# Twenty Years Later: Local Firefighters Keep The Memory Alive

"For me, it's about keeping the memory," said Travis Littler, of the Cassville Fire Protection District, in reference to the ninth annual 9/11 Springfield Area Memorial Stair Climb, an event that expects hundreds of attendees for the twentieth anniversary of the September 11, 2001, attacks on the World Trade Center Towers in New York

Several local firefighters, such as Littler, attend the memorial every year, and Sunday, September 12, will mark Littler's seventh climb.

"Three hundred, fortythree [members of the New York Fire Department] died," Littler continued. "All their families and friends had to deal with their loss of life."


Littler is a training officer in Cassville, and a full-time firefighter in Bentonville, Ar-

"The crazy thing to me is now we have adults and teenagers who weren't even born yet in 2001, so we just keep that memory alive," he said.

Each year, children, adults, firefighters in full gear, military, law enforcement, EMS, and many others climb the stairs of Plaster Stadium at MSU enough times to equal the 110 stories the Twin Towers had. In 2020, the stair climb went virtual, and had over 250 participants. However, this year, organizers are excited to return to an in-person event.

The 2021 9/11 Springfield Area Memorial Stair Climb will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday, September 12, at Plaster Stadium, 1015 East Grand Street, Springfield, on the Missouri State University campus.

St. Jude's is strictly paid for by donations, so when a kid gets sick, their parents don't have to pay for it. They can focus on getting that kid healthy again. A lot of those types of non-profit organizations, their money ends up in somebody's pocket, but this provides an actual service, this goes directly to them. As a parent, it would take away a lot if you have to worry about the bills when

# **Balloon-release planned** in memory of suicide victims

September is "Suicide Prevention Month." In memory of suicide victims, Senior Life Solutions, in conjunction with personnel from area hospitals, will host a Suicide Awareness Balloon Release at 2 p.m., September 16, in the parking lot near the main entrance of Mercy Hospital in Cassville.

Karen George, the Program Nurse/Program Director for Senior Life Solutions, says the event will be open for public participation this

"Suicide is something that affects the entire community," she said. "Friends and family members of anyone who has taken his or her own life are invited to participate in the balloon release if they wish. We will hand out helium-filled balloons for participants to write a message on if they'd like, maybe something like, 'I love you,' or, 'I miss you.' And, if they want to, they will be given the opportunity to share a memory of their loved one.

"Residents are welcome to attend, whether they participate in the balloon release or not," George emphasized.

A Suicide Awareness Walk will also be hosted by Senior Life Solutions on September 30 at 2 p.m. Those who wish to participate may gather in the parking lot near the front entrance of Mercy Hospital

in Cassville for a short suicide awareness presentation, followed by a walk.

According to George, the number of people who have taken their own lives has risen dramatically since the beginning of the COVID pandemic over a year ago.

"Isolation and loneliness are a huge part of the problem," George said, "especially among the elderly who have been denied visits from friends and family members while living in nursing homes. Even though keeping them isolated was for their physical well-being, their mental health suffered."

"Elderly residents often don't have access to information, nor the ability to research information, about COVID-19 and its repercussions, George said," and they typically react in one of two ways to what they've been told: either succumb to paralyzing fear, or take up an attitude of defiance, such as an elderly nursing home resident with profound dementia who knew enough to say, 'I'm tired of this #\*#.""

According to George, elderly people are remarkably successful at committing suicide if they decide to do so.

"In most cases, it's been well premeditated," she said.

According to a 2019 data report from the Center for Disease Control (CDC), suicide was the ninth leading cause of death in Missouri for that year: third for ages 10 - 24, second for ages 25 - 34, fourth for ages 35 - 54, eighth for ages 55 - 64, and 17th for

ages 65 and older.

The Barry County Health Department and Office of Emergency Management reported an increase of 99 new cases of COVID-19, of 681 tests administered, between August 26 and September 1.

Two more deaths were also reported, bringing the total number of COVID-related deaths to 71 in Barry County since the counting period be-

As of September 1, 146 people in Barry County were in isolation with active cases of COVID-19, 250 were quarantined, three were hospitalized and 3,961 had recovered.

