Community bids farewell to former Fire Chief Ron Rickard eye-catching, with more eye-catching, with more

When a valued member of the community dies, you expect to see an outpouring of support to remember them, but sometimes that goes above and beyond what anyone would expect. This was precisely the case with long-time Central Crossing Fire Chief Ron Rickard's funeral on Monday.

As fellow firefighters, family and friends gathered to remember a man who gave so much of himself, the funeral procession was eye-catching, with more than 15 fire trucks and water tankers paying homage to the chief of 29 years who passed awat at 78.

Rickard was a wellknown and loved member of the community. Rickard and his wife, Pat, moved to Shell Knob in 1971, and in 1972, he joined the Central Crossing Fire Department. After serving as Fire Chief for 29 years, he passed the torch on to his grandson, current chief Rusty Rickard. Ron was also instrumental in helping to form the 911 center and kept working with the department until his death.

The number of people who attended the service actually overwhelmed the church with an additional wing having to be opened to accommodate the number of people who Ron affected during his life, including a large number of firefighters, EMTs and law enforcement officers.

Rusty said, "He put a non-paying volunteer posi-

tion before anything else, whether that meant closing his business or sending people away from the shop to go cover a fire call, he would do it. It didn't take long for people to see that."

He continued, "Ultimately, it was him that got me hooked with the department." Rusty began with Central Crossing 15 years ago and was promoted to chief in 2005.

The mass of people who turned out on Monday to honor Ron included members of the local fire departments, the honor guard and members of the Missouri Fire Service Funeral Assistance Team. Ron's granddaughter Toni Fields, said, "The Missouri Firemen's Service team had their honor guard out of Stone County come and do the whole service and even stood guard over his casket. They loaded him on the fire truck and six of them rode up on top of the truck with him in the cold rain when it was 37 degrees. It was amazing to see that dedication to our Papa."

The team is dedicated to honor fallen firefighters with dignity and reverence and provide support for their families. Part of that service includes standing guard over the casket of their fallen comrade to honor them.

Fields added, "He was loved by so many. I think it was that he was down to earth, and he was a truthful man. What you saw was what you got with him. He was knowledgable because of the work he did and what he learned from others."

That desire to listen and learn is what drew many to Ron over the years and helped the community in so many ways. Fields said, "He always said through his stories to take the time to listen and learn from others. When everyone told stories at the service, it was what they had learned from him. He really took the time for others and you could see that yesterday with the number and variety of people who came."

So when the church and processional was filled with firefighters and others who had been touched by Ron's

Anglers lined the banks of Roaring River to catch their limit on the first day of catch-and-keep trout season on Sunday.

Sunday morning proved to be a great day for fishing for those that braved the unfortunate winter storm that blew in Saturday. Even with the heavy snowfall, which only added to the beauty of the park, the trout were hungry and, before the rounds were emptied from the gun shot by Tim Homesley to signal the beginning of Opening Day, people were pulling fish out of the water left and right.

Initially, Roaring River anticipated 2,600 to 2,700 anglers to beckon in the beginning of trout season,

an honorable holiday for locals. However, by the end of the day, only 1,185 tags were sold at the park, less than half of the planned for turnout. There were 189 youth tags and 996 adult tags for the day. Hatchery staff stocked the waters with 8,000 rainbow trout in the week leading up to Opening Day, and those that showed their dedication to the sport walked away with a good haul.

This marks the second year in a row that the Opening Day crowd was tempered by winter storms. Last year, tag sales were 1,974 on a Saturday which was low for a weekend. They anticipated 2,600 fishermen last year, as well. The last time Opening Day fell on a Sunday was 2008 and tag sales were 2,147.

This year, Roaring River was supposed to have special visitors to the park with a filming crew for the Outdoor Channel show Stihl Reel in the Outdoors with Joe Thomas planning to film at the park on Opening Day, as well as going fishing on Table Rock Lake. However, the film crew was un-

Counterfeit \$50 bill found at Cassville business

The Cassville Police Department is warning area businesses that a counterfeit \$50 bill was found last week. According to Chief Dana Kammerlohr, the bill was received at Casey's in Cassville and was discovered to be counterfeit by their bank.

