Butler Hollow Project debate continues, open house scheduled

The comment period for the proposed Butler Hollow Project, which would affect a great deal of the Mark Twain National Forest in Cassville and the surrounding area, will now be extended because of increased interest on both sides of the issue, according to District Ranger Joe Koloski.

The initial 30-day comment period on the project ended on December 22 after a public notice was posted in the Springfield News Leader on November 22, 2014. However, the controversy stirred on both sides has led the rangers to open up for additional comments on the proposal from January 26 through February 6. There will also be an open house in Cassville on Tuesday, January 27, to allow the public to ask questions and become more involved in the process.

The Butler Hollow Project is a proposed course of action that will affect 18,181 acres of National Forest System lands on the Cassville Unit of the Mark Twain National Forest. The proposal has sparked both positive

and negative comments from the community to the Forest Service, local and national legislators and many letters to the editor in local publications.

According to the proposal by the Ava/Cassville/Willow Springs Ranger District (ACWSRD), the management of the lands, which will include vegetation management, prescribed burns and service roadway reconstruction and deconstruction, is vital to the forest health and will restore the lands to conditions similar to what the land was historically. If the proposal is approved, a prescribed burn would affect 17,517 acres and 10,842 acres would be converted to open woodland. Currently, most of the land is closed woodland. The primary difference between the two is the density of the overstory

Nay-sayers of the project are concerned about a myriad of issues, including chemicals used for the vegetation control, the number of trees and shrubs removed from the land impacting the overall beauty of the forest and area, and how actions

Cyber crimes Task Force faces loss of funding

The Southwest Missouri Cyber Crimes Task Force (SMCCTF), which is charged with apprehending and prosecuting those who prey on children over the Internet, may soon be shut down due to a lack of fund-

The SMCCTF is one of 12 Missouri regional task forces that investigates Internet sex crimes against children, and its jurisdiction encompasses the 14 counties located in the southwest corner of Missouri. Some of the people they recently investigated include Matthew Casas and Chase Norman, both of Cassville, and Tong Yang, of Stella.

Casas, 25, was charged in March with receiving and distributing child pornography, while Norman, 23, was indicted in November on a count of using a minor to produce child pornography and two counts of using the Internet and a cell phone to induce a minor to engage in illicit sexual activity. Both men remain in federal custody, await-

ing trial. Yang pled guilty in September to transporting a minor across state lines for illicit sex and was sentenced to 13 years in federal prison without parole.

Last June, the Missouri General Assembly voted to approve a \$1.5 million grant to fund all of the regional task forces, but according to Det. Chip Root, who heads the SMCCTF, Governor Jay Nixon has yet to release those funds. He said they normally receive \$200,000 a year in grant money.

The SMCCTF employs three full-time, grant-funded employees: Det. Brian Martin, from the Barry County Sheriff's Department, Det. James Smith, from the Cassville Police Department, and Det. Tim Williams, from the Jasper County Sheriff's Department. Root did not know how long the task force could keep operating without funding, but said if it the money was not released soon, Martin will be transferred back to the Barry

Ambulance sales tax to appear on April ballot

dents in the South Barry County Ambulance District (SBCAD), a proposed sales tax will be appearing on their April ballot.

The SBCAD held their monthly board meeting on Tuesday, January 13, to approve the ballot language of the proposed change and also go over informational materials to be distributed to the public about why the board feels the change is necessary. The board hopes voters will approve a rollback of the property tax levy and, instead, replace it with a district sales tax of 1/2-cent, a move they say is more fair since around one-third of the ambulance runs are for nonresidents that are travelling through, visiting family or vacationing.

"This is a more fair way to continue services to everyone without us having to cut back on equipment."

Currently, the SBCAD is funded through ambulance property taxes, however, the funds have never been sufficient with that system to fully fund the ambulance district, and due to an increased call volume over the last decade, the district is struggling to maintain and replace the equipment needed.

