Paine arrested for Purdy bomb incident

On Thursday, February 2, just before 5 a.m., Purdy Fire and the Barry County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to a small outside fire on Farm Road 2095 in Purdy. While en route, responding units received updated information from central dispatch of a possible bomb. When firefighters arrived on the scene, a device was found that resembled an explosive

According to a prob- fire was extinguished, it was

able cause statement dated February 3 by Detective Doug Henry with the Barry County Sheriff's office, the fire was reported to be a fivegallon bucket on fire on top of a propane tank. Once the

determined that the incendiary device was a homemade bomb. The propane tank appeared to be equipped with a light switch hooked to a battery with wire fence clips, nuts, bolts, screws, ceramic shards, and other debris attached.

On February 3, Detective Doug Henry interviewed Benjamin Wade Paine, 29, of Purdy, after Barry County deputies arrested him for trespassing on the same property and through the same gate where the incendiary device was placed on February 2. During the interview, Paine admitted to being at the bucket that was on fire and that a knife found at the scene by investigators was his.

Responding agencies included Springfield Fire Department's Bomb Squad and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Paine is charged with Unlawful Possession of an Explosive Weapon and is currently held in the Barry County Jail on a \$50,000

Local dispensary optimistic about rec cannabis

With adult use of cannabis being passed in Missouri last November, it has officially become legal to purchase in the state for all citizens over the age of 21. Though the motion only passed by a slight margin, local recreational and medical dispensary manager Charlea Estes-Jones says that medical professionals and locals have responded quite positively to the change.

In total, the medical card would cost you around \$125 with expenses included, and Estes-Jones states that many locals can't afford this upfront price point for their medical attention. With the bill being passed, several aspects of the function of a medical card have altered, with one being that they are now valid for three years as

opposed to one.

While medicinal use is on the mind of many, recreational cannabis being passed will accrue its share of curious fun-seekers; however, Estes-Jones says that approximately 80% of those who have entered the store are asking medically based questions, not recreational.

"People are having fun," she says, "but whether they know it or not, they're likely coming here for medical treatment."

Historically, mental health issues like anxiety, depression, lack of appetite, social difficulties, and more have been soothed by cannabis, she states. However, Estes-Jones has personally seen the plant accomplish greater feats.

Cannabis from front

"I had a really hard time admitting I was sick for a really long time. I had brain surgery in November and a cervical spine fusion in December; those were six weeks apart. My neurosurgeon was incredibly supportive of the field that I work in because he has seen what it does for people. So being transformed myself while also seeing my patients come in, say how many times they've been in the ER to receive morphine, then come in and say that with a single transdermal patch, with no psychoactive effects whatsoever, their pain stopped. They break into tears because it's the first time in recent memory they haven't been in pain. That's why I do what I do."

On the April ballot, there will be an additional 3% tax offered on the sale of cannabis for the county. Currently, there is a 6% tax split between mental health services, drug rehabilitation, and public defenders.

On the subject of this being a step in the direction of analyzing the medicinal benefits of other substances shown to have potential (LSD, psilocybin, ketamine, MDMA), Estes-Jones stated:

"From a natural healthcare perspective, there is a reason why mental health professionals are fighting to have those types of things decriminalized. We have had people have total life 180s with cannabis. It's not because it's a cure-all, it's not

because it's a miracle, but because people are using it as a health and wellness tool, and they're able to integrate it into their life to make themselves feel better. We're seeing that a lot."

Weeds adapt to fight back against herbicides

Weeds today aren't like "what Mom used to make," says University of Missouri Extension weed scientist Kevin Bradley.


Today's weeds know how to fight back against longused herbicides and adapt in ways that spell trouble in production agriculture, says Bradley. Officially, Missouri already has 11 different herbicide-resistant weed species. Waterhemp and Palmer amaranth, both weeds in the pigweed family, rule the roost when it comes to resistant weeds in Missouri, he says.

Resistant weeds are fast outpacing the development of new herbicides. It's not just resistance running amok; it's the type of resistance that concerns Bradley. "Some of the mechanisms responsible for resistance in these weeds like waterhemp and Palmer amaranth aren't like anything we've seen before," he says.

