# **SWEPCO** slated to run through Barry County

Southern Barry County is facing a rising concern in the community with a recent change regarding the Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO). On Friday, January 17, Arkansas Public Service Commission Administrative Law Judge Connie Griffin filed an order allowing SWEPCO to use alternative Route 109 in order to build a 345,000 volt transmission line through northwest Arkansas and into southwest Missouri.

Griffin's order has 30 days to be approved by the threemember commission. However, the Missouri Public Service Commission has yet to receive any information or action on the SWEPCO project.

The route would take 150-foot-tall electrical transmission towers just north of the state line for almost 25 miles, damaging the landscape and even requiring some residents to move because of placement of the lines

SWEPCO originally introduced the project in April 2013 in order to alleviate overloads on the transmission system in Benton and Carol Counties while extending and reinforcing the high voltage transmission network serving northwest Arkansas and southern Missouri.

Peter Main, public relations specialist for SWEPCO, stated that Southwest Power Pool (SPP), which SWEPCO is a member of, directed the power company to carry out the building project to improve reliability.

"Our preferred route was Route 33, running from Shipe Road Substation in Benton County to the proposed Kings River Substation in Carroll County," stated Main. "However, we are pleased that the Administrative Law Judge has confirmed the need for the transmission project and selected a route for the facilities," he continued.

Main also stated, "We are certainly aware of the

many concerns about this project. We will work hard to complete the project in a responsible manner that will minimize the impact while serving the needs of electric consumers across the region."

The transmission project caused great controversy last year and led to the development of Save the Ozarks organization in Eureka Springs, Arkansas, where residents took it upon themselves to be proactive in the fight against SWEPCO and the transmission line project. After months of campaigning and voicing their opinions in hearings, Route 33 escaped the limelight and Route 109 was chosen as an alternative.

"We are firmly convinced So

that there is no need for this SWEPCO project. Our expert witness, Dr. Hyde Merrill, presented persuasive evidence that the project does not meet a public need, and that, even if such a need were to exist, it could be met by means other than construction of the proposed 345 kV

# Cassville seeks approval for \$4 million bond issue

The Cassville R-IV School District is hoping to get a bond issue passed on the April ballot that would give the school the authority to borrow \$4 million to complete a variety of back logged projects within the district at no cost to the taxpayers of Barry County.

The bond measure proposed by the Board would allow the school to borrow money to make a variety of repairs, upgrades and catch up on general maintenance on all buildings within the district. However, this would be done at no additions to the current debt service levy with the County.

When the district was approved for the FEMA grant after being in planning stages for two and a half years, Superintendent Richard Asbill said that they had to act quickly to begin planning for the required grant funding. The FEMA shelter completed in August 2013 was not a 100 percent grant provided by FEMA, but the District is required to provide 25 percent of the initial grant, plus 100 percent of an additional features that were non-FEMA like, such as seating, staging, flooring, etc.

For three years, a variety of projects that the school intended to complete were put on the back burner until the FEMA building could be completed and free up resources.

John Sullivan, Board president, stated, "For over 25 years, we have made it a priority to maintain our facilities and keep our school the center of pride for our communities. The board maintains a conservative approach to all our projects and looks at opportunities to improve facilities that will last and have long term saving opportunities."

If voters approve the bond issue, the potential payback would be on a schedule of 15 to 20 years. Jon Horner, Board finance committee representative, pointed out that the favorable interest rates would make more financial sense that waiting, even paying over multiple years. Horner stated that it is a prime time to borrow because there is an extremely competitive construction market currently.


Asbill stated, "Why we are asking voters to approve this measure is that it would allow us to catch back up on proj-

# Student allegedly bullied by substitute

For one student in the Exeter School District, bullying became too much to handle, but the bull was not the person you would expect.

The boy's mother said that her son and another child were bullied, but not just by other students. Her main complaint is that the bullying was done by a substitute teacher for the district.

The boy has attended Exeter Schools for a number of years, and this year, the boy who, will be called John to protect his identity, was bullied to the point that his mother removed him from school.

