunny days, we see more caddis. Midges hatch regardless of weather, it seems.

Most of the dry flies we

are fishing right now are #16s and smaller; with Blue Wing Olives, we fish sometimes as small as #22s.

We're still seeing a few dark caddis, and I've seen the occasional light-colored midge; I usually imitate them with a #22 cluster midge.

San Juan worms were really good this week; red seemed to be the most popular color, but pink was working pretty well also.

Nymphs, sow bugs, pheasant tails and copper johns were best this week; we were fishing these in #16s and #18s with a #4 shot placed about 8" above the nymph and fished 2 - 3 feet deep under an indicator.

Black, olive and brown woolly-buggers were still

good this week. I think black worked a bit better early in the morning, and olive seemed to work best in the late morning and afternoon.

Mop flies in cream and orange were good all week, as were yellow and orange globalls; I like the ones with a red dot.

Chamois worms always work and they didn't disappoint this week either; with all the fish being cleaned in the river, the white chamois worm works very well, trout feed very heavily on the guts that are thrown into the water.

Red/white, orange/white, white, and tan jigs work for the same reason. The trout are feeding on the trout carcasses thrown in the river, so these colors really attract the trout. Olive RR specials and black/yellow jigs were the ticket for a lot of the spin-fisherman this week; black was pretty good also.

Spinners, as usual, work very well for 30 minutes

Cassville man lands fish stocked at Table Rock in 1970s.

Joe Richter had a hunch Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) biologists would be interested in the small metal ring attached to the jaw of the paddlefish he had snagged, but he didn't know the interesting story Tag S-777 revealed about successful paddlefish management at Table Rock Lake.

When Richter landed his 57-pound paddlefish on Table Rock's James River arm in March and saw the tag, the Cassville resident recalled hearing about a paddlefish tagging program MDC conducted several years ago. His efforts to report his tag connected him with MDC paddlefish biologist Trish Yasger and that's when things got interesting.

"She was excited about me catching a tagged fish and thanked me for calling," Richter said. "She took all my information. Then a couple of days later, she called back."

The reason for the callback was that Yasger and

MDC Fisheries Biologist Sara Tripp had a list of the 8,970 tags that were put on paddlefish in MDC's 2015-2019 tagging project. And Richter's tag number wasn't on that list

Winter-hardy perennial flowers likely will survive April's historic low temperatures across Missouri, said University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein.

Their tender annual counterparts, however, may not be so lucky.

MU Extension horticulturists across the state answered numerous calls from concerned gardeners about freeze damage to their flowers and flowering shrubs as temperatures dropped into the 20s.

Perennials, even those in tight bud stage, likely will face minimal damage, Trinklein said. His callers included someone who feared losing a peony planting that has been in the family for more than 140 years.

Trinklein explained that peonies and other spring perennial favorites have survived other extreme weather events through the years and likely will survive this one.

Annual flowers that bloom only one season are

more likely to fall victim to extreme temperatures. Annuals come in three classes: hardy, half-hardy and tender.

Hardy annuals, such as pansies, violas and snap-dragons, will bounce back to brighten spring flower beds despite the cold weather.

Half-hardy plants, such as petunias, can tolerate light frosts but might not fare so well when temperatures drop to the 20s. Tender annuals usually die when plant tissue freezes, causing them to turn watery and mushy.

Potted plants face greater risk of damage than those planted in the ground and will survive better when brought inside the house or garage until temperatures rise and danger of frost passes.

In the vegetable garden, cabbages, broccoli, Brussels sprouts and kale likely will survive. Popular tender vegetables such as tomato and pepper are common casualties of cold.

Check the crown (growing points) of flowers and vegetables for damage, Trin-

klein said. Plants that still have a living growing point should recover but may be weakened. If this is the case, gardeners need to decide whether to replant or wait for plants to recover.

Many fruit trees and small fruit plants were likely damaged by the frost, but the extent of the damage depends on stage of bloom, said Michele Warmund, MU Extension horticulturist.

Pollinated fruits are less susceptible to frost injury, she said. Plants in low-lying areas face the most risk, so consider site selection.

Check flowering bushes and fruit trees by cutting a branch, taking it inside and putting it a container with cut ends of stems in water for a few days. Floral parts that are cold-injured will soon turn brown and wither, Warmund said.

After a freeze, do not apply nitrogen fertilizer to damaged fruit trees or bushes, she said. Additional nitrogen only creates more vegetative growth. Continue to water bushes and trees and watch

for disease signs such as cankers. Warmund said it is important to closely monitor for signs of disease. If needed, follow MU Extension's fruit spray schedule at extension.missouri.edu/g6010. For more information, see "Ice and Freeze Damage to Ornamental Trees: Implications and Remedies" at extension. missouri.edu/xr1.

