Golden Post Office Burglarized

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service is offering up to a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person(s) responsible for the recent burglary at the Golden Post Office. The crime occurred sometime between 5:15 pm, August 1, and 7:05 am, August 2. Property damage occurred and cash were stolen, according to Sheriff Mick Epperly.

through an interior lobby door, causing excessive property damage. Phone lines to the building were severed as well. The only item removed from the premises was cash from the teller's drawer. Epperly wouldn't elaborate on the amount of money stolen other than that the property damage incurred exceeds

Epperly stated, "In a case like this, where it fouls up the

The burglar broke in mail service for residents of a small county, we want to see the person or persons responsible held accountable." It was a clear burglary where the suspect was searching for money inside the building. Epperly stated that there were other items of value that could have been taken but were not thereby showing the intent of the thief.

Postal Service, since the investigation is ongoing, information available to the public is limited. Letter carriers for Golden are not from the Golden Post Office, so mail delivery service was uninterrupted. On August 2nd, the service window was closed until 2:00 pm and the post office box deliveries were slightly delayed.

When questioned if the burglary was possibly of a malicious intent to harm

the mail service or the community in some way, Epperly denied that was the case. He believes the crime was driven by the poor economy.

Roaring River Flooding Leads to Park Evacuation

Rainy conditions in the Ozarks led to intense flooding at Roaring River State Park on August 7th and 8th. Approximately six inches of rain fell at the park and the surrounding area, causing flooding and subsequent damage. Some campgrounds were evacuated due to the rising waters through the night.

As the rain poured at Roaring River, park employees were aware of the situation, alerting campers to seek higher ground earlier in the night. Gena Terlizzi, Communications Director for the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, said that by 3:30 am, 63 campsites were evacuated.

Most of the damage appears to be in and around Campgrounds 2 and 3. All related events. campsites in Campgrounds

2 and 3 and sites 58-77 in Campground 1 are closed until August The Roaring River swimming pool is also closed until this prospective date.

At this time, the DNR is unsure of the financial burden of the damages. The Missouri State Parks' budget includes funds for clean-up of weatherrelated events, as well as unusual damages.

Crowder holds Graduation Ceremony Cassville School enrollment up from prior years

Cassville Elementary School is experiencing a jump in the student enrollment for the 2013-2014 school year. Enrollment numbers had declined between 2008-2011, due largely to economic issues facing families in an uncertain job market.

On the first day of school on Monday, the total enrollment for Cassville's Eunice Thomas Elementary was 506 children. Enrollment numbers for the first day of the 2011-2012 year was 434.

Cassville Superintendent Richard Asbill stated, "The numbers for this year are ex-

citing, but it is so early it's difficult to evaluate actual numbers as students move in and out routinely over the next two weeks."

School administration is keeping an eye on the first grade enrollment, which has risen to 162, compared to their kindergarten class of 148. Last year's first grade enrollment was 140 students, 22 students less than this



The AEL Instructors are Janet Ballard, Liz Hendrix and Anne Collier. The Cassville and Seligman class sites are two of 12 Adult Education and Literacy class sites in the Crowder College AEL Program.

In line with the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, all programs across the state, including Crowder College Adult Education and Literacy, will soon be moving away from the 2002 paper/pencil GED®/High School Equivalency test. Crowder AEL will begin helping people prepare to take a new computer-based test in 2014.

For those who wish to take the current version of

the test before January, GED applications are due to DESE no later than September 1, 2013. The test takers who attempted the test, but did not successfully complete it, the application is due to DESE by November 4, 2013. Applications currently require a \$20 payment. The application form and instructions may be downloaded and printed at www.hse.mo.gov. An additional fee of \$20 must be paid to the testing center when registering for the test.

Kids Fishing Day August 17

The Missouri Department of Conservation and The Department of Natural Resources will host Kids Fishing Day, August 17, at Roaring River State Park. At this event, young anglers will have opportunities to catch fish and learn about fishing at Roaring River State Park.

At Kids' Fishing Day, children age 15 and under will be able to pick up free trout tags at the hatchery office any time the day before the event (Friday, August 16) or all day on the day of the event. A portion of the park's fishing area will be reserved for youths age 15 and under. Volunteers will be on hand to help out. Children are encouraged to bring their own fishing equipment. Parents are welcome to assist kids, but only one pole may be used between helper and child. Adults are not allowed to fish by themselves. Free hotdogs, chips, and soda will be available 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Bluegrass music will be performed at the Fishline Bluegrass Stage (Main Stage) throughout the day from 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. The lineup includes Spur of the Moment, Ozark Mountain Revival, Flying Buzzards, New Dogs Old Tricks, Timberline and Wilderness Road.