Tom Rees, Shell Knob region board member stated, "People regularly want to know why they pay taxes and still receive a bill for their ambulance, and they don't realize that their taxes only fund a fraction of the ambulance district. Even though the property tax levy

Shell Knob district board was approved in 1974 and a For Barry County resi- member Tom Rees stated, six-member board was established, a contract with another entity is needed to actually maintain an ambulance service, which is why people still receive a bill for ambulance services. As it stands currently, the SBCAD maintains the two ambulance barns, six ambulances and most of the equipment within with property tax levy funding. The SBCAD then contracts with an outside agency, presently Cox Health, to provide the 24-hour emergency personnel, stocking and maintaining the ambulances, fuel and utility costs of the two barns.

According to the SBCAD Board, the number of ambulance runs over the last decade has increased by on third, totalling around 3,000

County preps to finalize 2015 budget

The County Office holders in Barry County submitted their department proposals for the 2015 budget which will be finalized on January 22. In 2014, the difference between the proposed and actual budget was comparable. However, the proposed budget for 2015 would have the county spending around \$345,000 more than what was spent last year.

County Clerk Gary Youngblood stated, "The proposal is just what the offices asked for, so there will still be some adjustments before it is all final-

In 2014, the county commissioners approved \$3,508,718 for all of the departments. The actual budget for 2014 came out to \$3,434,417,

The primary offices requesting an increase in funding are the County Commission, the Sheriff's Department, the Jail and the Prosecuting Attorney's office. According to Youngblood, the approximately \$27K increase in the Commissioners budget is mostly due to four new Sheriff's Deputy cars being purchased by the commission. He also mentioned that the commission will be addressing repairs to the sound system at the Judicial Center in the 2015 budget.

The difference between the Sheriff's actual budget in 2014 and the proposed budget for 2015 is around \$30,000, but Youngblood stated that the bump was mostly due to an

anticipated grant that no longer appears to be available, so he said he doesn't expect to see that increase approved.

The \$20K bump for the jail is primarily groceries for the inmates' food costs. Over the last couple years, rising grocery costs have dramatically impacted the budget for the

Finally, the Prosecuting Attorney's office is asking for a \$44K increase, this is from the Prosecuting Attorney's salary increase which is set by the State, and the full-time Assistant. The Assistant Prosecutor was not employed the full year in 2014, which led to a discrepancy, along with a small increase in the normal operation of the Prosecutors office.

Seligman council approves

new equipment, shotguns

At Monday's Seligman City Council meeting, the aldermen voted to purchase new equipment from HD Supply that will help the city's water/ sewer employees locate water pipes and water leaks underground. The equipment purchased includes a nonmetallic pipe locater, a leak detector, a metal-pipe detector and a wire-trace locater. Altogether, the equipment will cost

The council also voted to purchase two new Mossberg 50577 shotguns for the Seligman Police Department.

While delivering his departmental report, Police Chief Terry Burgess explained to the council that when he and the other officers used the department's current shotguns at a practice range, they jammed repeatedly. He asked the council to purchase the Mossberg shotguns to replace them.

Burgess's request was tabled until the council heard new business. At that part of the meeting, they voted to purchase the new shotguns from Eggleston Pawn for \$644. The department's current shotguns will be auctioned off to defray

Cassville native appointed to judgeship

Laura Johnson, who grew up in Cassville, became the first woman to be sworn in as a circuit court judge in dual counties on December 31. She will be finishing up the term left vacant by the sudden death of Judge Mark Orr on June 1,

Johnson was sworn into office by Barry County Presiding Judge J. Edward Sweeney on December 31 after being elected to the position during the November 4 General Election last year.

Johnson was elected as the Republican candidate. She ran unopposed for the seat as 38th district circuit court judge that serves Taney and Christian counties.

