# Churches give big to community on Kindness Day

For around 400 people on Sunday morning, instead of dressing up in their finest dresses and suits, they donned work jeans and boots and headed over to the American Legion grounds to get their hands dirty in the name of God.

Kindness in Action was a day inspired by Pastor James Weaver's, of First Baptist Church of Cassville, hometown tradition. He and United Methodist of Cassville's Pastor Andy Lambel took the idea to the Cassville Ministerial Alliance.

First Baptist Church of Cassville, Nazarene Church, United Methodist, Spiritual Streams, St. Thomas A'Becket Episcopal, Emmanuel Baptist, First Christian Church and The Point all joined together to spend a day serving the community they work, play and live in.

Projects ranged from mowing and lawn service, to painting, picking up trash, pumping gas and bussing tables. The purpose of the day was to serve all members in the community in some way, not just the members of the churches in question.

One of the recipients

of the acts of kindness was the Cassville R-IV District. For the Birds donated some shrubs and flowers for church members to spruce up existing flower beds and create new ones for the school. The crew also weeded and cleaned the gravel parking lots, pruned shrubs and the school lots were cleaned. Jill LeCompte, of Cassville Schools, stated, "The help that the area churches provided was very much appreciated. Those small acts free our maintenance staff to work on bigger projects."

Other church members worked at the Habitat for Humanity house currently under construction while another group distributed 1,200 homemade chocolate chip cookies. It took people of all walks of life and talents to truly serve the community in ways that showcased what they were capable of.

For many, the simple act of kindness of having a visitor at their nursing home when they don't often get one was enough to make the day worth it. To some, having their groceries carried at Ramey or their shopping cart returned at Walmart might seem a small act, but

# Knife threat sends one to jail, \$50K bond

One man was arrested on Monday, October 14, in connection with a domestic disturbance call. Detective George Daoud, with the Monett Police Department, was dispatched to the residence at 210 North Kyler, in Barry County. The suspect's girlfriend, Maria Barrientos, reported that the her boy-

friend, George Daniels, had kicked in the back door of the home and threatened her with a knife.

Barrientos was in the residence with her three children, all under the age of 12. She alleged that Daniels would not let them leave the home, blocking the door and swinging the knife at them. One child received a nick

on her arm allegedly from Daniels thrashing the knife in the air. Officers noted that the minor wound had fresh blood on it that was red and

It was also accused that Daniels attempted to choke one child with her jacket. One child claimed that Dan-

# Porter murder probe extends into Barry Cty.

A man already facing murder charges connected to the 2011 double homicide of his nephew and his wife is facing additional charges after authorities from multiple jurisdictions and at least one state agency. Multiple simultaneous search warrants were executed on two separate properties near Purdy last week.

Authorities didn't use the traditional knock and talk method to execute the warrants at 201 Caledonia and a residence on Highway C. Instead, the Barry County Sheriff's SWAT team used a

flash/bang diversionary tactic to gain the upper hand, according to a neighbor.

The Caledonia property is owned by Robert Campbell, according to court documents. The other is owned by a family named Petit, according to Robyn Poyner, who witnessed authorities bringing evidence out of the

Authorities allegedly recovered two VIN plates that had been removed from vehicles during the search, according to the probable

cause statement. Rusty and Becky Porter lived on land adjacent

to Campbell near Willard when they went missing in April 2011. Campbell and Rusty Porter had each filed orders of protection against each other prior to the couple's disappearance, and they were allegedly engaged in a land inheritance dispute when the couple went miss-

The couple's skeletal remains were found three months after they vanished in Taney County on property that Campbell's brother-in-law, Tony Friend, was "very familiar with." Autopsy results show the cause of death was gunshot wounds to the head.

Friend and his cousin, Dusty Hicks, are facing firstdegree murder and felonious restraint charges connected to the double homicide.

