Get to Know Your Presiding Commissioner Candidates; Election Aug. 2

Put broadly, the presiding commissioner is the pocketbook of a county.

The individual elected to this position has complete authority in authorizing expenditures of their county. Therefore, the presiding commissioner's signature on a document is, in essence, the signature of the county.

With the previous Presiding Commissioner for Barry County, Gary Youngblood, not seeking re-election, three candidates are now campaigning for the position: Steve Blankenship, Drew Henbest, and Chad Johnson.

The role of presiding

commissioner is very important, as they are tasked with representing the interests of the entire county, maintaining an open ear to the concerns of the public, and ensuring that they are heard and addressed. The presiding commissioner works alongside the other two district commissioners, with equal voting power.

However, there are two primary functions that differentiate this role from the two district commissioners. The first is that the presiding commissioner will be in charge of leading commission meetings. This responsibility is far more strenuous

than possibly assumed, as it requires unparalleled awareness of crucial county-wide infrastructure issues and other county matters.

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Secondly, the elected candidate is the architect of a county's expenditures. The presiding commissioner occupies the role of official chief executive officer of the county, regarding the signing of payments and contracts.

Local elections rarely draw similar attention as national elections, though local elections offer citizens a way to directly affect your county and your town.

An Aurora man was killed in a crash west of Jenkins last Wednesday at 10:24 a.m.

According to a crash report by the Missouri Highway Patrol, Patrick Anderson, 38, of Aurora was eastbound on Farm Road 1180, three and a half miles west of Jenkins in a 2021 Kawasaki ZX10R, when a northbound 2001 Chevrolet 2500 failed to yield to Anderson, causing a fatal

collision. Anderson was pronounced deceased on scene by Barry County Coroner Gary Swearingen at 1:30 p.m.

Anderson was transported by the Barry County Coroner to Fohn Funeral Home in Cassville.

The driver of the 2001 Chevrolet fled the scene with information still unknown. Anderson was wearing a safety device at the time of

Steve Blankenship Age: 57

City of Residence: Jenkins

1. What do you feel Barry County's largest concern is? How would you face it?

The largest concern I can see right now is the economy as a whole. \$5.00 gas & diesel plus rising inflation could possibly slow tourism, which could result in lower sales tax revenue, which in turn hurts the county budget.

I believe the best way to face it is consulting with each of the elected officials and evaluating everything in our budget together as we go.

2. How will you promote positive relationships with all other county offices and officials?

The first thing to promote is positive relationship with the other county officers and officials to keep good open communication and stay up with what they need to do their jobs and work with each of them.

Chad Johnson Age: 35

City of Residence: Eagle Rock

1. What do you feel Barry County's largest concern is? How would you face it?

There's not one thing that I would consider the largest concern in the county but a few things that are no secret to citizens. The substance abuse in the county is very disheartening. We need to do what we can to combat substance abuse and protect our citizens. We live in a great area, but we aren't immune from bad things happening.

2. How will you promote positive relationships with all other county offices and officials?

1. What do you feel Barry County's largest concern is? How would you face it?

I think the largest concern at this time would be the jail project. My focus would be to make sure it comes in on time and on budget, and then address any needs that arise because of it.

The county desperately needs is road district reform. We've got 26 independent road districts in the county, we are a very large county, but we don't need 26. I'd like to get that into a 8 - 10 range. We've got a lot of small districts with a lot of money, and a lot of large districts without any money, and that's something I'd like to try to get on the ballot, so we can help more people with the roads.

2. How will you promote positive relationships with all other county offices and officials?

I would just keep an open dialogue with everyone. One thing that I would like to do would be to post in the paper, and online, a quarterly report, with reasoning. That way, there's more engagement with the community itself. There are a lot of people who don't know why the commission is doing things the way they are. Then the same with those above me, at the state and federal level, just making sure I'm informed with what's going on on the state level, and what

our needs are down here.

3. What is your opinion of the present budget, and what changes, if any, would you make if elected?

There are no large holes in the budget that I've seen. One thing that I am interested in seeing is, recreational marijuana is on the ballot for this November, and if that passes, the county can levy up to a 3% sales tax. That would be a big boom to the county's finances. Something I'd like that money to go to is more mental health initiatives.

