Second Roaring River dive nets artifacts, photos of "Colossal Dome"

When the team of divers from KISS Rebreathers (of Fort Smith, Arkansas) made their second park-sanctioned diving exploration of

Roaring River Cave over the weekend, they made a startling discovery. At a depth of 225 feet below the surface of the water - the point previous divers had reached in 1979,

then again in the early 1990s - a second opening into the caverns beyond had formed near the narrow opening discovered by previous divers. Through these two small

openings, at impressively Mike Young, said. "That secstrong discharge rates, pours all of the water that feeds Roaring River.

County COVID-19 numbers rise sharply

The number of new cases of COVID-19 in Barry County has increased exponentially in the past two weeks.

Nineteen new cases were reported by the Barry County Health Department for the reporting-week ending June 9, followed by an additional 29 cases on June 16 and 36 more on June 22.

Perhaps more telling is the positivity rate, a number which increased from 4.49 percent positivity on June 9 to 21.17 percent on June 16. The positivity rate for the current week is 32.14 percent.

CoxHealth Media Spokesperson, Kaitlyn McConnell says the number of patients requiring hospitalization from COVID-19 complications has risen as well.

"We hit 88 patients in our hospitals at one point (Monday)," she said, "including a patient in Cox Monett."

On June 18, CoxHealth had 79 COVID patients, a number which represented a five-fold increase, according to McConnell.

McConnell said the the rise in numbers can be attributed to a variety of factors. One factor, she says, is because the vaccination rate in lower in southwest Missouri than in other parts of the country.

The Barry County Health Department reports a 31.2 percent vaccination rate as of June 22 for residents of the county. This percentage is lower than the cumulative Missouri state average of a little over 44 percent, and much lower than states along the west coast and many states in the northeast, which have achieved a vaccination rate of well over 60 percent.

"We have seen the success of vaccination firsthand at Cox," McConnell said. "While the vaccine isn't perfect, we have seen very few

Barry Electric Cooperative: Part Two

Learn about your local electricity provider

Here follows part two of my conversation with Jennifer McBroom, CEO of Barry Electric Cooperative .- Editor

Taking over a well-established cooperative does not come without its existing challenges, and one area McBroom is becoming well informed in is renewable energy. While clean energy has become a major topic in the national news, McBroom strongly believes that the resource stabilization, technology, and affordability for alternative energy sources needs to be in place before fossil fuels are dropped.

"I can see both sides of the argument for and against the use of fossil fuels," McBroom said, "but as the CEO of an electric cooperative, my primary concern is that the best interest of our co-op members is served. My question would be, 'what is the most efficient and reliable way to replace that coal?' It takes research and technological advances - and time - to answer that question. When we're forced to research under a tight time-line, the technology might suffer.

'We don't want what happened in Texas during the February cold snap to happen in southwest Missouri," she added.

Net metering is another legislative topic that McBroom is following.

Net metering is the metering method for members who have generation capability, known as membergenerators. It is used for the billing of renewable energy produced on the membergenerator's side (i.e., solar or wind). Net metering is particularly important to the member-generator when wind and solar power sources are unavailable and not coupled with storage capabilities. The member-generator then uses Barry Electric as a supplemental energy source.

McBroom said Barry Electric Cooperative currently has 31 members who use a solar source for a portion of their electricity; none of their members generate electricity with wind.

Current net metering laws can hinder utility cooperatives and ultimately cause subsidization of costs to nonmember-generators.

Missouri House Bill 539, which could create legislative changes in favor of rural electric co-ops when some of their members generate a portion of their own electricity, has been tabled until the next legislative session, she

McBroom expressed a concern for Barry Electric Cooperative linemen when members use alternative renewable sources.

"Many people aren't fully informed of the dangers member-level generation poses for linemen," she said, "especially if they're constructing their own solar energy generation station. Member-side back-feed on our system creates a real hazard to our linemen. It's especially important that residents contact us prior to construction if they plan to use an alternative power source in addition to the electricity we supply them

Cassville City Council approves body cam, dash cam purchase

Cassville City Council met June 14.

Council approved the \$132,363.53 expenditure for new body cams and dash cams for city police officers, with payments to be made over a five-year period.

According to chief of police, Dana Kammerlohr, the chosen provider is Axon Enterprises.

"We talked to several companies," Kammerlohr said, "and felt Axon offered the best value.

"Twelve body cameras and seven dash cameras for police vehicles will be delivered on day one," Kammerlohr said. "In 30 months, 12 newer body cams with updated technology will be provided; in 60 months, both body and dash cams will be

provided, upgraded to the to begin after the first of the newest technology at the


According to Kammerlohr, one feature of the Axon body cams is that they will be automatically activated when an officer removes his weapon - either sidearm or taser - from its holster.