Herbicides focus on specific enzymes that bind to target sites. Historically, weeds have adapted through mutations in their internal enzymes that result in changes to the those target sites. This has been one of the most common resistance mechanisms identified in weeds for the past several decades.

More recently, weeds have been developing metabolic-based resistance, or non-target-site resistance, which lets plants convert the herbicide's active ingredient into inactive metabolites that don't kill the plant. Worse yet, metabolic resistance can confer resistance to other herbicides within the same chemical groups and perhaps even to herbicides in other groups. It's possible that metabolic resistance can confer resistance to new herbicides that have never been sprayed in that field. This makes weed control even more unpredictable and concerning, says Bradley.

"Unfortunately, the trend with resistant pigweeds like



waterhemp and Palmer amaranth right now is metabolic resistance," says Bradley. "When weed scientists have investigated the 2,4-D, dicamba or group 15 resistant pigweed populations that have been found in some states in recent years, they have found metabolic resistance mechanisms in these weeds more often than not," he says.

"Keep mixing and rotating herbicide sites of action, but remember, herbicides alone aren't a silver bullet to solve the resistance problem."

Meanwhile, Bradley is studying other ways to control weeds and prevent weed seeds from returning to the soil. Methods include weed electrocution and a seed destructor that crushes seeds during harvest. Bradley says that it is going to take more than herbicides alone to solve this problem with resistant weeds. Visit weedscience. missouri.edu for more information.



Haven of the Ozarks: Pet of the Week





MDC virtual program to focus on paddlefish snagging

Snagging for paddlefish and for nongame fish is a unique and challenging form of fishing.

People wanting to learn more about snagging should sign up for the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) virtual program "Fishing Skills: Virtual, Snagging Fish" on Feb. 22. This online program, which will be from 2:30-3 p.m., is being put on by the staff of MDC's Shoal Creek Conservation Education Center in Joplin. People can register for this program at https://mdcevent-web.s3licensing.com/ Event/EventDetails/188972.

Snagging (also called grabbing) involves hooking a fish in an area other than its mouth. The primary focus of the Feb. 22 program will be paddlefish. MDC Administrative Specialist Tim Smith will discuss about this style of fishing that is used to catch paddlefish, also known as "spoonbill." Smith will discuss the rods, reels, hooks, and other gear needed for the paddlefish snagging season. He'll also discuss regulations, techniques, and strategies. Missouri's paddlefish season is from March 15-April 30.

Although much of this program will be about how to snag paddlefish, Smith will also discuss snagging non-





game fish. Missouri has two snagging seasons for nongame fish; March 15 to May 15 and Sept. 15 to Jan. 31. Only species that are classified by Missouri's Wildlife Code as "nongame fish" are legal to be taken during these seasons. Suckers are the most frequent catch of these snagging seasons, but people also snag for carp, buffalo and other species of nongame

Though this program is free, registration is required to participate. Use the link above. Registrants must provide an e-mail, so a program link can be sent to them. People can stay informed about upcoming programs at MDC's Shoal Creek Conservation Education Center and other nearby MDC facilities by signing up for text alerts and e-mail bulletins. People who have questions about how to sign up for text alerts from the Shoal Creek Center can call 417-629-3423.





Paul Hamby Benefits of a four day school week

Are students better off with a four day school week than five days? Results so far indicate mostly yes with a few concerns.

About one fourth of Missouri school districts have now made the transition to a four day week. The trend started in small rural schools. Lathrop, a small town in NW Missouri, was first in our state to switch in 2010.

Andrew Palmer taught Middle School English at Lathrop that first year of 2010 and continued through 2015. He came to Lathrop from one of the largest school districts in the state; "From an educator's perspective, the thing I loved the most about having students only four days of the week, was I finally had a fifth day to work on grading papers and improving instruc-

tion. When you teach middle school and high school, there are always numerous papers to grade. With a standard five day week, all that additional work that happens after the students leave the classroom usually happens in the evenings, late at night, or even on a weekend day. It makes for less stressed and more productive teachers."

The Independence School Board voted in December 2022 to move to a four-day week beginning Fall 2023. Independence will be the largest Missouri school district, with 14,000 students, on the four day plan.

