Haven of the Ozarks welcomes new director

The Haven of the Ozarks has welcomed a new director, Laura Jarek. Jarek is originally from Boston, Mass., though she moved to Washburn ten years ago to have land for her horses and a farm of her own in retirement. In Boston, where she still owns horses, the animals are kept in boarding facilities with arenas, as opposed to the animals residing on one's property.

Eight weeks ago, while working part-time for a local veterinarian, Dr. Thorpe, at Riverview Animal Clinic in Cassville, Jarek stated that the Haven board of directors asked Dr. Thorpe if he knew anyone that could fit the position of Haven director, and he advised Jarek. The interview process was approximately two weeks, and Jarek began her job in early November.

With a career spent in corporate marketing, Jarek says she was ready to retire and calm her life down; however, as her passions pursued her, she fell into the chain of events that would lead to her being offered the position.

couldn't turn down," she says.

Jarek says that "a lifetime of horse training and dog work" acclimated her for the position, and she states that it means a great deal to her to have the opportunity to "give these pets a second chance, even though many weren't ever given a first, to get into good health. I stated to the board of directors that I would be hunkering down with the staff and really working to make sure these animals are, I call it, 'the most spoiled in the United States of America.' That's our goal. They receive excellent medical care, and we work on getting to know them so we can, I call it, make a 'love connection.' Really paying attention to who's coming in to adopt, understanding their family dynamic, and matching the pet to that, and it is definitely working."

Jarek says that if a family already has a pet, bring it with them upon visiting Haven. Jarek says that this is where the best "matchmaking" occurs, in real-time, as the pets react to one another alongside the family.

"We are trying our best to "This was a mission I work with the community,

to give back to the community, and to try to increase the amount of adoptions we have so we can take more in. We don't want to say no. We want to be able to take in every case we get."

Alternative resources and waiting lists are offered if kennels are full, though Jarek says this does not happen often. As a no-kill shelter, Haven of the Ozarks makes an effort to accept all animals they can. "We have lots of beautiful puppies that need homes," she says.

Jarek plans to strengthen engagement with the local communities and become involved in more local events.

Cassville receives grant for pedestrian and bike corridor

Over the coming years, the City of Cassville will be taking steps to construct a pedestrian/bike corridor between Mill Street and the City of Cassville's Greenway Trail, including 61 feet of 10-foot wide sidewalk leading to a 240-foot pedestrian bridge spanning Flat Creek.

The city applied for and was approved to receive \$500,000 of Transportation Enhancement Program Funds, which is going toward the project. The program funds are expected to cover 61% of the total cost to design and build the infrastructure, and the remaining funds will be the burden of the city. The process officially began Monday, December 12.

Steve Walensky, Cassville's City Administrator, states his excitement. "I am thrilled that we've got some grant money coming, we're very lucky to get the grant, and we'll see where we go from there. Should be exciting!"

Construction is estimated to begin shortly after September 2024.



P.A.W.S focus of Cassville Schools April Bond Initiative

On November 17, the Cassville school district's board of education approved a resolution to construct a new performing arts center, repurposing space for a wrestling program, and general repairs and maintenance across the District. A special school bond election will therefore be held on April 4, 2023, with the vote deciding the actions of the school district

If initiated, Paragon Architecture has been selected as the District's architect for the projects. R.E. Smith was previously chosen as the District's construction management company for the project

Merlyn Johnson, superintendent for the Cassville school district, states that this will be a no-tax rate increase initiative. Johnson also says that the bond proceeds will allow for improved opportunities and space at the high school for students in the fine arts programs, including opportunities to become familiar with advanced programming, recording, and sound systems.

This performing arts center would also serve as a site for elementary school concerts, award programs, and movie nights.

"The addition of the performing arts center will be something the community can be proud of and use for many community-related events," Johnson states.


He predicts that relocating a number of fine arts classes will create space for other needs on the campus, such as the desired space for wrestling. There will be safety and energy upgrades with all projects, which would include energy-saving/maintenance repairs and upgrades throughout all campuses. Many of these upgrades center around the campus's older buildings, such as the primary and middle schools. A focal point of the improvements will also be to secure the entryway into the high school even further.

"We are very excited about the possibilities of this bond initiative," Johnson continues. "School improvement is an ongoing process, and something school districts should never stop doing. The selected projects on the April 4 ballot are all student-centered improvements. Cassville R-IV students deserve the same opportunities as many neighboring districts. The project is estimated to cost 9 million dollars and will be on the April 4, 2023, ballot.

