Community raises over \$7K for Jessica Morgan Memorial Scholarship

Sometimes the best way to show the strength of a community is to watch them amidst tragedy. In the case of the Southwest School community, that sense of solidarity raised over \$7,700 during a fundraiser held on Saturday to remember Jessica Morgan, a senior who was killed in a car wreck last fall.

Jessica's death ravaged the Southwest community, impacting not only her family, friends and teachers, but the community as a whole. As an avid Christian and athlete, she was well-loved by her teammates and those who knew her. After her death, her family searched for ways to remember her giving spirit which is what led to Saturday's event.

Her family decided to create a memorial scholar-ship to honor Jessica and to help other students in the community. Jessica's mother, Barbara Morgan, said, "Creating a memorial scholar-ship was a wonderful way to honor Jessica's life and who she was. Jessica loved helping others, and she'd be so proud of how the community has come together to help one another."

While the details of the scholarship are in the initial stages, next year and subsequent years, the family hopes to raise \$10,000 each year through annual events and donations to give away to graduating Southwest seniors to help with college expenses.

Jessica's sister, Amber Paulsen, said, "This year will be different with the scholarship because it is the first time. Part of the money we raised Saturday will go to pay for Jessica's headstone, but the rest will be used for the scholarship." At least one senior will be selected this year to the Jessica Morgan Memorial Scholarship with

the number of scholarships handed out increasing beginning next year.

Her family worked with Linda Morgan, Southwest High School teacher and Fellowship of Christian Athletes adviser, to develop a scholarship application available for students who are active in FCA. Students are asked to write an essay about their need for the scholarship. Paulsen also said, "We also want the students applying to be aware of the importance of organ donation because that was very important to Jessica."

In following years, family and friends plan to have at least three annual events to contribute to the scholarship fund, including the Fly High 5K in Jessica's memory beginning this fall.

Saturday's fundraiser included a meal, t-shirt sales, an auction and more. Many of the items donated for the sale came from local businesses. Volunteer Dia Dixon said, "I helped collect donations, advertise and work the event. I was so amazed at the generosity of both Arkansas and Missouri businesses. Everyone wanted to help in one way or another. I was even more surprised

Jessica's sister, Ashley Wallace, said, "We had people who would buy \$20 worth of stuff and give us a \$100 or \$50 bill and tell us to keep it. The way the com-

munity came together and surrounded us with love and light makes me so grateful to be a part of this small town."

on Friday, March 6, beginning at 7 p.m. Friendly competition ensued and teams had a lot of laughs along the way, as well.

Over 80 people attended

Over 80 people attended this year's event with teams sponsored by Security Bank, Crowe's Cronies book club, the Barry-Lawrence Regional Library, Cassville teachers, Commerce Bank, Freedom Bank and First State Bank competing. Teams consisted of up to eight people who answered four rounds of 15 questions each. In addition to the trivia questions, teams could also compete in bonus point games between sessions for an entry fee that benefitted Cassville Schools.

This year's emcee for the night was Donna Hayes Mallams who read questions in categories that ranged from history and sports to movies and science. Aside from the trivia questions, the games played in between rounds got the teams moving and brought a lot of laughs from the audience.

By the end of the night, the event raised \$1,172 for the Cassville Education Fund, which is a permanent endowment fund for the educational needs of the Cassville Schools.

Local law enforcement officers caught up with one man who was wanted for a warrant since November last year.

Tory Leon Fleeman, 38, of Golden, was charged with statutory sodomy in the first degree and endangering the welfare of a child on November 6, 2014. According to the affidavit of probable cause, Fleeman allegedly committed sexual acts with a 10 year-old girl in Golden. At the time of the charges, Fleeman's whereabouts were unknown to authorities.

Fleeman also had failure to appear warrants related to five misdemeanor charges related to a drunk driving incident with two children, ages

nine and ten, in the vehicle in October 2014.