"This way," Kammerlohr said, "an officer won't have to take that extra second to activate his body cam."

In additional matters, Marshall Decker, of Decker & DeGood, presented the council with favorable audit results.

Council gave representatives from Allgeier Martin the green light to begin soliciting easements from property owners for sewer and water right-of-ways, with improvements expected

Leave tree trimming to experts

- If you use a ladder, tie it off to a secure location. Never go anywhere near a power line with a ladder,
- especially a metal one.

Purdy City Council Met in June

Purdy City Council met Wednesday, June 16.

According to Public Works Director, Lonnie Lowery, due to an undetectable water leak, Purdy is losing nearly one-third of their water supply - approximately one million gallons of water each month. Two recent water leaks have been fixed, yet the third remains unfound. Extensive measures continue to be taken to find and fix the leak.

According to Section Three of the Ordinance of the City of Purdy which Prohibits Illegal Dumping within the City Limits of the City of Purdy, any person engaged in illegal dumping will be summoned for an ordinance violation. This ordinance is presently in full force and effect. Purdy May Police Report

• On May 2, a loose dog killed twelve chickens after breaking into a chicken coop. The

killer was caught and taken to a dog pound, and their owner was issued a citation for "dog running at large."

- On May 6, two juveniles threw rocks at children, breaking a car window. The juveniles were reported to the juvenile office.
- On May 10, a school custodian caught a juvenile male vandalizing the FEMA building with "gang style graffiti" using a black permanent marker. This juvenile was also reported to the juvenile office.
- On May 12, a victim was bitten by a loose dog, and the owner was issued a citation for "dog running at large." The victim was not seriously injured.
- On May 13, two purses were stolen from an unlocked vehicle in the Dollar General Store parking lot. Several pieces of jewelry and a cell phone were among the stolen items. The investiga-

tion is ongoing. Possibly related, on May 15, another purse was stolen from another unlocked car. Later that evening, a credit card taken from the purse was used at Happy House in Monett. Another credit card was used at the Rapid Roberts Store in Monett to purchase \$100 worth of scratcher tickets. A possible suspect has been identified and charges have been filed in Monett for fraudulent use of a credit device. Stock Market Insights

Growing up around Table Rock Lake teaches you something about lake life. For instance, it can be really difficult to jump off a boat onto a dock, especially when the boat is still moving. In a similar way, the Federal Reserve is trying to do something just like that. However, it seems they are too scared to jump.

On June 16, the Federal Reserve decided to maintain the federal funds rate at the very low 0.00-0.25% at its Open Market Committee meeting held last Wednesday. Their do-nothing decision was expected, but one must wonder why keep pouring gas on a fire that is already raging? Investors have been concerned about rising inflation rates as the U.S. economy continues to reopen.

The Fed vote was unanimous to keep rates as they are and to continue to buy \$120 billion of bonds each month in their asset purchasing program to help the economy and markets. These types of moves are generally ones they use to help a struggling economy or a market in freefall.

Yet the Fed chose to hold steady when the economy and stock markets are booming. It's almost like they were saying, "we're going to keep buying assets and keep interest rates crazy low long after they are needed because we can." The Fed is acting like there is no negative consequence to their actions and that the inflation isn't real.

But there are consequences. The markets have cycles and they need to get ready for the next one. Right now, as I type, farmers all around us are moving their hay bails out of the field (now that it's finally dry) so they can get the field ready for the next cut. In the same way, the Fed needs to slow their bond purchases and begin slowing weaning the market off the ridiculously low rate so when the market turns downward, as it always does, it will have the ability to lower rates and buy bonds to stimulate the

market and economy again. As the good book says, everything has a season, and the Federal Reserve needs to prepare for the next season.

Many analysts predict the Fed to raise their rates in 2023, possibly two different times, and that they will begin slowing down their bond purchases in the spring of 2022. Sometimes you just have to jump, if you get scared and don't jump off a boat onto the dock the driver has to turn around and try to line up again. The economy and stock market are lined up pretty well right now for the Fed to exit their defensive strategies, but if they miss their opportunity, it might be some time before they line up again.

The purpose of the plan is to address issues associated with the overpopulation of white-tailed deer at the park. The proposed action was selected after careful analysis of resources and visitor impacts, and consultation with affiliated tribes, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), the Arkansas Department of Game and Fish, Arkansas State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO), and review of public comments.

