Cassville R-IV School District approves sale of \$9 million general obligation bonds

The Board of Education of the Cassville R-IV School District of Barry County, at a regular meeting on July 25, 2023, approved the sale of \$9,000,000 General Obligation Bond Issue to its Municipal Bond Underwriter, L.J. Hart & Company of St. Louis.

"We appreciate the strong vote of confidence we received from local patrons at the election and want to lock in interest rates that are still favorable in the current rate environment," stated Jeremy Marple, President of the Board of Education.

These new money General Obligation Bonds were Bank of Southern Missouri approved by about 62.59% of the voters at the April 4, 2023, election for the purpose of providing funds for a new Performing Arts Center, energy improvements, and safety upgrades.

The bond marketing process provided the first opportunity to invest to local financial institutions and according to Courtney Wegman, Vice President of L.J. Hart & Company, Freedom purchased \$250,000 of the bonds. This local support was helpful to the success of the financing.

"It is nice that our marketing procedures facilitated this local involvement while still receiving attractive reoffered yields,"

commented Dr. Merlyn Johnson, Superintendent of

The Board of Education selected the negotiated sale of the bonds in order to capture current market conditions, to be certain that local banks received an opportunity to purchase the bonds, and because the proposed interest rates and yields were fair-based upon

Cassville wastewater rehabilitation begins next phase

According to David Brock, Cassville Public Works Director, a new phase of the city's wastewater rehabilitation began last week.

Construction began with an open trench in the 1300 block of Park Avenue and will progress southwesterly to Fair Street within the next seven to ten days. Construction will then move southwesterly on Fair Street to 10th Street. A lane closure at the intersection of Fair Street and E. 12th Street will also be necessary to accommodate the discharge of a bypass pump. Traffic will be prohibited when excavation is in progress.

Traffic patterns for the elementary and middle school campuses will be impacted; drivers should be prepared to find an alternate round around the construction.

Barricades will be located at the ends of the block where construction is present to redirect through traffic, but local traffic will be able to access their home/business. Local traffic must approach and depart on the appropriate side of the work area.

Other active construction areas will be along Farm Road 1120 and continue progress towards town. Road closures for all traffic will be necessary on Farm Road 1120 in the next week, and 13th Street will see closures this week, weather determinant, with a detour for the Wildwood area and East 13th Street to and from Hwy 248.

Pearls of Production celebrates 10 years with events in **Kirksville and Mount Vernon**

Pearls of Production, taught by University of Missouri Extension women specialists to women producers, is celebrating its 10th year and offering two one-day events, Sept. 30 and Nov. 4.

Pearls began in 2013 to offer women hands-on training in agriculture production practices.

"With two events in different regions of the state this year, we are hoping to reach a larger audience," said Heather Conrow, MU Extension livestock field specialist. "For some women it's a struggle to get away from home and the farm to attend an overnight conference, so we're hoping these one-day events closer to their homes will accommodate more women."

The first event is 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 30, at Truman State University in Kirksville.

"We want to meet women where they are by bringing the learning close to their farms," said Reagan Bluel, MU Extension dairy specialist. "Pearls of Production is about helping women who want to get their hands dirty learn how to

produce food." The number of women involved in agriculture in Missouri and across the U.S. continues to increase, and more women own and operate farms and ranches, Conrow said.







Exeter Chapter of Sleep In Heavenly Peace completes 40 bed goal at nationwide event

The Exeter Chapter of Sleep in Heavenly Peace (SHP) participated in the annual Bunks Across America national event last Saturday to complete 40 beds in five hours. Being one of five children growing up in a home where sometimes we slept on a couch or a pallet on the floor, I was curious to see the chapter in action.

According to Sleep in Heavenly Peace statistics, approximately 1,400 children in Barry County alone do not have their own bed. The Exeter chapter, which began in July of 2022, has provided 110 frames, mattresses, and bedding to date to local children in need in Exeter, Cassville, Purdy, Wheaton, Ridgley, Washburn, and Seligman. But they haven't even made a dent in their mission to ensure "No Kid Sleeps on the Floor in Our Town."

What fascinated me was you don't even need construction experience to volunteer at one of their monthly builds, which they hold from spring to fall every year. Over 40 volunteers gathered at the nationwide event on Saturday, and chapter president and pastor of the Exeter Assembly of God, J.D. Alverson, was gracious enough to show me how the building process is completed in an assembly-line fashion.

The Bunks Across America event closed out the 2023 season, but those interested in volunteering in builds in the spring can contact Pastor Alverson at 417-489-6953. Lowe's provides the lumber for the frames, but the Exeter chapter relies on donations to provide mattresses and bedding for those in need. 