After being featured as one of Barry County's Most Wanted multiple times and seeking tips on the Barry County Sheriff's Department's Facebook page, a community tip regarding Fleeman's location helped officers find him last week

On Thursday, March 5, Officer Michael Moore with the Barry County Sheriff's Department and Conservation Officer Daniel Shores arrested Fleeman at the Butterfield Stage Stop.

According to Major Leonard Collins, Chief Deputy with the Sheriff's Department, "They received a tip that he was in the area. It took them awhile to locate him, but they finally did find him."

Collins continued, "He had left the area and came back. We think he may have been living in Pierce City, but he was out of the area."

Fleeman is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$150,500 cash-only bond. His arraignment was held on March 6, and a disposition hearing is scheduled for March 26 at 8:30 a.m. with Judge Robert Foulke.

Butterfield Chili Supper raises funds for fire department

The Butterfield Firefighters Auxiliary held a chili supper on Saturday, March 7, to raise money for the Butterfield Fire Protection District. The event raised \$2,852.50, which will be used to purchase equipment the firefighters need.

According to Donnie Privett, assistant chief for the Butterfield Fire Protection District, that equipment can be expensive. "A single bunker gear suit can cost up to \$5,000," he said.

The suits, which include an air mask and an oxygen

tank, are worn by the fire-fighters when they respond to fire calls. Privett said the department responds to an average of 90 to 125 calls a year. Around 40 percent of those are for fire and the rest are medical calls.

The chili supper was originally scheduled for February 28 but had to be postponed due to severe winter weather. There had been some concern among organizers that the forced postponement might hurt attendance, but that fear proved to be unfounded. About 250 people showed up for the event.

Guests who attended the chili supper were treated not only to all they could eat chili, soup, chili dogs and desserts but entertainment as well. Journey On, a local band, played gospel music during the first hour of the event. Afterward, guests had an opportunity to bid on a wide variety of items, including gift certificates for Branson shows and homemade pies during the silent and pie auctions. A live auction conducted by auctioneer Brad Holder capped off the night's events.

In addition to the items that were auctioned off, mer-

chandise from some local businesses was also available for sale. Jennifer Privett, owner of Diva Bling, sold purses, jewelry and other accessories, and she donated her profit to the fire department.

Sara Haefner, owner of

Sara Haefner, owner of Emergency Personnel Accessories, and her husband Randy, a firefighter with the Lebanon Fire Protection District, also had a table set up with a number of t-shirts, printed scrubs, dress blue uniforms and other items worn by emergency personnel. According to Randy Haefner, Emergency Personnel Accessories donated \$100 worth of their merchandise to be used in the silent and live auctions.

Holding the chili supper was a true team effort. According to Sherry Sears, Treasurer of the auxiliary, there were at least 36 volunteers, including auxilary members, firefighters, firefighter cadets and family members, involved in planning, setting up and carrying out the event. Auxiliary members purchased and cooked the food. They also baked pies for the pie auction and solicited local businesses and Branson theaters for items to use in the silent and live auctions. Altogether, 69 items and 12 pies were auctioned off.

Volunteers also gave generously of their time. According to Sears, they worked about two and a half hours on the evening before the chili supper and all day Saturday

Cassville man formally indicted on sex charges

A former Barry County man was formally indicted on two counts of sex crimes by a federal grand jury last

Michael Douglas Peterson, 32, of Morristown, Tenn., had a federal criminal complaint filed against him on January 23 for using a minor to produce child pornography and using a cell phone to entice the minor to engage in illicit sexual behavior.

According to an affidavit of probable cause by Task Force Officer Tim Williams with the Southwest Missouri Cyber Crimes Task Force, Peterson and the 15 year-old victim had sexual intercourse in March 2014 in Cassville, and the investigation was initiated by the Cassville Police Department.

According to Williams, Peterson and the victim exchanged multiple photographs via SnapChat on their cell phones as well as illicit conversations. A warrant was initially issued through Barry County for statutory rape in the second degree, but officers were unable to locate Peterson to serve it.

Officers eventually located Peterson in Morristown, Tenn., where he was living with the victim, who

was pregnant with Peterson's child, and her biological mother. Peterson stated in an interview that he had been living with the victim since June 2014. The victim's mother was aware of the sexual nature of their relationship and allowed Peterson to live with her daughter, according to the court papers.