Education is also part of Kids' Fishing Day. Throughout the day, seminars will be held on fish cleaning, fish cooking, knife sharpening, knot tying, fly tying and fly casting, how to fish Roaring River, stream biology and other subjects. A hatchery tour will be held to show how trout are raised. A program on Missouri snakes will be held, using live specimens.

If kids attend three classes they will be entered into prize drawing. The drawing will be at 5 p.m. Other prizes will be awarded as well that will include catching a tagged trout. Children must be present to win. Classes are also to the whole family, but only children may enter the drawings.

Fishing starts at 7 a.m. and will continue until 8 p.m. The event will be held rain or shine. Roaring River State Park is located on Highway 112 about seven miles south of Cassville.

Sales tax revenue sees slight increase

Cassville's sale tax revenue totals for the end of July were up 5.6 percent compared this time last last year. For the month of July, Cassville's sale tax generated \$56,009.15. For the same month in 2012, the tax brought in \$53,041.57. Year-to-date, Cassville's revenues are down 1.4 percent from the City's projected budget.

The County's revenue has also increased for the month of July. For July, Barry County's sales tax revenue was up 1.2 percent from June's figures. July generated \$115,522.39, and increase of \$1,277.69.

For the year, Barry County's revenue is down 3.18 percent







Beeson Legacy lives Volunteers help rebuild Beeson bluebird boxes

When I woke up to rain Saturday morning, it crossed my mind that maybe what this community really needed to build was an ark. As the rain stopped and the sun broke through the heavy clouds, it was hard not to smile and think about Laurance Beeson; to imagine him looking down on all the great people who were gathering at LeCompte's Building Supply to help rebuild his legacy.

Dozens of family members and volunteers of all ages rallied to restore more than fifty bluebird boxes that were destroyed along the Beeson Family Blue Bird Trail on July 19-20.

Working in assembly line volunteers took fashion, about four hours to cut, predrill, assemble, and paint 83 new homes for our resident bluebirds. An additional five boxes were donated, making a total of 88 boxes that will be hung in the following months.

Bluebird Box Vandalism is a serious crime

Missouri Bluebirds are protected by the Missouri Department of Conservation, as well as under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918.

This means that it is a federal crime to destroy nests or to disturb nesting birds. Punishments for violations can vary based on the severity of the offense, the birds affected and the record of the individual charged.

Misdemeanor violations can lead to fines up to \$1,500 and up to six months in jail, while felony violations (typically crimes connected with an intent to sell, trade or barter birds) can have fines up to \$2,000 and up to two years in jail.

If multiple birds are affected, sentences can be stacked, leading to far more substantial fines and lengthy jail sentences.

Bluebirds are also protected in Missouri under Operation Game Thief. Information leading to arrest is eligible for a reward up to \$1000.

If you witness a wildlife violation, report it to your local conservation agent, or call the toll free number at 1-800-392-1111. You may remain anonymous

LeCompte's Building Supply, TH Rogers, Home Depot, Sater Pharmacy and Stumpff Auction all made generous donations to the project, as did many private individuals. One woman even dropped of some lovely bluebird-blue cupcakes.

"We are just amazed," Lloyd Beeson said on Saturday. "We lose some boxes every year and we just quietly put them back up. When we lost so many we just never imagined in our wildest dreams that something like this would happen. That the community would come together like this to help us out is just amazing."

The family wants to show their appreciation to the community by extending their trail and hanging the boxes that were built on Saturday along the Greenway Trail in Cassville.

"People were just so generous," Lloyd said. "We got enough wood to rebuild the others. But the community came together to get these built, and I want the community to be able to enjoy them."

Building bluebird boxes is just a fact of life for the Beesons, something that has bonded generation to generation for over forty years. I saw a tiny Beeson at the elbow of an older kid who looked like he was still getting the hang of his power drill. Lloyd looked on, giving direction and some good natured teasing.

At the painting table teenagers happily painted alongside great aunts and parents and siblings, heckling each other and getting into the occasional paint fight.

Kids where cheered on as they worked diligently painting boxes, tables, and themselves in wide sloppy strokes, or learned how to use a hammer with the help of an uncle.

It's easy to see that Laurance Beeson's legacy will live on through the strength of this family and the hearts of the community. It's my hope that these cheery blue boxes will inspire other families to start projects of their own. 