Where there is an overabundance of deer there is an increase in deer-vehicle strikes, deer-related diseases, and deer browsing, which has a negative impact on native vegetation. The plan's selected alternative seeks to improve the health of the deer herd, the habitat, and to increase human health and safety by reducing and maintaining the park's deer population at 20-35 deer per square mile.

The park will continue to work with partners to develop an implementation plan, with associated compliance, based on the Deer Management Plan. As a result, and due to current, and planned, projects, management of deer on the park is anticipated to begin in 2023. MDC expands opportunities for commercial photography and filming

The Missouri Conservation Commission gave final approval to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) on a proposed change to the Wildlife Code of Missouri regulations that would require permits for commercial or for-profit photography and videography on MDC areas.

Commercial use is defined as any activity that directly or indirectly results in financial gain, or where money is exchanged in connection with the activity. MDC notes commercial-use permits are not required for news agencies, hobby photographers and videographers, or those taking personal pictures or videos. Photography and filming on MDC areas for non-commercial use have been and remain allowed on MDC areas without the need for a commercial-use permit.

Professional, for-profit photography and filming have historically been restricted on MDC areas as "commercial use" activities. The new regulations, effective July 1, will allow photography commercial and filming on MDC areas through new commercial use permits. The new regulations come amidst requests from photographers and videographers to allow commercial photography and videography on conservation areas.

A Commercial Photography Permit will be required for commercial photographers on department areas with an associated fee of \$100 annually (expires June 30 each year). A Commercial Videography Permit will be required for all commercial videography on MDC areas with an associated fee of \$500 per day.

Commercial photogra-

phers will also need to apply for a no-cost Special Use Permit in certain situations (allow 30 days for processing):

- Special accommodations requested (activities normally not allowed on conservation areas, such as after-hour access, vehicles on non-public roads, etc.);
- Use of unmanned aerial system (UAS) or drone;
- Use of props (larger than average person could carry);
- When more than ten people are involved;

On MDC areas associated with nature and education centers, staffed ranges, offices, and on the following department areas:

- Burr Oak Woods Conservation Area
- August A. Busch Memorial Conservation Area
- rial Conservation Area
 James A. Reed Memorial Wildlife Area
 - Rockwoods Reservation Find more information

or apply for an MDC Special Use Permit at https://mdc.mo.gov/permits/special-use-permits.

Other county, state, and federal land management agencies allow commercial photography and filming on their areas through the use of commercial permits with associated fees. MDC staff reviewed other agencies within and outside the state to determine a price structure.

The proposed regulations were initially approved by the Missouri Conservation Commission in September 2020. Following initial Commission approval, the proposed regulations were submitted by MDC to the Office of the Secretary of State for a 30-day public comment period in October 2020. Following a review of comments received, the Commission gave final approval to the proposed regulations in De-

cember 2020. The regulations go into effect July 1.

May state revenue increased 128.3 percent over last year

State Budget Director Dan Haug announced today that Net general revenue collections for May 2021 increased 128.3 percent compared to those for May 2020, from \$533.5 million last year to \$1.22 billion this year.

feet per second, according to USGS statistics. By the end of May, the discharge rate had dropped to less than 250 cubic feet per second.

Not only is the discharge rate less prohibitive, the water clarity has increased as well.

Young feels confident that if the favorable water conditions continue throughout the summer, that he and fellow divers will be able to breach one of the openings and discover what lies beyond. If successful, they will navigate underground territory where no known person has gone before.

According to Young, who made several dives into the

rate reached over 2,000 cubic mouth of Roaring River Spring over the weekend, the second, newer opening is partially covered by loose rocks, which he says are movable, provided the water flow rate is not too high. He's confident the new opening can be breached.

> "I'll use my scooter to pull me through the opening," Young said.

The so-called "scooter" is a slim, torpedo-shaped, motorized vehicle with handlebars and propellors.

"We use it to give us a rest from swimming when we need it, or to pull us through tight places," Young said.

Young believes the feat of breaching a crevice 225 feet below the surface of the water will be possible because of newer technology than previous divers had access to. That technology has led to the production of the compact rebreathing units KISS custom-builds for divers around the world.

"We can get through much smaller spaces with rebreathers than divers could in the past, who only had traditional, bulky SCUBA gear at their disposal," Young said.

Young's rebreathing unit is called, appropriately, "The Abyss," and is built for extreme water-depth, for "adventure divers," according to surface manager for Saturday's dive, Tony Bryant.

"Adventure diver" is a label that fits Mike Young well.

He learned to dive 30 years ago in a sinkhole in the Kalahari Desert in Botswana, South Africa. Since then, he's explored underwater cave systems around the world.