Good Fences Make Good Neighbors

"Good fences make good neighbors" is a quote normally used to justify building a fence and keeping neighbors at arm's length. But that was not the author's recommendation.

In Robert Frost's 1914 poem, "Mending Wall," the writer describes two neighbors working together to repair a fallen stone fence separating their properties.

One neighbor is keen to Arrangements are under rebuild the gap in the wall, while the other fails to see why it is needed in the first place. Of this, he writes:

> There where it is we do not need the wall:

> He is all pine and I am apple orchard.

My apple trees will never get across

And eat the cones under his pines, I tell him.

The neighbor's response

is, "Good fences make good neighbors." The author intends the

statement to be an indictment against our culture's collective failure to be hospitable and neighborly, where we only share a commitment to not sharing anything.

Frost's poem is a metaphor for the walls we build that keep people out and apart. Walls that keep us from being hospitable. Social media has exacerbated the problem but isn't the root cause. The real problem lies with us and our

failure to be connected and engaged neighbors.

Instead of developing relationships, we build a fence so we never have to see the neighbors. Then we build a wall around our time and activities and our hearts. We build a fortress of solitude! (But since we are not Superman, this will fail because we need social connections).

Granted, cattle need fences to stay in their field and dogs often need fences to stay in their yard. Fences can be a necessity in agriculture.

But fences do not help create healthy neighbor relationships. We are now learning that positive and healthy neighbor relationships lead to strong neighborhoods.


Strong neighborhoods foster diverse relationships, connect residents with opportunities, promote human capital, and support children's growth. If we can strengthen America's neighborhoods, we can improve people's well-being and access to the "American dream."

This week, why not remove the metaphoric fence from around your heart and home?

Let me encourage you: invite someone over this weekend. Prepare a big meal. Use good dishes. Wear something nicer than a T-shirt. Go the extra mile! As you gather, do so with a deep desire to share your lives with others. You'll be amazed at what can happen if you let people in, not only to your homes, but your hearts as well.

current conditions in the municipal bond market.

Dr. Johnson stated that the District did compare proposed interest rates with the national bond indexes and other Missouri issues with a similar rating quality sold at competitive and negotiated sales to be certain that rates for the District's bonds were favorable.

"Based upon pricing of these other financings, and the national indexes for AA rated General Obligation Bonds our rates were as good as or better than some public sales and other negotiated sales for a similar quality level of bond issue," Dr. Johnson remarked.

The information shared by L.J. Hart & Company indicated that the bonds are scheduled to mature on March 1, 2032, through March 1, 2043, with reoffered yields ranging from 3.50% to 4.10% which produces additional funds for the projects in the amount of \$322,701.50. The interest income from the bonds is exempt from federal and state of Missouri income taxes and the bonds were available in \$5,000 denominations.

These bonds carry a "AA+" rating from S&P Global due to the District's participation in the State of Missouri Direct Deposit Program coordinated through the Missouri Health and Educational Facilities Authority.

The bonds do contain optional redemption (call) provisions on March 1, 2028, at no penalty that will facilitate the reduction of future interest expense in the event of prepayment or a future refunding to lower rates if market conditions make it economically feasible. The financing proceeds were made available to the District on August 16, 2023, and were promptly reinvested by the District to earn additional interest for use in the completion of the projects. CS Bank was approved to hold these bond funds. The legal documents to complete the issuance of the bonds were prepared by Lori Lea Shelley, Esq. of Lathrop GPM in its role as bond counsel for the District.





Roasted Pumpkin Soup With Pumpkin Crisps

- Serves 6 to 8 3 to 31/2 pounds pumpkin
- 6 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 onions, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, chopped 1 3-inch piece of fresh ginger root, grated
- 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric Pinch of cayenne pepper
- 4 cups vegetable stock
- Salt and ground black pepper 1 tablespoon sesame seeds
- Fresh cilantro leaves, to garnish
- For the pumpkin crisps
- Wedge of fresh pumpkin, seeded 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1. Preheat the oven to 400 F. Prick the pumpkin around the top several times with a fork. Brush the pumpkin with plenty of the oil and bake for 45 minutes or until tender. Leave until cool enough to handle.
- 2. Take care when cutting the pumpkin, as there may still be a lot of hot steam inside. When cool enough to handle, scoop out and discard the seeds. Scoop out and chop the flesh.
- 3. Heat about 4 tablespoons of the remaining oil (you may not have to use all of it) in a large pan and add the onions, garlic and ginger, then cook gently for 4 to 5 minutes. Add the coriander, turmeric, and cayenne, and cook for 2 minutes. Stir in the pumpkin flesh and stock. Bring to a boil, reduce the heat, and simmer for about 20 minutes until tender.
- 4. Cool the soup slightly, then puree it in a food processor or blender until smooth. Return the soup to the rinsed out pan and season well.
- 5. Meanwhile, prepare the pumpkin crisps. Using a swivel-blade potato peeler, pare long thin strips off the wedge of pumpkin. Heat the oil in a small pan and fry the strips in batches for 2 to 3 minutes, until crisp. Drain on paper towels.