"In Missouri, there's over 140 districts that have done this and only one has gone back," said Independence Superintendent Dr. Dale Herl.

Less is More. One of the benefits for students is the time per class is a little longer. They can cover more depth on a subject.

Cindy O'Laughlin, Missouri Senate Majority Floor Leader, was the chair of the senate education committee from 2020 to 2022. She visited more than 30 schools during that time and sees a bigger problem; "The public school system is so overwhelmed with requirements from both the feds and the state Department of Elementary and Secondary education that teachers are fed up and leaving in droves. I will always believe good teachers have a heart for their work and bureaucrats have managed to destroy their initiative and joy in teaching. It's not the salary causing people to leave teaching; it's the culture of the classroom."

One of the unexpected benefits of a four day school week for students is the opportunity to spend more time with extended family.

The fifth day can be a rotating day with grandparents, a parent, with day trips to Missouri's many parks, museums and events. Families can plan three day weekend events. Our job as parents and grandparents is to teach our children life skills. This extra day would be a good time to do just that.

For high school students exploring career opportunities, the unplanned fifth day is an opportunity to job shadow or intern to try out jobs they have an interest in.

One downside is that a single parent with no close family or support system struggles with finding and affording childcare for the extra day each week.

In today's hectic world, finding balance is important. Four days at school and three days of family time is a better balanced life for our chil-

February reminds me of hearts and flowers. February is also "American Heart Month," and heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States.

I would like to provide definitions of some common heartrelated terms.

The heart is that strong muscle in your chest that pumps blood throughout your body.

Heart health is the term used to describe the well-being of your heart.

Heart disease is a term used to describe a variety of conditions affecting the heart or blood vessels.

Cardiovascular disease is the term used to include the heart and vessels (arteries and veins), their structure, and function.

Coronary Heart disease is the most common heart disease. It occurs when plaque (a combination of fat, cholesterol, calcium, and other substances from the blood) builds up inside your arteries. Blood in the arteries carries oxygen to your organs. Plaque decreases the amount of blood getting to your organs, especially your heart. Plaque can lead to blood clots, which can block blood flow, and muscles require oxygen to

A heart attack, also known as a Myocardial Infarction (MI), is when the flow of blood and oxygen to part of the heart muscle is blocked. That part of the heart muscle that is not receiving the oxygen in the blood begins to die.

Cardiac Arrest happens when the heart suddenly stops pumping. Blood flow to the brain and other organs is stopped.

A stroke or a Cerebral Vascular Attack (CVA) or Transient Ischemic Attack (TIA) happens when blood flow to the brain is blocked. The brain also requires oxygen to function and will begin to die without oxygen. The effects of a TIA are transient or short-term, usually resolving to some degree over time.

Blood Pressure is the force of your blood pushing against the walls of your arteries as the heart pumps blood. The Systolic is the first number and is the pressure when the blood is pumped out to the heart. Diastolic is the second number and is the pressure between heartbeats when the heart is filling with

Hypertension, or high blood pressure, develops when blood flows through your arteries at higher than normal pressure. Healthy blood pressure is less than 120/80, and high blood pressure is when the blood pressure is consistently 130/ 80 or higher. (This is according to the National Institute of Health.)

The Real Deal

In the world of Real Estate, we are definitely in a period of transition. Interest rates have more than doubled in the past 12 months, and inventory is at an all-time low, and it has been for almost two years now. What does this mean for you?

New or First-time buyers

If you're buying, you had best have your finances in order and be able to show preapproval or proof of funds even to get your offer considered. If you are a first-time home buyer or trying to utilize a government-subsidized loan such as FHA, rural development, or VA, you are at a definite disadvantage. Some sellers don't even want to entertain those offers at all. To make it worse, the home you were eligible for one year ago is now out of reach because of jacked-up interest rates. To compound the problem, the inventory of entry-level homes is almost nonexistent.

New homeowners are still buying homes! They have had to lower their expectations and, in some cases, get creative with financing. A good Realtor can help prep young buyers for these difficulties and put them in a position where their offer will be taken seriously and, hopefully, accepted!