Kammerlohr said, "We felt that the businesses need to be aware of it since it was a larger bill. They need to be aware of what a counterfeit bill looks like since they've changed recently." Kammerlohr said that only one counterfeit bill has been found but that businesses should take the time to study the new bills to make finding any fakes more likely.

New bills contain a se-

curity thread, color shifting ink and a watermark. The security thread in the bill is visible when it is held up to the light. The color shifting ink that is used to print the denomination of the bill, such as 50, changes from copper to green when the bill is moved up or down. There is also a faint watermark that can be seen when held up to the light, as well. Kammerlohr

"We've only found one. We don't see a lot in Cassville, but a couple years ago there were some 10's and 20's."

wisdom and genuine caring for others, it shouldn't have been a surprise. Rusty said, "He wanted to do anything he could to help the other agencies, whether they were big or small. A lot of people came to him for wisdom and knowledge because he'd been through it all."

Before Ron was laid to rest at the cemetery, all of the beepers went off and it was the signal of Ron's last call. Fields said, "They rang the bell three times three to show that it was his last time out. It was such a service to our family that they provided, such a level of respect."

As his fellow firefighters bid him farewell in style, they offered the sentiment, "We'll take it from here, brother."

Charges in child abuse case dropped

Child abuse and neglect charges against a Cassville woman were dismissed in court last week alleging that a child was found outside in cold temperatures and without shoes in January.

Rebecca Lynn Chaddock, 36, of Cassville, was initially charged with the crime on January 1. According to Chaddock, "The whole thing was a bold-faced lie."

The child, who Chaddock identified as her six-year-old niece, was found by law enforcement officers on January 1, around 3:30 p.m. near 201 Partridge Drive in Cassville. In a probable cause statement filed with the Barry County Courts, Officer Colt Beck with the Cassville Police Department said that the girl was found in a t-shirt and shorts with no shoes, socks or coat in sleet and rain. He also noted that she was bleeding from her nose from being shoved on the concrete.

In an interview, Chaddock said, "I didn't deal with the child. The child was my niece." When asked if she was supposed to be caring for the child, she said, "I was present in the house, but I wasn't taking care of her." Chaddock declined to say who was watching the child at the time of the incident.

She said, "She was upset that she couldn't go to Walmart with her mom."

When asked why officers found her outside, Chaddock explained, "She was outside for just a few minutes and a nosy neighbor decided to

Chaddock claims that the entire situation was blown out of proportion. She said, "Because I've been in trouble with the law, then the county thinks, "Tag, you're it." When asked to clarify, Chaddock said, "The county law enforcement thinks once you're in trouble, you're always trouble." Chaddock admitted to having previous convictions, but said that she is turning her life around and moved back to the area to make a difference.

She said, "I was a housemother at the house in Exeter trying to make a difference in this county." The home Chaddock was referring to was group home in Exeter for women struggling with drug addiction in Barry County. The facility has since closed.

Chaddock said, "I want people to realize that I'm not a horrible person at all."

When asked for comment, Barry County Prosecuting Attorney Amy Boxx stated, "We chose not to pursue those charges. It was scheduled for a preliminary hearing, but we found that we didn't have sufficient evidence to proceed with the case." Charges were officially dropped against Chaddock on Wednesday, February 25.







Cassville PD on the look out for drunk drivers

Local police will be out in full force as part of the annual nationwide St. Patrick's Day Holiday "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" crackdown on drunk driving. The crackdown, which will include high-visibility enforcement throughout Cassville, will run from Saturday, March 14, through Tuesday, March 17.

The effective nationwide drunk driving crackdown will include high-visibility enforcement and will be supported by national paid advertising, creating a comprehensive campaign to curb drunk driving over the St. Patrick's Day Holiday.

The Cassville Police Department said its officers will be aggressively looking for drunk drivers during the crackdown and will arrest anyone caught driving drunk.