The bond initiative is projected to read as follows: Shall the Board of Education of the Cassville R-IV School District, Missouri, without an estimated increase in the current debt service property tax levy, borrow money in the amount of Nine Million Dollars (\$9,000,000) for the purpose of providing funds to construct, equip, and furnish a new Performing Arts Center on the High School campus; to implement energy saving/maintenance improvements, including roofs, windows, electrical systems, gutters, heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) units, and lighting; to complete safety upgrades District-wide; to repurpose existing space for the wrestling program; to the extent funds are available, complete other repairs and improvements of the existing facilities of the District; and issue general obligation bonds for the payment thereof? If this proposition is approved, the adjusted debt service levy of the School District is estimated to remain unchanged at \$0.5071 per one hundred

MDC reports 16,032 deer harvested during antlerless portion

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that deer hunters in Missouri harvested 16,032 deer during the antlerless portion of the firearms deer season, Dec. 3-11. Last year's antlerless-portion harvest total was 15,019. Top harvest counties were Callaway, with 451 deer harvested; Pike, 412; Macon, 348. Ninety-three were harvested in Barry County.

Little Known Property-Tax Relief Programs Help Seniors Save

Dear Savvy Senior,

I recently learned about a property-tax relief program for seniors in the county where I live. Apparently, there are hundreds of these programs across the country that many retirees, like me, are eligible for but don't know about. What can you tell me about this?

Overtaxed Eddie

Dear Eddie,

Great question! Residential property-tax refund and credit programs exist in nearly every state, but unfortunately few people know about them. These programs can help retirees and many other Americans by reducing their property taxes. Here's

what you should know.

Rising Property Taxes

Property taxes are a major source of income for local governments, but while they help fund key public services, they can be a financial drain for many homeowners, especially retirees, many of whom live on fixed incomes.

According to Attom Data Solutions, a property-data provider, the average American household paid \$3,785 in property taxes in 2021, but this amount varies widely depending on your state's tax rate and your home's estimated value. For example, New Jersey residents paid \$9,476 per year on average in 2021, while West Virginia residents paid \$901.

To help ease this tax burden, most states offer a num-

ber of property-tax relief programs. But states aren't always proactive in letting people know. It's up to you, the homeowner, to find out what's available in your county or city that you may be eligible for, and to apply.

Relief Programs

Property tax relief programs, sometimes called exemptions, release eligible homeowners from paying some or all of their property tax obligation. How long the exemption lasts can vary depending on where you live, and the reason you're applying for the exemption.

The tax-relief process varies by county, city or state. In general, you'll have to meet certain eligibility requirements, submit an application and provide documents that support your request. Most programs will either reduce, waive or freeze property taxes for seniors, veterans, surviving spouses, disabled and low-income residents.

But there are some counties that also offer basic homestead exemptions to homeowners regardless of age or income, and others that may provide exemptions to homeowners that have recently made energy-efficient improvements to their home.

Where to Look

The best way to learn about local property-tax relief programs and their eligibility requirements is to visit your county, city or state website that collects your property tax. Most of these sites also provide applications and instructions, and will allow you to apply either online, by mail or at your local tax office.

Another good resource for locating programs in your area is the Lincoln Institute, which has a property-tax database that lets you to browse programs across the country. To access it go to Residential-PropertyTaxReliefPrograms. org.

AARP may also be able to help through their Property Tax-Aide service - see PTAconsumers.aarpfoundation.org. This free program, which is available in 13 states (Arizona, Colorado, Florida-Miami Dade County, Illinois-Cook County, Kansas, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New York and North Carolina) and the District of Columbia helps eligible homeowners and renters apply for relief.





Not Your Average Cookie... For Santa Chocolate-Orange Crackle Cookies

Ingredients 2 cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 stick unsalted butter, cut into pieces

5 ounces unsweetened chocolate, cut into pieces 2 cups granulated sugar 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier or other orange-flavored liqueur

3 large eggs, lightly beaten 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar Directions

1. Whisk the flour, baking powder and salt in a medium bowl; set aside.

2. Heat the butter, chocolate and 1 3/4 cups granulated sugar in a medium saucepan over low heat, stirring, until melted and smooth. Let cool slightly, then add the Grand Marnier and eggs and stir until combined. Add the flour mixture and stir until just combined. Transfer to a bowl, cover and refrigerate

until firm, about 2 hours.

