SWEPCO line scrapped, STO seeks damages

After a nearly two year battle, Arkansas-based Southwest Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) recently withdrew a pending application to build a new power line in Arkansas and southern Missouri. Multiple routes were evaluated, including one that would have crossed into Missouri and breached Barry and McDonald Counties, concerning area residents due to the potential damage to the land and loss of property values with a major electric line running across their prop-

SWEPCO initially asked for approval for the \$116 million power electric line in April 2013 after the Southwest Power Pool (SPP) did a study indicating the need for it based on electric trends. The SPP is the Regional Transmission Organization responsible for ensuring reliable supplies of power in parts of eight states, including Arkansas. While the line would not have provided any electricity to Missouri, one of the routes proposed constructing part of the towers in Missouri to avoid more extensive construction issues in more urban areas in Ar-

However, on December

29, the SPP notified SWEPCO that their updated forecasts indicated that the demands for power were significantly lower than originally estimated, and there was no need for the new line. As a result of the SPP's findings, SWEPCO withdrew their application from the Arkansas Public Service Commission (APSC) to continue with the project.

In a statement released by SWEPCO, president and chief operating officer Venita McCellon-Allen said, "As a transmission owning member of SPP, SWEPCO's role is to obtain regulatory approval and to construct electric transmission facilities as directed by SPP. SPP determines the need for projects based on studies containing future load growth and other transmission system usage projections. Based on SPP's new findings, we are notifying landowners, community leaders and elected officials that we have withdrawn our application to the ASPC for authority to construct the Shipe Road to Kings River transmission project."

While this appeared to be a victory for Ozarks residents who did not want their property traversed by a 345 kV transmission line, the new issue at hand is the tens of thousands of dollars of attorneys' fees that have been provided to fight the electric company's request and protect the land.

People in both Missouri and Arkansas were up in arms when they received letters from SWEPCO citing their intentions of building the line that would have meant 150foot towers every 800 feet, with clearing a 150-foot area of right-of-way. People were immediately worried that the project would destroy the natural beauty of the landscape and negatively impact property values. As citizens networked and learned more about the proposal, Save the Ozarks (STO) was formed, a non-profit organization comprised of volunteers working to stop the project.

In an initial press release, SWEPCO estimated that the APSC would finalize the project withdrawal by the end of January. However, STO filed a petition with the APSC asking them to deny the request for withdrawal on January 12. STO requested that SWEP-CO's application by denied instead of withdrawn.

In the petition filed by STO, it states, "After the expenditure of many tens of

Miller faces kidnapping victim in hearing

A Washburn kidnapping victim faced her alleged attacker in court last week when Mathew Miller, one of the Eagle Rock brothers accused of the crime, had a hearing in the McDonald County court system. Mathew, his brother, Michael, and Michael's girlfriend, Amanda Rhodes, all face charges for the crime in both Barry and McDonald Counties.

Mathew's McDonald County hearing last week led the court to determine that there was probable cause for a trial on the case. Victim Pamela Walker testified at the hearing, recounting the details of the event where the brothers abducted her, put her in the trunk of her car, and eventually dumped her and rolled her down a hill.

According to the affidavits of probable cause, the Miller brothers and Rhodes all played a hand in the kidnapping that spanned both counties. Walker was abducted from her home in McDonald County where the men demanded to know where her drugs were and what the PIN number to her bank account was. Later, she was shut in the trunk of her

car, which the brothers stole and then drove to Cassville.

The Millers were identified by the security footage at the 1st State Bank in Cassville where they withdrew \$351.50 from Walker's bank account. After visiting the ATM, the brothers allegedly drove the victim's car to an area in rural Eagle Rock where they took her out of the trunk, hit her, punched her, and then rolled her down a hill. The victim walked until she found a residence and could call 911, according to the probable

The brothers dumped Walker's car, a 2011 Chevy Malibu, which was later found partially submerged in an arm of Roaring River

to live." The first year's winners were selected as Justin Gates, Stacy Runnels, Caleb Buntin and Mindi Artherton. The 900 block of Main Street, owned by Bob and Carolyn Bishop, replaced the metal siding of the building with brick and also remodeled the inside to make room for two new businesses. Finally, Crose Cafe, owned by Stu and Lavita Crow, moved from Washburn to Cassville, where the pair remodeled their current location, adding a parking lot and closed in a large deck area for more

Finally, Mills presented the year's Cassville Community Service Award to retired Judge Victor Head. Head's accomplishments in the community, particularly his involvement in the Barry County Drug Court program, were emphasized. Head helped start the program in 2008 as a means for alcohol and drug offenders to get clean and motivate change in their lives. Mills said, "Since the inception of the program in 2008, there have been 56 graduates, and one of the most inspiring things, is that 17 drug-free babies have been born to parents in the program."

Head served as an Associate Circuit Judge in Barry County for eight years, but worked in the public defenders position in Monett for 17 years before that. When Head received his award, he was surprised by his family, who came from all over the state, to celebrate with him as he was honored.

