

### Freight-Liner Overturns in **Roaring River**

An Arizona man was moderately injured in a crash south of Roaring River State Park at 1:25 p.m. last Wednesday, May 25. According to Missouri Highway Patrol crash report, Bernardo Morales, 46, of Glendale, Arizona, was on Missouri-112, three miles south of Roaring River State Park, in a 2009 Freightliner Tractor Trailer. Morales then slid off the right side of the roadway and overturned, totaling his vehicle. Morales suffered moderate injuries and was transported by ambulance to

the Mercy Hospital in Cassville. Morales was wearing a safety device at the time of the crash.

### **Golden Woman Life** Flighted from 86

A woman from Golden was seriously injured in a crash near Eagle Rock at 4:30 p.m. on the evening of Friday, May 27. According to a





ney has retired as the general manager, and states that he is thankful for the experiences he has gotten while working at the CO-OP.

Marney recalls his introduction to the CO-OP fondly. "In 1974," he states, "I was a manager at the Ready-Mix Plant for three years, and CO-OP happened to be looking for a manager, and that was when I came on board as general manager."

When discussing what made Marney stay at the Barry County CO-OP so long, he states, "It was close to home and I loved the community. It was a good place to raise my family and the business continued to grow. I continued to work past the retirement age and enjoyed getting to watch the business continue to succeed."

Marney says he will miss

the camaraderie he had with the employees and getting to interact with all of the customers. Marney states that the most rewarding thing during his career was "The success of the CO-OP, and so much success that we could pay back to the customers every year. It is a small town CO-OP, but there aren't many CO-OPs of this size still left in the area."

Cassville's class of 2022 graduated at 3 p.m. on Sunday, May 22, 2022. The ceremony was filled with speeches from faculty as well as the valedictorian, Landry Parnell, and the salutatorian, Rachel Steinman. The graduation ceremony also held a presentation of cum laude honors to 50 students in the

graduating class. Steinman's speech highlighted change and how it has impacted her success as well as pushed her to do better.



We had a great weekend at Roaring River State Park.

The water is still up, running at 218 CFS this morning.

Still, the fishing is pretty good, more power bait and other plastics are still catching lots of trout, it is so easy to use when the water is up. Yellow, pink, white, and flo. Yellow power bait was the best colors this week.

Spinners were good also, black was the best, but a lot of the trout that were caught were caught on the pink, white, and the orange spinners, and with the water still being up, small gold spoons caught a lot of trout this

You'll need to use extra weight when fishing the power bait, at least 2 3/0 weights will be needed, in most of zone 1. There are a few places where more weight will be

Fly fishing was good for most of the week, the upper end of zone 1 was the easiest part of the river to fish, brown crackle backs, yellow mop flies, Y2K bugs were good, glo balls caught a lot of trout also, nymphs did well, copper johns and pheasant tails did very well, sow bugs and hares ears did well also.

Black, olive, and brown Woolly buggers and other streamers did very well in the bigger water.

Some drys were working a bit, ants, beetles, and caddis were catching few, and this will only get better as the water drops. 9' 6X leaders are working great right now, if you are using big streamers, we will use up to 9' 4X leaders (6lb) on spinning rods, I recommend 2 or 3 pound

Good luck on the river this week, looks like very little rain for a few days, should be some great fishing.

# From the Roots Up

Well, we can finally get into our gardens. We have had a few dry days, and the soil is now workable. I want to talk today about companion planting and why we do

Companion gardening is a form of organic gardening that improves plant health and yields. There are storebought organic pest control options, but this is nature's way of avoiding chemicals and pesticides in the garden.

Companion planting also helps attract beneficial insects, helps with pest and damaging insect management, enhances pollination, and helps boost nutrient up-

In vegetable gardens, you often see a lot of marigolds and nasturtiums planted. These flowers help repel (microscopic nematodes worms that damage root systems), reducing the plant's ability to get water and nutrients from the soil.

Nematode infestations result in yellowing and wilting of the plant. Marigolds also help keep vine borers from laying eggs in your cucumbers and summer and winter

I plant Basil and peppers with my tomatoes, and I keep my tomatoes away from potatoes as they both can suffer from the same blight (a fungus that affects the leaves like mildews, rusts, and smut). I also keep them away from my corn as cutworms can be a problem if grown together. When planting, separate them by three to four rows in my in-ground garden and 25 feet in my raised bed and cattle lick tub garden areas.