Admission for adults is \$10 each; admission for children is \$5 each.





# Crowder, MSU expand teacher education program

# Barry County producers may be eligible for disaster relief

The USDA administrator designated Arkansas counties as primary agricultural disaster areas making certain farmers and other agricultural producers in primary and contiguous counties eligible for low-interest emergency loans from USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA).

Missouri counties were designated as contiguous natural disaster areas due to damages and losses caused by excessive rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, and lightning, which started April 1, 2021 and ended June 11, 2021.

Producers in contiguous counties may be eligible for programs based on this designation. The counties are Barry and McDonald.

All counties listed above were designated disaster

areas on August 12, 2021, making all qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for low interest emergency (EM) loans from FSA, provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of declaration to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment abil-

Loans for physical losses must be used to replace or repair damage to buildings, fences or to compensate the farmer for losses of basic livestock, stored crops, or supplies on hand, equipment, etc., that was lost due to the disaster. Loans for production losses may also be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to make payments on real estate or chattel

Generally, loans for production losses cannot be approved until crops have completed their production cycle or have been harvested.

In order to qualify, a farmer must have suffered a 30% loss in production or an actual physical loss that was essential to the successful operation of the farm.





Football trivia: on a night filled with worsts and firsts, the most glaring statistic hung on the scoreboard. Back in 2014, Cassville shut out McDonald County, 35-0, in week 4, then were blanked by Lamar the following week, 49-0. On Friday night, the Wildcats saw history repeat itself, as they lost to Marshfield, 35-0, one week after shutting out Mt. Vernon, 27-0

This was the worst pointdifferential loss for the Wildcats since the 49-28 loss to Odessa in the 2019 Class 3 championship game.

But the shutout was the story. Since 2010, Cassville had been held scoreless only five times going into this season. Four of those came at the hands of the Lamar juggernaut.

Now, two weeks into the 2021 season, Cassville's young and inexperienced team is in search of an identity

Give the Blue Jays their due. On Friday night, they were the better team. You expected their left-coast offense to put up some points. But the dominating defensive performance was a shock for the black and gold.

East Newton's win over Mt. Vernon shone a new light on Cassville's week 1 victory.

This first road trip for the Wildcats was a learning experience.

**GAME SUMMARY** 

After Bull ran for a 47-yard touchdown on the game's first possession, the Wildcats struggled to move the chains and were limited on offense by poor field position. That 7-0 deficit could have been worse. Marshfield missed a chip shot field goal, and then Jake Anthonysz intercepted Bull at the Cassville one-yard line to prevent another score.

At the start of the second quarter, Hernan Hernandez fielded a punt and was tackled at his own 5-yard line. Three plays later, his punt bounced out of bounds at the Cassville 30-yard line.

Marshfield took advantage of the short field, scoring in just four plays. Bull rambled into the end zone on first-and-goal as the Blue Jays extended the lead to 14-0 with 5:03 left in the first half.

The Wildcats drove to midfield, where they face







# Missouri Steer Feedout accepting entries

Entries will be accepted through Oct. 10 for the next Missouri Steer Feedout, with weigh-in on Nov. 2, says University of Missouri Extension livestock specialist Eldon

An entry consists of five or more head of steers born after Jan. 1, 2021. At delivery they should be weaned at least 45 days, weigh over 500 pounds, be dehorned, castrated and healed, and have had two rounds of modified live vaccines.

The Missouri Steer Feedout started in 1981 at a small feedlot in Dade County near Lockwood. Since then, 369 farms have entered 7,908 head of steers, says Cole. Partners include MU Extension, Southwest Missouri Cattlemen's Association, Missouri Department of Agriculture and Tri-County Steer Carcass Futurity in

The pickup locations are in northeastern Missouri at the Paris Veterinary Clinic in Monroe County and in southwestern Missouri at Joplin Regional Stockyards near Carthage. Following weigh-in, Missouri Department of Agriculture graders evaluate and price steers. Pricing helps at the end of the feedout when profitability is calculated, says Cole.