Investors

Cash is still king, and investors with capital to spare are taking advantage of this market. Any property that needs some fixing up, or is what we call an "unconventional lend," is a prime opportunity for a well-funded investor. The process of flipping these homes is still a great option, especially if the contractor can get the house in shape to qualify for a firsttime homeowner loan. These types of properties are in very high demand and scarce as hen's teeth these days. Of course, many investors may also opt to rent these homes, as landlords are commanding historically high rents these days, and rental homes are almost impossible to find. The main question for an investor is, do they have the patience to be a landlord for several years and receive a gradual income, or make it all in one fell swoop on a sales transaction? Most seasoned investors know that a sharp realtor can increase their opportunity of finding these properties and, in many cases, land the deal.

Sellers

We have all heard the scuttlebutt, "interest rates are through the roof," "lenders are hesitant," and "people are not buying homes like they were," and prices have dropped accordingly. Rumor has it that it's a bad time to

Oddly enough, this has had the opposite effect on the market. Sellers have been very cautious about listing their homes, so the market is very tight. There are still more buyers than sellers, and good properties fly off the market in a hot minute. It is true that sellers cannot command outrageous prices for

their properties, but these sales have always been at the mercy of appraisals. A house still has to receive an appropriate appraisal to pass the lender's requirements. An experienced professional, whether an agent or an appraiser, will always try to give a fair assessment of the property's true value, and if they know what they're talking about, the home will still sell. I will say that 100% of the time, if you know somebody whose property has had no activity or is not sold in less than 30 days, it is priced too high for the market.

Many sellers are sitting on the fence, waiting to see what happens with the economy. Of course, none of us have a crystal ball, but I see the market stabilizing and interest rates setting in very close to where they are now for quite a while. Even if the political climate changes after the next election, I think it'll be a long while before we see 3% mortgage rates again.

In my opinion, the best course of action for a potential buyer is to get their finances in order and team up with a professional who can be realistic and guide them through the home-buying process. Likewise, if you have a property to sell, I suggest you get a few opinions. A responsible agent should be honest with you and let you know what your property can sell for in the current market. It would be wise to beware of any great disparities in these evaluations; there are some agents who might lean towards being a little overly optimistic about your property's value. Listing your home at an over-inflated price is not going to end well for anyone. Of course, if you are patient, you may tend to get a slightly higher price for your home versus opting for a quick sale. That's a judgment call for you to make. You might want to check references and an agent's track record. Overall, the market is still strong, a little tougher than it used to be, but there are still plenty of opportunities for buyers and sellers. In real estate, as in most other aspects of life, the best strategy is always to be well-informed.

January Tipped

On a recent night, he only had two tables during his shift and only made five dollars in tips. "Dad, I worked really hard for them, and they even told me how great of a job I was doing, but they still didn't tip." Sometimes people don't reward their server even though they should, and sometimes months in the Stock Market don't reward us either, but thankfully January rewarded us well.

January is behind us now, and it felt different than 2022. In 2022, stocks and bonds fell, and there was a lot of uncertainty. But this past month, stocks and bonds were both higher and among the highest monthly returns since 1980. January tipped.

The S&P 500 was up in January 6.3% making it the third time in four months it was up more than 5%. It's still a new year, but I like how the year is lining up. We will

probably have a short and mild recession, but I think the US economy will pull out of it quickly because of strong consumers who still have a lot of cash to spend.

I am still overweighting my strategies to stocks but am changing the makeup of the stocks because I think this year will end strong once we are past this mild recession in the near term.

I had been leaning more toward low-volatility US stocks than international stocks, but I'm moving back toward my target levels. My rationale is that developed international stocks have rebounded and have good valuations. I'm doing this because I see some opportunities for my clients, but I also expect these moves to manage their risk level.

After a challenging 2022, January is encouraging. I'm sure 2023 will have some market ups and downs, but after last year, it's good to start the year strong. January tipped, and I think 2023 will too.

One last thing, if a teenager or college kid serves you at a restaurant, don't be a knucklehead and stiff them. Instead, be a generous tipper and encourage hard work; I'm talking to you and the market.