Green beans can be grown close to corn as beans can add nitrogen to the soil, and corn needs a lot of nitrogen to produce good-sized ears.

Green beans can also be planted close to your potatoes, cucumbers, cabbages, peas, and radishes. At the end of my rows, I plant marigolds, nasturtiums, rosemary, and summer sa-

vory. These plants seem to help with plant growth rate. Marigolds also help repel the Mexican bean beetle.

I do not plant onions or sunflowers next to my beans because they can emit a chemical into the soil that kills off the good bacteria on the roots and causes plants to be stunted.

Cucumbers can be planted next to beans, corn, dill, peas, and radishes. Next to my cucumbers, I plant marigolds and nasturtiums to repel aphids and beetles. Do not plant sage next to cucumbers, as they can stunt the growth of your plants.





10:14.61 to earn a spot on the awards podium.



# **Superintendent Speaks on Safety**

With the latest tragedy in Uvalde, Texas, many educational staff, parents, and citizens are questioning the safety of our schools, and asking what we can do, and what we have done, to prevent these atrocities before they happen.

Cassville Superintendent Merlyn Johnson spoke of student and staff safety at schools, discussing the safety protocols the Cassville school district is practicing.

Johnson states, "We have well informed and trained staff who understand the importance of individual and group setting student safety. We have updated safety measures across all of our campuses over the past few years. We just replaced the safety and security systems across all buildings and grounds. We have a resource officer on campus every school day and for many after school events.

"Cassville police officers have familiarity of the layout of all school buildings and grounds. We often jump in too quickly to reassure our students, when what they really want and need is for us to listen to their concerns. When we move too quickly to reassurance, we stop the conversation at that point. It is far more effective to ask students to tell us more. As school staff and as parents, we should engage our student/child in conveying their

thoughts about a range of ideas or possible solutions. The greatest outcome of these conversations is letting students know that we are willing for them to talk with us about anything.

"An expression in the crisis response is to never waste a crisis, and this is our opportunity to connect deeply with our students. Setting the stage for more open communication about all kinds of things in the future is key."

Eliminating unwanted entry is a key factor in determining exactly how protected an environment is.

"We have surveillance on all of our entry doors," Johnson begins. "We have primary and secondary locked entry doors, two sets of locked doors at every entry. District staff first identify visitors before buzzing them into the secured entry vestibule."

In the event of an intruder, Johnson states the district's protocols and deployed safety measures. "Detailed plans are in place to ensure student and staff safety under a variety of circumstances," Johnson says. "These plans are practiced throughout the school year. We do not share these plans with outside people.

"Two intruder 'lockdown' drills are held during the year. We will be hosting the ALICE training at the beginning of next school year."

# **Outbreak Investigation of Hepatitis A Virus: Strawberries**

The FDA, along with CDC, the Public Health Agency of Canada and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency, state, and local partners are investigating a multistate outbreak of hepatitis A infections in the United States and Canada potentially linked to fresh organic strawberries branded as Fresh-Kampo and HEB, purchased between March 5, 2022, and April 25, 2022.

Currently, the potentially affected FreshKampo and HEB products are past shelf life. People who purchased FreshKampo and HEB fresh organic strawberries between March 5, 2022, and April 25, 2022, and then froze those strawberries for later consumption should not eat them. These products were sold at the following retailers, including, but not limited to:

**HEB** Kroger Safeway Sprouts Farmers Market Trader Joe's Walmart

Aldi

Weis Markets WinCo Foods

If you are unsure of what brand you purchased, when you purchased your strawberries, or where you purchased them from prior to

freezing them, the strawberries should be thrown away.

Epidemiologic and traceback data show that fresh organic strawberries sold as FreshKampo and HEB brands that were purchased between March 5, 2022, and April 25, 2022, are a likely cause of illness in this outbreak. The traceback investigations show that cases in California, Minnesota, and Canada report having purchased fresh organic strawberries branded as FreshKampo or HEB prior to becoming ill. Illness onset dates range from March 28 -April 30, 2022.

As this investigation is ongoing, additional products may be included. More information will be provided in this advisory as it becomes available.

### Recommendation

Consumers, restaurants, and retailers should not sell, serve, or eat any fresh organic strawberries branded as FreshKampo or HEB if purchased between March 5, 2022, and April 25, 2022. People who purchased the fresh strawberries and then froze those strawberries for later consumption should not eat them. They should be thrown away. Currently, the potentially affected product is past its shelf life. If you are

unsure of what brand you purchased, when you purchased your strawberries, or where you purchased them from prior to freezing them, the strawberries should be thrown away.