I did notice that this county lacks any kind of website with information. That's something that I think on a government level, that's something we should invest in, so people know what's going on in the county.

We were proud to call



From the Roots Up



Greetings friends!

As I drive around town I see gardens thriving. If yours is not in its not too late. There are still plenty of tomato and pepper plants in the garden sections of Walmart, Lowes and Home Dept. I saw watermelon, squash, eggplant, and plenty of herbs. Plants are pricey though. Best way is to just buy seed and grow

your own. Its too late to plant tomato and pepper seeds but you still got time to plant squash seeds, bean seeds, corn seeds, carrots and beet seeds, pumpkin and melon seeds. These will be ready to harvest in the fall. I plant beans every 2 weeks all summer long. Some of my best green beans have been planted in August. After the first of July it will be too late to plant melons, pumpkins and winter squash. They take 90 to 105 days to mature and we wont have that many days before our first frost. There is a reason why the old timers ate so many green beans. They are easy to grow, easy to

can and have a short growth time. I have a friend who told me once if his mom did not can 200 jars of green beans each summer she was concerned how she would feed her family. His job was to cut the firewood and feed the open fire that she canned over. Just think of that! I tell you our ancestors were tough people. Today we have pressure canners that we just fill and turn a dial on the stove to preserve those beans while sitting in an air conditioned house watching the pressure gauge. 25 minutes and the beans are done. Easy work compared to our ancestors.

So if your garden is plant-

ed you will need to water it to keep it alive. Try to water as early in the morning as possible. Try to water deep and slow so the roots will grow down to find moisture. Strong, deep roots make better plants. Try to water at ground level. Getting the leaves of the plants wet can cause all kinds of plant diseases which can either kill your plant or greatly reduce the harvest. Do not spray from overhead with sprinklers or a nozzle. I really like soaker hoses. They are inexpensive and last several years if taken in after gardening season is over. By using a faucet splitter and hooking up 2

to 4 hoses from the same faucet you can water with multiple hoses. I use a regular hose to get to the garden then attach the regular hose to the soaker hose which I leave laying on the ground under the leaves all summer. Another option is to use plastic milk jugs or juice bottles with holes in the bottom, fill and let them soak down slowly. I pull the mulch back just a little bit and set the container right on the soil. Raised beds and container gardens need to be watered daily whereas in ground gardens needs a deep soaking once or twice a week. Enjoy gardening this week!

Gauge a fair rate to pay for custom farm services

Knowing whether to own farm equipment or hire a custom operator to apply pesticides or other inputs often comes down to cost.

The most recent survey found that chemical application costs in Missouri ranged from \$5 to \$8 per acre and averaged \$7 per acre, says Ray Massey, MU Extension agricultural economist.

Monitor mental health as farm responsibilities ramp up

When raising crops and livestock, farmers can experience many stressors that are largely beyond their control. As you manage heavy farm workloads, check in with yourself and your loved ones about the importance of personal health and well-being, says Joni Harper, MU Extension county engagement specialist.

To help manage stress, you can enroll in the Skills for Psychological Recovery for Farm Stress program from the University of Missouri's Psychological Services Clinic.

The program helps farmers, ranchers and their immediate families cope with anxiety and stress related to farming and ranching. Participants can receive as many as five free teletherapy sessions that focus stress-reduction skills. To request telehealth services, go to muext. us/RuralTelehealth.

Four steps when communicating with farm land-

Communication make or break a relationship between a farm tenant and farm landowner. MU Extension agricultural business specialist Karisha Devlin suggests that farm tenants take four steps to communicate well with landowners.

- 1. Assess how often landowners would like to receive updates. Maybe it's monthly or seasonally.
- 2. Select a communication channel that you and the landowner feel comfortable using. You might consider an e-newsletter or social media
- 3. Share about topics that interest the landowner. Examples include crop progress management summaries, practice changes and weather
- 4. Keep the presentation simple. Use easy-to-read words and fonts, and create a design that doesn't detract from your message.