Avoid future frost damage by covering plants with reusable row cover cloth and be patient when planting. "The best way to avoid frost damage is to plant at recommended times after the danger of frost passes," Trinklein said.

Trinklein said that frost/ freeze dates are averages to serve as a guide but are not fail-proof.

Steer feedout calves accepted until May 10

The 2021 Missouri Steer Feedout for calves born after July 1 to October 31 are being accepted until May 10. The gathering and delivery to the Tri-County Steer Carcass Futurity in southwest Iowa will be June 1. Calves should be weaned before May 1, preferably by April 15.

The Feedout gives cow-calf raisers a chance to learn the strengths of their breeding and management program. Knowledge gained from seeing how their steers perform in the feedlot and on the rail can be used to make future marketing decisions.

Since the average Missouri beef cow operation only runs about 40 cows, the Feedout only required 5 steers to be entered. There is no upper limit, but the greater the numbers, the better the accuracy of the evaluation of the breeding program. The gain, feed-to-gain and carcass results will allow you to compare how your steers stack up against other Missouri cattle.

Participants in past Steer Feedouts have been surprised when the program concludes how much difference there is between steers out of the same bull and same management perform. Larger herds often enter sire groups of four or six steers per sire.

The entry fee of \$20 per steer is payable on May 10. No other charges are necessary until all steers have been killed. The feed and other expenses will be deducted from the proceeds of the carcass sale. Another perk of the Feedout is the opportunity to receive a \$400 per head cash advance once the cattle are processed in Iowa. The advance is only given when ten or more head are entered by the participant.

Eldon Cole, University of Missouri Extension field specialist in livestock at Mt. Vernon works with the Feedout. He says retaining ownership of cattle until slaughter is a risk and he won't guarantee you'll make money. He will guarantee you'll learn a lot about whether you have cattle that deserve a premium from an order buyer.

Normally, the cattle are loaded at Joplin Regional Stockyards, Carthage and Paris Veterinary Clinic, Paris. Other loadouts will be arranged based on entries by May 10.

In recognition of the Missouri Bicentennial, University of Missouri Extension will extend this year's Century Farm application deadline to June 1.

"With our partners the Missouri Farm Bureau(opens in new window) and the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources(opens in new window), we want to be sure every eligible farm family has an opportunity to apply in this special year as we celebrate Missouri's 200th year of statehood," said Marshall Stewart, MU vice chancellor for extension and engagement.

To qualify, the same family must have owned the farm for 100 consecutive years. The current owner must be the children, grandchildren, siblings, nephews or nieces including through marriage or adoption — of the original settler.

This year, a special one-

time recognition will also be given to Missouri Founding Farms, properties that have been in the same family for 200 or more consecutive vears.

"Family farms are the cornerstone of our rural way of life," said Missouri Farm Bureau President Garrett Hawkins. "One family farming the same ground for over 200 years requires determination, hard work and a love for the place you live. We are proud to honor the families who operate Founding Farms and thank them for their dedication to the rich history of Missouri."

Since the Missouri Century Farms program began in 1976, more than 8,000 Missouri farms have received the Century Farm designation. Owners of properties in the Century Farm database identified as eligible Founding Farms will be contacted directly by MU Extension about this one-time recogni-

Christopher Daubert, vice chancellor and dean of the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, encourages all who are eligible to apply to the Century Farm program during this year of special recognition for farms that have been in families throughout the state's 200-year history.

or so each morning. Black, skunk, brown and green were the best colors all week. Fish them slow and deep for your best results.

The water is very clear at the moment. Use 2-lb. green tinted line; this will work all day. Try to avoid bright green, red, yellow, white, blue or camo lines. They will only work when the water is very murky.

For fly-fishing right now, use 9' 6X leaders for nymphs and 9'7X leaders for dry flies; you can use 9' 5X early if you are fishing woolly-buggers or larger streamers.

It looks like there's some rain moving into the area; if this happens, you can use the same flies, but you'll need to add extra weight to your leader; you'll sometimes need a couple of #4 spit-shot on your leader to help it stay down where the trout are hiding. Dry flies don't work great if the water gets high and dirty, but nymphs, globalls, San Juan worms and bigger streamers will catch trout very well.

Power bait 1" cheesecrawlers were very effective

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

this week; there are lots of limits on these baits. Orange power bait worms were working, as were the pink power bait worms. A lot of people were doing well with pink power-bait eggs, and with white power-bait eggs.

