

# Southwest Student Earns Full Ride At Mizzou

"In eighth grade, I wanted to try taking a class on Journalism," began Lacey Reeves, current University of Missouri student. While taking classes on transitioning into high school, Reeves became intrigued by journalism, and threw a Google search at the idea. Looking into schools for professional journalism, she discovered a local college high on every list: the University of Missouri. "I thought to myself," she continued, "how have I never heard of this school before?"

Soon after, Reeves discovered that on September 8, 1908, the University of Missouri opened its doors as first real Journalism school in America, only secondopened in the world; first being the Ecole Supérieure de Journalisme in Paris, France, founded 9 years prior. While reading of the university's hand-on approach to gaining real-world experience, she realized this could be the path her study takes.

After speaking with her teachers about the idea, Reeves was told of the opportunity that would make it all possible: the Missouri Land Grant, "which sparked my interest," she said, "I heard the words '100% of financial needs met,' but I was torn. 'Do I want to stay here, where I love? Or do I want to go somewhere further away to have a better opportunity?" A truly ancient question, yet she soon found her answer.

This particular land grant covers tuition, and was meant to provide the opportunity for education to those financially unable to

accommodate their stay, otherwise. The requirements are based on the ability of the student's family to offer financial contribution to their child's educational expenses, and if the family's ability falls below a certain number, the student is approved. Coming from rural Missouri, one does not expect to attend the first journalism school in the country. Dreading being turned down, Reeves was hesitant to be certain - but soon enough, she found out she met the requirements.

"And that was the first half of the puzzle," Reeves explained, "the second half would be getting into the Mizzou Honors College. If I got into that, it would cover my room and board, meal plans, books, parking pass, down to the littlest things. If accepted for both of these grants, Reeves would not have to pay a cent to attend the university.

Automatic entry to the college is a 24 on the ACT, so she set out to getting her score as high as possible to ensure entry, and financial coverage. Reeves would go on to complete the test a total of four times, and dissatisfied with an already-acceptanceworthy score of 26, she decided to undertake serious study to earn entry into the honors program she sought. She researched practice tests online, scoured the ACT book in the Barry County Library, and completed math tests everyday after school.

On her fifth completion of the ACT, Reeves scored a 28 enough to enter. "The minute I opened that honors acceptance letter, I just looked

at my parents and said, "I'm going to college for free.' I couldn't believe it," Reeves said. "I had never been that far north by myself, or lived that far away, ever. It was very weird. When I brought up the grant at school, my friends started looking into Mizzou."

Her freshman year was paid for, of course, however sophomore year brought trouble in the form of improperly filed documentation. Reeves explained that due to an error in financial data, she received a letter saying she no longer qualified for her grant. "I saw other people transferring or leaving, I didn't want to be that person." Reeves then filed a Special Circumstances FAFSA, unsure if it would solve the issue, but remaining hopeful.

Luck, it seems, was on her side, though. "The day before my sophomore move in, I get an email: 'Your case has been selected, you are eligible for the Missouri Land Grant Honors.' I had spent that whole summer worrying and worrying, and it had finally come to that day where I'd chosen to continue without the grant. But I was eligible. And I got to go to college my sophomore year free."

Unfortunately, the honors program offering full financial coverage for all nontuition costs has ended - but will cover students before the Class of 2025. Beyond that, the additional costs will need to be covered by scholarships or other funds.

But for one lucky student, it all worked.

Increases in fertilizer prices add to the cost of growing forage for grazing. This leads farmers to ask if they should buy hay or fertilizer, says University of Missouri Extension nutrient management specialist John Lory.

Comparing the benefits of buying hay vs. applying fertilizer for better yields is complicated, but it is crucial to the bottom line, says Lory.

A fair comparison looks at the costs of hay vs. fertilizer, whether the farmer can use the grown forage or purchased hay, and the nutrient efficiency of the grown forage vs. purchased feed.

Studies at the MU Forage Systems Research Center in Linneus and MU Southwest Research Center in Mount Vernon give some insight, he says.

MU researchers fund that 50 pounds per acre of nitrogen boosted spring pasture yield an average of 1,100 pounds per acre. With nitrogen fertilizer prices near \$1 per pound, the cost of that feed is 5 cents per pound.