Plan for marketing your hay crop

For the most part, producers who sell hay must create their own markets rather than rely on elevators or other agribusinesses to buy their crop. If you're raising hay as a crop to sell this year, make a marketing plan now, says MU Extension county engagement specialist Jason

Your marketing plan should identify the buyers you want to reach, such as cattle producers, horse owners, hay brokers or industrial users. Certain buyers may look for a certain type of hay, such as fescue, clover or alfalfa.

When pricing hay, consider the volume and nutritional value of the bales you sell. Test hay samples for quality and use that information in your marketing messages. Find more information about hay marketing at muext.us/MarketingHay.

Make time for three types of farm meetings

As you plan the second half of 2022, MU Extension agricultural business specialist Wesley Tucker recommends scheduling three types of farm meetings. Blocking time on your calendar for these meetings can improve your farm's communication and increase its productivity.

Operating meetings. Schedule operating meetings every week or every day to create agendas and set goals for each farm employee.

Family business meetings. At regularly scheduled family business meetings, include everyone involved in day-today farm operations. Meet at an off-site venue, and use the time to clarify responsibilities and roles within the business, create a culture of group decision-making and plan for the future.

Family council meetings. Host an annual family council meeting to allow all family members — even those who work and live off the farm to learn about the family business and issues that affect the family.

On June 27, 1972 Rickie Allen Carter and Connie Sue (Gregurek) Carter were wed in Port Lavaca, Tex. They spent their first few years of marriage in Texas, but by 1976, decided they wanted to move to the Ozarks region of Missouri, and fulfill their dream of becoming hillbilling

Over time they built their dirt floor home just up the hill and carried buckets of water from the spring to have water in the home. There they had three children: in 1979 Christopher, in 1982 Ivy, and in 1983 Erin.

dream and persevered.

On February 29, 1984, a fire took the home, which by this time had a floor and 2 additions, but their family was spared when Christopher, their eldest son, woke up. The hair on the back of Rickie's head was singeing as

he got his family out to safety. With snow on the ground, no shoes on their feet, only the clothes on their backs, and their babies in their arms, they were grateful to be alive.

As time passes, a new home is built. Along with Rickie's dream to become a hillbilly, he also had a dream to turn the swimming hole into a lake. In 1986, work on the lake began. Rickie bought a bulldozer and began pushing dirt to form the dam, creating a crater for the springs to fill. It became their oasis in the Ozarks. The family gathered and played here for many years. In the early years, they referred to it as Fate Hollow Lake.

If you are familiar with Faith Hollow Lake, you know it's much more than a simple swimming hole. So, how did it get to where it is today? The cabin, tabernacle, playground? We need to go back and explain a little further.

At work one day, an 18 year old young man, Gerald, began witnessing to her, he asked her if she was saved and when she responded with, "Yes, I'm saved, I know who Jesus is," his response shocked her, he



said, "Even Satan knows who Jesus is - but do you know Jesus as your personal savior?" 



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
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Keeping the family in the farm and the farm in the family

Successfully transitioning a family farming business to the next generation doesn't happen overnight.

University of Missouri Extension agricultural business specialist Wesley Tucker says it takes planning and "communication, communication, communication."

To help families start the succession planning process and initiate communication, Tucker and an MU Extension team will lead two-hour workshops across the state in July and August. Six of the workshops will be in-person events at various locations, and one will be held online via Zoom.

The Missouri Department of Agriculture and FCS Financial provided funding for the workshops.

Tucker says fear of conflict stops many families from pursuing succession plans, but sitting down together and communicating what everyone wants takes a lot of the angst out of the process.

"You will make some mistakes," he says. "There is no perfect plan to transition a family farm business to its heirs when you want the farm business to continue running, which is the goal of succession."

No one enjoys conflict, so we often avoid difficult conversations, Tucker says. But it's important to engage in "intentional communication" in the form of regular family business meetings.

"While it might sound foreign, the more we can separate ourselves from the family roles and treat it like a business, the greater our chances of actually making this work," he says.