Although it is illegal in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico to drive drunk, having a blood alcohol content of .08 percent or higher, far too many people across the nation get behind the wheel after consuming too much alcohol. The latest statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration underscore the serious nature of the nation's continuing drunk driving

epidemic.

"Every year, about one third of all motor vehicle traffic deaths involve one or more impaired drivers or motorcycle operators," said Chief of Police Dana Kammerlohr. "In 2013, 218 people were killed and 666 seriously injured on Missouri's roadways in accidents that involved at least one substance-impaired driver."

Kammerlohr added the St. Patrick's Day Holiday is particularly dangerous. During the St. Patrick's Day holiday in 2014, 247 DWI arrests were made statewide.

"Research has shown that high-visibility enforcement, like the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign, reduces drunk driving fatalities by as much as 20 percent. By joining this nationwide effort, we will make Cassville's roadways safer for everyone throughout the holiday," said Chief Kammerlohr.

"We want to remind everyone that getting behind the wheel drunk is a terrible idea. Unfortunately, not only does drinking impair your ability to operate a vehicle safely, it also impairs your judgment and good sense about whether you can, or should drive. If you have any doubt about your

sobriety, do not get behind the wheel. If you do chose to drive impaired, you will be arrested. No warnings, no excuses," Chief Kammerlohr said.

Kammerlohr noted that being arrested for driving drunk brings a wide range of negative consequences into one's life. Drunk drivers face jail time, loss of their driver licenses, and steep financial consequences such as higher insurance rates, attorney's fees, court costs, lost time at work, and the potential loss of job. When family, friends and co-workers find out, violators also often face tremendous personal embarrassment.

"Driving drunk is simply not worth the risk. So don't take the chance. Remember, we will be out in force and we will be watching, so "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over," said Kammerlohr.

Cassville weather radio transmitter out of service

According to a notice put out by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the Cassville Weather Radio transmitter is out of service due to antenna and cable issues. The service was disrupted February 6 and is not expected to be operational

until April.

For the time being, weather radios in the Cassville area will not work until the antenna and cables are repaired. The transmitter for the Cassville area is WNG608, and the frequency is 162.500.

Local Storm Siren testing times change

The Barry County Siren Policy has been recently updated. As a result of the update, the warning sirens will now be tested on the second Wednesday of every month at 10 a.m. There is no make-up testing time scheduled, so if the monthly test is canceled, it will not be made up. According to David Compton, the Director of the Barry County Office of Emergency Management (BCOEM), the policy was changed to make it as consistent as possible with the rest of the region.

The BCOEM has policies in place to activate storm spotters and the warning siren. According to the Spotter Activation Policy, storm spotting agencies are contacted when severe weather appears to be approaching Barry County. Every effort will be made to contact the agencies 30 minutes before the weather reaches the county. Spotters are notified during a National Weather Service (NWS) thunderstorm or tornado watch, and are paged to respond nonemergency, according to their department's policy, during a NWS severe thunderstorm warning or tornado watch.

Siren Activation Policy calls for spotters to be contacted by radios or pagers of what the potentially affected area, the location of the suspected tornado, and the direction it is traveling. Spotters in the path of the suspected tornado are to

take cover immediately. Sirens in the potentially affected area will be activated.

Should a spotter sight a funnel cloud or tornado, the spotter's location, type of sighting, direction the funnel is traveling, and a damage report are to be obtained. All information is to be relayed via pagers or radios, and the storm sirens are activated for the potentially affected areas.

Sirens are also activated during severe thunderstorms with sustained winds greater than 75 miles per hour, radar indication of a tornado, the monthly siren test and the Annual Statewide Tornado Test, which is held on a date and time determined by the NWS.

The policy also calls for a number of agencies and people to be notified immediately after spotters or sirens are activated. These include the Barry County Sheriff's Office, the municipal dispatch centers, emergency management at both county and municipal levels, the Chief of Police, the Fire Chief and the City Mayor in each municipality, and on duty EMS, fire and law enforcement personnel in each municipality.