What is the cost based on utilization rate?

Lory explains that cattle only eat part of the forage available to them, leaving

the rest to waste. High prices make it critical to manage pastures for high forage utilization rates.

Research shows that cattle eat about 60% of available forage in highly efficient spring grazing systems, but rates typically dip below 50%. That means that cows waste about half of the fertilized forage. At 50% use, the actual cost of consumed forage doubles, says Lory. If nitrogen fertilizer is \$1 per pound, cost of consumed feed is 10 cents per pound. Many farmers can buy hay for less that that now.

Forage use for purchased feed usually runs higher than that for grazing, says Lory. Hay utilization rates can reach 80% but most often are closer to 65%. If hay is \$80 per ton, the cost per pound is 4 cents. However, at 65% utilization, the cost per pound of feed eaten goes to 6 cents.

"These examples show how purchased feed has the potential to be an economically competitive approach compared to buying fertilizer when prices are high," says

"When you bring hay or other supplemental feed onto your farm, you are buying feed and fertilizer at the same time," says Lory. "A ton of fescue hay contains nearly 100 pounds of fertilizer nutrients. If spread strategically on your farm, these nutrients provide fertilizer value to offset the cost of the hay."

Beef cows typically excrete most of the nutrients they eat. To get the most value from hay, move the hay and cows to pastures that need fertilizer. Unroll hay bales, move hay rings or use some type of bale-graze system to spread across pastures. All of the excreted phosphate, potassium, sulfur and micronutrients in the hay is available to the pasture as fertilizer, but only about 25% of the nitrogen is available. The rest is lost or tied up in the soil organic matter. So, a ton of hay with 12.5% protein provides about 10 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer, 12 pounds of phosphate and 35 pounds of potash.

The fertilizer value of hay is usually a little over a penny per pound, or slightly more than \$20 per ton. Recently, nitrogen prices rose to nearly \$1 per pound, and phosphate and potash prices more than doubled. This increases the fertilizer value of hay to more than 2.5 cents per pound.

In pastures, nutrients brought onto the farms as feed or fertilizer recycle and improve yields. When winter feeding hay, the hay's fertilizer will increase spring pasture growth. When properly managed, about 5 tons of feed on a pasture with a total nitrogen fertilizer value of 50 pounds can provide an additional 1,000 pounds or more of quality spring forage growth.

Fertilizer value also can influence hay purchase de-

cisions, says Lory. Buying high-quality hay increases the fertilizer value of the hay. With current costs, a ton of hay may have \$20 more fertilizer value than poorquality hay, making the higher-quality hay the more economical feed, even if it costs more up front.

Hay: Predictable feed at a known price with fertilizer

"Buying hay instead of fertilizer can provide a predictable feed supply to supplement spring pasture growth at a known price," says Lory. "High utilization can be assured through judicious

feeding practices, and unneeded hay can be stored if not used. With high prices, the fertilizer value of the hay has more than doubled, currently around 2 ½ cents per pound of forage or \$50 per ton, offsetting a significant fraction of cost of hay. The fertilizer value of the hay also will boost spring forage growth."

No matter how you meet your herd forage needs, he adds, high prices require you to maximize forage utilization, both when feeding hay and managing pastures.

dog food and even a Kuranda bed. So our final total was just over \$7,000! I would love to see this become a yearly event in honor of Betty White's love for animals."

Haven of the Ozarks continually expressed their gratitude for the community's acceptance of the cause, stating on Facebook: "I'm sure Betty White could've never of dreamed of such an honor and is smiling along with all of our friends at the Rainbow Bridge."





The Barry County Commission proposes a budget of \$6,380,434.99 for 2022. Estimated revenue projection is \$5,002,325.00 plus \$2,112,158.02 carried over from 2021 giving a total appropriation of \$7,114,483.02. The Commission approved a 4% cost of living raise for county employees and a 2% cost of living raise for office holders.