The U.S. Small Business Administration found that businesses are more at risk of failure when transitioning to family members instead of people outside the family.

"Keeping the family in the farm and the farm in the family is the goal of nearly every Missouri producer," says Chris Chinn, director of the Missouri Department of Agriculture. "In order to do that, producers must be intentional and focused to prepare a succession plan that takes all parties and priorities into consideration. Navigating this process can be very daunting. This workshop will help answer questions while providing a road map for preparing a plan that works for your operation."

Unlike estate plans that start into motion after an event — typically, a funeral - succession plans should not depend on an event, says

"If they do, then successors who have been involved in their family businesses risk that they won't be adequately compensated for their efforts if anything happens to go wrong before that event," he

Succession planning's focus on handing off business operations also makes it different from estate planning, which involves giving your land and equipment to your

"That's easy," Tucker says. "But if the goal is to keep the farm business together, then you also need a succession plan."

Tucker says the MU Extension "Preparing for Farm Succession Planning" workshop will show farmers the path from where their businesses are today to where they want their businesses to be when they're gone. At successor gains experience in management and has greater responsibility to make decisions, he says.

During this process, the role of parent transitions from chief decision-maker to chief mentor and supporter.

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How to Choose a Medicare Supplemental (Medigap)

Policy

Dear Savvy Senior, I'm planning to enroll in original Medicare in a few months and have been told I probably need to get a Medicare supplemental policy too.

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Almost 65

Dear Almost,

If you're enrolling in original Medicare, getting a supplemental policy (also known as Medigap insurance) too is a smart idea because it will help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and the Part A deductible.

Here are some tips to help you choose an appropriate

Medigap Plans

In all but three states (Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin), Medigap plans, which are sold by private health insurers, are available to new enrollees in eight different standardized plans. These plans are labeled with the letters A, B, D, G, K, L, M and N, with two more, C and F, that are only available to those eligible for Medicare before

Plan G is the most popular policy among new enrollees because it covers the most comprehensive range of benefits. Monthly premiums for Plan G typically range between \$100 and \$300, depending on your age and the state you reside in. If that's more than you're willing to pay, there are also highdeductible plans that have lower premiums but impose higher out-of-pocket costs.

How to Choose

To pick a Medigap policy that works best for you, consider your health, family medical history and your budget. The differences among plans can be small and rather confusing.

To help you choose, visit Medicare.gov/medigap-supplemental-insurance-plans and type in your ZIP code. This will give you a list of the plans available in your area, their price ranges and the names, and contact information of companies that sell

But to get specific pricing information, you'll need to contact the carriers directly or call your State Health Insurance Assistance Program. See ShipHelp.org or call 877-839-2675 for contact infor-

Since all Medigap policies with the same letter must

cover the exact same benefits (it's required by law), you should shop for the cheapest policy.

You'll get the best price if you sign up within six months after enrolling in Medicare Part B. During this open-enrollment period, an insurer cannot refuse to sell you a policy or charge you more because of your health.

You also need to be aware of the pricing methods, which will affect your costs. Medigap policies are usually sold as either: "community-rated" where everyone in an area is charged the same premium regardless of age; "issue-age-rated" that is based on your age when you buy the policy, but will only increase due to inflation, not age; and "attained-age-rated," that starts premiums low but increases as you age.

Community-rate issue-age-rated policies are the best options because they will save you money in the long run.

You can buy the plan

directly from an insurance company, or you can work with a reputable insurance broker.

Drug Coverage

You also need to know that Medigap policies do not cover prescription drugs, so if you don't have drug coverage, you'll need to buy a separate Medicare Part D drug

See Medicare.gov/plancompare to compare plans. Also note that Medigap plans do not cover vision, dental care, hearing aids or longterm care.

Instead of getting original Medicare, plus a Medigap policy and a separate Part D drug plan, you could sign up for a Medicare Advantage plan (see medicare.gov/plancompare) that provides allin-one coverage.

These plans, which are sold by insurance companies, are generally available through HMOs and PPOs that require you to get your care within a network of doc-

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
