First winter storm of the season causes problems for travelers last Thursday

The first winter storm of the season pushed through Barry county last Thursday morning, December 22, bringing windwrapped snow to the area and plummeting temperatures into negative digits. Wind gusts were as high as 45 mph, with a wind chill as low as 35 degrees below zero. A wind chill warning remained in effect until Saturday.

By 8:30 a.m., Cassville Fire Protection District reported ice buildup on the roadways; Butterfield Fire /Rescue also said State Highway 37 to be "just as slick as the side roads."

A short time later, ER/Golden/Mano Fire District reported its first slide-off at the corner of FR 1165 and State Highway 86; and another on State Highway 112, on Roaring River hill.

By noon, in Cassville, the temperature had dropped to 5 degrees, with sleet and ice turning to heavy snowfall, with up to two inches reported throughout the county.

Barry Electric Cooperative reported no disruption of service during the winter storm.

Cassville PD link Jump to fifteen burglaries in Barry County

Cassville police have apprehended and charged hind many of the local burglaries and break-ins that took place throughout the month of November.

Jump has been charged with one count of tampering in the first degree, seven counts of stealing, one count of stealing in the second degree, eight counts of seconddegree burglary, one count of unlawful possession of a firearm, three counts of secage with one count of firstof possession of a controlled substance.

Probable cause statements filed by multiple officers report Jump's involvement in an estimated total of 15 burglaries and break-in-related crimes across the southern half of Barry County, most frequently in Cassville.

20 Year Old Monett Man **Charged with Murder**

A 20-year-old Barry County man faces charges of seconddegree murder, leaving the scene of a motor vehicle accident, and tampering in the first degree.

According to a probable statement filed by Officer Colton Beck, on June 15, 2022, at approximately 11:24 a.m., Derek Coburn was traveling north on Farm Road 1180 in a stolen red Chevrolet pickup when he struck an eastbound motorcycle at the intersection of Route Z and CR 1180. The driver of the motorcycle, Patrick Anderson, 38, was fatally wounded during the crash. Witnesses reported that the driver, the pickup's sole occupant, left the area after being picked up in a black two-door passenger car. The owners of the Chevrolet were identified and contacted by police, who stated they did not know the suspect, Derek Coburn, nor did they consent to him operating the vehicle.

Monett Police contacted another witness, and it was learned that during the early morning of June 15, Coburn had contacted this individual and disclosed a desire to steal a red Chevrolet pickup. The witness stated that they had observed the theft of the vehicle in Monett, in addition to a burglary in a shop owned by the Chevrolet's owner. Tools stolen during the burglary were later recovered at an undisclosed residence.

From June 15 to June 16, a number of witness reports, including several individuals involved in assisting Coburn, identified Derek Coburn as the primary suspect. A report from the individual who picked Coburn up stated that on the late morning of the fatal crash, a shirtless white male, Coburn, ran to their vehicle from the wrecked pickup, identifying himself as Derek, then adding that he needed a ride to Monett. The driver reported not knowing Coburn before this incident.

Derek was dropped off at his requested residence in Monett and was later identified in a line-up by the driver.

Another witness reported that Coburn seemed uneasy upon arriving in Monett, making statements suggesting he foresaw himself going to prison, additionally admitting that he had been involved in a crash.

Coburn was booked into Barry County Jail on December 8 with a bond of \$500,000.



As I sit inside by the fireplace and look out the window at the snow, it looks so beautiful. But when the temperatures drop this low, we all need to be aware of the potential related dangers. When the temperatures fall below 5°F the risk of frostbite increase and in wind chill of -16.6°F frostbite can occur on exposed skin in less than 30 minutes.

Frostbite is when the skin and underlying tissues freeze. It usually occurs when skin is exposed to cold air but can happen with direct contact to ice, freezing metals and very cold liquids.

Certain medical conditions increase your risk for frostbite. Examples are diabetes and other diseases that cause poor blood flow in fingers, toes, and other extremities. Other examples are dehydration, excessive sweating, exhaustion, use of alcohol, drugs, and smoking. Fear, panic, or mental illness that impairs judgement increases risk. A history of a previous frostbite or cold injury; being at high altitude, where oxygen levels are lower; and infants or older adults, both can have circulatory and heat distribution difficulties.