After the weigh-in, the steers are sent to a feedlot in southwestern Iowa as part of the Tri-County Steer Carcass

Futurity (TCSCF). Complete carcass data is gathered at a Tyson Foods plant in Dakota City, Nebraska.

TCSCF officials combine the set-in price, feedlot performance and carcass value to find out which steers were the most profitable during the finishing phase. This helps participants make decisions about breeding stock and whether to retain ownership, says Cole.

Many consignors participate numerous times while others enter only once, he

Consignors at Joplin Regional Stockyards also gain valuable insight into what market officials, order buyers and others in the beef industry think of their feeders through a feeder panel grading and audience participation, Cole says.

The feedout is part of Southwest Missouri Cattlemen's monthly educational

Cole says the feedout offers consignors other perks.

The only upfront money required is a \$20 per head entry fee payable by Oct. 10. There are no periodic feed bills, as all expenses are deducted



The water came up a bit Saturday night. It went from 20 CFS, to 25 CFS, but it wasn't enough to even make a difference. All the rain did was fill the river full of ants, beetles, little caterpillars and hoppers that were in the trees and bushes along the river. It should really make the fishing better.

With the water still low and clear, the use of a good two-pound line in either clear, like fluorocarbon, or a good moss-green line, like maxima or gamma, will work

If you are fly-fishing, nine to 12-foot leaders will work best, with the tippet either 7X or 6X. I wouldn't fish heavier than 6X, unless you are fishing a big streamer.

Beetles, ants, hoppers, stimulators, cracklebacks, griffith's gnats, adams, caddis, and blue-wing olives are good drys to fish right now.

If you are going to fish nymphs, it's hard to beat a pheasant-tail, or a copperjohn, but lots of fish are being caught on San Juan worms, mop-flies, glo-balls, and on white thread jigs.

Most people are fishing with small indicators, and

one small #6 shot about a foot above the fly. They are fishing probably one inch to three inches under the indicator. You will need to adjust your fly-depth every time you move, or almost every

Black, olive and dark brown woolly-buggers have worked well in the morning.

Inline spinners (roostertail type) also work well early in the morning. Black, brown, white, and fire-tiger have been good colors.

Marabou jigs will catch fish all day long, and olive, black/ yellow and white have been working very well the past few weeks.

If you are fishing powerbait, white eggs are working well; orange eggs are working pretty well also.

Power-bait worms, cheeseyellow and orange peel are all working well.

The one-inch cheese crawlers are still working great; the brown one-inch crawlers are still working well, but pink has been so-so.

A few fish are still being caught on the little rebel weecraws, and on the small rapala minnows.



# Patrol Provides Synopsis Of Some New Laws Related To Crime & Traffic Safety

The abbreviated descriptions below are intended to make the public aware of some of the new legislation enacted by the Missouri General Assembly which is related to crime and motor vehicles. The listed legislation has been signed into law. Unless otherwise noted, these laws will go into effect August 28, 2020. The Patrol wishes to make the public aware of several of these new laws or changes to increase public awareness and education. For a complete description of these newly enacted laws, visit the Missouri House of Representatives or Missouri Senate websites.

#### HB 1682

MEDICAL <u>MARIJUANA</u> EDIBLES (Section 195.805 RSMo.)

This act prohibits the sale of edible marijuana-infused products, packaging, or logos in the shape of a human, animal, or fruit, but geometric shapes shall be permitted. Each package, or packages within a package, containing 10 or more milligrams tetrahydrocannabinols (THC) shall be stamped with a universal symbol and the amount of THC, as described in the act.

Any medical marijuana licensed or certified entity regulated by the Department of Health and Senior Services found to have violated this provision shall be subject to sanctions, including an administrative penalty. The department shall promulgate rules regarding prohibiting marijuana-infused products designed to appeal to persons under 18 years of age, as well as developing a process by which a licensed or certified entity may seek approval of a product design, package, or label prior to manufacture or sale to determine compliance with these provisions.

#### HB 1896

DRUG TRAFFICKING (Sections 579.065 and 579.068 RSMo.)

This act adds to the offense of trafficking drugs in the first degree knowingly distributing, delivering, manufacturing, or producing or attempting to distribute, deliver, manufacture, or produce more than 10 milligrams of fentanyl or any derivative thereof, or any mixture or substance containing more than 10 milligrams of fentanyl or carfentanil, as a Class B felony and a Class A felony when the amount is 20 milligrams or more. Additionally, trafficking in the first degree of one or more

grams of flunitrazepam or any amount of gammahydroxybutyric acid for the first offense shall be a Class B felony and a Class A felony for any second or subsequent offense.

This act adds to the offense of trafficking drugs in the second degree knowingly possessing or having under one's control, purchasing or attempting to purchase, or bringing into the state more than 10 milligrams of fentanyl or any derivative thereof, or any mixture or substance containing a detectable amount of fentanyl or carfentanil as a Class C felony and a Class B felony when the amount is 20 milligrams or more. Additionally, trafficking in the second degree of less than one gram of flunitrazepam shall be a Class C felony for the first offense and a Class B felony for any second or subsequent offense.

Finally, this act modifies current law for the Class B felony offense of trafficking of drugs in the first degree and the Class C felony offense of trafficking drugs in the second degree by removing the ceiling of the ranges of grams or milligrams of various controlled substances, including heroin, cocaine, LSD, PCP,

phencyclidine, marijuana, and amphetamines methamphetamines.

#### HB 1963

COMPOSITION OF OFF-**HIGHWAY VEHICLES** (Sections 300.010, 301.010, 407.815, 407.1025, 577.001 RSMo.)

This act provides that in addition to the other requirements specified in the definition, a vehicle need only meet the seating and handlebar requirements "or" the maximum width requirement to meet the definition of "all-terrain vehicle," and specifies that the width shall be measured from the outsides of the tire rims. These definitions are also modified to specify a maximum weight of 1,500 pounds rather than 600 pounds or rather than 1,000 pounds.

The act modifies the definition of "recreational offhighway vehicle" by specifying a maximum width of 80 inches, rather than 67 inches. The act provides that the width shall be measured from the outsides of the tire rims, and specifies a maximum unladen dry weight of 3,500 pounds rather than 2,000 pounds.

The definition of "utility vehicle" is modified to specify a maximum width of 80 inches, rather than 67 inches. The act also provides that the width shall be measured from the outsides of the tire rims, and specifies a maximum unladen dry weight of 3,500 pounds rather than 2,000 pounds.

TRANSFER TOR VEHICLES (Sections 301.010, 301.140, 301.190, 301.210, 301.213, 301.280,

and 301.560 RSMo.) The act modifies the definition of "owner" of a vehicle to include a person who has executed a buyer's order or retail installment sales contract with a licensed motor vehicle dealer when there is an immediate right for the buyer to possess the vehicle.

Operation of a motor vehicle with temporary license plates or license plates transferred from a trade-in shall be legal for no more than 60 days when a dealer sells the vehicle with an agreement for the delayed transfer of title as provided in the act.

Vehicle owners obtaining a vehicle as specified in the act shall apply for a certificate of title within 30 days of receiving title from the dealer.

A vehicle transfer shall be 'presumed" fraudulent and void unless the vehicle's title is assigned and passed to the buyer at the time of transfer,

or unless the parties have agreed to delayed delivery of title as provided in the act.

The act specifies that licensed motor vehicle dealers may deliver a motor vehicle or trailer to a purchaser with a written agreement to pass the certificate of ownership with an assignment to the purchaser within 30 days after delivery. The agreement shall be in a form prescribed by the Director of the Department of Revenue, shall provide that if the dealer does not pass the assigned certificate of ownership to the purchaser within 30 days, the purchase shall be voidable at the purchaser's option, and the dealer shall re-purchase the vehicle as provided in the

#### **MOTOR VEHICLE REGIS-**TRATION PERIODS (Section 301.030 RSMo.)

This act specifies that fees for the renewal of noncommercial motor vehicle registrations shall be payable no later than the last day of the month that follows the final month of the expired registration period. No renewal penalty shall be assessed, and no violation for expired registration shall be issued, until the second month that follows the expired registration period.

## FLEET VEHICLE REGIS-TRATIONS (Section 301.032

This act provides that the registration for fleet vehicles shall be fully payable at the time the license plates are ordered, except that when the plates are ordered after the first month of registration, the fees shall be prorated.

RESPONSIBILITIES THE HIGHWAY PATROL (Sections 301.560 301.564 RSMo.)

This act replaces certain references to officers of the Missouri State Water Patrol with references to "authorized or designated employees" of the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

The act makes this change in a statute regarding the certification of a boat manufacturer's or boat dealer's bona fide place of business (Section 301.560 RSMo.), and in a statute regarding the inspection of certain documents and records (Section 301.564 RSMo.).

#### MOTORCYCLE HELMET LAW (Sections 302.020 and 302.026 RSMo.)

This act provides that persons under the age of 26 who are operating or riding as a passenger on a motorcycle or motortricycle shall wear a helmet when the vehicle is in motion. Similarly, a person who is 26 or older, is operating a motorcycle or motortricycle, and who has been issued an instruction permit shall wear a helmet when the vehicle is in motion. No political subdivision of the state shall impose a protective headgear requirement on the operator or passenger of a motorcycle or motortricycle. No person shall be stopped, inspected, or detained solely to determine compliance with these provisions.

The act also provides that qualified operators who are 26 or older may operate a

How to Find Free Money and Save for College will take place on Tuesday, September 21 at 6 p.m.

The free virtual event will feature speakers from Sallie Mae, a nationwide consumer banking institution specializing in private student loans, and MOST, Missouri's 529 Education Plan.

MOST, Missouri's 529 Education Plan, is a tax-advantaged savings plan for education expenses. Money in MOST accounts can be used to pay for K-12 tuition and apprenticeships, trade, college, and graduate school tuition and expenses. Contributions are eligible for state tax deductions, which can save families up to \$864 a year, and assets in MOST 529

accounts grow tax-free.

motorcycle or motor-tricycle without a helmet if he or she is covered by a health insurance policy or other form of insurance which will provide the person with medical benefits for injuries incurred as a result of a motorcycle or motortricycle accident. Proof of such coverage shall be provided on request of law enforcement by showing a copy of the qualified operator's insurance card. No person shall be stopped, inspected, or detained solely to determine compliance with these provisions. (Section 302.026) DIGITAL DRIVER'S LI-CENSES (Section 302.181.10 RSMo.)

This act authorizes the Department of Revenue to design and implement a secure digital driver's license program that allows license applicants to obtain a digital driver's license in addition to a card-based license. The digital license shall be accepted for all purposes for which a card-based license is used. Department of Revenue contracted entity(ies) may develop a mobile software application capable of being utilized through a person's electronic device to access the person's digital



driver's license. The Department shall suspend, disable, or terminate a person's participation in the digital driver's license program if the driver's driving privilege is suspended, revoked, denied, withdrawn, or cancelled as provided by law, or if the person reports their electronic device has been lost, stolen, or compromised.

COMMERCIAL DRIVER'S LICENSES (Sections 302.720 and 302.723 RSMo.)

This act provides for a process by which commercial

with disabilities may request testing accommodations for the written and driving tests, and specifies that the accommodations shall state that a hearing test shall not be required for applicants who are deaf or hard of hearing. These provisions shall be null and void if the United States Secretary of Transportation determines they will result in a loss of federal highway funding.

The act also specifies that any entity providing training

to persons preparing to apply for a CDL shall provide reasonable accommodations for persons who are deaf or hard of hearing. These provisions shall be null and void if the United States Secretary of Transportation determines they or the provisions relating to disabled applicants requesting testing accommodations will result in a loss of

# Growing mushrooms for fun and money

of wild mushrooms in the Ozarks, they only think of the delicious morels that grow for a few short weeks in the spring. However, for Lauren Smith of Palace Mushrooms, wild mushrooms are

a year-round, full-time job.

When most people think

For years, Lauren was an avid mushroom hunter. In 2015, while attending the University of Arkansas, she took a mycology class and realized that she could clone wild mushrooms that she had found. After graduating, Smith moved to Missouri, alongside Mike's Creek on the Barry/McDonald County line, and started the process of creating a lab and fruiting chamber in the old farm house that she and her husband, Josh Wardlaw, live in. In 2019 she officially created Palace Mushrooms.