Rural broadband expansion planned

electric cooperatives might remember with fondness the "day the lights came on." For those who once lived without electricity that event was a life-changing experience.

Like electricity, access to high-speed internet service in this Digital Age is a requirement, not a luxury. Modern broadband Internet service has become a necessity in this digital age. It will improve educational opportunities, serve as a foundation for economic growth, and in job creation, improve global competitiveness and lead to a better way of life.

Barry Electric Cooperative began exploring the possibility of building a fiber-to-the-home (FTTH) network in 2010 after numerous requests from its members. Finley Engineering, Lamar, was hired to design a full FTTH network to serve all of Barry Electric's members as well as provide SmartGrid, SCADA and Energy Efficiency capabilities for the Cooperative.

The system design selected is a G-PON (Gigabit Passive Optical Network) design with capability for some Active Ethernet

Longtime members of where required. Speeds of up to 1 Gbps will be available with this design.

Barry Electric's service area required a central office location and seven remote locations. There will be a total of eight separate build areas. A fiber ring will connect all remote areas to each other and to the central office for redundancy.

The Cooperative submitted an application to the FCC for a grant in 2014 but was not selected at that time. If the Cooperative had been successful in its application, it would have been able to build all eight areas over a three year pe-

Undaunted, the directors of Barry Electric Cooperative felt that FTTH is such a critical infrastructure project that the cooperative is moving forward with a pilot project. The central office portion of the network will be built. Approximately 179 miles of fiber will be installed along with all the electronics required to provide internet, phone and possibly video to more than 1,600 members. The current plan is build the seven remaining areas as funds are available.



Cassville native works to help Rwandan women out of poverty

When Melissa Stimson-Bittle lived in Cassville, she liked to help others. She was active in First Baptist Church, where she participated in a number of mission trips. Her role models were her pastor, the Rev. John Duncan, and his wife, Jennifer.

"John and Jennifer really fostered the heart of missions in our church," she said. "Whether it be local service or serving around the world, they led by example and, to this day, serve the community."

Now living in Reeds Spring with her husband of 13 years, Michael, Bittle continues to pursue mission

work. Bittle is the Admissions Director at the Academy of Hair Design, and it si through that position that she is helping to better the lives of women who are living in poverty in Rwanda.

Bittle, the second of two children to Bill and Marge Stimson, graduated from Cassville High School in 2000. After graduation, she went to OTC in Springfield and earned an associates degree in graphic design. Bittle worked as a graphic designer in for the Parade of Homes for eight years but left to work in the administrative side of a beauty school in 2009. For the last two years, she has been with the Academy of Hair Design in Springfield.

In Rwanda, about 57 percent of the nation lives in poverty due to lingering effects from the 1994 Rwandan Genocide and a massive food shortage. About 27 percent of the families in Rwanda are headed by single women, and they are the most in danger of falling into poverty.

In 2012, the Academy of Hair Design partnered with Africa New Life Ministries, an organization founded to help end poverty in Rwanda, to open the Dream Beauty Academy in Kigali, Rwanda. Here, women with no way of providing for themselves are taught cosmetology and business skills through an 11-month program. These skills allow them to earn a living for themselves and their fami-

In October 2014, Stimson went to Africa with a number of other staff members at the Academy of Hair Design to the visit the

Dream Beauty Academy. They spent 10 days in Kigali and had the chance to speak and work with the school's students.

They also met some of the women who had already graduated and were work-

ing in beauty salons in Kigali. According to Stimson, the Academy has powerfully affected their lives.

"A couple of the students I got to meet personally now work in a salon in their city," she said. "They are able to make money and provide for their family whereas before they didn't know where meals would come from. The children would be forced to go on the streets looking for food. Through their stories, you can see the heartbreak they felt for not being able to give their children basic necessities. Now, as trained, employable citizens, they can hold their heads high as they walk down the street knowing they no longer have to do illegal or immoral acts to be able to survive."