Young and his wife, Sheri, live in the Fort Smith area, as does fellow diver, Joe Heinrichs, and safety diver/RN, Neil Brownlow.

Additional team members for the June dive included cartographer Jon Lillestolen, of Virginia, and his assistant, Gayle Orner, of Wisconsin.

The purpose for the dives into the mouth of Roaring River Spring is not simply for the sake of adventure.

Young and his team plan to remap the underground caverns using an intricate

system of ropes and knots for measurement. They also plan to create a video of their underwater exploration for use in the Roaring River Park Nature Center.

Tim Bass, of NWA Adventure Dive in Bentonville, will be filmographer for the team's endeavors.

Last weekend's dive into the spring netted more than just the discovery of a second opening. Neil Brownlow discovered a remnant of pottery - about four inches wide - possibly of Native American origin. Research is being conducted.

Other finds in the spring included an old, metal, longhandled rake, a bird's skull and several intact glass bot-

While the divers were able to move a few rocks away from the new opening they discovered over the weekend, they will not attempt to go through the passageway, into the caverns beyond, until their next scheduled visit, July 16 - 19.

A retired high school Vo-Ag teacher, he inherited his appreciation for flowers from his mother, who always had a vase of fresh flowers on the table when he was growing

Epperly started his flower project modestly the first season by planting a halfacre of zinnias and sunflowers. In spite of being unable to attract many takers for his by-donation, homegrown flowers, he persevered - and expanded.

The second year, he planted four acres with a wider variety of flowers and began a Facebook Group called "Pa's Posey Patch." That group, he says, was responsible for a blossoming clientele of photographers who drive for hundreds of miles, collectively - and some, individually - to take advantage of his labor of love.

During his second season, Epperly adopted what he calls an "advisory council" of five photographers who make suggestions and answer questions he may have.

"The first bit of advice they unanimously offered me," he said, "was to tell me to charge for the use of my field. I took them up on it, and it seems to have increased business rather than slowing it down.

"I charge professional photographers \$25 for a sitting now," he said. "For everyone else, I still just accept donations.

For this season, his third, Epperly planted 13 acres with a wider variety yet of annuals and perennials.

On the advice of his council, he planted fields of poppies - one with just red poppies, and another with deep pink poppies mixed with blue bachelor buttons. Reactions have been phenomenal. Wizard of Oz fans have even been known to put in an appearance.

"It's a photographer's dream backdrop," said a Fayetteville photographer, whose clients - also from Fayetteville - followed her to Epperly's poppy fields for their engagement photo shoot.

Epperly says on most

weekend evenings there will be eight to ten photographers and their clients shooting photos in his fields.

"I currently host about 100 photographers within about a two-hour radius of here," he said.

Epperly has operated a donation-only pumpkin patch from his fields for the past 40 years, and the idea for growing flowers along with pumpkins was a natural evolution for him, he said.

"I planted my first garden when I was five years old," Epperly said. "My mom instructed me to plant marigolds in it. She always told me, 'everything grows better with flowers.' I figured flowers would go well with pumpkins, too."

Epperly says he expects his sunflowers to be in full bloom after the Fourth of July.

"Then, I'll have sunflowers, zinnias, Mexican sunflowers and Brown-Eyed Susans in bloom until frost," he said. "I plant them successively, so that I'll always have some blooming."

The poppies are winding down for the season, but Epperly says Bachelor's Buttons

and Larkspur will continue to provide blues in backdrops.

Another popular backdrop, says Epperly, is his field of Buckwheat, which changes from pale green to golden brown as the summer pro-

Roaring River is looking fantastic! The water has finally cleared up, except for when they are dredging and doing repair work to the stream

The water level is at 74 CFS. This is fantastic fishing. The fly fishermen are having a ball fishing black ants, black beetles, crackle-backs, elkhair caddis, and parachute

We are starting to catch more fish on stimulators and small grasshoppers.

The top-water fishing is really good right now. If you want to fish a woolly-bugger, olive-green, black, and brown have been good col-

Nymphs work great right now; we are starting to use smaller nymphs; size 16's

and smaller are probably best right now. Pheasanttails, sow bugs, burlaps, copper-johns, and gold-ribbed hares-ears are good right now, and a black, brown, or red zebra-mage will catch fish fairly well now.

With the water much clearer now, we are using mostly 9-foot 7X liters when fishing dries, and a 9-foot 6X liter when fishing nymphs. You can still catch fish on larger streamers, especially in the deeper hole down in the fly area (Zone 2).