According to Joyce Ennis, Clerk of County Commission, the \$105,080.05 spent under Miscellaneous was primarily used to fund the sending of rebate checks in June of 2021, which acted as refunds for an accidental over-taxation. Ennis commented on the incident in June of 2021: "Certification errors of the 2020 tax levies for Barry-Lawrence Ambulance District and Barry County Developmentally Disabled were discovered. Tax payers were over-taxed for these two entities."

The substantial increase from \$29,705 in 2021, to \$465,000 in 2022, under Capital Projects is a result of the county purchasing land for a new jail, as well as roof maintenance for the courthouse itself.

# **MU Extension guide for farm families**

A new University of Missouri Extension publication and related online tool can guide farmers through the difficult task of keeping the farm running when the owner or key decision-maker cannot.

When someone becomes ill or incapacitated, family members often struggle with finding key information, says MU Extension agricultural business and policy specialist Mary Sobba.

"Short-Term Operating Plan for Farms and Ranches" (MU Extension publication M202) gives guidelines for operation of the farm for two weeks to six months.

"Locating key information can be stressful and timeconsuming," says Sobba. "This plan will help reduce stress and save time."

The free guide, which is available as a fillable, printable PDF, breaks down key information into categories general, livestock, crop, horticulture, woodlands/timber, equipment, etc. Sobba recommends a yearly review and update of information.

Sobba and MU Extension county engagement specialists Joni Harper, Catherine Neuner and Kyle Whitaker wrote the guide. They also worked with a team at the University of Minnesota

to incorporate the content into AgPlan, a free online tool to create customized business plans. The AgPlan website lets users store their password-protected data and share it with selected individuals.

People can use the guide, the website or both. Some people may choose to start with a paper copy to gather the data then enter it into the website to share with other family members, Sobba says.

Sobba reminds users that the plan does not take the place of legal and professional advice.

# **Omicron Variant's High Rate of Infection**

While the omicron variant continues to infect people around the world, researchers at the University of Missouri have identified the highly prevalent, specific mutations that are causing the omicron variant's high rate of infection.

The findings help explain how the new variant can escape pre-existing antibodies present in the human body, either from vaccination or naturally from a recent CO-VID-19 infection.

"We know that viruses evolve over time and acquire mutations, so when we first heard of the new omicron variant, we wanted to identify the mutations specific to this variant," said Kamlendra Singh, a professor in the MU College of Veterinary Medicine, assistant director of the MU Molecular Interactions Core and Christopher S. Bond Life Sciences Center principal investigator.

Singh collaborated with Saathvik Kannan, a student at Hickman High School in Columbia, Missouri, and Austin Spratt, an undergraduate student at MU, and Sid Byrareddy of the University of Nebraska Medical Center,

#### Commission Agrees on Redistricting Map

The House Citizens Redistricting Commission voted and passed a bipartisan redistricting map Wednesday afternoon. Both the Democrat and Republican commissioners worked together over the last six months to achieve fair and representative maps.

"We are encouraged by the bipartisan work this commission has completed. Today, we voted on a plan unanimously - that means 10 Republicans and 10 Democrats voted on the same map. When these commissions were announced, few people expected an agreement, let alone a positive outcome. As Democrats, we stood strong on our values of transparency and public input from the beginning. To see an agreement come together means that public input wasn't wasted and that two sides were able to connect for the future of Missouri," said House Commission Co-Chair Keena Smith.

Today is a good example of teamwork - we can cooperate. We never were looking for a Democratic lean or bias. We fought for fair maps across the state, not just in the districts we are 'concerned' with. While many states are gerrymandering competitive districts out of existence, this commission created more competitive districts, giving Missouri voters an increased say in their future. We are proud of the bipartisan agreements specifically for Jackson, Clay, Greene, Boone and St. Louis counties," said Missouri Democratic Party Executive Director Randy Dunn.

When comparing 2018/2020 outcomes with the now passed House Commission map, estimates show possible gains for Democrats in 2022 with proper represento analyze protein sequences of omicron samples from around the world, including South Africa, Botswana and the United States. The team identified 46 highly prevalent mutations specific to omicron, including several located in the region of the virus' spike protein where antibodies bind to the virus in order to prevent infection.

