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Jury says Klemps must pay \$8 million for McCullough's death

It took a jury in Stone County less than an hour to award \$8 million to the daughters of a man who has been missing from Barry County for 14 years.

Gary McCullough was married to Sandra Mc-Cullough-Klemp, was having an affair with her current husband Kristopher Klemp, when he went missing from their home near Cassville in 1999.

Over 20 witnesses were called during the four day trial in Galena.

McCullough-Klemps daughter, Liehnia [Lena] Chapin, disappeared from her apartment near Steelville in 2006; however, jurors weren't allowed to hear about her disappearance or hear a taped conversation between McCullough's brother, Gary, and Chapin that was made before she disappeared.

They also weren't allowed to hear from Lena's fiance, Jason Bryant, whom she was living with when she vanished. He says when he

returned home from work in February of 2006, Sandy and one of her daughter's were moving Lena's things from their home. According to Bryant, Sandy, who did not have a key to the apartment, told him Lena moved to Florida with a guy she met.

Sandy and Kris Klemp have since adopted Lena's son, Colter Creek, who lived with them for two years before his mother was reported missing.

Klemp's former wife, Jennifer, told the jury that she went to see Klemp shortly before McCullough went missing. He was on the phone with someone and said, "You won't be going to prison, I will." She says he told her he couldn't deal with her "because he was dealing with his girlfriend who was pregnant with his kid and had to deal with killing a man."

She says when she picked him up about 1:45 a.m. on May 12, 1999, he was scared when he came out of the woods near the

McCullough property and he had a gun with him. She told jurors that Sandy called her to let her know that Kris had given her a ring and he was "now hers." She testified that Sandy told her she had always wanted a son and "she would kill me and take mine."

In June of 1999, then prosecutor Stephen Hemphill charged Klemp with conspiracy to commit murder. Those charges were dropped prior to preliminary hearing because Hemphill anticipated Klemp's lawyers would not waive the hearing.

Instead of tipping his hand and showing defense attorneys the evidence that was compiled against their client, Hemphill dismissed the charges so investigators could continue to compile evidence in the case.

Jeff and Nikki Allen told jurors that after Gary caught his wife in a truck with Kristoper Klemp, he had had enough and began moving things out of the farmhouse and into their

residence. Nikki Allen says Sandy slapped her during a confrontation at the Allen property. Police were called and Sandy eventually

Jenkins Fire receives nearly \$2,700 grant

During July and August, matching funds grant checks for rural fire departments are being distributed by the Missouri Department of Conservation, Forestry Division staff.

One hundred eighty-two fire departments are receiving checks for up to \$4,000 to help with the purchase of personal protective gear and

fire fighting equipment, for wildfire as well as structure fire suppression efforts.

The total funding awarded to Missouri fire departments through the matching funds grant program this year is \$354,467. Fire departments are required to match 50 percent of the funds which are provided by the Missouri Department

of Conservation and the US Forest Service, Volunteer Fire Assistance Program.

Throughout the last 30 years, over \$7 million has been distributed to rural fire departments to help them increase the safety of their fire fighters and provide them with better fire fighting equipment.

Five arrested on drug charges

Barry County Sheriff Mick Epperly announced that five individuals were arrested on Tuesday, July 16, 2013, on drug related charges.

Twenty-seven year-old Kevin B. Sojak of Aurora, Devin Rust, 19, of Monett, Casey Myers, 31, of Monett, Jared Utter, 32, of Monett, and Orville Miller, 26, of Monett were been charged with a class B felony of Distribution of a Controlled Substance.

Marijuana, methamphetamine and controlled pharmaceuticals were purchased by an undercover Missouri State Patrol Officer.

The five individuals are all from the Monett area and have been under investigation for over a year now.

This was a cooperative effort between the Barry County Sheriff's Office, Missouri State Highway Patrol, Southwest Missouri Drug Task Force and the Monett Police Department stated Sheriff Epperly.

According to Sheriff Mick Epperly, more arrests are forthcoming.

Woman charged with 10 felonies after high speed chase

A 26-year-old Colorado woman is charged with 10 felonies after she allegedly lead officials on a high-speed pursuit in a stolen car.

The woman hit several vehicles and caused injuries during the pursuit.

The chase went through Stone and Barry counties on Monday, July 22.

According to a probable cause statement, Stone County Deputy Tommy Smith stopped a 2012 Chevy Captiva on Highway 13 and Stonebridge Road for allegedly traveling at a high speed

and because the vehicle's tags were allegedly not visible.

As Smith approached the vehicle, the driver took off.

The driver, Brandi Zamora, caused many incidents during the pursuit and hit three patrol cars, according to the statement.

The pursuit reached speeds in excess of 100 mph on multiple occasions, the statement said. The chase ended after deputies set up stop sticks in the roadway.

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
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Brattelid wins Cassville Rotary Club raffle


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Exeter Corn Maze unveils 2013 design

After she begged for her life, Sandy McCullough-Klemp told her husband "don't kill my baby." She never made it to the hospital to be treated for her wound and was kicked out of the house after she told her mother that Kristopher Klemp "was making passes at her.

Petersen and another sister, Robin Shoemake, testified that they witnessed Kristopher Klemp drive from an area adjacent to the burn pile the day McCullough went missing. Petersen says she saw a piece of a red flannel shirt near the smoldering burn pile shortly after Klemp left the "corral."

Shoemake says she saw

her mother and her lover dragging something "long and heavy" out of the farmhouse in the early morning hours of May 12, 1999, and it wasn't furniture.

Both girls testified that they saw the truck that Mc-Cullough was supposed to have taken to go to Diamond to buy the fighting rooster parked along a tree line on a hill on the property. When they told Sandy about the discovery she said, "What are you talking about. I don't even want to hear it." The girls said the truck was gone the next day.

"She can't get any of the dates right or when she last saw her mother. Then she suddenly realizes she saw her again when she needed money for a trailer. That's what these girls do."

Deputy Martin said the truck was discovered on May 15th, on a dead end road in Pulaskifield and it was towed to the Barry County Sheriff's office. There were beer cans in the back of the truck and when Sandy saw them, she said, according to Martin, "Those weren't in there yesterday, I mean last week."

When Wiley cross examined Martin about a positive hit of luminol on the burn pile and one speck of blood found in the bedroom he said he wasn't sure if it was a false positive and that only animal bones were found in and around the burn pile.

He told jurors that Sandy agreed to take a polygraph "if Gary's remains were ever found."

Wiley told jurors that investigators and family members had tunnel vision while they investigated Mc-Cullough's disappearance. He questioned why none of them had gone to Diamond or anywhere else to investigate whether McCullough could have gone missing while he went to buy the rooster, as Sandy alleged.

Sandy McCullough-Klemp and Kristopher Klemp didn't show up at all for the four day trial. If they had shown up, they would have had to take the stand if they were called in the civil trial.

Undeterred by that hurdle, Anderson entered their 2007 depositions into evidence. They each invoked their 5th amendment right to self in-

crimination when they were asked if they had anything to do with Gary's disappearance or presumed murder.

April McCullough says Sandy had been "mean" to her when she went to live with her and her dad and he eventually gave her permission to go live with her grandparents. She said she has not heard from her father since the day he went miss-

"My dad wasn't there to walk me down the aisle." He also wasn't there for the birth of his granddaughter, Lon-

In Anderson's closing he told jurors "We've done what we could to bring the evidence to you."

Wiley told them, "Theirs is a story with no corrobora-

"The problem with this case is not what's said, it's what's not seen." said Wiley "There's more than one act of being a magician here. One is scrubbing a crime scene so clean that there wasn't any evidence left two days later, and the other is making a body completely disappear."

On rebuttal, Anderson "Gary McCullough lived in that house for 3 years and not one hair and none of his DNA was found in there, you've got to be kidding me.

Lewright told jurors he believed the "white elephant" was that his client had taken the 5th several years after disappear-McCullough's ance.

53 minutes after they began deliberating the baliff announced the jury had a verdict. The jury foreman said Sandy McCullough-Klemp should pay \$4 million dollars to Gary McCullough's daughters for his wrongful death. The same punishment was assessed against Kristopher Klemp.

"Obviously, for 14 years we've tried to get some kind of answer, so we're very, very happy to have some semblance of closure," Mc-Cullough-Backes said after the verdict. "I am so excited for this, it's a new beginning. Maybe now we can convince the prosecutor to try the defendants in this trial for my dad's murder."

She said it was something more than money they were after, they wanted to hear a jury say they believed Sandy McCullough-Klemp and Kristopher Klemp are responsible for her father's disappearance. "This was a great ruling for us, but it's not going to bring my dad back. Money isn't everything."

Cassville's Crowder TriO Student Support program continues to make a difference

In September 2010, Crowder College in Cassville received the TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) grant, a five-year grant which initially provided \$220,000 funding per year for a Federal outreach and student services program designed to identify and provide services for individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds. SSS serves 140 of all of the students at Crowder's Cassville site with the goal of increasing the college retention and graduation rates of its participants.

Students who receive the Federal Pell Grant are also eligible for additional grant aid through the SSS

"Keeping students in school and working their way toward graduation is the main focus of our program. We understand that providing SSS grant aid may not completely eliminate the students' unmet need or loans, but it will hopefully reduce it," said Cheyenne Ward, Director of Student Support Services (SSS) at Crowder College in Cassville.

Students who are current participants in the SSS program, who are in their first two years of postsecondary education, and who are receiving Federal Pell Grants are also eligible to receive SSS grant aid. Approximately 70 percent of all students enrolled at Cassville during the spring 2013 semester were eligible for Federal Pell

Ward stated, "The eligible applicants are only competing with the other students (140) in the program, rather than with every student who attends at Cassville." There are also other criteria students must meet, such as participating in program activities, completing a financial literacy requirement, and writing an essay in order to be considered for the SSS grant aid award.

Even after experiencing a program budget cut of 3.1 percent for the last two years, SSS has awarded over \$56,000.00 that has gone directly to the students at Crowder's Cassville site. In 2013-2014, the Federal Pell Grant amount is increasing, which will also slightly increase the amount of grant aid that SSS will award to

Section 401(b)(7)(B) of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (HEA), provides for an automatic increase to the appropriated Federal Pell Grant maximum award, resulting in a 2013-2014 maximum award of \$5,645. This maximum Pell Grant award for the 2013-2014 Award Year is an increase of \$95 from the \$5,550 maximum Pell Grant award for the 2012-2013 Award Year

The minimum amount of SSS grant aid students will receive in 2013-2014 will be \$605.00, which is an increase from the 2012-2013 amount of \$555.00.

Ben Lesué and Jerri Hudson, both SSS Academic Coordinators, spoke with a few of this year's grant aid recipients to see how it has benefited them. When asked how the grant aid helped him academically and how he felt when he found out he received the award.

Brandon Kerr stated, "It relieved the stress of finances so I could focus on my studies. I was super excited. It came at a real good time."

When asked how SSS has helped him in other ways, Kerr stated, "You're really good at informing us about things about college life outside the classroom, about transferring, and what we need to do to stay on the right track."

Kandace Norman, another recipient, said, "It's helped me a lot. I'm going to use it to pay for college algebra this summer." Tracy Pride, who also received the grant aid, stated, "It means the world and has made a big difference in my life. It has helped with gas and transportation so I can get to school easier and take the classes I need."

Fifteen SSS students received SSS grant aid during 2012-2013.

