## Jenkins native, MIA WWII veteran, interred in Arlington 80 years after death



now adorns the name of Barry County native, U.S. Army Sergeant John V. Phillips, known as "Johnnie" by his family. Johnnie's body is no longer in a grave in that cemetery, though.



After 80 years of uncertainty, Sgt. Phillips's body is home in the United States. Through the search and recovery efforts of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, the body of the

World War II veteran was positively identified from among the remains of some 2,500 troops once buried in Common Grave 225 in a Japanese prison camp during World War II. Positive iden-

tification through the use of DNA analysis was made in December 2019.

After identification, Sgt. Phillips's remains were transferred to Arlington National Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia, where they were interred in a special funeral service on September 13,

## CoxHealth warns of phone scam


CoxHealth would like to notify community members of a phone scam currently underway in southwest Missouri.

Numerous individuals have reached out to Cox-Health reporting that they have been called by someone attempting to connect about various health issues, such as pain management, or to

sell medical equipment (specifically braces, such as for backs). They even "spoofed" CoxHealth's name so that

## **Resurrection Church to Celebrate** 1st Anniversary

Resurrection Church, located just south of Cassville on Highway 112, will be celebrating its one year anniversary on Sunday, September 19. However, this church, unlike others in the area, is actually a 'replant.' Lead Pastor David Killingsworth and his team are trying to "plant a church that will plant churches," and possibly rebrand churches that have "come to the end of their season, rather than closing those buildings up and walking away."

John Atchley, founder of the previous church in the same location, Spiritual Streams (founded in 1980), passed away in 2003. Killingsworth felt this could be a time of rejuvenation. Kill-

## Meet the **KISS** Rebreathers dive team


Roaring River State Park will host a Meet & Greet event for the public on Saturday, September 25, 7:15 - 8:15 p.m., in the park's ampithe-

The event will give interested residents a chance to meet the divers who are currently filming and conducting research on Roaring River Spring. The team will be on hand to display its modern equipment and explain how divers safely navigate the dark underwater cavern. Visitors can expect to learn more about the KISS Dive Team's research, as well as the amazing discoveries the divers have made below the surface of Roaring River Spring.

Past dive teams from 1979 and 1999 were limited due to bulky traditional scuba equipment, and could descend only 224 feet into the spring before they were stopped by a narrow constriction. The KISS dive team has made history by not only squeezing past the restriction, but by also mapping and filming hundreds of feet beyond what was once considered the "bottom" of the spring.

Roaring River State Park ampitheater is located just south of the CCC Lodge on the road leading to the hatchery, at 12716 Farm Road 2239, Cassville.

ingsworth, of Miami, Oklahoma, is working on a PhD in Apologetics at Midwestern **Baptist Theological Seminary** in Kansas City, and lives just north of Berryville, Arkansas. Killingsworth has extensive experience in church leadership from the 23 years he spent as the pastor of Forerunner House of Prayer in Green Forest, Arkansas.

Resurrection Church is the same denomination as its predecessor, however, instead of "pure Pentecostal," Killingsworth affirmed that "in some areas, because of my background and my education, I'm going to emphasize the Perseverance of the Saints."

"During the time everything was shut down for Covid last year, we were feeling like planting a new church here. We got the approval of the owners (The Church of God of the Apostolic Faith) and decided when things started opening back up, we would begin with prayer meetings on Sunday night. We did that last June."

However, the spirit of Resurrection's predecessor isn't gone.

"We do have many people (on the Leadership team) with Resurrection were involved with Spiritual

The church also plans to launch a Youth Ministry in late October, but that's not where Killingsworth's plans end. Over the next twenty years or so, he plans to "plant seven or eight more churches," and even "spend more time teaching in a Bible college."

"The thing we say is, 'This, we do for the gospel's sake.' Whatever we are going to involve ourselves in, is going to be for the purpose of evangelism. Everything we do runs through that filter," Killingsworth said.

Killingsworth works as a CPA in Berryville and refuses to take a salary from the church.