Frostnip is the earliest stage of frostbite and results in no permanent damage to the skin. Frostbite symptoms include cold skin and a prickling sensation, then numbness and inflamed or discolored skin. As frostbite increases, skin becomes hard or waxy looking. Frostnip is treated with rewarming the

area, but frostbite requires medical attention. It can cause permanent damage to skin, muscle, bone, and other tissue. Common sites of frostbite are fingers, toes, nose, ears, cheeks, and chin. Because of the numbness you may not realize you have frostbite until someone else points it out. Persons with black or brown skin need to be aware that changes in skin color might be more difficult to detect.

Seek medical attention if you experience signs and symptoms of frostbite: increased pain, swelling, inflammation or discharge in the frostbitten area; fever; hard, cold, blotchy skin.


Prevention is the key! Dress in layers of loose, warm clothing. Undergarments that wick moisture away from the skin, and the outer layer needs to be wind-proof and waterproof. When clothing gets wet, remove it as soon as possible, especially

hats, gloves, and socks. Head gear needs to cover ears. Mittens are better than gloves or wear thin glove-liners under heavier gloves or mittens. Socks and sock liners need to fit properly. Foot and hand warmers are great, just so they don't make boots too tight. Avoid drinking alcohol, it causes the body to lose heat faster. Eat a well-balanced meal and stay hydrated, it helps you stay warmer. Keep moving but avoid becoming exhausted. Be Safe!

"As we make historic investments to expand internet access, I encourage Missourians to participate in the FCC's broadband map challenge process," said Governor Mike Parson. "Ensuring we have an accurate understanding of broadband coverage in Missouri is vital. Maps that reflect our needs will ensure our state receives and administers the necessary resources to advance our progress in this critical priority."

The challenge opportunity will identify errors in the new

FCC maps that would prevent Missouri from receiving its full share of funding through the upcoming Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program. Errors could relate to physical locations or types of internet service availability. To ensure coverage for homes, businesses, and communities is accurately represented, any citizen can participate. All challenges submitted prior to January 13, 2023, will be considered.


"We hope every Missourian will take part in this historic moment for broadband expansion," said BJ Tanksley, Director of the Office of Broadband Development. "Our goal is access to quality, high-speed internet for every Missouri citizen, business, and community. To get there, we need the public's help."

The FCC's map, which displays the best available data of the state's served, underserved, and unserved areas,

will determine how much of more than \$42 billion the state will receive for broadband expansion. Missouri's share of this funding will be received through the BEAD Program, part of the Infrastructure, Investment, and Jobs Act (IIJA). The state will use BEAD funding for its Connecting All Missourians initiative, which aims to provide high-quality internet statewide.

To assist individuals with challenge submissions, guidance is available from the Office of Broadband Development or at any local University of Missouri Extension office. Resources, including an instructional video, how-to document, and FAQs, are available at ded.mo.gov/get-connected.

Ring in the new year with black-eyed peas


Eating black-eyed peas on New Year's Day is a tradition said to bring wealth and good fortune in the new year, says University of Missouri Extension horticulturist Michele Warmund.

This custom dates to around A.D. 500 when people ate black-eyed peas for luck during the celebration of Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish new year. In the U.S., eating black-eyed peas on New Year's Day is a southern tradition for good fortune in the coming year. When eaten with cornbread and collards or other leafy green vegetables, the cornbread symbolizes gold and the vegetables stand for the prosperity of green money, says Warmund.

Eating black-eyed peas in the U.S. may also go with the adage, "Eat poor on New Year's and eat fat the rest of the year." Adding liquid to the dry peas for cooking causes them to swell, representing expanding wealth, she says.

In another version of this custom, a clean penny or dime goes into the cooking pot. According to lore, the person served the coin will enjoy the most prosperity in the new year. This custom is not advised since a coin may become a choking hazard.

Black-eyed peas (Vigna unguiculata), also known as cowpeas, are a type of bean. Several parts of the plant are edible, including the leaves and the small, immature pods, but it is most often eaten as a dry, shelled pea. A common variety of blackeyed peas with a bush-type growth habit is Arkansas Blackeye #1, while a common vining type is California Blackeye #5.