If consumers purchased fresh organic strawberries branded as FreshKampo or HEB between March 5, 2022, and April 25, 2022, ate those berries in the last two weeks, and have not been vaccinated against hepatitis A, they should immediately consult with their healthcare professional to determine whether post exposure prophylaxis (PEP) is needed. PEP is recommended for unvaccinated people who have been exposed to hepatitis A virus in the last two weeks because vaccination can prevent a hepatitis A infection if given within 14 days of exposure. Those with evidence of previous hepatitis A vaccination or previous hepatitis A infection do not require PEP.

Contact your healthcare provider if you think you may have symptoms of a hepatitis A infection after eating these fresh organic strawberries, or if you believe that you have eaten these strawberries in the last two weeks.

# FDA Efforts to Result in Millions of Additional Bottles of Infant Formula to Further Increase U.S. Supply

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is providing an update on additional steps it has taken that will lead to more infant formula on U.S. store shelves in the coming weeks and months.

Under the agency's recent increased flexibilities, Bubs Australia plans to provide at least 1.25 million cans of several varieties of its infant formula . Some of this product is currently in stock for transport and additional product is being produced in the coming weeks and months. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services is evaluating options for getting the products to the U.S. as quickly as possible. The company has information about the products and where to find product once in the U.S. on the Aussie Bubs website.

The FDA notified Bubs Australia that the agency is exercising enforcement discretion for the importation of certain infant formula products following the review of information provided pertaining to nutritional adequacy and safety, including microbiological testing, labeling, and additional information about facility production and inspection history.

On Tuesday and Thursday, the FDA also announced steps that will lead to tens of millions of additional bottles of infant formula, including specialty infant formula that is in short supply for infants with certain allergies or critical health conditions. The agency is leveraging a number of flexibilities to bolster the supply of products that serve as the sole source of nutrition for many infants while ensuring the infant formula can be used safely and provides adequate nutrition. The FDA remains in further discussions with manufac-

turers and suppliers regard-

ing additional supply to ensure there's adequate infant formula available wherever and whenever parents and caregivers need it.

The FDA issued guidance on May 24 that outlined a process by which the agency would not object to the importation of certain infant formula products intended for a foreign market or distribution in the U.S. of products manufactured here for export to foreign countries. This guidance also may provide flexibilities to those who manufacture infant formula products domestically and may be able to increase further the quantity of domestically produced product for the U.S. market. The agency has posted a webpage

that will be updated with information about additional products headed to the U.S.

The agency's around-theclock work as part of the allof-government efforts has already begun to improve supply and availability. The agency expects that the measures and steps it is taking, and the potential for Abbott Nutrition's Sturgis, Michigan, facility to safely resume production in the near-term, will mean more and more supply is on the way or on store shelves moving forward. The FDA continues to

advise against making infant formulas at home or diluting formula. Caregivers are encouraged to work with their child's health care provider for recommendations on changing feeding practices, if needed. HHS has also released a fact sheet with information to help families find infant formula.

The agency also monitors online marketplaces for fraudulent products and works with major online retailers to remove violative and harmful products offered for sale on their sites.

Additionally, since many of these fraudulent products originate overseas, the agency targets and examines these products at ports of entry. The FDA also monitors and follows up on various external signals such as consumer complaints about potential counterfeit and fraudulent products.

The FDA will continue to dedicate all available resources to help ensure that infant formula products remain available for use in the U.S. and will keep the public informed of progress updates.



### How to Get Underutilized COVID Funeral Assistance Funds

Dear Savvy Senior,

I recently saw a news segment on TV about a government funeral assistance program available to families who lost loved ones during the pandemic. What can you tell me about this? I lost my 78-year-old mother to CO-VID in 2021 and want to find out if I'm still eligible for any funeral funds, and if so, what

I need to do to get them. Still Sad

Dear Sad,

I'm very sorry about the loss of your mother. The government program you are asking about is the CO-VID-19 Funeral Assistance Program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (or FEMA). This program is part of the American Rescue Plan, a stimulus package passed in 2021 in an effort to help the

country financially manage amid the pandemic.

This program, which has no end date, offers up to \$9,000 to cover the cost of a funeral for someone who died of COVID-19 as far back as January 2020.

Unfortunately, less than half the people believed eligible for funeral assistance have actually applied for it. Here's what you should know about the program's requirements and how to apply.