Bittle also got to meet

and spend a day with Keila, a seven-year old girl she and her husband personally sponsor through Africa New Life Ministries. She took Keila to a worship service at a church outside of her hometown and also took her shopping. "It was the first time Keila had ever been outside of the town she lives in," Bittle said.

Bittle said Africa has always been on her heart, and she plans to return, either this fall or in 2016. She believes the Dream Beauty Academy provides the women who attend there with something that is valuable beyond estimation.

"They have self worth, they have a goal, they feel confidence and pride," Bittle said. "In a country that aimed to decimate a people group a short 20 years ago, these feelings don't come lightly. Having training and someone invest in you personally are valuable opportunities for the Rwandans."



Barry County courts send 8 to prison in February

· Hoy Andrew Ashley, Cassville, pled guilty to two counts of DWI-Alcohol as a persistent offender, two counts of burglary in the second degree, two counts of theft/stealing of \$500 to \$25,000, and DWI-Alcohol as an aggravated offender from arrests originating in 2008, 2009 and 2010. Ashley's probation has since been revoked, and he has been terminated from the CRISP program. He is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In September 2008, Ashley was arrested by the Missouri State Highway Patrol after crashing his car on Farm Road 1065 in Barry County. Ashley was trapped in the car after losing control of his vehicle around a curve, hitting a ditch and overturning. The Purdy Fire Department had to cut him from the vehicle, and he was found to have a blood alcohol level of 0.14

In July 2009, Ashley broke into a residence on Schell Street in Cassville and stole a Playstation, Wii system, video games, a black diamond necklace, a diamond necklace, a converter box and controllers. The items were valued at around \$3,200.

In December 2010, Ashley was arrested for DWI-Alcohol again when he drove a U-Haul in a ditch along Highway 76 in Exeter. His blood alcohol content at that time was 0.137 percent.

• Dylan Bowlin, Monett, pled guilty to unlawful use of drug paraphernalia with methamphetamine and distribution of not more than five grams of marijuana. Bowlin received a suspended imposition of sentencing, 100 hours of community service, and five years supervised pro-

Bowlin's charges originated from an arrest in August 2014. Jailers at the Barry County Jail found a plastic bag outside the jail that contained four bricks of marijuana wrapped in duct tape. Detective Doug Henry placed a decoy bag in the same place and set up a game camera to find out who was retrieving the marijuana.

When the suspects were identified, officers found several glass methamphetamine pipes at the residence where Bowlin and two others were staying. They also found the duct tape used on the decoy bundles at the home.

Bowlin is to serve probation until Feb. 13, 2020.

• Joshua Tyler Brown, Wheaton, was found guilty by a jury of endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree. Brown was sentenced to seven years incarceration.

Brown was initially arrested in March 2013 when it was found that he had abused a two-year old girl by pulling chunks of her hair out, burning her buttocks and leaving a hand mark on her thigh.

bridge, Cassville, pled guilty to assault in the second degree while operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated. Burbridge was sentenced to seven years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended, five years supervised probation and 20 days shock time in the Barry County Jail.

Burbridge was charged after the Missouri State Highway Patrol was dispatched to a wreck on Route M. Burbridge failed numerous field sobriety tests after the wreck and the Trooper found him to smell strongly of intoxicants. He also had prior DWI

Burbridge is to serve probation until Feb. 25, 2020.

• Jeremy F. Donahoo, Cassville, pled guilty to resisting arrest for a felony and tampering with the motor vehicle in the first degree. Donahoo was sentenced to four years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended, five years supervised probation, and he must complete the CRISP program.

In July 2014, Donahoo attempted to flee from officers questioning him. When he was caught, he was found to have five blank checks in his possession that had been stolen. Then, in August 2014, while being transported by the Barry County Sheriff's Department, Donahoo kicked the rear window out of the vehicle.





Jermain's sentencing came after multiple run ins with enforcement between 2013 and 2014. In October 2013, Jermain was found to be operating a meth lab in a shed beside his residence in Seligman and also admitted to stealing aluminum wire from a residence on Farm Road 2280 in Seligman. In October 2014, Jermain was stopped by the Barry County Sheriff's Department and had multiple precursors to manufacture methamphetamine in his possession.