The incident allegedly occurred during class when John and another child were singled out by the substitute, being made fun of for their clothing and weight. As if that were not enough, the mother said the substitute encouraged other kids to join in, even using profanity in front of the students. John was distressed to the point of tears, begging to not be sent back to the school once he got home.

While many districts, including Exeter, use programs and curriculum to make students aware of bullying and the damages done by it, one wouldn't expect that a teacher charged with safeguarding young students would initiate it.

When asked about the incident, Superintendent for the Exeter R-VI School District, Dr. Ernest Raney, was restricted about what information he could provide since the issue involves personnel.

Raney stated, "We take complaints and matters like these very seriously. We want to put our students first. I have faith that Mr. Taylor (Exeter High School's principal) will be thorough in his

investigation and discourse with all involved."

Raney went on, "Once Mr. Taylor finishes his investigation, we will be reporting to the Board on Wednesday." The Exeter R-VI School Board will meet at 7 p.m. in the High School Library, but personnel matters are always closed session and not open to the public.

John's mother said, "What am I supposed to do when my child comes home and says that he wants to die? I had no choice but to take him out. I'll do anything to keep him safe."

John's mother admits that the boy was a victim of bullying for the last five years. She stated, "It isn't something new. We've been dealing with it for awhile, but you wouldn't expect it from an adult."

According to the mother, the substitute even went as far as to encourage other students to join in. Her decision to pull him was after he had been sent back following the incident and was still being ridiculed.

She stated, "Nothing was being done. The same group of kids was still making fun of him, and nothing was being done about it even when the regular teacher was back." She said John didn't even want to tell the administration about the incident for fear of more ridicule, exactly what the mother said ended up happening.

Raney stated, "At the elementary level, our counselor is in every classroom every week taking a proactive approach to teaching our young people how to interact in a positive and caring manner. Lessons related to bullying help our students to be prepared for dealing with these issues effectively. Additionally, Caring Kids committees are used to help some of our students who need support from their peers to work through challenges they may be dealing with which could include bullying."

Raney continued, "At the Junior High and High School, Mrs. Crouch works with students who report bullying to equip them with skills so they don't become the victim in these situations. Assemblies are conducted to promote positive behavior and for the purpose of 'bully proofing' our district."

All substitutes that serve within the Exeter District are certified though the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). The final decision to hire or fire substitute teachers is made by the Exeter Board of Education, but Raney stated that using a substitute on the list is up to administrative discretion. In other words, the District does not have to use a substitute just because they are on the list.

After the Board's meeting, DESE will be made aware of any findings made during the investigation of the incident. Raney stated, "We are going to take the proper steps to ensure that our students have the best experience possible in our district."

transmission line." stated Dr. Pat Costner, director of Save the Ozarks.

She also gave advice to Missouri residents regarding the issue, "There is strength in numbers. Missouri residents will benefit by working together. Options include working with or joining Save the Ozarks or other organizations that oppose SWEPCO's plan or forming new organizations. It is important to begin immediately to seek the support of elected officials, state agencies, federal agencies, municipal and county governments, civic organizations, faith-based organizations and communities, etc. "

When speaking of the transmission line, Griffin stated, "I find Route 109 fulfills the requirements and is both feasible and reasonable. The route will facilitate the transmission of electricity as require by the needs assessment. While Route 109 will cost slightly more than Route 33, cost is not the only factor to be considered. Route 109 is longer, and it crosses more undeveloped lands with larger parcels. As such, Route 109 has a lower residential proximity and visibility, and crosses fewer parcels and major roads."

This statement Route 109 look like the least plausible route in the eyes of many residents. This decision will require SWEPCO to obtain additional regulatory approval from the appropriate Missouri agency in order to proceed with the


transmission line. Griffen also stated that Route 109 "has a lesser impact on residential areas and a lesser aesthetic impact." Her order will to the Arkansas Public Service Commission (ASPC), where they have 30 days to either accept, modify or reject the proposal. If they fail to act, a new order will need to be filed.