6. Reheat the soup and ladle it into bowls. Top with the

Setting the Table for **Year-End Markets**

"Will you set the table?" When my wife says this, I know I'm about to do a little work, but soon it will be time to eat. The market blues of August and September hopefully set the table for good times ahead.

Stocks snapped a fivemonth winning streak in August after the S&P 500 ended negative 1.8%. And while the monthly stock winning streak is over, upside momentum may continue.

Although stocks went negative, they did so in an orderly fashion, which is a good sign of healthiness for the market. The market's overall trading volume was low, telling me investors were not panic selling.

While the stock's monthly winning streak has ended, there might still be some solid months ahead. Historically, after the end of a five-month positive streak, the market has gone up an average of just over 7% over the next six months. Interestingly, this same scenario has happened six times since 1950, and all but one were positive over the next six months, according to LPL.

Don't get overly worried about September because it is generally a dud. September is historically the worst month of the year for stocks since 1950. Stocks have averaged a negative half percent and have finished negatively more times than not. The good news is that historically, stocks have rebounded from a weak September with a pretty strong October. The October-November-December period is the strongest part of the year for the market. This and the fact that the market usually does well just leading up to the US presidential election gives me optimism.

While the next few week's



outlook is mixed, I am encouraged by the historical market trends around the presidential election cycle and the frequent strong returns of the year's final quarter. With this shortterm outlook, I'm maintaining a slight overweight to fixed income (bonds) over stocks in the accounts I manage. I'm not negative or bearish towards stocks but more neutral to them with an expectation of upcoming buying opportunities.

I had a table-setting misstep while doing a college internship in England. I was trying to be helpful and set the table but was quickly corrected on how the "British do it." In my mind, I was thinking, "This from a country that doesn't even know which side of the road to drive." I didn't say it because I still wanted to eat. Let's hope the market isn't as picky about the table setting and serves up something great for the year's end.

Increasing cases of West Nile Virus have been in the national news lately. The total number of cases in the US this year so far has been 552, and cases have been reported in 38 states. According to the CDC West Nile Virus Data and Maps, no cases have been reported in Barry County or surrounding counties.

Colorado has experienced a higher-than-normal number of cases this year. They attribute this to a wet winter and spring, allowing Culex mosquitoes to thrive. Higher infection levels of West Nile Virus follow increased numbers of Culex mosquitoes. The West Nile virus season typically runs from May to October, with increased numbers of Culex mosquitoes during mid to late summer when the temperatures are highest and it is drier. West Nile virus is most commonly spread to people by the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes become infected when they feed on infected birds. Infected mosquitoes then spread West Nile virus to people and other animals by biting them.

Eight to ten people infected with West Nile virus do not develop symptoms. One to five people develop a fever with headache, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea, or rash. They usually recover entirely but may experience fatigue and weakness for weeks or

A few people, about 1 in 150, develop a serious illness that affects their central nervous system, such as encephalitis (inflammation of the brain) or meningitis (inflammation of the membranes surrounding the brain and spinal cord). Symptoms include high fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, vision loss, numbness, and paralysis. People over 60 years of age are at greater risk for severe illness. People at greater risk have conditions such as cancer, diabetes, hypertension, and kidney disease, and those who have had organ transplants. Recovery from severe illness may take several weeks or months, and some effects may be permanent. About 1 out of 10 who develop severe illness may die.

If you think you or a family member might have West Nile Virus, contact your health care provider. Diagnosis is made based on signs and symptoms, history of possible mosquito exposure, and laboratory blood and spinal fluid testing.

There is no vaccine or specific medication. Antibiotics do not treat viruses. Rest, fluids, and over-the-counter pain medications may relieve mild or moderate symptoms. Severe cases will most often require hospitalization for intravenous fluid, pain medications, and nursing care.

Most people infected with West Nile Virus are believed to have lifelong immunity from getting the disease again.