On Saturday, April 4, the Cassville 30K Classic and Crystal Springs 2-Mile races return for a second edition. Last year, these races were held for the first time as a fundraiser for the Cassville Wildcats Cross Country program.

Once a staple of the Missouri racing scene, the 18.64 mile distance disappeared for decades before being resurrected in Cassville last spring. Most of the state's 30K overall and age-group records were set prior to 1984.

Along with the 30K classic, Coach Chris Shore will also host the Crystal Springs 2-Mile race.

The 30K race course is a double out-and-back loop from the Wildcat field house north to a point past the Merl's Chapel bridge on Highway Y and back. The two-mile is run on an out-and-back course from

the Wildcat field house to a point just past the old bridge on Crystal Springs road and back

Both courses are certified by the USA Track and Field Association and are eligible for state and national records.

The race date is set for Saturday, April 4, 2015. The 30K race starts at 7:30 a.m., and the 2-Mile starts at 7:45. Race Day entry fees are \$35 for the 30K, and \$25 for the 2-Mile.

Runners should check in at the Football Fieldhouse at least 15 minutes prior to the start of their race

Awards are given to the overall male and female champions, and to the top three runners in each age group.

Race details and forms are available on the Ozark Mountain Ridge runners website.

All proceeds from the event will benefit the Cass-ville Wildcats Cross Country program.



Funding available for emergency food/shelter

OACAC has been awarded federal funds made available through the Department of Homeland Security (DHS)/Federal Emergency Management Agency under the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program.

Barry County has been chosen to receive \$12,549.00 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America, The Salvation Army;

and, United Way Worldwide. The Local Board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high- need areas around the country. A local board will determine how the funds awarded to OACAC are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds made available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must:1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to re-

ceive Federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and /or shelter programs, and 6) if they are private a voluntary organization, have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

OACAC has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Cassville UMC, Central Community UMC and Helping Hands Food Pantry.

Public or private voluntary agencies interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Gail Reed, 700 E. Hwy. 248, Cassville, (417) 847-2140 for an application. The deadline for applications to be received is March 12.





unexpected generosity. To highlight the fact that farmers are the ultimate source of food, Yarnall and Stubblefield handed out two \$25 checks to a couple of random shoppers at Ramey Supermarket in Cassville. "We want to draw attention to where our food comes from and all the hard work the farmers do so we can have food to eat," Yarnall said.

The checks, which were made out to Ramey, could be used by the shoppers toward their grocery purchases. The two lucky shoppers who received them were Pauline Day, of Exeter, and Jerry Hoffman, of Cassville, who was at the store with his son, Lee.

The BCFB's promotion of agriculture extends far beyond Thank A Farmer Week, though. According to Chad Yarnall, Agency Sales Manager at Missouri Farm Bureau Insurance Services, the Bureau supports farmers throughout the year in a variety of ways.

One way the BCFD supports farmers is through its Young Farmer/Rancher activity. Each year, three or four couples who are new to farming are picked to go to a convention in Tan-Tar-A, all-expenses paid. According to Yarnall, the farmers sent to the convention learn the latest techniques in growing crops, managing livestock and many other agricultural technologies. Members are preferred, but any farming couple is eligible to go.

The Bureau also sponsors students from area schools to go to the Missouri Farm Bureau Youth Leadership Day in Jefferson City, usually members of the FFA. According to Yarnall, up to 12 students a year can be sponsored. The BCFD also provides area farmers with representation at the state and federal levels of government.



Cassville PD to crack down on teen seat belt usage

Under the Graduated Driver's License (GDL) law, teens are required to wear their seat belt as it's a primary offense, meaning they can be pulled over solely for not wearing their seat belt.

"Local motorists should be prepared for stepped up seat belt enforcement," stated Sgt. Donald Privett. "We'll be out there to remind you seat belts can and do-save lives," he concluded.