Johnson attended Oxford University in Oxford, England, and received her bachelor's degree from the University of Missouri. She attended law school at Southern Methodist University in the top 10 of her class. Johnson's father, Joe Ellis was also an attorney in Cassville with his father, Royle Ellis, who practiced until his death in 1983.

Johnson has practiced as an attorney in Springfield with Ellis, Ellis, Hammons and Johnson, P.C. for many years before taking the judgeship position. Laura and her husband, Todd, have lived in Christian County for 25 years.

Woman arrested after 6-yearold found in freezing temps

Rebecca Chaddock, 36, Cassville, was arrested last week when a six year old she was watching was found running down the street without shoes in freezing weather conditions.

According to the affidavit of probable cause, the six year old was found running down the street in the freezing rain and sleet unattended in shorts and a t-shirt and without socks, shoes or a coat.

When officers found her, she was also bleeding from her

Upon investigation, the Cassville Police Department found that Chaddock had held the girl down and slapped her. She also shoved her down multiple times. After the child fell face-first on the concrete, the girl ran away from Chaddock, which is when someone noticed her and called the authorities.

Once the girl ran, Chaddock never tried to find her or continue caring for her. Instead, she called the girl's mother and told her that the child had left.

According to court records, Chaddock has had multiple other convictions in Barry County, including passing bad checks, forgery and child molestation. She is currently being held in the Barry County jail on a \$25,000 bond for class C felony endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree and class C felony child abuse.





Martin is in charge of processing all cyber tips received by the SMCCTF from the Center for Missing and Exploited Children, including determining if the reported crimes fall in their jurisdiction. Last year he processed about 80 cases. He also does undercover work on the Internet, investigating enticement, child pornography and child prostitution.

If the grant money is not released, Martin expects his transfer to take place no later than Jan. 31, which he said this would be a devastating blow to the SMCCTF's efforts. "We were already horribly understaffed with only three guys doing the investigating," he said. "There is no way only two guys can keep up with investigating the most horrendous crimes."

Cassville Police Chief Dana Kammerlohr agreed. "The SMCCTF works as a team, and they have many hours of specialized training," she said. "To lose one

investigator will affect the productivity of the task force and their ability to track down the predators."

CRIMES from FRONT

Barry County Sheriff Mick Epperly believes that if the SMCCTF is forced to shut down, catching Internet predators will become extremely difficult for local law enforcement. "The task force has all of the tools to work with this," he said. "The Sheriff's office would have to spend thousands and thousands of dollars we don't have to catch these predators."

Kammerlohr also believes losing the SMCCTF will burden on the City Police. Det. Smith will be able to continue with the SMCCTF because that is included in the department's budget. However, when the grant money is distributed, the department is supposed to be reimbursed for Smith's salary. "We have always budgeted this position in case something like this happened," Kammerlohr said, "but it will be a hardship." She added, "I hope Governor Nixon will reconsider and release the money so we don't lose the investigators who may be the ones who protect our children or grandchildren from one of these predators."

Missouri State Rep. Scott Fitzpatrick said he has attempted to contact Gov. Nixon, urging him to release the funds, but has heard no reply. "I have written to governor Nixon, recommending strongly that he release the funds he is currently restricting for the Cyber Crimes Task Force," Fitzpatrick said. "Unfortunately, I have received no response to my letter. The task force serves a very important purpose, and I will continue to urge the governor to release the funds that the legislature appropriated."

calls a year. Most of the cause for the increase is changing medical care and also an aging population. The operating budget for the district is around \$217,715 from property tax revenue. If the 1/2-cent sales tax passes, the district is anticipating an increase to around \$490,316 annually to replace and maintain their ambulances and equipment.

Ken Cieslinski, SBCAD chairman, stated, "A lot of this comes down to demographics because there isn't a trauma center across the street. We need a lot of lifesaving equipment on the ambulance because of the distance from those trauma centers." For example, the four cardio monitors used by the district need to be replaced at \$35,000 each. Travel time to reach a major trauma center is always a concern when stocking ambulances in more rural areas.