Resurrection Church will be celebrating their one year anniversary on Sunday, September 19, at 10 a.m. with Craig Rogers as the service's evangelist and music led by Zack Hodgson.







#### PHILLIPS from FRONT

Arlington, his remains lay unidentified in the Manila cemetery, which - with 16, 859 - contains the largest number of U.S. WWII military dead, plus the 36,286 names of those who are, or were, missing.

Sergeant Phillips, a Barry County native from the Jenkins area, lived and played along Flat Creek as a boy, attended whatever rural oneroom school his father (John E. Phillips) was teaching in, and graduated from Jenkins High School with the ninemember Class of 1933 when he was 16 years old.

Shortly afterward, his family moved to Wasco, California, in search of better economic opportunities. There, Johnnie and his younger brother, Zane, joined the U.S. Army a few years prior to its involvement in World War

John Phillips was a radio operator for General McArthur's 31st Infantry, when

Japanese forces invaded the Bataan Peninsula in December of 1941. Intense fighting continued, until the Bataan Peninsula and Corregidor Island were surrendered by U.S. and Philippine forces on April 9, 1942, and May 6, 1942, respectively. Thousands of service members, including John Phillips, were captured and interned at POW camps after the surrender.

Phillips was officially reported missing in action in June of 1942. He was 25 years old. The date marked the beginning of years of uncertainty for his family.

"It was a terrible time," Bonnie Ragain, Phillips's closest living relative in Barry County, recalled. "I was just a little girl, but I remember how worried Uncle John and Aunt Vada were. 'I wonder what happened to Johnnie,' they'd always say."

According to Ragain, the last letter his mother (Vada Phillips) had received from him was in November of 1941.

Bonnie Ragain, a selfconfessed family historian and genealogist, saved a clipping from a 1942 issue of The Bakersfield Californian announcing that Johnnie was Missing in Action.

She also saved a 1945 clipping from The Wasco News announcing his death.

"The war was over," Ragain said, "before Uncle John and Aunt Vada found out that he was dead."

After the war ended, historical data revealed that Phillips died July 27, 1942, after enduring the forced Bataan Death March to a Japanese prison camp, almost 70 miles beyond the point where he and some 60,000 or more U.S. troops were initially taken captive.

According to a March 15, 1945, clipping from The Cassville Republican, Johnnie's parents learned of his

death from a young woman to whom he was engaged. Other sources report that he was married to the young woman, Claire Snyder Fuentes Phillips, for a short time prior to his death, a marriage which took place in the jungles of the Philippines.

Because John Phillips was buried in a common grave with other prisoners of war, authorities were unable to identify individual remains interred in Common Grave 225 when the grave containing more than 2,500 prisoners of war was exhumed after war's end. The unidentified were simply interred as "unknowns" in the present-day Manila American Cemetery and Memorial, and their names - including the name of John V. Phillips - were recorded on the Walls of the Missing in the 152-acre cemetery and memorial site commissioned by the American Battle Monuments Commission (AMBC).

On December 11, 2019,



Phillips' status was no longer unknown.

Because of the development of advanced mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) analysis capabilities, the bodies of the previously unidentified soldiers began to be exhumed in 2018 for the purpose of using DNA matches for positive identification, according to a January 21, 2020, press release from the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA).

With cooperation from John Phillips's brother Zane and his daughters, a sampling of Zane's DNA was taken which proved to match that of John Phillips.

With positive identification made, almost 80 years after his death, a final interment and funeral service took place at Arlington National Cemetery on September 13, 2021.

A final resting place, while sad in its connotation, can also bring closure for those still living, closure which John Phillips's parents had longed for.

Judy Eaton, of Jenkins Johnnie's cousin-once-removed - attended the military service in Arlington, along with her sister Jane Howe, of Exeter.

"It's what Uncle John and Aunt Vada would have wanted," said Eaton. "We loved them, and we know how much they missed Johnnie."

Eaton says the Arlington funeral was both an amazing and an emotional experience.