CHS boasts elevated grad rates

The Missouri State Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has posted on its website comparative rates for the years 2011, 2012 and 2013, taking into account the number of students entering high school as freshmen and the number of the same students that successfully graduate four years

Districts in Missouri started reporting a second graduation in 2011 based on students beginning as freshmen. The rate for graduation is calculated based on how many students graduate in four years, making adjustments for transfer students.

Education leaders have said the four year rate, which is required by the U.S. Department of education to allow rates to be compared across the county, can help school districts understand the student populations that don't earn regular diplomas or who take longer than four years to finish high school.

"We recognize that not all students will graduate from high school in four years, but by using data effectively, we can identify the characteristics of students who may be at risk or may take longer to succeed," Chris Nicastro, Missouri's commissioner of education, said when the new rate was introduced

In the state of Missouri, 87.64 percent of students graduate within four years according to the most recent numbers, improvement from 2011 when the rate was 81.42 percent. Cassville's current graduation rate is above the state average and most schools in the area at 93.15 percent in 2013, up from 90.24 percent in 2011.

Comparatively, Donald County's 2013 rate was only 89.50 percent and Monett's was 92.59 percent. Cassville's rates prove its superiority in aiding students achieve their high school diploma in four years, holding one of the higher rates of the schools in the state of Missouri.





Missouri Department of Insurance **Reaches Million Dollar Settlement**

The Missouri Department of Insurance announced today a settlement with Time Insurance Co., Union Security Insurance Co. and John Alden Life Insurance Co. related to their coverage of health benefits required by state law. State insurance regulators allege that the three health insurance companies that issue policies for Assurant Health violated Missouri law in how claims were being handled.

A market conduct examination into the three companies found several instances where the companies denied claims for childhood immunizations, colon cancer screenings, mammograms, Pap smears and prostate screenings. In some cases, claim payments were denied or reduced because the companies imposed waiting periods, copayments or deductibles for these preventive care procedures.

"Consumers pay their premiums and expect their health insurance companies to give them access to preventive care checkups, screenings and tests," said John M. Huff, director of the

Department of Insurance. "When health insurance companies fail to provide these basic benefits required by Missouri law, the health of Missouri citizens suffers as a result."

Under the settlement agreement, the three companies will:

- Agree to provide childhood immunizations to Missouri residents without copayments, coinsurance, deductibles or waiting peri-
- Review all denied claims for childhood immunizations, colon cancer screenings, mammograms, Pap smears, prostate screenings and paid claims for short-term major medical submitted to each company since Jan. 1, 2004.
- should have been paid along with interest at a rate prescribed by law. • Modify their processes

• Pay those claims that

- to comply with state law in • Pay a \$500,000 fine to
- the Missouri State School
- Donate \$500,000 to a Missouri charitable or non-

profit organization or organizations selected by the companies and approved by the department.

In market conduct exams and investigations, the department reviews insurance companies' practices regarding the treatment of policyholders for compliance with Missouri law. This includes the way premium rates are charged, the way insurers handle claims and other responsibilities under state law. These reviews can result in refunds for consumers, fines and corrections in business practices, as well as other remedies.

Since the beginning of 2009, the Market Conduct Section has recovered more than \$16.3 million in recoveries for consumers or for the public and in fines, which by law go to the Missouri State School Fund.

Post 118 has a long history dating back to its first charter in 1939. Currently as a non-profit organization, Post 118 continues the

Exeter Fire Department Receives Grant

Throughout the last 30 years, over \$7 million has been distributed to rural fire departments to help them increase the safety of their fire fighters and provide them with better fire fighting equipment.



"The culprit can be one of any three herbicides which have been approved for use on pastures and forage crops," said David Trinklein, University of Missouri Extension horticulture specialist.

Newer versions of herbicides with active ingredients such as clopyralid, picloram and aminopyralid can pass through the digestive systems of foraging animals and arrive, unchanged, in the manure. If that manure is composted, gardeners could unwittingly introduce these plant-killing compounds into their soil, Trinklein said.

"My first encounter with this was with a gentleman in northwestern Missouri who was using buffalo manure for composting," Trinklein said. "We were able to demonstrate, on tomato, that there was something in the compost."

So why not just test compost before selling it? Commercial testing for these chemicals is costly.

"The test is between \$300 and \$400 per chemical," Trinklein said. "Say you test for picloram and it's not found in the sample. You'll have to spend another \$400 to test for another chemical. You would have to keep testing until you find the culprit. Meanwhile, you've spent \$400 a test."

It's not just compost. These herbicides can show up in mulch too.