Scott Fitzpatrick, District 158 Representative for Missouri, stated, "Senator Sater and I are going to try and set up a meeting with the PSC for this coming week to discuss the issue. Representative Lant from McDonald County will be in attendance, as well. The three of us will do everything we can to ensure that this route is not approved in Missouri. I will also be researching legislative options to prevent this from occurring.



# Wattam begins Navy Jet/Strike training

Navy Ensign Ben E. Wattam, son of Charles Wattam, of Shell Knob, and Dianne Wattam, of Mobile, Alabama, recently reported to Naval Air Station (NAS) Kingsville, Texas.

At NAS Kingsville, Wattam will undergo 13 months of intermediate and advanced Jet/Strike training in the Boeing T-45 Goshawk before earning his wings and designation as a Naval Aviator.

Jet/Strike training is broken into two phases over a 53-week period.

During phase one, students receive Ground School training in instrument flying, T-45 flight simulator training in formation flying, day formation flying, and airways navigation.

In phase two, students are trained in night flying, low altitude flying, air-to-ground training, tactical formation flying, air combat maneuvering, and air-to-ground weapons training.

The final evolution of the training takes the students to an active aircraft carrier for landing qualifications.

Once students success-

fully complete the Jet/Strike training, they are designated as Naval Aviators and presented their "Wings of Gold."

The new aviators then move to a Fleet Replacement Squadron where they will learn and train on their specific fleet aircraft.

Wattam is a 2008 graduate of McGill Toolen Catholic High School, Mobile, Alabama, and a 2012 graduate of Georgia Institute of Technology, Atlanta, Georgia, graduating with a Bachelor's of Business Administration—Finance.

# Curtis F Marbut, Barry County's most famous son, part III

When, in 1909, USDA Lor and Bao Lor of St. Paul, Bureau of Soils Chief Milton Whitney came to the University as keynote speaker at the annual Farmer's Week activities, he lured Marbut into the federal service as Special Agent in the national survey. Marbut's first task was to make a reconnaissance soil survey of the Ozark region of Arkansas and Missouri. However. Marbut's wife Florence died from pneumonia that same

year, leaving him in care of the family. When he was promoted to Scientist in the Soil Survey in 1910, he took a 2- year leave of absence from UMC for him and the family to take up residence in Washington, DC.

Marbut began his federal professional career by publishing the results of his Ozark soil survey in 1911, and leading the preparation of a monumental tome on US soils published in 1913. He was appointed Scientist- in-Charge of the Soil Survey in 1913, but he and the family returned to the UMC. Suddenly, he decided to return to Washington and left the family at home in Columbia with a housekeeper to begin the most significant part of his professional life.

Upon his return to Washington, Marbut revisited the soil survey conceptdescription problem. He wrote to Louise about the situation that, "For four years I continued to grope in darkness without a ray of light."

In 1921, at the American Survey Workers Soil Association (ASSA) meeting in East Lansing, Michigan, he introduced the Russian concepts of classification and soil profile without identifying their origin. Founded in 1920, was an organization started by scientists in soil survey for the promotion and publication of their ideas. Roy W. Simonson, however, has stated that the ASSA was formed "to counteract the growing influence of C.F. Marbut." Nevertheless, the ASSA was influential in disseminating ideas and it joined with the Soils Section of the American Society of Agronomy to create the Soil Science Society of America (SSSA) in 1936. He worked with ASSA colleagues and soil survey parties to apply these 'new ideas' in the USA.

# **Traffic** fatalities up in county

The state of Missouri continued to see a decrease in traffic fatalities in 2013 according to the Missouri State Highway Patrol's preliminary statistics. With the exception of a slight increase in 2012, the past seven years has shown a downward trend in fatal accidents across the

There have only been two years since 1949 that the state has experienced fewer than 800 traffic-related fatalities, 2011 and 2013. Between the years of 2005 and 2012, total crashes in the state decreased by 21 percent.

However, of the 741 people killed in crashes in 2013, 63 percent were not restrained by seat belts or safety devices. All motorists and passengers should be restrained in a seat belt or child restraint anytime they are in a motor vehicle.