The victim was taken into protective custody of the state of Tennessee and placed in foster care pending an investigation, according to the affidavit.

The case is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Ami Harshad Miller. It was investigated by the Southwest Missouri Cyber Crimes Task Force, Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) and the FBI.

Purdy woman seriously injured in Hwy. 37 crash

A Purdy woman was seriously injured last week at a crash at Highways 37 and W in Butterfield.

Vicki D. Shockley, 59, of Purdy, was driving a 1998 Chevrolet Cavalier and made a left turn across Highway 37. Shockley turned in front of a 2001 Chevrolet Tahoe, driven by Jarod L. Stockton, 36, of Cassville, causing the Tahoe

Shockley was airlifted to Cox Hospital in Springfield with serious injuries. She was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

The Tahoe's driver and passengers also received minor injuries from the crash. The driver, passenger April F. Stockton, 32, and three minor passengers received minor injuries are were taken to various hospitals, including Cox South in Springfield and Cox Hospital in Monett. All of the Tahoe's passengers were wearing seat belts at the time of the crash.

Voters to decide on ambulance sales tax

On April 7, there will be an unprecedented election in Barry County where some of the county's voters will cast ballots and some will not.

In 1973, the legislature enacted a law permitting counties to establish ambulance districts. Prior to that time, the funeral homes, for the most part, furnished ambulance service and, if possible, collected modest fees from the patient.

It all change in 1973 when districts throughout the state began forming tax-supported access. One was formed in Barry County.

The remnants of that district are essentially all of Barry County except the Monett and Purdy townships. They will not be affected by the Tuesday election as they are in a separate district.

The present district collects around \$225,000 in tax revenue, which is the tax imposed where the district was originally formed.

The present ambulance board made up of Ken Cieslinski, Cassville Region; Lisa Prewitt, Exeter/Wheaton Region; David Dalton, Selig-

Gilreath, Golden Region; Tom Rees, Shell Knob Region; and Gary Luppen, Cassville/ Butterfield Region; feels the income from the tax levy is not sufficient to sustain the operation at its present level, and they are asking for an increase of income which would be from a one-half cent sales tax, which would result in doing away with the present real-estate tax that produced \$227,419 in 2014, and the added tax would bring in an increase of around half a million dollars annually. Estimates by tax authorities run anywhere from just under half a million to as much as \$600,000 or \$700,000 each year to fund the ambulance district.

How to spot an unhealthy tree

Perhaps because they can live for so many years, trees have a way of falling down homeowners' landscaping priority lists. Trees also tend to be big and strong, so it's no surprise that they often are overlooked in favor or other areas of a lawn and garden that don't seem so strong in the face of Mother Nature.

But trees are susceptible to damage and disease, and homeowners who learn to recognize symptoms of such problems can prevent them from escalating and reduce the risk that the trees will cause damage to their properties. The following are just some of the ways homeowners can determine if their trees are unhealthy. Homeowners who suspect they have a tree that poses a safety risk should contact a professional tree service for an immediate inspection and steer clear of the tree until an inspection has been performed.

Check around the base of the tree. The base of a tree may offer some telltale signs that the tree is unhealthy. Soil that is cracked or raised at the base of the tree may be indicative of a tree that has started to uproot. If you recognize any cracking or if the anyone unlucky enough to soil is raised, look at the tree to see if it is leaning. If the soil is cracked or raised because it is uprooting, then the tree might have already started to lean in the opposite direction of the cracking or raised soil.

Examine for fungus. The growth of fungus on the tree trunk or close to it may be a sign that the tree is rotting or decaying. Fungal growth, of mushrooms, around the base of the tree is another sign of decay. If the wood behind fungal growth crumbles easily, then homeowners should call a professional tree service, as the fungal problem on the tree has likely already been festering for quite some

Look for cavities on the trunk. Cracks and cavities on a tree may not be an emergency, but especially deep cracks and cavities may be indicative of a structural problem. Multiple cracks and cavities also serve as red flags.