"There were 28 funerals scheduled in the cemetery that day," she said, "but each funeral took place separately, in different parts of the cemetery. Each service was made special for the family members and friends who attend-


During the service, the family was presented with a mosaic containing memorabilia from John Phillips's life and military career.

Barry County residents, Steve and Deanna Blankenship, of Jenkins, also attended, as did Barry County native Dawn Cope, of South Carolina. A 1978 Cassville High School graduate, Robert Gay, of Virginia, was present, as were several of John Phillips's nieces and nephews from California.

"We were able to meet some of our California relatives face to face for the very first time," Eaton said.

In addition to the military funeral for John Phillips in Arlington, the rosette placed beside his name on the Walls of The Missing in the Manila American Cemetery & Memorial represents another act of closure. The placement of a rosette traditionally signifies that a soldier has been recovered or his body identified.

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency continues its efforts to identify additional services members over 80,000, according to its Facebook page - who are still missing in action from all U.S. wars. Its mission is to provide the fullest possible accounting for missing personnel to their families and the nation.



As the water drops, the fish become very finicky at times, so you'll have to try different colors when fishing plastics. White is usually a good color in clear water; the natural browns and more natural colors sometimes work better, but try the bright colors. There are days that the trout will key in on yellow or orange.

Eggs are a great choice when the water is clear, and small #16 or #18 hook and a B or BB shot about 18" from the egg, fished in the riffles, can be very effective when the water is low.

Black, brown, and olive spinners will work well the first 30 minutes, and so will 4 lb. line but then you'll need to switch to 2 lb. line and power baits and or marabou jigs to really catch a bunch of trout.

Fly fishing is still fantastic right now. Caddis, Adams, Blue Wing Olives and Lt. Cahills are working every day, and with the dry, hot conditions, we are still doing great on ants, beetles, hoppers, stimulators, and on crackle backs.

Lots of trout being caught on black, brown, olive, and orange zebra midges. When fishing flies smaller than #16's, I'm using a 9' 7X leader. On the bigger flies, I'm still getting by with a 9' 6X leader.

A Hopper dropper combo is working well right now, a bigger fly on top with about 2' of tippet tied on the hook of the top fly, and a smaller nymph attached to the tippet.

Good nymphs right now, pheasant tails (always work), sow bugs, burlaps, copper johns, and asst. Zebra midges are all working well right now.

First thing in the morning, a black, olive, or brown wooly bugger will usually catch trout pretty well. They will work all day. I use bigger buggers early, and switch to smaller buggers later in the day.

Marabou jigs are great right now. The water is perfect for sight fishing.

Black/yellow, white, olive, brown, and black/white have all been good color of marabou jigs.

Good luck on the river this week.

Use a good 2 lb. line, something clear, or moss green.

Now is when monarch butterflies are migrating through Missouri to their wintering grounds in central Mexico, which makes it an excellent time to have a program about them.

People can learn more about these beautiful butterflies, the migration they make, and the pollination benefits they provide people at the Sept. 25 Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) program "Monarchs Rule." This free event, which will be from 10-11 a.m. at MDC's Springfield Conservation Nature Center, is for ages 10 and older. The importance of having monarch butterflies around is about much more than seeing pretty butterflies in flower gardens. Studies have shown that the financial benefits provided to U.S. citizens by the pollination activities of butterflies and other insects can be measured in the billions of dollars.

Just as impressive, but much more mysterious, are the annual autumn migrations monarchs make to central Mexico. No monarch makes the trip more than once (the butterflies live about a year), yet migrating monarchs end up at the same location year after year. MDC Volunteer Naturalist Dana Tideman will discuss theories about the annual monarch migration and will also talk about this butterfly's life cycle and what plants provide good habitat for these colorful butterflies during the time they're in Missouri. Tideman will also discuss how to tag monarchs to assist with the research being done on this fascinating insect.

Though this program is

free, registration is required. Program registrants should note that they now have the option to link their children's accounts to their own, which will streamline the program registration process. Once a group account is set up, parents will be able to register their children for an event without having to log-off or log-in for each person. This allows parents to register an entire family or select family members for an event at the same time.