While the state as a whole had fewer traffic crash-related deaths for the year, locally, Barry County's troop had a slight increase. Barry County lies in Troop D which also includes counties: Barton, Cedar, Christian, Dade, Dallas, Dade, Greene, Hickory, Jasper, Lawrence, McDonald, Newton, Polk, St. Clair, Stone, Taney, Vernon and Webster. In 2013, 140 vehicle deaths were reported, whereas there were only 133 in 2012, and 135 in 2011. Any data reported for 2013 is subject to change as late deaths occur or departments report deaths after time of publica-

Crash-related fatalities specifically within Barry County have gone against state trends, increasing in recent years. For 2013, 11 fatalities were reported by the State of Missouri STARS reporting system. In 2012, the county had 10 fatalities, and in 2010, there were only seven deaths. Barry County still experienced a dramatic decrease comparatively to years 2005 and 2006 where there were 18 and 19 fatalities respectively.

# Meth bust yields jail time for one

Local man, Billy Hutchins, was sentenced to 90 days of jail time and two years of unsupervised probation after receiving an execution of sentence suspended following a methamphetamine investiga-

Luckey and Crouch were given permission to search the vehicle by Donald Snyder. Once all passengers exited the vehicle, they found the evidence purchased at Walmart with a receipt with the current date. Agent Crouch then placed Hutchins in hand restraints and advised him he was being arrested for purchase of chemicals with intent to manufacture methamphetamine.

During the search of Hutchins clothing, he was found to be in possession of a syringe and a package of lithium batteries. He was read the Miranda Rights and waiver while being searched.

Hutchins then stated that he bought the items for his own personal use, and the other occupants did not know about the purchase. He was then transported to the Barry County Jail by officer Jennifer Luckey. All evidence was photographed and seized by Agent John Luckey and transported to the DTF evidence room.

# BC prepares to finalize 2014 budget

Charlea Mills

For Barry County's Commissioners Cherry Warren, Wayne Hendrix and Gary Schad, Thursday, January 23, marks the finalization of the much-anticipated 2014 budget decisions with additional funds generated by the sales tax initiative passed in April of last year.

Budget proposals received by each of the offices within the county's jurisdiction came in around \$500,000 more than last year. For 2013, the approved total budget (including emergency funds) was \$3,173,703 with the actual budget coming in just under that amount at \$3,164,283.

This year, the total budget requests, including emergency funds, was \$3,677,255. Funds requested by all

According Gary to Youngblood, each of the departments is seeking a six-percent pay increase for their employees. Non-elected County employees have not received a pay increase since 2007. While employees did receive an additional two percent pay bump in 2013, Youngblood explained that was to combat additional Social Security taken from their paychecks. He stated, "It was to keep them from a decrease in their paychecks since Social Security deductions changed."

## Mineral Springs was once a flourishing resort town, part IV

Continued from January 15's edition.

By Murial Ash, published in The Cassville Republican on March 3, 1955

Upon being told by a blind man that there was a huge body of water behind the spring opening, Mr. Lohmer had the idea to blast the spring area and find the lake. Having a whole lake of this wonderful mineral water would add greatly to the popularity of the resort. Whether this was merely a joke enjoyed by the blind man or whether he actually had some basis for his story of the lake is not known; however, "Judge" Lohmer took the story seriously and about 1886 he began blasting around the spring in an attempt to locate a big lake of the precious water. But, unfortunately, he found no large opening behind the spring, and only succeeded in disarranging the grounds surrounding the spring. Evidence of the blasting is visible now as the concrete on the outside of the spring house is torn away and broken off, said to be a result of this venture. This blasting incident also caused damage to the bath house which was located nearby, and it eventually had to be torn down, along with ruining the basin which had been erected to catch the water coming from the spring.