New Chamber President Michelle Redeson stated, "I think our celebrate Cassville event was enjoyed by all. The trivia competition was a lot of fun to watch. I was honored so many people agreed to help with this event. Cassville is a great place to live and has some amazingly talented people involved in its success."


The evening was wonderful reminder to the community how the people of Cassville work together to make the community a warm, welcoming place for residents and visitors alike.

in Eagle Rock. Rhodes then picked the brothers up in her van and drove them to Berryville, Ark., where they used the debit card again and withdrew more money from the victim's account, according to the investigation.

Michael and Rhodes were both arrested near Pittsburgh, Penn., and held in the Allegheny County Jail in Pennsylvania, and Mathew was arrested locally. According to information added to the probable cause, Michael's cell mate in Pennsylvania corroborated much of the story about the kidnapping and also told authorities that Michael was attempting to alter his tattoo that was used to identify him in the ATM security footage.

Another brother, Marc Miller, was also charged in connection with the crime in February, as was Mathew's girlfriend, Shelby Keeler. However, the kidnapping and tampering with a motor vehicle charges against them were dismissed on March 10. Initially, investigators believed the Marc and Keeler played a hand in transporting Michael and Mathew before and after the kidnapping.

Now that Mathew's case will go to trial, he has entered a plea of not guilty and has a pretrial conference scheduled in McDonald County for March 3. Michael waived his preliminary hearing in McDonald County, also entered a plea of not guilty, and has a pretrial conference scheduled for March 3 in McDonald County. Rhodes's pretrial conference in Mc-Donald County is scheduled



for February 18.

In Barry County, Michael has no hearings scheduled, but Mathew has a motion hearing under Judge Blankenship set for March 2. Rhodes has a disposition hearing set for February 17.

Each of the Miller brothers and Rhodes currently face kidnapping, burglary, and tampering with a motor vehicle in McDonald County and felonious restraint, tampering in the first degree, and assault in the second degree in Barry County.

thousands of dollars, months of attorney time, months of efforts by Intervenor STO's members and other Intervenors, public hearings, a lengthy trial, substantial briefing on multiple issues, and significant efforts and time commitments by the Commission, its presiding officer, and agency staff, all directed towards a just determination of the controversy in the above captioned docket, initiated by SWEPCO, SWEPCO should not be allowed to simply file its "never mind" Notice to close the matter."


The main reason STO hopes to have the filing denied is so that SWEPCO is legally responsible for the attorney fees and litigation costs associated with trying to stop the project. STO also asked the Commission to name them as the prevailing parties so that they could seek an award for their attorneys' fees. SWPECO filed their response to STO's petition on January 20, solidifying their position to have their application withdrawn instead of denied.


At this point, it isn't clear how long it will take for the APSC to make a ruling in the matter and as to whether STO will be able to recoup their attorneys' fees in fighting the electric company. However, much to the relief of area residents, the electric line that could have caused a significant loss in property values and impact the natural beauty of the Ozarks, is no longer in the cards.

Ozarks Festival Orchestra slates concert for Feb. 15

The Ozark Festival Orchestra continues its 35th season with its annual Pops in the Park and pie and ice cream fundraiser on Sunday, Feb. 15, at the Monett City Park Casino. The concert will feature orchestral showpieces from some of the most popular films in recent years.

Director Todd Borgmann has chosen suites from the Disney film "Frozen," "The Lord of the Rings: Return of the King," "The Chronicles of Narnia: The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe," and "The Complete Harry Potter." 





Monday's games will begin at 6 p.m. at the CHS gymnasium.









Five Cassville teachers announce their retirement after the school year

At the start of the next school year, five faces familiar to Cassville Schools will no longer be seen in the classrooms. Teachers Sherri Brooks, Wendy Miekley, Kaye Hughes, Janet Kice, and Alene Campbell are retiring from education after the school year ends this May.



Sherri Brooks

Retiring teacher Sherri Brooks has spent almost 30 years teaching in Cassville R-IV. During her career, she has had a variety of experiences, including teaching second grade, sixth grade math and science, and seventh grade math.

Brooks likens teaching styles to a pendulum. "The teaching style we use will go away for awhile, and we will change how we do it," she said. "Then, it will come back with a different name and a few changes, but will basically be the same thing."

Asked about her retirement, Brooks said she plans to keep busy. "There are so many things that I would like to do, I don't really know where I will start," she said. "Whatever it is, I want it to be as enjoyable as teaching has

For those who are considering becoming teachers, Brooks suggested they get their feet wet by becoming substitute teachers. "Try to get into as many classrooms as you can," she said. "Number one, you will see if you think that is really what you want to do. The second thing is, you will see which age group appeals to you and maybe even a particular subject that you would like to teach."

Brooks also said even those who become teachers should never forget that they are also students. "Once you start teaching, don't be afraid I also hope to do more with grandsons as they grow. I an

to ask for advice from the veterans. They have been there, and they have a wealth of knowledge that can help you a lot. Be a life-long learner. We can learn new things everyday. That is what keeps it fresh and new."