Windy Friend, Tony's wife, is also charged with murder. His son, Phillip Friend, has already pled guilty to second-degree murder and felonious re-

straint. He is currently serving a seven year sentence for felonious restraint, but won't be sentenced on the murder conviction until he testifies at the upcoming murder tri-

Taney County prosecutor Jeff Merrell announced last month that he would not seek the death penalty against four of the defendants, but that "the death penalty was still on the table for Tony Friend."

When Campbell was apprehended at Lowe's in Monett on Wednesday, October 16, he was allegedly in possession a stolen semi truck. The tractor trailer was stolen in 2006 in Bentonville, Arkansas, and belonged to Josh Taylor, of Willard, another relative of Campbell's.

Court documents say that authorities discovered that the big rig's serial number had been altered during a search of the vehicle.

Campbell has been charged with receiving stolen property and removal or altering a vehicle identification number. If convicted of

the class C felonies, Campbell could face up to seven years in prison.

Barry County Sheriff Mick Epperly said authorities recovered two guns, business documents and phones in the raids. Two stolen tractor trailers were also recovered, according to Epperly.

Barry County prosecutor Johnnie Cox said he believes Campbell and his wife moved to the area after he was released on bond after he was charged with murder.

Campbell is being held in the Barry County jail in lieu of \$150,000 cash-only bond. Federal charges could be filed against Campbell, who is a convicted felon and was in possession of a firearm, according to an investigator involved in the raids.

The search warrant applications and returns associated with the Barry County raid have been sealed by the court, according to Cox.

The Missouri Department of Revenue's Criminal Tax Bureau, the IRS, the Greene County Sheriff's office and the Purdy Police Department were involved in the raid on the Barry County properties.

18" knife on the steps where Daniels had been standing when they arrived. Another witness stated that he saw Daniels on the porch of their home, as well. The witness also claimed that he saw Daniels swinging something toward Barrientos and the children in the home that appeared to be a knife.

When Daniels was interview by officers on October 15, he admitted to kicking the door in to the residence and that he had an argument with Barrientos while waving the knife around, but that he was not waving it in a threatening manner. He denied causing any injuries.

Daniels was taken into custody and transported to the Barry County Jail. He was charged with class C felony of assault in the second degree and three class C felonv counts of endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$50,000 cash-only bond.



# Cassville PD to take back prescriptions

On October 26 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the Cassville Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public its seventh opportunity in three years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous, expired,

unused and unwanted prescription drugs. Bring your medications for disposal to Cassville City Hall, Council Chamber/Municipal Court Room, at 300 Main St., entrance in back. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last April, Americans

turned in 371 tons (over 742,000 pounds) of prescription drugs at over 5,800 sites operated by the DEA and its thousands of state and local law enforcement partners. In its six previous Take Back events, the DEA and its partners took in over 2.8 million pounds, more than 1,400 tons, of pills.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines, flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash, both pose potential safety and health hazards.

The DEA is in the process of approving new regulations that implement the Safe and Responsible Drug Disposal Act of 2010, which amends the Controlled Substances Act to allow an "ultimate user" (that is, a patient or pet or their family member or owner) of controlled substance medications to dispose of them by delivering them to entities authorized by the Attorney General to accept them. The Act also allows the Attorney General to authorize long term care facilities to dispose of their residents' controlled substances in certain instances.

### **FAQs**

Q: Should we accept the containers as well as the drugs? Yes, you may. No need to separate the drugs from the vials. Plastic and glass are acceptable. Just no needles.

Q: May we accept pre-loaded syringes? Yes, as long as the needle has been removed by the patient. Epi-pens are acceptable since the needle is sheathed by design in heavy duty plastic.

Q: What advice should we give those who bring syringes with needles that we cannot accept? Believe it or not, the following advice comes from the waste disposal industry. Advise the user to place the syringes in an empty plastic laundry detergent container. Screw the cap back on the container, mark the bottle "SHARPS" with a pen and dispose in the trash.