Look for dead wood. It may sound simple, but dead wood poses a threat to the tree and anyone who happens to spend time in its vicinity. Dead wood snaps easily, and falling dead wood can harm

be beneath the tree when the dead wood snaps. Dead wood branches won't bend in the wind, and such branches frequently fall off of trees when strong gusts of wind come along. Dead branches either won't have leaves or the leaves will be brown (dead pine branches will have brown needles).

Weak connections. Unsuch as a sudden population healthy trees often have weak connections between their branches and their trunks. If branches don't appear to be strongly connected to the tree bark, call a tree service to determine a solution. The tree might not be on its way out, but you may have to take steps to strengthen the connections so branches are not at risk of falling.



Chamber to host Ballot Issues luncheon

Challengers this

year are Wade Hermansen and Dale Phelps. All four candidates will be present at the event to answer approved questions. Each of the terms for school board members is three years.

In the Cassville City Council election, two seats are up for election, the North and South Ward alderman positions. Incumbent for the North Ward seat Ann Hennigan is facing challenger Jon Horner. Hennigan has served on the City Council for three years. In the South Ward, incumbent Jan Anthony is facing challenger Cindy Carr. Anthony has served on the City Council for two years. Hennigan, Horner and Carr are all sated to attend the event, but Anthony will not be present. Terms for Cassville City Council seats are for two years.


Representing the South Barry County Ambulance District Board, Chairperson Ken Cieslinski will be at the luncheon to ask question about the district's proposed sales tax. The board is asking for voters to change their funding from a real estate levy to a half-cent sales tax instead to generate more revenue to replace aging equipment and meet demands of the district





"I have often thought that nothing would do more good at a small expense than the establishment of a small circulating library in every county, to consist of a few well chosen books, to be lent to the people of the county under regulations as would secure their safe return in due time."

While libraries have changed greatly since the times of Thomas Jefferson, America's need for library services have not. According to a study in 2006 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation*, 71 percent of people using the library cite the library as their primary source of access to a computer and the Internet.

Studies show that because of the recession and job shortages, low-income Americans are using the public library more and more for job research, job applications and continuing education. They are using the library to research health care issues and for government health care resources. Students use the library for their homework. The children's programs at the library give them a head start on learning. A library is more then just a place to check out a book. It is a safe haven in the community. Students may study at the library just to have a quiet place to do so.

A public library can and should be something that our community can be proud of. Shell Knob needs a new library for many reasons. Presently, our library has outgrown its small space. We are grateful that the land for a new library has been generously donated to our community, but there is still much to he done

With a new library there could be room for more computers, for all our citizens to use. It would be handicap accessible, and the children's area could be partitioned off to allow for peace and quiet.

There could be a quiet spot to read newspapers and periodicals. There is a huge need for a secure Wi-Fi system. 

Barry County Health Department February Food Service Report

Seligman moves forward on new splash pad

The Seligman City Council took another step forward in building a new splash pad at the park next to the Seligman Community Center during their monthly meeting on Monday, March 9. The council voted to purchase additional equipment which will be used to operate the splash pad, including a soft-touch ground sensor, a drain and a timer for \$1,476.

In addition to the splash pad, the council voted to create another upgrade to the park. Wal-Mart recently donated \$1,500 to the city to go towards the purchase of park benches. The council voted to use the funds to purchase 10 benches. Five of them will be positioned around the new splash pad and the other five in other places at the park.

In wake of the recent winter storms, the council also considered purchasing a new snow plow for \$5,200 but chose to hold off as it is Winter is coming to an end. The council will look again into purchasing a plow in

Fall.

Brian Nichols, City Clerk, said that the paper work for two grants to reimburse the city for plugging City Well #2 had been submitted. He also told the council that a grant submitted to the Missouri Department of Natural Resources to fund a water study had been rejected on the grounds that there are no funds available with the state right now. Nichols added that Olsson Associates, the engineering firm that is handling the city's water study and lagoon upgrades, had to told him to send over the grant application to them. According to Nichols, Olsson will put the grant in front of their lobbyist, who will try to get funding for the city when new funds become available.