The sales tax proposal will appear on April 7, 2015, and all residents residing within the ambulance district will have the opportunity to vote on the issue. The 1/2-cent sales tax would only apply to businesses within that district, which includes much of Barry County except for Purdy and Monett. Cassville, Jenkins, Wheaton, Exeter, Seligman, Washburn, Shell Knob, Eagle Rock and Golden are all part of the southern district that will either approve or shoot down the tax. If approved, property taxes would be reduced by the levy rollback for both individuals and businesses. In a statement released by the board, they said that the sales tax would be more fair for residents so that everyone who uses the service helps pay for it.

the cost of the new shotguns.

During the meeting, City Clerk Brian Nichols told the council that Well #2, which has not been in operation for over two years, either would have to be tested for contamination or plugged permanently with concrete, due to state regulations. He said the cost of plugging the well could run from \$10,000 to \$18,000, while testing the well could run from \$10,000 to \$12,000. He mentioned grants would be available through the Department of Natural Resources to assist in plugging the well. The council took no action on the well.

In other business, Michael Avers was appointed by the council to fill the vacant West Alderman position. He replaces Shirley Beaver, who passed away last year, and will hold the position until the end of the term on April 13, 2015. They also voted to table a vote on installing the new splash pad in the city park until speaking to the contractor at their next meeting on Feb. 9 and to review bids for mowing of the city grounds until March 9.

Lorene Meadows, Marionville, died on November 21, 2014, at the age of 99. Like many who lived to such an age, she saw many important historical milestones during her lifetime. However, she herself was also a person of historical significance, as she was the last person in Missouri whose father had been a Civil War veteran.

Lorene Meadows was born Lorene Elizabeth Miller on February 3, 1915, in Aurora. Her father, James Alexander Miller, enlisted in the Union Army at the age of 17. He was captured by Confederate forces and taken to Andersonville, a prison that was infamous for its brutal conditions. He was determined to survive, however, and his perseverance paid off nine months later when he was paroled.

James was married to his first wife, Elmira Angeline Shearer, from 1866 until her death in 1911. He lived as a widower until 1913, when he married Agnes P. Ward, Lorene's mother. At the time he was 67 and she was 35. Their marriage lasted until James died in 1920.

Lorene grew up in Aurora and was an avid reader. Her love of reading served her well as she later gradu-



ated valedictorian of her 8th grade class, for which she received a \$5 gold piece.

She also went to high school in Aurora, and it was there she met Lester Meadows, her future husband. They married secretly on Dec. 10, 1932, not telling their parents until after Lorene graduated from high school. Lester and Lorene had six children: Joyce Anne, Shirley, Roger, Mark, Denis and John.

In 1934, they moved to a shack in Shell Knob. Eventually, they moved onto a farm near Jenkins.

At Lorene's funeral, her son Mark read her obituary in which he said the family had a battery-powered radio but Lorene was really the children's source of entertainment. She would play

the piano and sing, and read books to them in the evenings.

Throughout her life, Lorene never lost her love of reading, and wasn't picky about what sort of books she read either. "She read fiction, biographies, westerns, mysteries; any genre you could think of," Mark said. "She'd just gobble up books," he

After Lester passed away in 1990, Lorene continued to live on their farm while renting out the land until she moved to Methodist Manor in 2006. When she passed away, Lorene was buried next to Lester at the Maple Park Cemetery in Aurora.

She was loved by the people who took care of her. Mark said, toward the end of Lorene's life, she had infirmities that made taking care of her a challenge. "It might have been a relief to get rid of her, but when Denis called the Manor to tell them mama had died, the caregiver burst into tears at her loss. I think it says a lot for mama that she instilled affection even in those whose lives she made a little harder."