After all this activity surrounding the Spring and after enjoying some very prosperous years, the town began to go down. During the years of 1886 to 1890, some of the largest holders of property in the community decided that more and better business opportunities for the year around existed in Cassville and surrounding towns, and the business houses began to close down as the owners left for richer grounds. One of the hotels, which was owned by D.P. (Pat) Pharia, was moved to Cassville and stood across the street from where the LeCompte Lumber Company now stands, but it eventually burned down. The store which was operated by S.R. Revnolds and also another hotel which was operated were either closed or moved away. The "republican" newspaper was moved to Cassville and various other businesses were moved and, as the activities of the town began

to slow down and the promoters to move away, the tourist trade also began to slacken. Although until just a few years ago there have always been visitors to the Spring to use the water, the great groups that came in the early years were never experienced again.

Mr. and Mrs. Brandon remember many humorous things that have happened during their life time in and around Mineral Springs, but one that remains very clear to Mrs. Brandon is the arrival of the first car on the scene. It seems that the new contraption, owned and being driven by Mr. Dave Dingler of Cassville, came into town at an unthought of rate of speed and Mrs. Brandon's two girls, who were doing their chores in

the yard, were so scared that they rushed to the house and refused to return to their work until they could no longer hear the roar of the car engine.

The town today is much smaller with there being little evidence left of the "city" that existed there in the 1880's, and the grocery store, which is owned and operated by Mr. Frank Tryan, is the only business building left. This store building was erected about 1913 after the one that previously stood there was destroyed by fire. Although there was a cooperative canning factory which operated around 1925, only the building remains, the factory having not operated for several years.

The Spring, which is lo-

cated about 250 yards down a steep incline directly behind the store building, is still producing crystal clear water, and has never failed or seemed to show any decline, and the concrete trough, which now catches the water, was built in 1912. Mr. Brandon remembers the date because it was just two days before the bonds were voted to build the

Cassville Courthouse. The hotels, bath house and dwellings along the pathway leading to the spring are gone and, although the mountains are still as picaresque as they were described in 1880, the only remaining visible evidence of the "Incorporated City of Mineral Springs" is the Spring itself.



Among the projects that the district would like to address includes repaving drives and parking lots, roof repairs, bathroom improvements and many other areas.

Asbill stated, "This bond issue request is much different than what the District has normally asked voters to approve. In the past 25 years, we have asked the voters to approve bond issues tied to the construction of a complete building like the high school in the mid-90s, the high school classroom expansion, and the Intermediate School in 2001. This request will impact all of our buildings kindergarten through 12th grade."

"This request will impact the overall district from energy usage, safety, energy access, technology improvements and improvements to drives, roofs, doors, bathrooms and other facility areas that we take for granted on a daily basis. We hope that the voters find merit in what we have done with the FEMA buildings and see that we have been good stewards and want to complete these other facility improvements to assist with the overall operational plans of the district," Asbill concluded.

Each of the classes in this education series is part



# Sen. Sater receives award from MO Cattlemen

to do everything we can to protect our farmers from extremist groups, overregulation and cattle rustlers attacking our livelihood."





A group of Southwest High School students ventured out into the Barry County historical community on Thursday, January 16, as part of an advanced class they are taking this se-

The group of 15 students are enrolled in an AP Language and Composition class taught by Linda Morgan at the school. The class focuses on improving writing skills and preparing for college, and the group was treated to a tour of the Barry County Courthouse, historic Bayless-Salyer house, Barry County Museum, Cassville Library and Roaring River to spark communication

and critical thinking as part of their community unit.

Gary Youngblood, Barry County Clerk, led the group on a tour of the Courthouse on the square in downtown Cassville. Sherry Sears, Barry County Assessor, and Janice Varner, Barry County Collector, also helped with the tour, showing the students the old jail cell in the basement and the safes no longer in use.

Then former Barry County Historical and Genealogy Society president Georgia Hart led the students on a tour of the Bayless-Salyer house, explaining the work done on each room and the history of the iconic Barry County home.

Hart and her husband, Bud, opened the house up to the students who were filled with fascination. A few of the students expressed that the structure was their dream home. As the students inspected the renovation progress from top to bottom, the cellar being a point of interest, they learned important facts about the Barry County families who played an integral part of the construction and renovations to the house over the years.