According to a Mo-DOT (Missouri Department of Transportation) Southwest District Traffic Alert, pavement sealing work on Route W between Route A in Wheaton and Old Business 37 Highway in Butterfield will begin on September 15 and last until September 18, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Crews will seal the existing driving surface as part of a pavement sealing project along various routes in the Southwest District.

Traffic will be reduced to one lane where crews are present. Drivers will encounter flaggers and pilot cars directing them through work zones. Drivers are asked to use caution and reduce speed when traveling over recently sealed sections.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds deer hunters of regulation changes for the upcoming 2023-2024 deer-hunting season. The changes include a new firearms early antlerless portion, a new firearms CWD portion, changes to firearms antlerless permit numbers, and the addition of 14 new counties to the MDC CWD Management Zone.

"The changes to deer hunting regulations for the 2023-2024 deer season were motivated by increasing deer numbers throughout much of Missouri and in response to changes in the distribution of chronic wasting disease (CWD) in the state," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "With a growing deer population in most Missouri counties, we're increasing opportunities for hunters to harvest deer both within and outside of the CWD Management Zone this year."

New Firearms Early Antlerless Portion October 6-8 MDC will offer a new firearms early antlerless portion

October 6-8 in the 100 counties open for the firearms late antlerless portion December 2-10. Reynolds County will now be open during the antlerless portions.

"With deer numbers being at desired levels in most counties but continuing to increase, additional antlerless harvest is needed to stabilize the deer population," said Isabelle. "This new season portion will help increase antlerless

deer harvest prior to the November portion, when many hunters focus on harvesting bucks."

Isabelle noted that timing of the early antlerless portion was chosen to provide hunting opportunity when weather conditions are usually favorable and to minimize conflicts with archery hunters, who usually hunt most in late October and early November.

MDC will offer a CWD portion of firearms deer season November 22-26 in CWD Management Zone counties during the 2023-2024 deer season.

According to MDC, hunters will be able to use any unfilled firearms deer hunting permits during the CWD portion and must abide by the statewide limit of one antlered deer during the firearms deer season, all portions combined. Hunters must also abide by county-specific firearms antlerless permit numbers.

"Because higher deer densities can increase the rate of CWD spread, additional deer harvest in the CWD Management Zone is needed to prevent further increases in deer numbers and help minimize the spread of the disease," said Isabelle.

Isabelle noted that the CWD portion is timed to occur during the tail end of the primary rut, when deer movement is typically good and hunter interest remains high. CWD testing is not required during the CWD portion.

MDC has also increased the number of firearms antlerless permits hunters can fill in most counties, including allowing hunters to fill a firearms antlerless permit in Butler, Carter, Scott, and Wayne counties. Hunters in Bollinger County will be able to fill two firearms antlerless permits beginning this year. Qualifying landowners in Reynolds County may now receive two Resident Landowner Firearms Antlerless Deer Hunting Permits. MDC has also increased the number of firearms antlerless permits from two to four in 85 counties.

"The liberalization of antlerless harvest opportunities will help slow population growth and keep the deer population at desired levels," said Isabelle.

He also noted that the additional firearms antlerless permits will help hunters and landowners to meet their deer management goals in areas where more antlerless harvest is needed.

MDC has included 14 new counties as part of the CWD Management Zone this year: Bollinger, Caldwell, Carroll, Clay, Clinton, Dallas, Grundy, Jasper, Livingston, Madison, Montgomery, Pemiscot, Ray, and Schuyler.


As with all counties in the CWD Management Zone, grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable products used to attract deer are prohibited year-round. Hunters must also follow carcass transportation regulations. The antler-point restriction has also been removed from Caldwell, Carroll, Clinton, Grundy, Livingston, Montgomery, Ray, and Schuyler counties.

Hunters who harvest deer in select CWD Management Zone counties during Nov. 11-12 must take the deer (or its head) on the day of harvest to a mandatory CWD sampling



MDC and MTA clinic Oct. 7-8

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) and Missouri Trapper's Association (MTA) will hold a free two-day trapping seminar 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Oct. 7 and 6 a.m. to noon on Oct. 8 at the Robert E. Talbot Conservation Area in Lawrence County. A portion of the twoday course will be held indoors at MDC's shop building on the Talbot Area and part of the class will consist of hands-on practice outside.

People attending this workshop will have an opportunity to gain a fundamental knowledge of trapping. Topics covered at the seminar will include trap setting, the types of traps in use today, regulations, skinning, and complete fur handling. Cable-restraint certification will not be included in this class. The first day will start at the Talbot Area shop, which is located at 7031 Highway 96.