Q: May we accept veterinary drugs? Yes. ALL Rx and OTC drugs are acceptable, including veterinary medications. The species of the "consumer" does not matter.

Q: My local pharmacist says we have to remove the Rx label from the vials before we can accept them per HIPPA privacy rules? No. HIPPA does not apply to you or this situation. This is a voluntary project that is consumer driven. You are under no obligation to remove anything from any label. The consumer should remove or deface the label if they are concerned before placing the vial in the box. All material in these containers will be incinerated. You may reassure the public that their privacy is being protected.

Q: May we accept inhalers? Would prefer that you don't because we are incinerating. We don't want any pressurized containers to "pop" or explode at the facility.







The Butterfield Fire Protection District hosted a live fire training session on Saturday, October 19. The purpose of the exercise was to provide live fire training in a controlled environment for the safety of the firefighters.

The main purpose of the class is to help firefighters work effectively in the field, including teaching techniques on structure fires. Hands-on fire fighting experience is useful for both veteran and rookie firefighters It also allowed different fire districts to work together and learn from each others' experiences. The districts in attendance were Butterfield, Exeter, Cassville, Purdy and Verona.

The classroom class was from 8 a.m. until 12 p.m. Then the firefighters enjoyed a lunch at noon provided by the Butterfield Firefighters' Auxiliary. The live fire training then was from 1 p.m until 4 p.m.

Departments do mutual aids together each year as a way to share ideas and improve the skill set of each individual district through sharing training. By working together, the districts can engage in more experiences to hone their skills.

Scott Brophy, tain training coordinator, stressed the importance of training like this. He stated, "Sometimes we get tunnel vision going guns blazing through the door to fight a fire. But we need to take our time to remember each step and keep each other safe."

Brophy explained that events like this one are important in helping firefighters remember the proper steps to extinguishing a fire that keeps them successful and also helping keep the individual firefighters as safe as possible considering the dangers of the job.

During the course, techniques help them remember to look at the entire 360 degrees of the building for signs of people trapped, the color of the smoke, location of the fire and how best to fight it. In some situations, ventilation is helpful. Other times, water needs to be applied in a specific manner.

Brophy said, "It is all about getting perspective. We don't want to go in there and get hurt." Brophy also stated



Parents should always check the candy before their child eats any pieces. It is recommended that the child


go out to trick or treat so they will be full and not tempted to sample as they go. Costumes should be tak-

Open enrollment for 4-H clubs is underway now and runs thorugh December 1.

As the largest out-ofschool youth organization in the world, 4-H is open to all boys and girls, ages 5 to 18. Children who are five to seven years old are eligible for 4-H Clover Kids, an introductory program.

Youths who are 8 to 18 years of age can select from a variety of 4-H projects and activities that stress social and life skills in areas such as decision making, communication, social interaction, civic responsibility and physical skills.

"You do not have to live on a farm to join 4-H," said Velynda Cameron, 4-H youth development specialist with University of Missouri Extension. "Project opportunities include computers, robotics, foods and nutrition, horticulture, large and small animals and much more."

Elliott-Engel, Jeremy Barry County 4-H youth development specialist, stated, "Agriculture continues to be a strong project area for members in Barry County 4-H with many of the top projects being all in the livestock areas, e.g. Beef, Market Goats and Poultry."

New in Barry County this year is the Shooting Sports project. Leaders are certified in Smallbore Rife (.22 caliber) and will start practicing in early spring. Youth are trained in gun safety and precision shooting skills. Competitions happen at the County, Regional, State and National Levels.

Elliott-Engel explained, "We know that active youth enrolled in 4-H are more likely to go to and successfully complete college education, and, are more likely to return and contribute positively to their home communities."

Missouri 4-H is University of Missouri Extension's youth development program. The program is designed to help to create opportunities for young people to be valued, contributing members of their community.

### **Rodeo Champion to Speak** at Golden Church of God



Everyone is invited to the event to hear his testimony.