'While this grant aid is a perk for some students who are in SSS, it is, by far, not the only thing we have to offer," stated Ward. Informative workshops are provided weekly by SSS staff, Crowder faculty, and community speakers.

"Justin Gates with Security Bank has been consistently supportive of providing our students with financial literacy information," said Ward.

During the last year, SSS staff also took students on campus visits to University of Arkansas, Missouri State University, Missouri Southern State University, and Drury University. Due to students' requests, an additional trip was made to the University of Missouri. These visits give students the opportunity to tour the facilities, classrooms, and dorms, and get information about transferring to a four-year university once they have graduated from Crowder College.

In addition to the campus visits, students also get to experience different culture activities. This year, students went to Crystal Bridges, in Arkansas, and Wilson's Creek National Battlefield. While there are these sorts of activities for students as well as tutoring, it is the academic advising that is one of the most important aspects of the program.

Meeting with students every semester to ensure they are taking the appropriate classes is crucial. Jerri Hudson said, "Now that students can enroll themselves without any help from an advisor we often find them making choices, and enrolling in classes, that do not even count toward their degrees. This costs students unnecessary time and money, and could have them using up all of their financial aid before they are able to attain a degree.

"If students want to be independent and enroll themselves they can always take advantage of pre-advising where the advisor and student sit down before enrollment begins to find the best classes and schedule for the student for each semester."

James Shigel Yoshimoto was sentenced to three years and six months in the custody of the Missouri Department of Corrections.

Yoshimoto must also pay \$375 in fines after his conviction for possession of a controlled substance.

The incident occurred in Barry County at the intersection of State Highway 37 and State Highway HH in Purdy.

The suspect, Yoshimoto, drove a 1994 Ford truck into a Barry County Sheriff's checkpoint.

The officers then conducted a pat down search for safety.

While conducting this search, officers found a

suspicious substance on his person and in the vehicle, along with scales.

The substance was then tested and was positive for methamphetamines.

Michael Jay Walden, from Seligman, was sentenced to four years in the custody of the Missouri Department of Corrections and must pay a fine of \$375.

The defendant, Walden, was found in the possession of methamphetamine on or about May 5, 2013.

Walden had three glass pipes, all of which had residue, field testing positive for the presence of methamphetamine.

Two metal pipes and a little metal container with five clear buggies containing a white powdery substance were also found.

Michael stated the substance was meth and also claimed he had used meth the night before officers arrived at his house.

Walden was also convicted for driving while his license was revoked.

Michael Dale Morris, 27, reconvicted of three felonies for possession of controlled substance. Morris received a Suspended Imposition of Sentence for the felonies and placed on five years of supervised probation for each felony.

In 2011,the Cassville PD went to 1491 County Farm road to check on the well being of three children.

An officer asked Morris to stand up when he way lying on an air mattress. When he stood, an ink pen casing fell between his feet.

Morris then attempted to conceal and drag the casing with his foot. The casing held a white-powdery residue. The substance field tested positive for methamphetamine.

Located in Morris' duffle bag was a tooth brush case with a U-100 syringe located inside of the case.

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Challenges Facing Farmers Today and Tomorrow

Though farming was once big business in the United States, by 2012 less than 1 percent of Americans were professional farmers. Many challenges face today's farmers, many of which are largely unknown to the general public.

Many people have an outdated view of a farm as a small, familyowned and operated parcel of land where livestock is raised in open pens and crops are hand-harvested when ripe. The reality is that modern-day farms have had to overhaul operations to meet demand and remain competitively priced while adapting to the ever-changing ways technology infiltrates all parts of life. Each of these factors present obstacles for today's farmers.

Technology

Rural farming communities are expected to make an effort to integrate modern technology into an industry that has been around for centuries. But such a transition in rural areas, where communications systems may not be as up-to-date as those in urban areas, is not always so easy.