If you are fishing a larger streamer I would recommend at least a 9 foot 5X leader. Sometimes you can get away with a little heavier when fishing a bigger fly.

If you're spin-fishing first thing in the morning, it will be hard to beat a spin-

Fish like a pro!

ner; black, orange, pink, and brown are good colors to start with. Fish usually will take these fairly well for the first 30 minutes or so; after that, you should probably switch over to a Marabou jig or to a plastic worm. The power-bait eggs in grubs will catch fish all day long.

With the clear water, a two-pound line will work best right now. If you have to put on heavier line, please do not go heavier than fourpound, A good alternative is the three-pound.

Pink Power-ade eggs, orange power-bait and white power-bait eggs worked really well last week.

If you are fishing the power bait one-inch crawlers, yellow is still the best color. Pink and brown are doing very well, and occasionally the chartreuse catches a few

We are still having some luck on small rebel wee crawdads, the smaller 2 1/2" to 3" inch crank-bait rebel minnows or rapala minnows.

If you are going to fish a marabou jig (and marabou

jigs are very effective all day long), olive, black/yellow, white, tan or ginger, are good colors to start with.

Since the water has dropped out quite a bit, a lot of the jig fishermen are dropping back into the 1/64 and 1/80 jigs. If you are fishing in the fly area (Zone 2), because of the wider river, sometimes it is easier to throw a 1/16 or 1/8 ounce jig over to the far side. That's a good place to fish because a lot of the trout, especially in the heat of the day, will lie in the shade-line during the hottest part of the day, and you can get to them with a little heavier jig.

The little white thread gigs, and the John Deere green jigs have done extremely well the last few days. Most people are fishing these under a small indicator; generally, we are setting the indicator at 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 feet deep. You will have to adjust this occasionally when you move on the

Good luck this week! It's going to be hot, but the trout don't know it; they will continue to bite all day. Sometimes the best fishing is during the last 2 1/2 to 3 hours of the evening.

The 2021 counting period for the July Fourth holiday will be from 6 p.m., Friday, July 2, to 11:59 p.m., Monday, July 5, 2020.

The Highway Patrol will be participating in Operation C.A.R.E. (Crash Awareness & Reduction Effort) and Operation Dry Water over the July Fourth holiday weekend. Operation Dry Water specifically targets impaired vessel operators. All available troopers will be patrolling Missouri roadways and waterways to enforce traffic and boating laws, and offering assistance as needed.

With more boats on the water, it is even more important to pay attention when operating your vessel. Never operate a vessel if you've consumed alcohol. 

The waters of Barry County seem to be Jeff Fletcher's second home. His father was a fishing guide for fifty years on Table Rock Lake, and Fletcher started guiding at twelve years old. He was fishing competitively by age sixteen.

"There are pictures of me as a baby wrapped up in blankets with my parents, going upstream to fish," Fletcher attests.

His father owned a resort that had other guides working for them, and when the guides weren't touring, they'd take a young Jeff Fletcher through the tours.

"So I got an education from guys who were the best on the lake," he added.

While attending the University of Arkansas to earn a business degree, in preparation to inherit the family business, Fletcher began guiding a man named Bill Fields. At the time, Fields was the "second in command" under David Glass, then-CEO of Wal-Mart. On one river guide, Fields asked Fletcher what he wanted to do after college. Answering truthfully, Fletcher simply said, "I wanna fish professionally."

Fields said he wanted to be involved in Fletcher's fishing career, and with his connections at Wal-Mart, entered Fletcher into an official tournament in 1992 on Lake Ontario. There, Fletcher finished 78 out of 350. The next year, however, Fletcher won second place and became part of the Top 100 Anglers, a title he held for seven years.

In 1999, his oldest son Riley was born, followed later by a second son, Carter. Fletcher had been paying the bills with prize money won at fishing tournaments, but was also travelling across the

for those tournaments.

country for weeks at a time Ultimately deciding he wanted to be home for his sons, Fletcher said, "the thing that I love most (fishing), I gave up to be the father that I needed to be for my children."

With his contacts in the professional fishing field, Fletcher then got a job selling years. He now works for Georgia Boots selling out-

However, Fletcher never quit fishing altogether, just professionally on a national level. Occasionally, he still guides, and he finds ways to get on the lake or river week-

"It's my happy place," he

Expressing how heavily fishing has ingrained itself into his legacy, his son Riley went to college on a fishing scholarship and was later asked to join the Drury Fishing Team. The scholarship paid half of his education and half of his room and board. Riley will be starting Pharmacy school in August of 2021.

Museum to host book-signing on Saturday