"Let's say a farmer put up hay but it got wet. Normally that would be great for mulch," Trinklein said. "But if that hay had been treated with picloram, avoid using it since there is the potential for the herbicide to leach into the soil and harm plants."

Once these herbicides have been added to the soil, through compost or mulch, there aren't many options for correcting the problem. You can remove and replace the soil, but that is expensive, labor-intensive and time-consuming.

You also have the option to wait until soil microbes break down the herbicides naturally, but these new-generation herbicides have lengthy half –lives of months to years.

"These herbicides, ultimately, will break down, but it might take a couple of years, depending on the concentration," Trinklein said. "We would hope that in most cases we could plant the following year, but one may want to avoid herbicide-sensitive plants, such as tomato."

The good news is there's a simple and inexpensive way to test for these compounds. Take green bean seeds and plant them into the compost.

"Green beans are very sensitive to herbicide," Trinklein said. "If the seedlings come up okay, the compost is good. If they come up twisted and damaged, allow the compost to age until the herbicide is broken down."

It is important not to panic. "We don't want to dissuade people from using compost and organic matter," Trinklein said. "They're the gardener's best friend when it comes

to building healthy soil. Gardeners should find out whether the compost supplier has used animal manure, and if so, make sure the animals have not been fed forages sprayed with these herbicides."

In this situation, being informed and proactive is your best defense. Homeowners and green-industry professionals should use the green bean test before they work compost into the soil. Also, talk with your garden supplier. Make sure they're aware of the problem and discuss the steps

Flood Effects on Grain Crops

The primary damage to plants (other than lodging) from flooding or ponding is oxygen deprivation. The oxygen content of water is much lower than air — even air within the soil. Water in soil (water-logging) or above the soil surface (flooding) means there is much less oxygen available to plants. Living plant tissues, including roots, require oxygen for respiration from which high energy compounds are made. These compounds are required for nearly all other life reactions. Low oxygen availability means that the entire process of respiration slows. If oxygen levels decrease too much, plant respiration changes to a pathway similar to fermentation. While some life-sustaining energy is produced during fermentation, energy production is reduced by up to 95 percent. So, one effect of low oxygen is drastically reduced metabolism, which can sharply reduce yield and, if long enough in duration, cause death to a portion or the entire plant.

Fermentation produces several chemicals, including lactic acid, acetaldehyde and ethanol, that are harmful to plants. The most problematic chemical is lactic acid, not from direct toxicity, but because of its effect on cell pH. Accumulation of lactic acid lowers pH. If pH drops too much, cell enzymes denature or precipitate out of solution. Most plant and tissue death is probably related to this acidosis.

The extent of the damage of flooding on plants is related to at least three factors: the temperature of the water, the amount of water motion and the duration of the flood. Temperature affects the speed of respiration. The faster the respiration, the quicker oxygen is depleted and the sooner fermentation begins. Warm water speeds respiration, oxygen use and cell death. The faster water moves the greater the degree of turbulence. This water turbulence oxygenates the water, slightly. Increasing oxygen content of the water slightly decreases the impact of flooding on plants. Duration of the flood is important because many of the effects of low oxygen on plants are reversible if the duration is not too long. Long durations allow for increased oxygen depletion and the build up of harmful chemicals. Although local conditions influence the effects, 36 to 48 hours is often the tolerable limit.

Soil drainage properties can aggravate the flooding effect. Soils high in clay content or with other drainage restrictions prolong the flooding and remain waterlogged after flood-

Location of the plant's growing point may affect response to flooding. Growing points are areas of intense cell growth and rapid respiration. In general, corn can tolerate flooding better than soybean. But, if flooding occurs in the spring, the corn growing point is near the soil surface (below or above), making it likely to be submersed longer. The soybean growing point is located at tip of stem and may remain above water.

Effects from flooding may last long after floodwaters recede. Soybean plants may turn yellow because oxygen for nodule function had been reduced. This nitrogen deficiency should be temporary. Corn may suffer from N loss through de-nitrification. Unless more N is supplied, permanent yield reduction is possible. Sometimes floodwaters deposit silt and residue on leaves. Photosynthesis will be reduced until the soil and residue are washed from the leaves by subsequent rain. Finally roots are often damaged, and thus, more susceptible

to disease organisms. Disease symptoms may not appear until several weeks or even months after the flood event.

The result is multiplied by 100 so the tax rate will be expressed in cents per \$100 (one hundred dollars) valuation. All information provided herein is based on estimates.








Barry County Health Department Monthly Food Service Report

The Health Department divides food service code violations into two categories: Critical and Non-Critical Violations.