According to the Manitoba Rural Adaptation Council, a shift from a resource-based to an information-based economy, compounded by the rapid introduction and expansion of new technology in the workplace, has altered farm operation and the skills in demand. Older workers who have been schooled in one way of agriculture may have a significant impact on labor supply and the vitality of farming as a career. Younger adults who are knowledgeable in technology may no longer seek out agricultural careers.

Decrease in farming as an occupation

The United States Environmental Protection Agency says that only about 960,000 Americans claim farming as their principal occupation. As that figure has dwindled, the average age of farmers continues to rise, as the Bureau of Labor Statistics notes that roughly 40 percent of the farmers in this country are 55 years old or older. This has led to concerns about the long-term health of family farms throughout the United States.

Environmental concerns


Many farmers have come under scrutiny for how farming impacts the environment. A growing emphasis on sustainability and conservation has led many people to protest certain farming practices. Protesters claim that certain practices, such as raising livestock, can pollute water, while the use of fertilizers and chemical pesticides is bad for the environment. Many farmers, however, have altered their methods to be more environmentally friendly and self-sustainable

Climate change is another environmental issue farmers must deal with. Strong storms and severe droughts have made farming even more challenging.

Financial fall-out

The ongoing recession of the last half-decade has also affected farmers. In November of 2012, the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics indicated that the unemployment rate within the agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting industries was at 13.6 percent, far higher than the national unemployment rate. As a result, many farm families have found themselves stuck between a rock and a hard place, as rising costs for equipment and technology are being coupled with decreasing profits and rising unemployment.

Further complicating matters is competition from corporations and international food producers who have made it difficult for family farmers to turn a significant profit. Many family farmers rely on loans and lines of credit



for those who do not work in the agricultural industry to overlook the struggles facing today's agricultural professionals, a greater understanding of those struggles and the challenges that lay ahead can benefit the industry and its employees down the road.

MO heat could create pavement blow-ups

As temperatures reach well above 90 degrees across the state, the Missouri Department of Transportation advises motorists to be aware that the heat can affect the surface of roadways.

"The heat can cause pavement blow-ups," said Wright, MoDOT's state maintenance engineer.

"These occur when the roadway surface expands at a crack or joint where moisture has seeped in. The crack weakens the pavement and the heat causes the pavement to buckle and warp."

MoDOT crews monitoring state routes for these blow-ups and will make repairs as soon as they occur.

Wright asked motorists who come across a blow-up to report the problem so crews can make necessary repairs.

How to grill for a crowd

Cooking over an open fire is a staple of warm-weather entertaining. Tossing some steaks or vegetables on the grill for a family dinner is usually an easy undertaking. But even the craftiest grill cooks may need to apply some tricks of the trade when grilling food for the masses.

• Cook a large piece of meat. Rather than individual burgers or chicken wings, think about barbecuing an entire pig or a roast. In many cases, the meat can be set up on the barbecue early in the morning. By the time the evening arrives, the meat should be tender and cooked through. With just occasional checking, turning and basting, this may be the most low-maintenance option when feeding a crowd.

- Rent or borrow a second grill. Unless you are working with industrial-sized or commercial equipment, a standard grill may not have enough surface area to cook a lot of food at once.
- Precook the food. You can put bratwurst, hot dogs or burgers on the grill to partially cook them before the party, then store them in aluminum pans. When guests arrive, simply reheat the food to the right temperature and they'll be hot and ready in no time.
- Make steak sandwiches. Make the food go further with less work by cooking ribeye steaks or flank steaks on the grill. Slice up the meat and serve it over garlic bread with

melted jack or mozzarella cheese.

- Opt for pulled pork. Start the basics of pulled pork in a slow cooker so that the meat cooks for several hours under low heat. If you have a smoker, you can opt to use that, but smokers may take longer to cook the meat and require more maintenance.
- Go with hot dogs. Hot dogs are usually precooked and will heat up quickly on the grill.

Grilling for a crowd is easier when you plan with foods that are precooked or heat up quickly. This way you can enjoy more time with your guests.
