MOAG awards local agencies with Community Partner Award

Missouri Attorney General (MOAG) Andrew Bailey recently award eight law enforcement agencies and two medical facilities in Barry County a Community Partner Award.

The Barry County Sheriff's Office, Butterfield Police Department, Cassville Police Department, Cox Monett Hospital, Mercy Hospital in Cassville, Monett Police Department, Purdy Police Department, Seligman Police Department, Washburn Police Department and Wheaton Police Department received the award for their help with the Attorney General's SAFE Kits Initiative, which assists with clearing untested sexual assault evidence backlogs.

"We want to recognize our partners who have assisted in clearing the backlog of untested sexual assault kits throughout the state. These recipients and their efforts are vital to achieving justice for every victim of an unspeakable crime," said Attorney General Bailey. "We would not have made it this far without them."

The Sexual Assault Forensic Examination (SAFE) Program covers the cost of gathering, collecting and preserving evidence during the forensic examination for victims of sexual crimes that occurred in Missouri. As of January of 2022, the MOAG SAFE Kits Initiative had collected an inventory of 7,020 previously unsubmitted sexual assault kits.

Stone County Breast Cancer Survivor holds inaugural Boo For Cancer 5K

A Stone County woman is turning her personal fight against breast cancer into inspiration to help others.

Nicole Turner, a mother of six and breast cancer survivor, from Stone County, hosted a 5K walk/run last weekend to help raise money for the community and to raise awareness about the toll breast cancer has not only on the individual but the families of breast cancer patients.

The Inaugural Boo for Cancer 5K Walk/Run took place on Sunday, Oct. 22, at the Reeds Spring High School parking lot, located at 20277 State Highway 413 in Reeds Spring. The event began at 8 a.m. and hosted vendors. The race started at the High School and had participants go around the other Reeds Spring school campuses before heading back to the High School. All the proceeds will go to the Stone County School Readiness Fair,

the Stone County Christmas programs and a new scholarship fund for area students.

Turner was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2021 and said during her fight she felt the warmth and encouragement of the community for her and her family.

"I was diagnosed with breast cancer in the fall of 2021. I battled with it, did chemo and then got the all clear," Turner said. "I was only three months in the clear before I got slapped with the diagnosis again. I did a total of 18 months of chemo. That's financially hard. It was emotionally hard. My out of pocket cost was between five to \$8,000 depending on if I needed medications to offset the chemo for nausea and dizziness. During this, our community, Reeds Spring, really, really rallied around me. People were

Changes coming to CDL Testing

From Missouri Dept. of Revenue

The Missouri State Highway Patrol and Missouri Department of Revenue wish to inform potential future Commercial Driver License (CDL) applicants of an upcoming change in CDL testing procedure. The new modernized testing standard being adopted by Missouri will begin on December 4, 2023, and will be utilized by all CDL examiners in the state, including at all Patrol examination

ty examination sites. The changes in testing procedure include a more streamlined pretrip examination and more efficient basic skills course.


Current testing procedures will remain in effect statewide until December 1.

It is important to note, per federal guidelines, applicants must pass the pre-trip and basic skills using the same testing model, meaning if an applicant passes the old model pre-trip, they must pass the old model basic skills test to be eligible for the road test. We encourage training schools and applicants to consider this when making plans for testing.



Jumping Hurdles: Stocks & War

> With the S&P 500 up just over 4% as of October 17, stocks are having an October to remember on the heels of a September to forget. Savvy investors saw the September market lows as a buying opportunity and raced in to buy the dip.

But of course, there are those two lurking hurdles: interest rates staying higher for longer than expected and the Israel-Hamas war. First, the market may have to live with higher interest rates for much

longer than anticipated. It seems there won't be any significant rate cuts until the middle of 2024. However, there are reasons for optimism. The Federal Reserve chairman said on October 19 that they are probably finished raising rates, which isn't as great as a rate cut but is still good

The second and most interesting storyline is the current Israel-Hamas war. Following the hospital bombing in Gaza, oil prices have moved higher, but only slightly. Though this war has the potential to escalate and upset global markets, the stock market has coughed it up to the Middle East.

The stock recovery doesn't come without risks and some timely maneuvering because of the monetary policy uncertainty and escalating tensions

in the Middle East. I have pulled back on some on international stocks in the accounts I manage from a slight overweight to a more neutral stance while increasing my large-cap value holdings. I do this mostly because of weakening European economies, better-than-expected economic growth in the US, and a strengthening of the US dollar.

With an expectation of solid earnings reports this quarter, oil prices remaining in check, and interest rates at least holding, we could have some upside opportunities in the remaining months of this year.

After all these years, Middle East being the my wife continues to be faster than me but is still a timid jumper. Right now, stocks are doing well jumping the hurdles, maybe not like a gazelle, but good enough for a solid month. Let's hope they

don't get timid too.



"I already have the name approved and am working on the paperwork to start The Turner Family Cancer and Community Foundation," Turner said. "Our mission will be to give back to the community. Even if it was just, 'Hey Nikki, I just wanted you to know you were in my heart and I'm praying for you'. Those little things are what got me

through what I went through. My husband used to say a phrase and it drove me insane. But it was so true. It was, 'How do you eat an elephant? One bite at a time'. I don't think the community realizes as someone who is going through that it's hard to think just one day, just one day, at a time. At the end you're

like, am I even gonna make it out of this. So just have that constant love and support and just telling someone you're there for them can go so far."


The Cassville Wildcats hosted the Monett Cubs last Friday night at Wildcat Stadium for the annual Barry County Brawl.