The first step in the process was collecting samples of local edible mushrooms. Though she primarily focuses on oyster mushrooms, Smith has also cloned lion's mane, chicken-of-the-woods, and enoki. She even attempted to clone the one truffle she found during her edible treasure hunts.

After gathering the mushrooms, she begins the process of isolating and cloning

Smith converted her laundry room into a lab and built a flow hood, which uses a squirrel-cage fan to create a clean working environment. Positioned in front of the flow hood, Smith uses a scalpel to slice thin pieces off of the mushrooms. The slices are then placed into a Petri dish containing nutrients to feed and grow the mycelium, the foundational material that mushrooms come from.

After about a week, the cells in the Petri dishes will have developed. Smith then transfers the flourishing mycelia into jars full of grain.

As the mycelia consume the grain, they expand.

Once the mycelia have fully colonized the jars of grain, Smith mixes them with pasteurized straw and stuffs them into plastic sacks. She cuts holes in the bags, hangs them in her fruiting chamber and waits for mushrooms to start popping out of the

Across the yard in Smith's and Wardlaw's Mike's Creek home, there is an old barn that the couple has converted into a work area. It is here that Lauren stacks the sacks of mycelium on a steel table.

Cleanliness is vital to success, so every work space has to be meticulously clean for each project. Inside the shed, the couple built a waterproof room where Lauren can regulate the temperature and humidity, using a homemade swamp-cooler in the summer and crock pots in the winter.

Between local restaurants and word-of-mouth, Palace Mushrooms, as a business, has taken off. The demand has been greater than Smith's growing space. As a partial solution, she began to create mushroom kits for individuals to take home and grow mushrooms themselves.


During the pandemic, when many parents and teachers found themselves teaching small groups outside of the classroom, at the request of a teacher, Smith began creating kits that students put together as science projects. This popular activity has since become a vital aspect of production for Palace Mushrooms.

Wild mushrooms can be intimidating for those who are unfamiliar with what is safe and delicious to eat. Through Palace Mushrooms, Smith hopes to expand people's understanding of the amazing foods which may lie just below their feet, or, sometimes, just above their



# Buy native trees and shrubs from MDC

Need trees and shrubs for your landscape? Go native with the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC). Native trees and shrubs can help improve wildlife habitat and soil and water conservation while also improving the appearance and value of private property.

MDC's George O. White State Forest Nursery near Licking offers a variety of low-cost native tree and shrub seedlings for reforestation, windbreaks, erosion control, wildlife food and cover, and other purposes. The nursery provides mainly one-year-old, bare-root seedlings with sizes varying by species. Seedlings varieties include: pine, bald cypress, cottonwood, black walnut, hickory, oak, pecan, persimmon, river birch, maple, willow, sycamore, blackberry, buttonbush, hazelnut, redbud, ninebark, spicebush, elderberry, sumac, wild plum, witch hazel, and others.

Seedlings are available in bundles of 10 or increments of 25 per species. Prices range from 34 cents to \$1 per seedling. Sales tax of 6.1 percent will be added to orders unless tax exempt. There is an \$9 handling charge for each order. Receive a 15% discount up to \$20 off seedling orders with a Heritage Card, Permit Card, or Conservation ID Number.

The nursery grows millions of seedlings each year, but some species are very popular and sell out quickly. Occasionally the seedlings succumb to uncooperative weather or hungry wildlife, despite the nursery staff's best efforts.

"The weather almost got us again in late winter in a huge way," said MDC Nursery Supervisor Mike Fiaoni. "We had almost 25% of our seedlings up due to early germination. Then we got two nights down in the mid-20s. The nursery staff did an outstanding job covering most of the seedlings with various

materials and saved around 1.5 million trees. The main species that took a hit were hackberries and black cher-

Fiaoni added, "We had reports of people last year setting their alarms to wake up at midnight on Aug. 31 to get their order placed. So again, this year get your order in early."

Fiaoni said that even if a species is listed as sold out, customers can still place an order for them. Sometimes orders get cancelled, freeing up inventory. Customers won't be charged for seedlings unless they are available to ship.