The next stop was a tour led by Cheyne Matzenbacher from the Roaring River Nature Center. Matzenbacher detailed the purchase of the site for three mills years ago, but also the history tied to the CCC and construction. Matzenbacher asked the students to write a creative writing assignment

about what the old pine trees at Roaring River would say if they could tell their story.

Students also visited the Cassville library's Genealogy Room and the schoolhouse at the Barry County Museum.

Students enrolled in the AP Language and Composition class are eligible for college credit for the course if they pass a College Board test in May. According to Morgan, "This unit is intended to help my students think long and hard about the meaning of community, especially with the changing world view of it."



Under new business, the Board approved revisions to the district's 2013-2014 calendar, stipulating that January 20, February 14, March 17, April 21, May 15, 16, 19, 20 and 21 will now be days that school will be in session. Should more school cancellations occur during the remainder of the winter season, additional revisions could be made. The Board also reviewed and approved the curricula for the district's family and consumer sciences, business, agriculture and physical education programs.

Pertaining to administrative reports, the Board reviewed winter sports information, submitted by athletics director Kenny Ferguson as well as the monthly maintenance report by director Tom Lawrence and administrative reports by Judy Randall, Beverly Bonner, Tosha Watson, Wanda Smith, Kara Hendrix and Bob Walker. During these reports, the Board approved two cooperative agreements with the Ozarks Area Community Action Corporation, set up to better serve children with disabilities and/or poverty issues. Superintendent Walker also provided an update on the track and field project, sharing that the contractor was hoping to asphalt during the week of January 20 if conditions allow. The early winter and consistent episodes of frozen precipitation have delayed the project's completion.

The Board was in executive session one hour and thirty-seven minutes discussing personnel items.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for February 13 at 7:00 p.m. in the High School library.



Reid has worked at Indiana University, Camp Mc-Dowell Environmental Center, in Alabama, the United States Forest Service in Ju-



#### Henderson honors memory of fallen warriors

Local graduate student Jesse Henderson, of Cassville, was one of the 16 College of the Ozarks students chosen out of 350 applicants to participate in the commemoration of the 70th anniversary of the Battle of the Atlantic. The students traveled to England with World War II veterans of the 8th United States Army Air Corps and the US Merchant Marines for the event and to meet veterans of the Royal Air Force on May 17 and 18, 2013.

The Battle of the Atlantic, which was a dominating factor in World War II, was at its height from 1940 through the end of 1943. The 8th Army Air Corps and US Merchant Marines played a huge part in protecting England and Europe and ultimately achieving victory in Europe.

Students, along with the vets, visited Cambridge, London and Liverpool. "The experience was more than just a tour. The important part was the vets' stories. Each had a mind blowing story," stated Henderson. "We had what was called the Round Table Discussion, where each man spoke of their experience."

Henderson also spoke of heartwarming stories that he remembers hearing to this day. "One veteran had survivor's guilt, and it became apparent when we visited the church in which his crew was buried. He had to stay back for some reason, and all of his crew was killed on the mission."

The visit was to Cambridge American Cemetery where 3,813 American military graves are, and 5,127 names of Missing In Action (MIA) soldiers from the air war over Europe and the Battle of the Atlantic are found.

Henderson was one of the five chosen to be in the cere-

mony for the 70th anniversary of the Battle of the Atlantic on May 26th. "I was one of the students that got to carry the flags representing one group, each battalion had its own flag carrier," stated Henderson. "America doesn't realize that during WWI and WWII, England lost two generations of men. Our veterans are a big deal to them. They think it's disrespectful to call them veterans, so they call them legends."

Henderson also commented on the scenery. "They are still rebuilding to this day and are still bomb stricken. People from Europe still have to live with the every day scars. It was meaningful to see the overall impact of the war on England."

The WWII trips were part of the College of the Ozarks Patriotic Education Travel Program and were set up so that students could carry on the legacy of the war so it