After 12 years as the Barry County Prosecuting Attorney, Johnnie Cox bid farewell to his office staff and began his new position as the Associate Circuit Division I Judge. During a brunch on December 30, Cox said his goodbyes to his office staff in the Prosecuting Attorney's office and looked forward to taking on his new venture as judge.

When asked what he will miss leaving the position behind, he said, "I miss the people that I worked with

on a daily basis, the Prosecutor's staff, law enforcement, probation and parole, and all of the other agencies. I'll also miss the satisfaction that comes from a successful prosecution of a case and the sense of closure and justice for the victims of crime."

Cox has tried many cases over his 12 years, some of the most memorable being his first trials and murder trials. He said, "The first murder trial that my office tried was the State v. Dennis Bisher, and it was probably the most satisfying just because it was my first, and we got a murder in the first degree conviction."

Cox also prosecuted Christopher Collings in the rape and murder of Rowan Ford. Cox said that the Collings trial was a four and a half year process and a month-long trial. Cox said, "The attorneys on the other side did everything

possible to wear the victims, witnesses and my office down. They made every effort to increase the costs of the trial for the taxpayers of the county and state. But, if the murder and rape of a 9-year-old child doesn't deserve the death penalty, why even have it as a punishment? In the end, it only

Cox said, "When I came into office in 2003, I already had a great staff to work with, and, over the years, even after some people coming and going, the staff continued to provide Barry County with top notch service. I really don't believe that the citizens always understand the stressful and sometimes chaotic work that happens at the Prosecutor's office, yet they have always come through."

Looking forward, Cox is ready for the challenges that being a judge will bring. He said, "I am looking forward to working in different areas of the law and having a greater hand in the management of the justice system in Barry County. It will be a completely different experience than being the Prosecuting Attorney, but in both circumstances, you are still a public servant and must do your best to see that the best possible service is provided to the citizens."



If you were an affected worker laid off from Luck-E-Strike on or after December 9, 2013 (Impact Date) and before December 31, 2016 (Expiration Date), you may be entitled to weekly Trade Readjustment Allowances (TRA), Alternative Trade Adjustment Assistance (ATAA), or Trade Adjustment Assistance in the form of training, job search allowances, and/or relocation allowances. To be eligible for TRA weekly benefits, an eligible worker must be enrolled in training by the end of the 8th week after the petition is certified (December 31, 2014 Certification Date) or by the end of the 16th week following the most recent qualifying separation (lay-off) from Luck-E-Strike, whichever is later. For TRA, ATAA, and/or TAA, a Trade Act claim must be filed with a Missouri Division of Employment Security (DES) Regional Claims Center. 



 Kenyon Ray Jordon, 61, Seligman, pled guilty to distribution of a controlled substance. He was given a suspended execution of a five year sentence and supervised probation

On August 27, 2014, Jordon was in possession of eight marijuana plants growing on his front lawn on Fair Field Lane in Seligman. The plants ranged from seven to nine feet tall. Inside the home, there were also glass pipes that field-tested positive for methamphetamine.

Jordon is to serve probation until December 15, 2109.

credit in 2013. Her probation has since been revoked and she is to serve 120 days shock

incarceration. In December 2012, Tuell and another person took several pieces of farm equipment and sold them to Rebel Recycling, including a square bailer, lawn tractor and other items stolen from a property south of Missouri State Highway HH.

Again in April 2013, Tuell was found to have sold items for scrap that had been stolen from a storage garage on East Bond in Monett.

Finally, in November 2013, Tuell stole a credit card from someone she had been staying with and used it without their permission.

Tuell is to be incarcerated until April 14, 2015.

• Jared Wayne Vaughan, 21, Aurora, pled guilty to theft/stealing of \$500 to \$25,000 in July 2014. His probation has since been revoked. He is to serve seven years incarceration with the DOC.

On January 19, 2013, Vaughan cut the copper wiring off of eleven telephone poles, totalling around \$500 worth in loss and damage.