## Nevada remains unbeaten, wins against Cassville

Then there were two.

Three weeks into the season, only two tigers remain unbeaten in the Big 8. The Nevada Tigers went on the road and racked up a 46-20 win at Cassville, while the Lamar Tigers hosted and roasted McDonald County,

Conversely, Rogersville, Springfield Catholic, and Mt. Vernon remained winless.

At Cassville, Nevada's Tigers roared to a 14-0 lead in the opening four minutes when the Wildcats fumbled on their very first play from scrimmage. Another Cassville lost fumble in the last four minutes of the half helped propel Nevada to a

30-14 lead.

The Wildcats scored on their opening possession of the second half to slice the lead to 30-20, but the Tigers scored twice more on drives of 64 and 75 yards to secure the 46-20 victory.

This game was not as lopsided as the score would indicate. Although Nevada passed the eye test as the bigger and faster team, Cassville's young squad more than held its own on the line of scrimmage. The Wildcats used their deep conditioning base to claw back into contention after digging the 14-0 hole. But turnovers doomed Cassville's comeback efforts. Three fumbles and an interception proved too costly

against this talented Nevada team.

#### **GAME SUMMARY**

Cade Beshore found Avious Steadman open for a 40yard touchdown pass to give the Tigers an 8-0 lead to open the game. Then the Wildcats coughed up the football with a fumbled center-quarterback exchange, and the Nevada defense recovered at the Cassville 35-yard line. Six plays later, Jordan Johnson bulled into the end zone to give Nevada a 14-0 lead with 8:34 on the first quarter

The Wildcats answered with a 12-play, 72-yard drive. Cutter Hicks completed two crucial passes, and Bryson Jacobson carried seven times,

capping off the drive with a three-yard plunge out of the wishbone. Peter Littlefield's PAT cut the lead to 14-7.


It was as close as the Wildcats would get.

Steadman reeled off a 59-yard TD run as Nevada scored in just two plays to push the lead to 22-7.

Cassville fought back, picking away at Nevada's 4-4 defense. Clay Weldy's scheme for this game had multiple receivers at all levels, impossible to cover with just three defensive backs. Hicks directed a seven-play, 65-yard drive that spilled over into the second quarter. With a first down at the Nevada 35-yard line, Hicks drilled a strike to Hernan Hernandez for 19 yards, then tossed a 16-yard touchdown pass to Isaac Hadlow. Another Littlefield conversion cut the lead to 22-14.

But another Cassville fumble gave Nevada a short field late in the half. The Tigers drove 33 yards in just seven plays to take a 30-14 lead when Nevada's 6-5 tight end Drew Beachler won a jump ball in the end zone for a 16-yard TD reception with just eight seconds on the clock.

The Wildcats struck back on the opening possession of the third quarter. On thirdand-seven from his own 38-




Above, Wildcat player, Cutter Hicks, prepares to pass during Friday night's game against Nevada. Photo by Priscilla Craig.

yard line, Hicks threw deep, hitting Jake Anthonysz in full stride. The Cassville junior raced into the end zone to complete the 62-yard scoring play. Trailing by 10, the Wildcats attempted a twopoint conversion but failed.

Nevada answered with a six-play, 64-yard drive. Workhorse running back Case Sanderson tightroped the sideline for a 25-yard score, then tossed to Beachler on a trick play for the twopoints and a 38-20 lead.

The Wildcats turned the ball over on downs but held and forced a punt. Three big Hicks completions fueled a drive that reached the Nevada 25-yard line. But a third

## Heirloom apples are ripe for the picking

September is prime apple picking time in the lower Midwestern states.

Not only are new cultivars available in stores during September, but many heirloom apple cultivars are at their peak in farm markets and U-pick operations, says Michele Warmund, University of Missouri Extension horticulturist.

Some of the heirloom apples – grown for 50 to more than 100 years - available in September include Jonathan, Red Delicious, Golden Delicious and Empire. Time of harvest depends on the weather. Daytime temperatures at or above 90 F can accelerate ripening by as much as two weeks while cool, cloudy days delay harvest.