The council also discussed upgrading the city's lagoon. Nichols told the council the upgrades to the city's lagoon were on hold as Olsson has requested a report on the gallon per minute flow from the lagoon's irrigation pump to the sprinkler heads. He also

stated Olsson wants the city to replace the lagoon's pump and motor head that feeds water to the sprinkler heads that will pump the water with less pressure, but Seligman's position is that the current pump and motor head are working just fine. "It's an unnecessary expense," Nichols said.

In other business, the council voted to raise Police Chief Terry Burgess's monthly pay from \$500 to \$750. They also voted to advertise an available maintenance position with the city and the availability of funds to pay for GED classes and testing for those who would like to get a GED but are unable to because of the cost.

At the end of the meeting, Alderman Eric Freeman announced that he was stepping down as he is beginning a new career as a program assistant with the Arkansas Department of Human Services. He will be replaced by Bob Hughes, who is running unopposed for the position of West Alderman during the election on April 7.

Huge sales tax revenue jump seen in March

Sales tax revenue received in March was a huge increase over last year's figures for both Barry County and the city of Cassville.

Barry County's revenue was up 18.38 percent over figures from 2014, giving the county an additional \$24,596.37 for the month on the half-cent sales tax. The 3/8 cent sales tax for the county generated an additional \$7,704.99 in revenue from the 23.04 percent increase over 2014.

Cassville's revenue was also up over 2014 by 16.2 percent. In March 2014, Cassville received \$61,591.25 in revenue. This year, the city received \$71,599.52 for their general one-cent tax. The increase in revenue was \$10,008.27 between the two years.

For the year, Barry County currently is at a 13.36 percent increase for the year. That increase put the county at \$55,855.67 in additional sales tax revenue on the general half-

Cassville's revenue is up 10.4 percent over 2014 with an additional \$20,233.70 received for the year so far.



In their four years, they have won two tournaments (Spokane Invitational and the Southwest Holiday Tournament), but more than that, they served as excellent role models to future Wildcat basketball players." -Coach Danny Powers

It has been a somber and challenging few weeks in our State Capitol. As most of you know by now, we lost a skilled and determined auditor, dedicated public servant, and proud Missourian last week. Missouri State Auditor Tom Schweich was a brilliant man who dedicated his career to serving his state and country. He was a fifth generation Missourian, grew up and attended high school in the St. Louis area, and was a graduate of both Yale and Harvard Law Schools. His resume was equally as impressive and included a stint as Chief of Staff to Senator John C. Danforth during the investigation of the Branch Davidian tragedy in Waco, Texas; service as Chief of Staff to three United States Ambassadors for the United Nations, including John Bolton; and a turn as Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of State and Acting Assistant Secretary of State at the Bureau for International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs on the federal level.

As auditor, he confronted waste and abuse in state government and took on tough issues like tax credits and ethics reform. He was a perfect fit for the job and performed it with energy and passion. In fact, he had just been elected to a second term last November after a very successful four years on the job. Perhaps more than anything, Tom Schweich was a devoted husband and father, and that is where our focus should be as we try to make sense of this terrible tragedy. My most heartfelt condolences go out to them and I hope they are able to find peace and comfort in the man he was and the immense good he did for everyone around him. He will be missed and we can honor him for more personal accolades and accomplishments than we can count but most of all we can recognize him for the title most appropriate to him: husband and father.

Prior to last Thursday's tragic events, I spent part of my week meeting with officials from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources discussing Roaring River State Park. Constituents had brought to my attention problems with vegetation growth and maintenance at the park. Along with Rep. Scott Fitzpatrick, we thoroughly inspected the issue at the park and found a number of problem areas that needed attention. We immediately brought those concerns to the attention of the Department of Natural Resources in a series of meetings at my office in the Capitol. Officials from the department assured me that the issue would be addressed quickly and in time for our busy summer tourism season.