Power-baits are king when the water comes up; we will use more weight and bigger hooks, and fish with powerbait right on the bottom of the river. Remember, only plastic power-bait is legal in Zone 1; any power-bait can be used in Zone 3; and Zone 2 is flies only (no plastic baits of any kind - no squirmy

For a chance to show off your ride and drink coffee with like-minded auto enthusiasts, mark your calendars for Saturday morning, May 15, 8 - 11 a.m.

In a social gathering called Cassville Cars & Coffee, vehicles owners and the general public are invited to gather in the parking lot of the Aquatic Center in Cassville.

"It's strictly a community social event," organizer James Crim, of Cassville, said. "There's no charge to bring your vehicle, and there will be no prizes handed out. It's just a great opportunity to show off whatever vehicle you might be proud of."

Crim said he got the idea for the planned monthly gathering from a friend in Tennessee who hosts a similar event.

The crew from Emmy's Lemonade Stand will be on site to sell coffee.

Crim said Cars & Coffee plans to gather the third Saturday morning of every month until winter sets in.

"Bring whatever kind of vehicle you're proud of," Crim said, "whether it's a car, truck, motorcycle, or even a camper."

"Sara told me our tag numbers are five digits long. I assumed that I had made a mistake in recording his information, so I called him to get the correct number," Yasger said. "He told me, no, the number was 777 and there was an S in front of the number. I knew that wasn't a tag from our current project."

The still-legible words "Cons. Dept." on the tag's pitted surface showed this was an MDC tag and indicated this tag could have been the work of former MDC Fisheries Biologist Kim Graham, who tagged many paddlefish in the 1980s and early '90s.

"I had very little tag information from Table Rock, so I reached out to (MDC Table Rock Fisheries Biologist) Shane Bush in the hopes that he had some old records,"

Yasger said. "Luckily, I found what we needed."

Bush's search through old records revealed Graham had placed Tag S-777 on a paddlefish at Table Rock in March, 1990. The size Graham recorded for that fish – 49 pounds, 40 inches in length – made Richter's catch even more interesting. Those dimensions indicated this fish had been part of MDC's initial stockings of 84,159 paddlefish fingerlings into Table Rock in the 1970s.

MDC's paddlefish stocking at Table Rock that took place from 1972-77 was part of the agency's strategy to maintain this unique fishing opportunity in Missouri. MDC biologists knew the construction of Harry S. Truman Dam in the early 1970s would block the paddle-

fish spawning migrations that occurred annually out of Lake of the Ozarks and would flood the paddlefish's spawning grounds on the Osage River near Osceola. If "spoonbill" snagging was to continue in Missouri, the state's paddlefish population would have to be sustained from fish raised at MDC hatcheries.

It was speculated that, if a paddlefish population could be established at Table Rock through stockings of hatchery-raised fish, it would provide clear evidence that MDC could maintain paddlefish numbers at Lake of the Ozarks and Truman through annual stockings, as well. These efforts would also create a paddlefish snagging opportunity at Table Rock.

"Shane and I talked and,

after looking at the stocking records and based on the size of this fish when it was tagged in March of 1990, we determined it had to be from the original stocking of 1972-77," Yasger said. "That makes the fish 44-49 years old when Joe Richter harvested it." In addition to being a unique find, Yasger said this is a good indicator that MDC's paddlefish management methods are working.

"Paddlefish at Table Rock – actually at all three reservoirs (Table Rock, Lake of the Ozarks, Truman) – are thriving," she said. "They have good growth rates, are healthy, and are in good condition." Today, Table Rock receives paddlefish stockings

in most years. (Natural reproduction of paddlefish has been recorded in some areas of the state, but the bulk of Missouri's paddlefish population is maintained through hatchery-raised fish.)

Richter's tag reporting had meaning to Yasger that went beyond growth rates and stocking numbers. She worked with Graham in her early years with MDC and has great respect for the now-deceased biologist.

"Kim Graham and the other biologists before us laid the groundwork for paddlefish management in Missouri," she said. "Thanks to all of their work, we have a thriving paddlefish population in our reservoirs for

snaggers to enjoy today. I was fortunate to work with Kim on paddlefish before he retired. It is special to me to know that fish he tagged are still out there and occasionally, we get tags from his work that allow us to learn more about these amazing fish."

She said Missouri's paddlefish snaggers also deserve credit for the state's spoonbill success.

"Thanks to all the snaggers for reporting their tagged fish," she said. "We owe a lot to the snaggers for working with us and reporting their tagged fish. We work together to learn and to keep snagging great in Missouri."