Warmund says each heirloom apple has its own unique history, taste, color and uses.

Jonathan is a tart, juicy, medium-sized red apple. It ripens in late August to early September. With its relatively short storage life, Jonathan is best eaten before December, even when refrigerated.

The Jonathan apple tree is believed to have been an open-pollinated seedling of the Esopus Spitzenberg apple. First described in 1826 ery catalogs, the improved by Judge Jesse Buel in an article for the New York Horticultural Society, Jonathan gets its name from Jonathan Hasbrouck, who brought the apple to Buel's attention.

By the mid-19th century, Jonathan was one of the most commonly produced apples in the eastern U.S. Stark Bro's Nurseries & Orchards Co. in Louisiana, Missouri, promoted it as the "Queen's Favorite" in its 1896 catalog, noting that Queen Victoria "had a carload sent over for the royal table."

Jonathan has been used as a breeding parent to develop many other apples. Although the original Jonathan clone has disappeared from nursstrains remain a Midwestern favorite.

The infamous Red Delicious apple was submitted to Stark Bro's First International New Fruit Show, in 1893. The show was designed to find better-tasting alternatives to the Ben Davis apple widely grown in the Midwest. After biting into an oddly elongated red apple with stripes and five prominent calyx lobes, Clarence Stark proclaimed, "Delicious! That will be its name. Who sent them?"

A frantic search failed to find the entry card with submission information. Undaunted, Stark sent letters to each entrant, inviting them to send fruit next year. Once again, Jesse Hiatt sent his sweet, oddly shaped apple he called Hawkeye to the 1894 Fruit Show, where it won first prize. Soon thereafter, Stark Bro's purchased the rights to what would become the Stark Delicious apple.

The Stark brothers were ecstatic about the apple, but others were not so impressed because it lacked the preferred round shape. To promote this new apple, Stark Bro's included 10 free trees with each large order. Subsequently, Red Delicious became one of the most important cultivars grown worldwide.

Another important Stark Bro's acquisition was the Golden Delicious. In 1912, A.H. Mullins sent Stark Bro's three yellow apples with a long storage life in his cellar. Lloyd and Paul Stark Sr. were so excited by this discovery that Paul pursued the "golden apple" to a remote point on Porter's Creek in West Virginia. Stark Bro's bought the rights to Mullins' tree and the 90 square feet around it for \$5,000.

Golden Delicious gained high praise from pomologists and growers across the United States. Like Jonathan and Red Delicious, the original Golden Delicious is a progenitor of many other strains and popular cultivars, including the Gala apple.

Empire is a mildly tart, medium-sized red apple distinguished by the naturally occurring whitish wax on its surface. The original McIntosh x Red Delicious cross was produced at the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station in the 1940s. The resulting cultivar was named Empire in recognition of the Empire State of New York. Due to their McIntosh parentage, Empire apples are best eaten soon after harvest in mid-to-late September and can be stored in the refrigerator for up to three months.

## Stock Market Insights

Dr. Richard L. Baker, AIF® Executive Vice President/ Wealth Advisor

Sometimes my wife has to remind me to lower my expectations, especially when I'm ordering a steak. I am naturally optimistic and have high expectations, but sometimes my expectations are unrealistic and I need to dial them back.

This week market analysts started dialing back their expectations for the economy for the rest of 2021. Argus

Research Company lowered their GDP forecast by 11%. Goldman Sachs lowered its forecast for the remainder of the year because of a "harder path ahead" for consumer spending.

There are reasons for the lowering of expectations besides COVID.

America, like a drug addict, is struggling to wean itself off of government stimulus such as mortgage forbearance, renters' eviction protection, and supplemen-

tal unemployment benefits. All of these are expiring soon or have already expired in the last few days.

The Mortgage Forbearance Program allowed people affected by COVID-19 to not pay their mortgage payments for up to a year. Nearly 1.6 million Americans enrolled in this program and half of them are scheduled to start making payments again at the end of October. We will see how many of them were smart with their money and can restart making their biggest monthly payment.