Roaring River and our other area parks and waterways are naturally beautiful resources that attract many and are tremendous assets to our local economy. Last year, a record 18.5 million people visited Missouri's state parks breaking the 2012 record and is a 25 percent increase over 2008. Attendance at Roaring River increased by over 10 percent while over a million people visited Table Rock Lake. Back in 2013, Missourians named Roaring River as their favorite state park in a www.MO.gov online poll. Particularly, Roaring River is known as a favorite trout fishing spot with anglers coming from all around to fish its waters. Trout season opened at the park earlier this week and while the weather kept some away, it was still a great success and will only improve in the coming weeks and months.

Missouri has great interest in and passion for the outdoors, and it is exciting to see so many people taking advantage of the beauty and fun of Roaring River, Table Rock Lake, and our other outdoors areas provide. Missouri has consistently been named among the best states for camping, its trails are recognized as some of the best in the country and attendance at our parks continues to grow. This should be a great source of pride for Missourians and our area in particular.







and Resource Expo will be held at the Scott Regional Technical Center in Monett on Tuesday, March 24. The event, which is being organized by a group of volunteers, will showcase vendors who provide a variety of services to the developmentally disabled in the Barry and Lawrence County area.

According to Geneva Blue, an instructor with Monett R-I School District who is helping to organize the Expo, about 50 vendors have been invited to participate. She expects 40 to 45 will attend.

The goal of the exposition is to help those with developmental disabilities in the area as well as their families, guardians and caregivers, learn more about the services that are available. Blue said having the event in Monett will also make it easier for people to meet the vendors and learn about the services offered, as previously they would have had to have gone to Springfield or Joplin.

"For a lot of families, going to Joplin or Springfield is a hardship due to the costs of gas and transportation," she said. "The Expo brings the vendors here and the families can

to someone in an informal setting and establish a relationship."

Blue is especially hoping to reach the families of young children who are developmentally disabled. She said that the earlier in life a person receives assistance the better. "If you wait until high school to get services," she said, "you've waited too long."

Another group living in the Barry-Lawrence County Area Blue is hoping to reach are those who only speak Spanish. "The Spanish-speaking population is a group we have trouble getting here," she said. "Many of these services would be beneficial to their family members with developmental disabilities."

Some people may not be willing to speak to a complete stranger about a family member who is developmentally disabled. Another event organizer, Marla Townsend, Program Coordinator for Alternative Opportunities, said she understands their reluctance and that there is no need for them to speak to anyone at the Expo. "They can come in, walk the tables and pick up information as they walk along," she said.

Expo to showcase services for developmentally disabled

While the service exhibits will be the main part of the Expo, two special breakout sessions will also be held. One of these is called "Guardianship and Alternatives." Three people will speak: Randee Stemmons, an attorney from Mt. Vernon; Pam Fobar, a guardian; and Bill Alexander, whose son is developmentally disabled. "The session with present three different perspectives," said Townsend. "A parent's side, an attorney's side and a guardian's side."

The other breakout session covers MO HealthNet, an agency that is responsible for purchasing and monitoring healthcare for Missouri's low-income and vulnerable citizens. Margaret Arnaud, a case manager for the Lawrence County Family Support Division, will answer questions and give information about available healthcare ser-

This is the fifth year for the Expo, and not only has it helped people with developmentally disabilities meet the service providers who can help them, it has encouraged those provid-

ers to establish locations nearby. "We've had some new vendors set up services in the area," said Cathy Backs, Team Director for the Lawrence County Board of Developmental Disabilities. "For example, Champion Athletes have set up bowling, basketball and water exercises here." Before Champion Athletes came to the area, people with developmentally disabilities who wanted to participate in these activities would have been required to travel to Springfield or Joplin.

The Expo will also feature some fun activities. A free, light dinner will be served from 3:30 p.m. to 6 p.m. and there will be demonstrations of music therapy and a Zumba class. Door prizes will also be given away throughout the evening.

The Expo takes place from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. and is free and open to the public. The Scott Regional Technical Center is located at 2 David Sippy Drive in Monett behind the Monett High School. For more information, call (417) 235-7022 or see the ad on page