Wendy Miekley

Cassville teacher Wendy Miekley will retire after a career that has spanned nearly 30 years, 22 of those at Cassville. Before coming to Cassville, Miekley was already a veteran educator. She taught at Lebanon High School and Purdy Elementary for the first seven years of her career. When she came to Cassville, Miekley taught third grade for 12 years, followed by 10 years of teaching fifth grade.

Miekley, who graduated from Cassville High School, said her path as an educator began during her senior year of high school when she helped in a fifth grade classroom. "I loved seeing a child grasp a new concept or get excited about learning something new, and that is still with me," she said. "I've enjoyed witnessing it in my classroom in first graders though high school seniors."

Though much changed in teaching over the last 30 years, a guiding principle in Miekley's educational philosophy has remained constant. "I still believe that every individual excels at some subjects and must learn to persevere at those that don't come so easily," she said.

Miekley plans a very active retirement. She has been working on a list of "100 Fun Things to Do upon Retirement," though she said she has only come up with 21 so far, including learning how to play the banjo and starting a small business. "I hear I'll be raking hay," she said, "and I hope we'll be going camping.

For those who are planning to go into teaching, Miekley recommends it only for those who are truly dedicated to helping children learn. "Be strong, be energetic and enthusiastic," she said. "Examine why you think you want to pursue teaching as a career, and be sure that will sustain you when working long hours for lower pay than what your peers will receive in their careers. You must be passionate about teaching and excited about seeing learning happening."



Kaye Hughes

Kaye Hughes is retiring after a total of 25 years as an educator. She began her career at Wheaton Elementary and later came to Cassville where she taught sixth grade communication arts, social studies and science for 13 years. For the last five years, she has taught seventh grade communication arts.

According to Hughes, the greatest change she has seen in education has been her own approach to the way she grades her students. "Many of us only experienced traditional grading as students and continue to use traditional grading in our classrooms," she said. "I believe grading should be based on what students know and can show you they know for each skill that is needed to be successful at that grade level for that content."

Though Hughes is retiring, she plans to continue to serve in the community, though she has not yet decided in what way yet. "I feel I am being led to make this change," she said, "whether that is continuing to teach in some capacity, volunteering in my church more, or just being there for my five excited for this new adven-

Hughes's advice to those who plan to become teachers is to make sure it is their calling and to be life-long learners. "There will be hard days, and there will be great days," she said. "Make sure you love what you are doing. Do not become stagnate and unwilling to always learn. Keep on learning with your students and find ways to make yourself the best at whatever profession you choose."



Janet Kice

After 15 years at Cassville R-IV, Janet Kice is preparing to retire. She has spent numerous years teaching fifth and sixth grades.

Kice actually began her teaching career in 1980 in Wichita, Kan. Later, she taught fifth grade and seventh grade math in Paola, Kan. for 15 years. After their sons were raised, she and her husband decided to move into the area to continue their

During her many years in education, Kice has seen many changes in the field. "When my career started," she said, "teachers couldn't envision how technology and high stakes testing would drive student learning."

Kice and her husband are retiring together, and they are looking forward to taking it easy. "We will definitely sleep a bit later in the mornings," she said. "There will be a much longer boating and

fishing season for us on Table Rock Lake, and we will travel to Kansas City and Big Bend National Park in southwest Texas to visit our children on a regular basis. Finally, we're looking forward to lots of traveling, especially to warm beaches during the winter months."

instructional technology coach for two years.

Campbell said her views on teaching have changed greatly. "When I first started in education, my view was the teacher was more of a lecturer with students completing paper and pencil-type activities. These paper and pencil activities were what would show student learning. Now, my view is there are multiple ways for students to demonstrate their learning."

Despite the changes, Campbell said one factor in student learning remains constant. "All students have needs that need to be met in order for them to be able to learn," she said.


Campbell would like to travel and see her grandchildren after she retires but also wants to continue learning. "I want to take up new hobbies,"

Bingham's charges stemmed from a traffic stop in September 2013. The Missouri State Highway Patrol stopped Bingham for speeding and noticed that she was intoxicated. She admitted to not having a driver's license, and the trooper also noticed that she had a baggie of marijuana in her wallet. She told him she was planning to deliver the bag to a friend. Bingham's license was suspended for multiple alcohol-related of-

Bingham is to serve probation until January 21,

• Jessica E. Carlisle, 21, Cassville, pled guilty to theft/stealing of property between \$500 and \$25,000 in 2011. Her probation has since been revoked, and she is to serve a five-year incarceration sentence.

Carlisle was originally arrested after she and another person were caught stealing from the Walmart in Monett. Items were stolen on multiple occasions by filling shopping carts and pushing them out of the store without paying for any of the items.

• Tara Nicole Carroll, 23, Reeds Spring, pled guilty to theft/stealing from \$500 to \$25,000. She was sentenced to long-term drug treatment and four years incarceration.

Carroll was arrested in May 2014 when she was caught stealing from the Cassville Walmart. Carroll and a man she was with took a Dell computer, worth \$998, out of the store without paying for it.