3. Position racks in the upper and lower thirds of the oven and preheat to 350 degrees F. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper. Put the remaining 1/4 cup granulated sugar and the confectioners' sugar in 2 separate shallow bowls. Form the dough into 1-inch balls. Add the dough balls, a few at a time, to the granulated sugar and roll to coat, then transfer to the confectioners' sugar and roll to coat. Arrange about 1 1/2 inches apart on the prepared baking sheets.

4. Bake, switching the pans halfway through, until the cookies are puffed and cracked, about 12 minutes. Let cool 5 minutes on the baking sheets, then transfer to racks to cool completely.



IRS reminds those over age 72 to start withdrawals from IRAs and retirement plans

The Internal Revenue Service today reminded those who were born in 1950 or earlier that funds in their retirement plans and individual retirement arrangements face important upcoming deadlines for required minimum distributions to avoid penalties.

Required minimum distributions, or RMDs, are minimum amounts that many retirement plan and IRA account owners must generally withdraw annually after they reach age 72. Account owners can delay taking their first RMD until April 1 following the later of the calendar year they reach age 72 or, in a workplace retirement plan, retire. RMDs are taxable income and may be subject to penalities if not timely taken.

IRAs

The RMD rules require traditional IRA, and SEP, SARSEP, and SIMPLE IRA account holders to begin taking distributions at age 72, even if they're still working. Account holders reaching age 72 in 2022 must take their first RMD by April 1, 2023, and the second RMD by December 31, 2023, and each year thereafter.

Retirement Plans

In 401(k), 403(b) and 457(b) plans; profit-sharing and other defined contribution plans; and defined benefit plans, the first RMD is due by April 1 of the later of the year they reach age 72, or the participant is no longer employed (if allowed by the plan). A 5% owner of the employer must begin taking

RMDs at age 72. RMDs may not be rolled over to another IRA or retirement plan. See the RMD Comparison Chart that highlights some of the basic RMD rules that apply to IRAs and defined contribution plans. Roth IRAs do not require distributions while the original owner is alive.

RMD Calculations and 50% tax on missed distributions

An IRA trustee, or plan administrator, must either report the amount of the RMD to the IRA owner or offer to calculate it. An IRA owner, or trustee, must calculate the RMD separately for each IRA owned. They may be able to withdraw the total amount from one or more of the IRAs. However, RMDs from workplace retirement plans must be taken separately from each plan.

An RMD may be required for an IRA, retirement plan account or Roth IRA inherited from the original owner. Retirement Topics - Beneficiary has information on taking RMDs from an inherited IRA or retirement account and reporting taxable distributions as part of gross income. Publication 559, Survivors, Executors and Administrators, can help those in charge of the estate complete and file federal income tax returns, and explains their responsibility to pay any taxes due on behalf of the decedent or person who has

2020 coronavirus-related distribution

Since 2020 RMDs were waived, an account owner or beneficiary who received an RMD in 2020 had the option of returning it to their IRA or other qualified plan to avoid paying taxes on that distribution. A 2020 RMD that qualified as a coronavirus-related distribution may be repaid over a 3-year period or have the taxes due on the distribution spread over three years.

A 2020 withdrawal from an inherited IRA could not be repaid to the inherited IRA but may be spread over three years for income inclusion. For more information see the Coronavirus Relief for Retirement Plans and IRAs page.

Online Master Gardener training begins January 15

Gardening is an activity with many rewards, says David Trinklein, state horticulture specialist for University of Missouri Extension.

"One of them is the satisfaction of sharing your plant knowledge with others. The Master Gardener program was initiated to do just that," Trinklein said. Its motto, "helping others learn to grow," emphasizes service to others as the program's main objective, he said.

A new session of online Missouri Master Gardener core training begins Jan. 15, 2023. Trinklein and MU Extension horticulture specialist Sarah Denkler teach the 14 online classes. "These classes represent a viable option for people who can't take the weekly classes in person," Trinklein said.

Classes are delivered through the Canvas learning management system as a series of scripted and narrated presentations. Students work at their own pace. A composite score of 70% on chapter quizzes is needed to pass the

Topics include basic botany, soils and plant nutrition, vegetable gardening, fruit production, insects and diseases, and pesticide safety.

Subjects covered include basic botany, soils and plant nutrition, vegetable gardening, fruit production, insects and diseases, landscaping, turf management and pesti-

Core training is the first step toward certification as an MU Extension Master Gardener. Trainees must also complete at least 30 hours of volunteer service, Trinklein said. Local Master Gardener coordinators can help online trainees find volunteer opportunities to meet the service hour requirements.

"There are Master Gardener programs in every state of the union and in most provinces of Canada," Trinklein said.