### Where to Start?

To apply for COVID-19 funeral assistance, you must do it over the phone by calling FEMA at 844-684-6333, anytime Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Eastern Time. The application process takes about 20 minutes.

After you apply, FEMA will provide you an application number, which you may

use to create an online account at DisasterAssistance. gov if you choose.

You will then need to submit supporting documents, including a death certificate for your mother, but it must state that her death "may have been caused by" or "was likely the result of" COVID-19 or COVID-19-like symptoms. Her death must also have occurred in the U.S. on or after Jan. 20,

If you don't have this, you won't be eligible.

You'll also need to submit proof of funeral expenses, such as itemized receipts, invoices or funeral home contracts.

These supporting documents can be submitted either online (through your DisasterAssistance.gov account), by mail (P.O. Box 10001, Hyattsville, MD

20782) or via fax (855-261-3452).

After the paperwork is received, it takes FEMA about 45 days to make an eligibility decision.

Families who had multiple deaths due to the coronavirus can also apply. One family can receive up to \$35,000 across multiple funerals.

Reimbursements can be used to cover any portion of funeral expenses including burial plots, caskets, preparation of the body, cremation, urns, clergy, services and headstones as well as costs related to state or local ordinances and producing death certificates.

But be aware that prepaid funerals are not eligible for reimbursements. Any payment made specifically for a funeral prior to death is considered a duplication and is not eligible.

If FEMA approves your application, the funds will either be deposited into your bank account or sent by mail via check, usually within a few days of approval.

If, however, you receive a letter from FEMA saying you're ineligible, or if the amount awarded is not enough, you have the right to appeal within 60 days of FEMA's decision letter.







# MU study finds health benefits of 'aging in place' at TigerPlace

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) found the majority of older adults want to stay in their own home as they age. However, given the natural decline in health that comes with aging, some older adults may have to move into a nursing home or assisted-living facility to receive more intensive levels of care.

To help older adults live independently as they 'age in place,' researchers at the University of Missouri analyzed eight years of health data from 2011 – 2019 for more than 190 residents at TigerPlace, a senior living facility developed in partnership between the MU Sinclair School of Nursing and Americare Senior Living.

Researchers found that because registered nurse care coordinators were able to identify illnesses early and quickly in residents and provide them with appropriate care and services, most of the older adults living at TigerPlace were able to stay healthier longer, which allowed them to comfortably 'age in place' and reduced their need to be transferred to a nursing home for more intensive levels of care.

TigerPlace combines the convenience and privacy of individual apartments with many recreational and socialization opportunities, such as sports bars, fitness centers, live music performances, pet therapy visits, dominoes, Bible study, bingo, volunteer opportunities and programs with local churches.

The residents at Tiger-Place received health assessments from registered nurse care coordinators every six months related to cognitive functioning, completing daily tasks, depression, the risk of falling and physical functioning. Additionally, some residents chose to use noninvasive motion, bed, and depth sensors to trend level of activity, respiratory and heart rate, and fall detection. Changes in activity, new or increased falls, and assessment were used to identify illnesses, such as pneumonia or a urinary tract infection, as early as possible so interventions could be provided quickly.

"The benefits of both the regular health assessments and use of non-invasive sensors helped to keep them steady as they age comfortably," said Lori Popejoy, lead author on the study and an associate professor in the MU Sinclair School of Nursing. "The goal is to identify slight declines in health as early as possible so the right services can be put into place, whether it is connecting them with a doctor, beginning therapy or starting

treatment for depression, whatever is needed based off the assessments."

Popejoy added the exercise and socialization opportunities available at TigerPlace help improve both physical and mental health outcomes, as well as reduce the risk of falls by improving muscle mass and strength. The average age of study participants was 84.

"The residents are able to use these services to enhance their quality of life in retirement, which allows them to live longer independently," Popejoy said. "For older adults that are still living at home and maybe starting to notice increased difficulty completing daily activities, or for those who are struggling with social isolation, moving to a facility like TigerPlace can be very helpful for living a healthier life longer and possibly avoiding the need to ever move to a nursing home."

The research study was interdisciplinary in nature, involving collaboration among nursing students, medical students, social workers, engineers and information technology professionals.

Popejoy has dedicated her career to improving the quality of care for older adults. She has provided hands-on clinical care in a variety of health care settings, from hospitals and nursing homes to community centers and home health care agencies.

"Longitudinal analysis of aging in place at TigerPlace: Resident function and wellbeing" was recently published in Geriatric Nursing.