The end of the Eviction Moratorium affects a lot more Americans. This program blocked landlords from evicting renters who aren't current on their rental payments. This program helps renters but hurts landlords. New York extended the moratorium in its state, but the Supreme Court blocked a national extension. There are

an estimated 11 million renters who are behind on their rent and over 4 million that are so far behind they could be evicted.

The Federal Supplemental Unemployment benefit expired on Labor Day (9/6/21) for the remaining states who hadn't opted out of the program. Economists estimate over 10 million people were still receiving supplemental unemployment and have lower unemployment benefits now.

It will be interesting to see how much spending is affected by all of these government stimulus programs ending at nearly the same time. The companies we invest in need Americans with available cash to buy their products. Consumer spending, which is what we call purchasing of individual American families, make up nearly 70% of the US economy.

Though many Americans will be negatively affected by the ending of these government stimulus programs a whole lot more Americans are doing well. I think we could have some short-term bumps in the road, but I expect the US and international economies to continue to be

positive. Even though it's losing momentum I still feel like it's the best option for returns, especially with the current bank rates.

If the current market was a steak, it would be a sirloin. Not a filet mignon or ribeye but not a hamburger steak either. Lowering our expectations to the reality of our situation, whether the stock market or steak, helps a lot.





## Landowner enrollment open for MO Outdoor Recreational Access Program


The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is now accepting applications through Oct. 15 for the Missouri Outdoor Recreational Access Program (MRAP). The program provides participating landowners with annual incentive payments of \$15 - \$25 per enrolled acre and financial assistance to improve wildlife habitat on their properties for public walk-in hunting, fishing, or wildlife viewing. The standard landowner commitment period is three years, with annual renewal opportunities.

MRAP funding is provided by a U.S. Department of Agriculture federal grant. This funding allows for the additional enrollment of approximately 10,000 acres into MRAP this year.

The recreation allowed on each property varies according to the public access option selected by the participating land-owner. MRAP access types include all access hunting and fishing, small game and turkey hunting, youth only hunting and fishing, archery hunting, fishing only, or wildlife viewing. Most MRAP access types are open to the public year-round, however, archery hunting and small game and turkey properties are open only during relevant legal seasons.

Offered lands must meet minimum eligibility requirements such as being at least 40 contiguous acres or at least

a one-acre pond for fishing access. Wildlife viewing properties must be at least five contiguous acres and be located within highly populated counties. Eligible lands must be comprised of at least 20% quality wildlife habitat such as native grass fields, crop field buffers, restored wetlands, or managed woodlands.

Public use is limited to foot traffic only. Properties must be open one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset. Equipment and gear are carry-in-carry-out daily.

Participating landowners are offered liability protection through Missouri's Recreational Use Immunity Law.

To apply, complete the MRAP Application. Completed applications can be submitted to local MDC Private Land Conservationists, Quail Forever Farm Bill Biologists, or emailed to Rachel.Williams@mdc.mo.gov by Oct. 15.

This free online program will be from 6-7 p.m. on Sept. 24 and is being put on by the staff of MDC's Shoal Creek Conservation Education Center in Joplin. This program is open to all ages, but recommended for ages 5 and up. People can register at: https://mdc-event-web.s3licensing.com/Event/EventDetails/179579

At this online program, MDC Naturalist Jessie Ballard will cover the basics of how to make your next nature walk or long hike a success. She will discuss how to find trails near you, how to find out what you can see on those trails, and how to ensure that family members of all ages will enjoy their outdoor treks.

Though the Sept. 24 program is free, registration is required to participate using the link above. Registrants must provide an e-mail, so a program link can be sent to them. This program will include a chat-based question-and-answer period where participants can interact with the presenters.

Program registrants should note that they now have the option to link their children's accounts to their own, which will streamline the program registration process. Once a group account is set up, parents will be able to register their children for an event without having to log-off or log-in for each person. This allows parents to register an entire family or select family members for an event at the same time.