Critical Violations are more likely than other violations to contribute to food contamination, or illness and/or injury.

When checking off items for college, the Missouri Department of Insurance is encouraging families to review their insurance policies to see what is covered while students are away at college.

"It's important that students and parents discuss their insurance coverage now," said John M. Huff, director of the Department of wait until you need to file a claim to find out whether you have insurance coverage."

Huff says insurance needs and coverage may change when a student leaves for college. He offers these tips for families to make sure their college-bound students are properly covered:

Auto insurance: If your child is taking a car to college, check with your insurance agent. The price and coverage of your policy may change based on the city and state where your child will live. In addition, see if your insurance company offers a discount for a student's good grades. The department has

a new auto insurance guide and video that provides basic information on car insurance. The video and guide are located on the department's website at http://insurance. mo.gov/consumers/auto/ auto.php.

Homeowners and renters

insurance: Ask your agent if your child's possessions will be covered under your homeowners policy. Some policies cover a student's possessions if they live on campus. For students living off campus, consider renters insurance, which costs about \$8-21 per month. A landlord's policy will only cover the building, not the tenant's possessions. The department has a new new video that highlights basic renters insurance on its website insurance.mo.gov.

Health insurance: Most young adults can stay on their parents' health insurance up to age 26, regardless of marital status, financial dependency, residence or enrollment in school. Students should take copies of their insurance cards and check their parents' health insurance plans to know which physicians and hospitals are in their network while away at school.

The department also encourages college students, as well as all consumers, to complete a home inventory, which is an itemized checklist of all possessions. A home inventory can make the process of filing a claim much more efficient in the event of fire, storm damage




My basement is wet; now what?

Few things can cause for insects. more damage to a home than water. Leaks and flooding can cause various structural insufficiencies and lead to unsafe conditions in a home. Panic often sets in when water enters a home.

Some homeowners live in areas where a high water table inevitably forces groundwater up and into subterranean living spaces. Others may live close to coastal areas or rivers and streams that can overflow and cause home flooding. Still others who may not have had a water problem before learn that a heavy rainfall, and perhaps inadequate drainage outdoors, can cause water damage to a home.

Compounding these issues is the fact that very often a home's utility systems are located out of the way in basements, or these spaces may be finished to create additional living space. Water in a basement can be much more than a nuisance. Water can lead to thousands of dollars in damage.

Moisture or several inches of water in a basement is nothing to take lightly. Furnaces and water heaters damaged by water can be costly to replace. Wires that come in contact with water can become hazards and cause an electrical fire, and water in a basement may be a harbinger for bacteria and viruses, creating unsanitary living conditions in the home. Mold spores that have developed in a damp basement can spread to other areas of the home thanks to a heating and cooling forced air system. And a cool, damp spot can be the perfect habitat

When a basement develops a water problem, it is best to call in a professional. Although it might not be cheap, calling a professional can help you to remedy the situation faster than if you try several methods to fix the water problem yourself. When looking for a waterproofing company, recommendations from people you trust. Only do business with licensed professional contractors who are willing to give you a free estimate. You also can check out businesses by contacting consumer advocacy groups. You may be able to read up on their business practices and learn if there have been any complaints lodged against a company in the past.

Hydrostatic pressure, poor foundations and cracks can each cause water to enter the house. Each situation is different, and a combination of exterior and interior changes may need to be made. In order to alleviate some water problems, certain modifications must be made. While the following solutions may not be applicable in each situation, they are some of the more common modifications

plumbers suggest when fixing flooded basements.

- Sump pump: In some cases, the installation of a well and a submersible pump may be all that's needed to keep basements dry. When water rises high enough to start the pump, the sump pump will then expel the water out through a pipe to a drain or the street. Sometimes a sump pump works in concert with a French drainage system, which is a channel around the perimeter of the basement that funnels water to the sump pump well.
- Vapor barriers: Vinyl, plastic and paint encapsulation systems may be applied to the interior of foundation walls to serve as a barrier system. This prevents water or condensation from reaching the interior of the house. A vapor barrier may

extend below the foundation to direct water runoff into a drainage system.

- Exterior fixes: There are many ways to address flooding from outside the home. These include using outdoor vapor barriers and paints, having grading issues corrected so water will flow away from the home, digging of a swale to catch water away from the basement, exterior drainage systems, and utilizing specialized rain gutters and downspouts to direct water further away from the home during rainstorms.
- Plumbing repairs: Sometimes water issues may be the result of a pipe backup or a faulty appliance and not necessarily an outdoor water issue. In these cases, repairing the source of the leak may be all that's needed.