"The purpose of antibodies is to recognize the virus and stop the binding, which prevents infection," Singh said. "However, we found many of the mutations in the omicron variant are located right where the antibodies are supposed to bind, so we are showing how the virus continues to evolve in a way that it can potentially escape or evade the existing antibodies, and therefore continue to infect so many people."

As antiviral treatments for individuals infected with COVID-19 continue to be developed, Singh explained that having a better understanding of how the virus is evolving will help ensure future antiviral treatments will be targeted toward the specific parts of the virus to produce the most effective

In a recent trip to his native India, Singh met with Manish Sisodia, the deputy chief minister of Delhi, to discuss the launch of Coro-Quil-Zn, a supplement that can be taken while infected with COVID-19 to help reduce one's viral load. The supplement, which Singh helped to develop, is now being used by patients in Tamil Nadu, a state in India. The manufacturer will soon seek FDA approval for its distribution in the United States.

"The first step toward solving a problem is getting a better understanding of the specific problem in the first place," Singh said. "It feels good to be contributing to research that is helping out with the pandemic situation,

which has obviously been affecting people all over the world?

"Omicron SARS-CoV-2 variant: Unique features and their impact on pre-existing antibodies" was recently published in Journal of Autoimmunity. Funding for the study was provided by the Bond Life Sciences Center, the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases and the National Strategic Research Institute at the University of Nebraska. Siddappa Byrareddy of the University of Nebraska Medical Center, Hitendra Chand of Florida International University and Kalicharan Sharma of Delhi Pharmaceutical Sciences and Research University were coauthors on the study.





#### Missouri Residents Spend the 12th Least on Groceries

The current run of inflation in the U.S. economy is putting pressure on household finances nationwide. The second half of 2021 saw several consecutive months of higher than usual price increases, reaching an overall 6.8% rate of inflation from November 2020 to November 2021. Wages have also grown in recent months but not at a rate fast enough to keep up with inflation, which is squeezing families' budgets in key spending categories like housing, energy, transportation, and food.

Groceries are among the areas where inflation has challenged household spending this year. According to recent data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, food at home cost 6.4% more in 2021 than 2020, the highest year-over-year increase since the Great Recession. Prices for meat, poultry, fish, and eggs alone increased by 12.8% over that span.

Continued supply chain challenges are a primary driver of the recent price increases. Many suppliers and distributors have struggled with labor shortages and increased transportation costs, which has made it more challenging to get food products on grocery store shelves. Inconsistent supply has meant greater costs for stores and ultimately for consumers, and as current conditions persist into 2022, a scarcity of certain products could continue to push prices higher.

Inflation in the cost of groceries has been especially challenging for U.S. households because consumers have also been buying more groceries in general during the COVID-19 pandemic. With more establishments closed or operating at limited capacity due to the pandemic, consumers were more likely to eat at home. As a result, spending on groceries increased by 11.2% in 2020 while food services and accommodations saw a 20.5% drop. Because food is a necessity, households were unable to avoid this increase in spending, in contrast to other categories like transportation services and energy that have seen large price increases during the pandemic but also significant drops in consumer expenditures.

Spending on groceries does vary from location to location. Different regions may have greater costs for food supply and distribution, real estate, or labor that grocers pass on to consumers. In dollars per capita, residents of New Englandwhich is not a major agricultural producer and has high costs—lead all regions in grocery spending at \$4,061. But as a percentage of total consumer spending, the Southeast (8.7%), Rocky Mountain (8.6%), and Southwest (8.3%) have the highest levels of spending on groceries, which in part reflects lower incomes in these regions. Many of the states where residents spend the most on groceries are found in these regions as a result.

The data used in this analysis is from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis. To determine the states where residents are spending the most on groceries, researchers at Filterbuy calculated annual grocery spending as a share of total spending for U.S. households. In the event of a tie, the state with the higher per capita annual grocery spending was ranked higher.

The analysis found that per capita annual grocery spending in Missouri amounts to \$3,136, compared to the national average of \$3,480. Missouri residents allocate 7.8% of all household spending on groceries. Out of all U.S. states, residents of Missouri spend the 12th least on groceries. Here is a summary of the data for Missouri:




