

## Imagination Library Comes to Shell Knob

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a service designed to gift books, free of charge, to children from birth to age five. It is structured as a program parents sign their children up for, via online forms, or a paper form.

Funding is supplied via Dolly Parton herself, as well as community partners in the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, and Republic of Ireland.

"I read about Teresa Philips putting Imagination in Exeter and Cassville, and I'm on the board for The Thrifty Closet in Shell Knob - so I thought, 'Oh, that might be something we can help do!' So, I contacted Teresa and asked, 'Is there any chance you can come to Shell Knob?" states Glenda Meyers, board member for nonprofit thrift store, The Thrifty Closet, and promoter of the Imagination Library program in Shell Knob.

Meyers soon discovered that yes, Imagination Library could be expanded into the Shell Knob area, given the proper sponsors.

"I thought," Meyers continued, "What better way to give back to the community? What better way to help our children than to provide books?' So, I took it to the board, and we discussed it. Teresa told us more about the program, and we decided to be the sponsor for our area code for kids age zero to five."

The online forms are up and running, according to Meyer, so anyone may visit imaginationlibrary.com and sign up their child, provided they live in the 65747 area code. This extends beyond the Shell Knob school district, however.

Alternatively, paper sign up sheets are available at The Thrifty Closet, and Meyer plans to make them even more readily available, hoping to make the paper signup sheets available in the Shell Knob schools.

"Sometimes, the preschool teachers will have knowledge of children at home, so they can help give out the forms as well.

"Totally free of cost to the parent, a child receives a new book every month, and it comes in their name," Meyers continued.

"The books are really nice hardbound books the children can keep for a lifetime. They aren't little bitty books - I was amazed by how nice the books were. We just thought this was a wonderful opportunity to help our chil-

## **Cassville Home Declared Total Loss After Arson**

On March 3, at 3:53 a.m., Barry County Police Officer Codie Evatt was dispatched to a residence in Cassville in reference to a call reporting a structure fire. According to a probable cause statement filed by Officer Evatt on March 3, the fire was intentionally set by Amanda Faye Allen, of Cassville.

Officer Evatt arrived on scene, made contact with Allen, and placed her in his patrol vehicle.

Afterward, Evatt made contact with the callers and victims. One of the victims informed Evatt that Allen had ignited a box in the residence, and the victim stated that he "stomped the box fire out." The victim then explained that Allen then went into the back room, and upon noticing smoke coming from beneath the door, he kicked the door down. Allen had reportedly barricaded the door from the other side, hence

necessitating forced entry. Upon entry, the victim noticed another fire. Allen then informed Officer Evatt that she had set a mattress on fire in the back room. Amanda states her reasoning for setting the fire was to make the two victims depart from the residence.

According to Amanda Faye Allen's probable cause statement, the mobile home was a total loss.

dren. We're a mission of the church, but we have our own board, and our board operates our daily business.

"The Dolly Parton Organization realized that you start off small, and then you gain, and gain, and gain - somebody tells somebody else and they sign up. Also, they estimate that when it gets in full swing, it's usually about 60% of the child population that gets involved.

"If a child is read to, they learn words that are beyond their knowledge in many ways, but they learn it by hearing the story over and over again, and I feel like nothing is better than reading to your child.

"I have always heard of it - I had even checked in the past where I had great-grand children living., if it was available."

The program is only available through sponsorship

and the responsibility of coordination, however.

"I love to see little children in doctor's offices pick up a book, and this is a good way to get them introduced to books at no cost to the par-

"There is no income level basis, it is available to whatever income level the parents are," Meyers concluded.

"As far as the effects of the community," began Teresa Phillips, Program Manager of the Local Imagination Library Affiliate, "I believe reading to children on a regular basis increases imagination, promotes language development, strengthens the bond between the child and parent or caregiver that reads to them, and promotes an overall love for reading.

"We are now in the third month since our local affiliate opened and we have significantly exceeded the projected number of registrations. I'm grateful for the interest and support of the program."

## \$4 Million Given to Support Student Sucess

University of Missouri President Mun Choi today announced nearly \$4 million in awards to fund 51 projects that will support student success during his State of the University address. The awards are part of MizzouForward, a \$1.5 billion comprehensive investment strategy to enhance the university's research and education missions over 10 years.

"When we launched MizzouForward last fall, we made a pledge to provide our faculty with the resources, infrastructure and support they need to provide world-class education and conduct cutting-edge research," said Mun Y. Choi, University of Missouri pres-

"This investment is the first of many that will enhance student success and improve graduation outcomes."

Each of the innovative projects support student success by making classroom upgrades (physical improvements or IT resources), upgrading laboratories (investments in new equipment or instruments for student education), or investing in new software that enhances classroom experiences or student learning.

In addition to the student investments, Choi shared important infrastructure updates, including news of federal funding in excess of \$60 million that will go toward the construction costs of the Roy Blunt NextGen Precision Health building and endowments of faculty positions.

He also discussed a \$20 million investment for the MU Research Reactor West (opens 2024) and a \$27 million investment for the Department of Energy Radio Isotope Science Center (expected 2024).

The 51 student success projects to receive funding include the following:

 Additional "Spot" robot - The Autonomous Systems Lab will invest in an enterprise edition of the Boston Dynamics Spot robot, which allows remote access for students not located in Columbia.

Adding an additional robot will also enable more students to gain important hands-on experience.

 Architectural Studies outdoor learning space - Architectural Studies will create an outdoor space for the installation of largescale fabrication and design prototypes where students can evaluate and test their artifacts in real-world con-

The space will foster experiential learning as students will be responsible for planning and executing exhibitions throughout the vear.

American Government course redesign - A joint venture between political science faculty and the Teaching 4 Learning Center will invest in a course redesign of American Government to incorporate gamebased learning, which leverages innovative, experiential and multi-modal opportunities for increased student engagement and learning.

An example includes

an escape-room style game where students are teamed up to solve a quest through collaborative analysis of clues and facts.

3D-printed organ models - The School of Medicine and the College of Engineering will develop 3D-printed organ models resembling human tissue that can be used to teach surgical techniques for students, residents and fellows in a controlled, low-risk environment.

This will ultimately improve performance when caring for patients. The collaboration with engineering students who create and produce these models will provide real-time learning for developers as well as end

Financial aid workshop - The Office of Financial Success will use award funds to develop a new student financial aid workshop that outlines basic financial planning concepts, concentrating on student financial aid processes and availabil-

By offering the workshop twice a semester, students will have the opportunity to increase their financial literacy and learn basic financial skills.

Highlighting research growth

Choi also highlighted new hires made as part of MizzouForward and the School of Medicine's RISE UP recruiting effort. Choi also noted that since 2018, MU has seen a dramatic increase in research performance. In the last three years, the value of submitted research proposals has increased 84%.

A second strategic priority of MizzouForward is increasing investments in new and current faculty. Choi said the university

intends to hire 30 new MizzouForward faculty this year and each year going forward, on top of regular recruiting. The university has worked to hire clusters of faculty focused in priority research areas for the National Institutes of Health, National Science Foundation and Department of Energy.

"To become a worldclass university, we need to think, act and invest like a world-class university," Choi said. "Through strategic focus and targeted investments, we are shaping our future with intention."

Choi announced a \$500 million commitment toward salary increases within the next five years, which includes annual performance increases as well as retention of high-performing faculty and staff.


To support existing faculty, a new Honors and Awards office was created to identify awards and faculty with high research activity and award potential. The office launched a searchable award database and will offer support throughout the application process. New research support programs will provide proposal development managers, grants and contracts specialists, technical editors and illustrators, and evaluation specialists.

Measuring economic impact

Choi also touted the results of a recent economic impact report, which showed MU had a \$5 billion impact on the state in 2021. The university supported nearly 50,000 jobs and generated \$281.8 million in state and local taxes.

More information about the economic impact of MU will be released later this week.





## Be alert for potholes and the road crews fixing them

#### Three different ways to report pothole locations

Snow and ice brought their own unique challenges to driving during the month of February. As temperatures begin to increase, the Missouri Department of Transportation is focusing on the potholes left in the road with all the fluctuating temperatures and precipitation.

"Crews have already started working on patching potholes and will continue as the weather allows," said Natalie Roark, MoDOT maintenance director. "When you see a Mo-DOT crew making repairs, please slow down and move over a lane to give them room to work. And never drive distracted. Remember, Buckle Up Phone Down."

In 2021, MoDOT patched approximately 530,000 potholes, spending \$18 million on pothole patching.

Potholes form when rain and snow from winter leave moisture that seeps into cracks and joints in the pavement and later freezes. This frozen water expands within the pavement causing it to bulge and bend. When the ice melts, gaps or voids are left in the surface and structure of the pavement. When cars and trucks drive over the bulging pavement, it weakens the roadway eventually causing chunks of pavement or asphalt to pop out, creating potholes.

The majority of pothole patching repairs

of April. Short-term repairs are made using a cold asphalt mix, with a priority to fill the deepest potholes first. The long-term fix, a hot asphalt mix, isn't effective until temperatures remain warm for a prolonged period.

MoDOT maintains 34,000 miles of road, including interstates, U.S. and Missouri highways and lettered routes.

If you can't avoid a pothole, try to slow down before you hit it. Here are some other safety tips:

Don't brake directly over a pothole as this can cause more damage.

When driving over the pothole, hold the steering wheel firmly to avoid losing control. Use caution when driving over a puddle of

water because it might be a pothole in hiding. Make sure your tires are properly inflated. Properly inflated tires hold up better against potholes than tires that have too much or too

Motorists can report the location of potholes on state-maintained roads using the following tools:

Don't know where to get started? A free 90-minute class from MU Extension can help. In time for spring, horticulturists extension Keay and Robert Balek will "Do-It-Yourself present Lawncare Essentials" 6-7:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 6, via Zoom.

Keay says simple changes such as raising your mowing height can help suppress up to 80% of lawn weeds. Overseeding your lawn in the fall is an easy way to fill in bare spots and help prevent weeds from taking over. A soil test can help you understand what nutrients your lawn needs—and what nutrients it doesn't need, so you can avoid applying unnecessary fertilizer that could contribute to water pollution. "We all have our part to play in protecting our state's natural resources, including our wonderful rivers, lakes and streams," Keay says.

"This class will be helpful to new and existing homeowner who are interested in optimizing management of their own lawns," he adds. "Folks will leave this class with a good grasp on basic lawn care practices and principles as well as the confidence necessary to start ef-

## A virtual way to rehab from a stroke


A study finds video gamebased therapy helps stroke patients improve their motor skills while also reducing therapist time, cost of treatment.

After a stroke, patients may lose feeling in an arm or experience weakness and reduced movement that limits their ability to complete basic daily activities. Traditional rehabilitation therapy is very intensive, time-consuming and can be both expensive and inconvenient, especially for rural patients travelling long distances to in-person therapy appointments.

That's why a team of researchers, including one at the University of Missouri, utilized a motion-sensor video game, Recovery Rapids, to allow patients recovering from a stroke to improve their motor skills and affected arm movements at home while checking in periodically with a therapist via telehealth.

The researchers found the game-based therapy led to improved outcomes similar to a highly regarded form of in-person therapy, known as constraint-induced therapy, while only requiring onefifth of the therapist hours. This approach saves time and money while increasing convenience and safety as telehealth has boomed in popularity during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"As an occupational therapist, I have seen patients from rural areas drive more than an hour to come to an in-person clinic three to four days a week, where the rehab is very intensive, taking three to four hours per session, and the therapist must be there



the whole time," said Rachel Proffitt, assistant professor in the MU School of Health Professions. "With this new at-home gaming approach, we are cutting costs for the patient and reducing time for the therapist while still improving convenience and overall health outcomes, so it's a win-win. By saving time for the therapists, we can also now serve more patients and make a broader impact on our communities."

Traditional rehab home exercises tend to be very repetitive and monotonous, and patients rarely adhere to them. The Recovery Rapids game helps patients look forward to rehabilitation by completing various challenges in a fun, interactive environment, and the researchers found that the patients adhered well to their prescribed exercises.

"The patient is virtually placed in a kayak, and as they go down the river, they perform arm motions simulating paddling, rowing, scooping up trash, swaying from side to side to steer, and reaching overhead to clear out spider webs and bats, so it's making the exercises fun," Proffitt said. "As they progress, the challenges get harder, and we conduct check-ins with the participants via

telehealth to adjust goals, provide feedback and discuss the daily activities they want to resume as they improve."

Nearly 800,000 Americans have a stroke each year according to the CDC, and two-thirds of stroke survivors report they cannot use their affected limbs to do normal daily activities, including making a cup of coffee, cooking a meal or playing with one's grandchildren.

"I am passionate about helping patients get back to all the activities they love to do in their daily life," Proffitt said. "Anything we can do as therapists to help in a creative way while saving time and money is the ultimate goal." "Video game rehabilitation

## Highly pathogenic avian influenza found in Missouri wild birds

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) has confirmed that highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) has been detected in an American white pelican in Clay County, Mo. Confirmation came from the National Veterinary Services Lab in Ames, Iowa.

Additionally, the University of Missouri Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab has confirmed positive birds from Pettis, Randolph, and St. Charles counties.

Avian influenza, commonly referred to as bird flu, was first confirmed in a commercial poultry flock in Stoddard County on March 3, and a backyard flock in Bates County on March 4. MDC is working closely with the Missouri Department of Agriculture and other state and federal agencies to monitor the spread of the virus.

"Avian influenza viruses naturally occur in bird populations, especially waterfowl, shorebirds, and domestic birds such as chickens and turkeys," said MDC State Wildlife Veterinarian Sherri Russell. "We have been monitoring this strain since early January, when it was detected in the eastern United States and Canada."

Avian influenza spreads

as birds along the North American flyways intermingle with infected birds from Europe and Asia. The viruses are transmitted from bird to bird through fecal droppings, saliva, and nasal discharges. There is a risk for spillover from wild birds into domestic poultry and then back again from poultry to wild birds, resulting in further spread.

"Fortunately, avian influenza does not present an immediate public health concern, although on rare occasions it has infected humans and other animals," said Dr. Russell.

"We recommend you

avoid handling sick or dead birds, and to report sick or dead wild birds, especially waterfowl, to MDC."

Wildlife Health staff are interested in reports of single waterfowl, raptor, or avian scavengers with neurological symptoms - tremors, head tilting, lethargy, loss of coordination, inability to fly or walk properly, or trouble standing upright. They are also interested in waterfowl or other waterbird deaths involving more than five birds where the cause of death is unknown. Citizens can report sick or dead birds by emailing WildlifeHealth@ mdc.mo.gov or calling their

local MDC office.

Hunters are advised to take common sense precautions when handling harvested birds in the field or at home. They should be aware that it is possible to transport avian influenza viruses on boats, waders, or other equipment, especially if it isn't dry before moving it from one site to another.

Allowing hunting equipment to dry between outings will reduce this chance. "It is safe to eat poultry and wild game birds because normal cooking temperatures are hot enough to kill the virus," said Dr. Russell.

"Make sure to cook your

meat to an internal temperature of 165 degrees Fahrenheit."

"I had a really great experience as an undergrad. I had a lot of opportunities to be involved with campus organizations, and that's what really made my Mizzou experience," Grissum said. "I was able to get a lot of working experience outside of the classroom, some of which was facilitated or supported by Mizzou classes and different departments. I am really grateful for that, and I honestly couldn't speak more highly of that." Grissum completed four internships as an undergraduate at MU, including one with the Missouri Department of Public Safety and another with Senator Roy Blunt's office in Columbia.

"The work and the internship experiences are by far what set me up for getting into the law school. I really appreciate that Mizzou law valued that more than just a GPA and an LSAT score," Grissum said. "I think it was that along with my on-campus involvement that really set me apart."

Kaija Caldwell, who received an undergraduate degree in animal science from the College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, was accepted into the Kentucky Equine Management Program after graduating from MU. She recently completed the six-month equine program in December of 2021 and is now back home in Chicago. "I found my passion during my time at Mizzou. I met a lot of great people, and I am so grateful for that," Caldwell said. "MU introduced me to my career, and all of the opportunities I was given taught me a lot about myself."

While at Mizzou, Caldwell participated in multiple organizations, which she said helped prepare her for the rigorous program in Kentucky. She joined the Collegiate Horsemen's Association and founded CAFNR Connections, a program that offers an opportunity for students of color in CAFNR to gather informally and share conversations. "It was a tough six months in Kentucky, but I learned so many things and experienced so much that I couldn't find anywhere else," Caldwell said.

"I wouldn't trade it for anything. It was one of the best experiences I have ever had, and I'm so thankful for the programs and the people who set me up for my success." Caldwell has been hired as an assistant vet technician at the Bronzeville Animal Clinic in Chicago, the same veterinary office where she completed her first internship in high school. Her goal is to become a thoroughbred horse trainer in the next five years. Shane Whitehead was accepted into the highly selective University of Missouri-Kansas City physician's assistant program after graduating from Mizzou with a degree in health science from the School of Health Professions.

She applied for the pro-

gram at the end of her sophomore year through an early admission program called the PA Scholar's Program for students at MU.

"I loved my time as an undergrad," Whitehead said.

"I wish I had stayed a year later. I took advantage of all the extracurriculars that I could and made some of the best friends I'll ever have."

Whitehead was part of the Physician's Assistant Club and worked at an optometry assistant office for six months. She also held a job at a hospital as a phlebotomist and volunteered at Boone Hospital Center multiple times during her time as an undergraduate. Whitehead said her experiences through MU and her internships were ultimately what set her apart from her peers when applying for the UMKC program.

Having a job at a hospital exposed her to the health care setting where she gained important skills such as talking and assisting real patients. Along with her internship experiences, Whitehead said her courses at Mizzou prepared her well. "As part of my degree, I had an internship that had a prerequisite class in which we worked on resumes, interviewing and personal statements," she said. "Those skills really prepared me for the application

Whitehead began the program at UMKC a year and a half after applying and now expects to start her clinical rotations on May 3.

Fishing has been very good this past week. We are really seeing some good dry fly fishing. Midges, Blue wing Olives, and Caddis every day. As long as the river remains at this level (90 CFS or below), the hatches should remain very good.

Elk hair Caddis in size #14-#18's are working right now, Blue Wing Olives are smaller, #20's and smaller are best, and Midges are best when you are using #20's and smaller.

The flies that are coming off every day are not huge, but we are already catching trout on beetles, stimulators, and bigger dries, like #12 ants and hoppers. The fish are looking up very well right

Nymph fishing has been very good, also. #16 copper johns, #16 and smaller pheasant tail nymphs, #16 and smaller burlaps, #16 and

smaller zebra midges, and #14 and smaller sow bugs have all been very good. Fish the dry flies on a 7X leader, and the nymphs I'll fish mostly on a 6X leader, both 9' or longer.

Black, olive, tan, and brown wooly buggers are still a good choice. These will catch trout most all day. Fished deep and slow is usually the best way to fish them, but sometimes the trout want them a bit quicker early in the day. Fishing a spinning rod? Use 2 lb. line and you will do better right now. Early morning a black, olive, white, brown, or a pink rooster tail type spinner will work. Fish 'em just fast enough to keep the blade turning, and fish 'em deep and you can catch fish on them off and on all day. Fish 'em too fast and you'll get lots and lots of trout chasing and very few that will actually catch the spinner.

Plastic baits are very effective all day. The yellow, pink, white, and the orange, eggs, and worms have been very good, the 1 inch yellow(cheese) crawlers are very good right now. We are fishing the plastic worms on a #10 Aberdeen hook, bronze or gold will work just fine, and the eggs we are fishing on #14 and smaller hooks. If you are using multiple eggs, #12's will sometimes work best.1/32 and larger marabou jigs are working very well right now. The olive, black/ vellow, white, brown, and the olive/tan is working pretty good right now.

Good luck this week on the river.

## **Grocery Prices Continue to Rise**

Research suggests that many factors contribute to the rapid rise.

Walk through almost any grocery store and it's hard to miss - prices on food staples from cereal to steaks are going up.

Scott Brown, director of strategic partnerships and associate extension professor at the University of Missouri College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, studies the economics of food prices and is closely tracking the consumer price index (CPI) of major agricultural commodities.

Brown discussed some of the obvious (and not so obvious) reasons behind the rapid rise and what consumers can expect in the months ahead.

What is happening to food prices?

It's many things, from prices at the farm-level to those added as the food is on the way to the restaurant or bought at the grocery store. I like to say that 80% of the value is added to basic commodities after they leave the farm.

Those costs are being driven higher by increasing labor and energy costs, as well as other supply bottlenecks related to COVID-19.

That leaves 20% of costs at the farm level, where we're now seeing higher livestock, dairy, wheat, corn, fruit and vegetable prices. Those are the two pieces — farm prices and the costs that are added on after — that make up overall food price inflation.

How is the conflict between Russia and Ukraine impacting prices?

We're hopefully coming out of some of the worst of the COVID-19-related effects, but now we're likely heading into effects related to Russia-Ukraine.

There are three big impacts that I'm seeing. The first is the increase in crude oil prices. Second is wheat, since Ukraine is important to overall wheat production in the world and wheat prices are really taking off. The third is sunflower oil.

Ukraine has been a large sunflower producer and produces a lot of sunflower oil.

Are prices rising for some food products faster than others?

Thus far, it isn't evenly spread. Since August 2021, beef is really leading the way.

Two things are important to the rapid runup in beef prices: Consumer demand for beef has been strong, and supplies of beef have begun

to slow down given where we are in the cattle cycle.

That's the biggest one, but I can pick out something like cheese that until earlier this year was running below year-ago levels, but is now also increasing.

How has this impacted producers?

For farmers and producers, they may see stories of food price inflation, but they don't enjoy the higher prices — at least in the same proportion as at the retail level.

Labor on the farm and higher fuel prices drive the farm-level costs higher as farmers try to adjust production given those higher input prices.

How unusual is this situation?

This situation is fairly unusual. For 2021, the annual CPI for food is up 3.9%. That's the largest annual increase since 2008, when we were up 5.5%.

The February 2022 CPI for food is 7.9% higher than the year ago level, the highest increase since July 1981.

What impact could this have on consumer food spending?

The percentage of disposable income spent on food averages around 10%. This depends a lot on your income level — for example, lower income folks spend a larger portion of income on

All things considered, it's a relatively small portion of monthly income, so many people can absorb some food inflation without having to make large changes. Some of the changes that might happen have to do with away-from-home food consumption. Higher value eating-out experiences go away, or people who do eat out are going to less expensive restaurants.


How do prices stabilize? I do see this as a trend that's not going away very quickly. It's very difficult to see CPI for food moving lower after an upward adjustment.

We have not had a negative annual rate of growth over the 2008-2021 period. The way it ends is we slow inflation, we don't turn it down.

From 2010-2019, we averaged 1.7% CPI a year, that may be a good long-term place to frame ourselves. I think we will find ourselves in a better situation when we don't have the same labor shortages we have today, and we have other inputs like crude oil moving lower.

But predicting either of those events is tough. I'm not convinced we lose these costs very quickly.