Learn more and place orders through MDC's 2021-2022 Seedling Order Form. Find it in the September issue of the Missouri Conservationist, at MDC regional offices and nature centers, online at mdc.mo.gov/treesplants/tree-seedlings, or by contacting the State Forest Nursery at 573-674-3229 or StateForestNursery@mdc. mo.gov.

Place orders now through April 15, 2022. Orders will be shipped or can be picked up at the nursery near Licking from February through May.





# **MSHP Releases Labor Day Holiday Statistics**

Seven people died in traffic crashes during the 2021 Labor Day holiday weekend. Last year, there were 18 fatalities. The 2021 counting period for the Labor Day holiday ran from 6 p.m., Friday, September 3, through 11:59 p.m., Monday, September 6.

The Missouri State Highway Patrol reports the following enforcement activity during 2021 Labor Day Holiday:

MSHP Traffic Statistics (preliminary): Crashes, 351; Injuries, 103; Fatalities, 7; DWI, 108; Drug Arrests, 71.MSHP Boating Statistics (preliminary): Crashes, 7; Injuries, 4; Fatalities, 1; BWI, 6; Drownings, 0; Drug Arrests, 18.

(Note: During the 2020 counting period, the Patrol investigated 278 traffic crashes, which included 140 injuries and 11 of the 18 fatalities. Troopers made 146 arrests for driving while intoxicated last year. Also, over the Labor Day holiday 2020: Troopers investigated 20 boating crashes involving six injuries and one fatality; and arrested seven people for boating while intoxicated on the state's rivers and lakes. There were no drownings over the 2020 Labor Day holiday weekend.)

Troopers investigated all seven of the fatal traffic crashes over the 2021 Labor Day holiday weekend. Three of the fatal traffic crashes occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, area; two fatal traffic crashes occurred in the Troop I, Rolla, MO, area; and one traffic crash fatality occurred in both Troop A, Lee's Summit, MO, area, and the Troop F, Jefferson City, MO, area. The boating fatality occurred in the Troop D, Springfield, MO, area.

One boating fatality occurred on Saturday, September 4, 2021. A 14-year-old female from St. Louis, MO, died when a personal watercraft struck the personal watercraft she was operating on Table Rock Lake in Stone County. The 14-yearold was ejected. Dr. Pallohusky pronounced the juvenile deceased at Mercy Hospital. The juvenile operating the other personal watercraft sustained minor injuries. Both operators were wearing life jackets at the time of the crash.

Three traffic fatalities occurred on Saturday, September 4, 2021. Godfrey G. Gitau, 35, of Hazelwood, MO, died when the vehicle he was operating traveled off the roadway and struck a guardrail end cap. Gitau was not wearing a seat belt and was ejected from the vehicle. The crash occurred in St. Louis County on Interstate 170 south of Interstate 270. Hazelwood EMS personnel pronounced Gitau dead at the scene.

Jaswant Singh, 31, of Fremont, CA, died when the commercial vehicle in which he was a passenger traveled off the right side of the roadway, struck a guardrail, an embankment

wall, and then overturned. Singh was not wearing a seat belt. The crash occurred in Crawford County on Interstate 44 at the 214.8-mile marker. Deputy Coroner Nikki Bussell pronounced Singh deceased at the scene. The driver of the commercial vehicle was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash; he sustained minor injuries. Jackson County Medical Examiner's Office Investigator Amanda Bogacz pronounced Moore deceased at the scene. A second passenger in the commercial vehicle sustained minor injuries. She was wearing a seat belt. The driver of the commercial vehicle was not injured; he was wearing a seat belt. The Lee's Summit Police Department also responded to the scene.

A 13-year-old male from Cedar Hill, MO, died when the driver of the vehicle in which he was a passenger lost control. The vehicle began sliding, traveled off the roadway, struck a tree, continued to travel northbound off the roadway, and struck a second tree. The juvenile male was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in Jefferson County on Engledow Road south of Blackwell Road. Valle Ambulance District personnel pronounced the juvenile deceased at the scene. The 17-year-old driver of the vehicle sustained minor injuries; he was not wearing a seat belt. 
